European DX Council.

EDXC has a new member club, DX International of West Germany. The club was founded in 1970 and at present has 105 members. The club covers all areas of DXing, but especially shortwave. Their annual membership fee is 12.00 DM. President of the club is Bernd Kreh, and secretary is Heinz-Dieter Muerkoster. The club publication, WELLENREITER, is issued monthly with 12 offset-printed pages. None of the bulletin is in English. The club's address is D-71 Heilbronn, Faistst 12/1, West Germany.

DXers Subjected to Fraud Attempts.

The International Radio Club of America's D X MONITOR warns DXers of fraudulent schemes for obtaining money from them. A person or persons using the address, Mail's Office, GPO, Accra, Ghana, is attempting to obtain money from DXers with requests for small amounts of money to buy a radio. Those shortwave DXers who have sent reports to Radio Ghana seem to be the most likely targets.

And, D X MONITOR reports that DXers whose names and addresses have been published in the Radio Japan News and similar listener newsletters of other broadcast organizations have been subjected to various forms of attempted fraud.

DX Stamp Service.

As of January 1, 1972, DX Stamp Service has a new address: G. N. Robertson W2AZX, 83 Roder Parkway, Ontario, New York 14519. For those not familiar with this service, DX Stamp Service has, for several years, supplied DXers with current mint stamps of almost every country of the world--stamps which often would be difficult, if not impossible, to obtain from any other source.

In view of the recent devaluation of the U.S. dollar on the world market, it would probably be a good idea to get a current price list from DX Stamp Service before placing an order.

101 Things A Bright Boy Can Do

It seems to me that by and large, SWBC DXers do a good job when it comes to keeping tabs on what's being broadcast these days. Rare is the new station that comes on the air without being quickly identified. Rare is the frequency change that isn't noted and reported.... But it seems to me that one area we tend to neglect, particularly when compared with our medium wave (BCB) compatriots, is hobby research. I'm afraid we tend to stick with what we know and do little to develop new techniques of listening, dig out background data that could help with our listening, make use of some of the vast amounts of technical information available.

For example, in recent years the BCB phase of the hobby has come up with new antenna developments, such as the altiazimuthal loop, which is a tremendous improvement over the traditional standard air loops used for decades. Doesn't the SWBC phase of the DX'ing hobby have technically inclined persons who could come up with a similar breakthrough? And I don't just mean the tinkerer playing around with antennas... Surely there has been plenty of research by the military, by industry in the area of short-wave antenna design. Where is the SWBC DX'er who could have dug out this existing research and have applied it to the hobby? For the practical man who doesn't have the theoretical background to design, how about coming up with, say, a parallel to the Joystick that the enterprising DXer could build himself (at a fraction of the cost of commercially made models).

For those who aren't technically trained or gifted, there is other new ground to be broken. Why, for example, haven't SWBC DXers compiled the lists of stations operating in Latin American countries? BCB clubs regularly publish researched lists of Dominican stations; Ecuadorian stations, etc in their bulletins. The information must be there, from government sources or from station personnel at other outlets in the country-- or even from other DX publications.

What about propagation? How much do DX'ers know about those factors which determine when we can hear certain stations, and when we can't? We rely on basic, generalized propagation charts that show only favorable bands for reception from large geographic areas. Why not more specific data on when to tune for specific, rare DX targets? Isn't there someone who can do some in-depth probing and provide us the techniques we could all use?

It would seem that there is a wealth of material available in club bulletins, domestic and foreign, past and present, which (if compiled) would be of great use to DXers. Manual compilation of this data is not only tedious and time consuming, it is old-fashioned and unnecessary in a day of the computer and various other information retrieval systems. Several BCB clubs have already made use of computer techniques to compile data--surely there must be persons in the SWBC hobby phase with the same computer skills...

Most DXers recognize the value of foreign language report forms. But although the forms we now use are helpful, aren't they rather stereotyped? Why not a series of form material which would provide the DX'er with many appropriate sentences in various foreign languages so that by combining them, one could manipulate the pertinent sentences into quasi-personalized letters in the foreign languages involved? Surely this sort of thing must be well within the capabilities of a number of DXers, who could make the results of their work available to the hobby as a whole.

Courtesy programs (special broadcasts arranged with stations which normally cannot be heard during regular program hours) have long been a part of BCB DX'ing. With rare exceptions this approach has been ignored

by SWBC DXers, but all this takes is some time and effort to arrange some interesting courtesy programs -- no special skill is required.

I've always felt that the more one knows about a rare DX station before he tunes it, the better prepared he'll be to hear it, knowing the sort of programming to expect and the best approach to take when writing for a verification. I therefore find feature articles on these stations both useful and informative...but when, for example, did you ever read a feature article about Dili, or about a domestic Congolese outlet? Possibly a few people are writing such features about obscure Latin American stations, but what about the rest of the world? Yet, there are plenty of features about Prague, the Vatican, and similarly easily heard stations, which may be very interesting --- but isn't a vast field still untapped? Why so many stories about the large international broadcasters and so few about the lesser stations? Because the big boys want the publicity and consequently send this material out unsolicited. With some work and initiative, though, the same sort of data can be obtained from the smaller outlets. But you have to seek it, for it won't come to you without some effort.

I can hear some saying, "But of what use is this information to the typical club member who may find this sort of thing beyond his depth, even if more experienced listeners did the research and wrote the articles for the bulletins." The answer is that if such information is not available, no one, beginner or experienced listener, is really going to improve his abilities. We remain in our old ruts, our knowledge limited, our techniques of listening unimproved, our equipment not what it could be, considering the true state of the art.

Yes, there are 101 things -- and more -- that a bright boy can do to really improve the hobby of SWBC DX'ing. So why aren't we???

Radio Vila - The New Hebrides Broadcasting Service

The Broadcasting Service is provided by the Joint Administration and responsibility for its use and operation is shared by the British and French national information services. Technical operations and facilities are made available by the Condominium Radio Department.

Radio Vila broadcasts twice daily, Monday to Friday, to the 80-odd islands of the New Hebrides. Programmes are presented in English, French, and Pidgeon, and are transmitted by a 0.5 KW transmitter feeding a dipole antenna beaming north and south, and operating on frequencies in the 41 and 75 meter bands:

- 41 meters YJB7 0030-0130 GMT 7260 kHz 41.32 meters
- 75 meters YJB4 0615-0730 GMT 3905 kHz 76.83 meters

The transmitter is a 0.5 KW Redifon, located at Malapoa near Vila (Lat. 168° 33' East, Long. 17° 44' South). Its operation is shared with the Marine Radio Service which at present limits our (R.Vila) hours of operation. Extended hours have been proposed pending the arrival and installation of a 2 KW AWA short wave transmitter, and operation in the broadcast band is also planned. (from R.Vila Information Sheet)

In a personal letter from R.Vila's Broadcasting officer, it was noted that: "Our new shortwave transmitter is now being installed, and should be ready for operation in Jan. 1972. We are extremely hard to hear in America as the Ham Bands cut across our Frequencies..." (He's tellin me??)

"Straight From the DXer's Mouth -- the SX190 Lowdown"
...by "Honest Ed" Shaw

The Allied Radio Shack SX190 is a solid-state professional receiver consisting of 43 various semi-conductors. It is crystal controlled, permitting precision tuning to within $\frac{1}{4}$ kHz (for whatever that's worth). The rx comes equipped to tune 75, 49, 41, 31, 25, 20, 19, and 16 meters, and also the 11 meter CB band. There is also the provision for two extra ranges of your choice, provided that one lies below 10 MHz and the other above 10 MHz. Ideally, one might choose xtals for the 60 and 13 meter bands, but that's merely opinion. The receiver sells right at approx. \$250.00 before tax and the lift of the price freeze. There are several very useful features included with the SX190 which are sometimes not found on other rx's; I particularly like the crystal calibrators for carriers at 25 and 100 kHz increments, the Q-Multiplier, and the product detector for upper and lower sidebands--essential for listening to most utility test tapes. It will perform on either house current or a 12 V.D.C. power supply (such as an automobile battery). So much for preliminaries. Now for evaluations.

APPEARANCE. The receiver is housed in a grey-colored metal cabinet, the top of which can be lifted off by removing a few easily accessible screws. A small indentation near the edge of the main tuning dial is particularly handy for rapid spinning of the dial with one finger. Main Knobs are large.

SENSITIVITY. Specifications claim less than 1 mv sensitivity for 10 db S/N ratio. Depending on the antenna used, listener's QTH, season, and atmospheric conditions, all receivers might have the capability to detect the weakest of signals, but the SX190 has consistently provided me with excellent results on 49, 41, and 25 meters. I have not concentrated interest on 19 meters or above. I am pleased that the SX190 has provided me more of the "below 7.5 KW" DX than I had previously noted. Particularly noteworthy are the FBS Athens, the Austrian Army Radio, and Deutschland Sender from E.Germany-- all from Europe. Also logged have been Fort Lamy in Chad, Sao Tome, Comoro, and Zambia--all in Africa. These two areas are my favorites.

SELECTIVITY. Without using the Q-Multiplier, there has been no trouble separating even powerhouse stations 5 kHz apart from smaller outlets. Many times, separation depends on how well a broadcaster cleans up his signal. At times, a signal has an extraordinarily wide bandwidth, and this causes trouble. To give some concrete idea of practical selectivity, I can on occasion separate 6005 kHz Montreal and 6006 kHz Costa Rica. As far as I am concerned, selectivity is superior to any receiver in my experience, the sole exception being the R-390. However, I haven't yet tuned the R4B or some of the very expensive king receivers.

STABILITY. The receiver is crystal controlled and solid-state throughout. The chassis is massive and solid metal. It doesn't drift one hair.

PROBLEMS. And there were a couple of really annoying ones, too! The first day or so that I had the rx, a cold solder joint or two accounted for broken contacts and the set was returned for repairs. Within a week, the receiver developed some really excessive noise, and the lower range of the preselector began to malfunction. I was getting terrible noise levels and harmonics at extreme ends of the crystal ranges. Another return to the shop fixed that. However, I am beginning to suspect that the SX190 has an inherent problem of slightly higher noise levels than I've had before. Since the set has a full-wave rectifier, it's not AC hum, but rather a soft SSSSSS sound. I am willing to overlook this relatively minor flaw in exchange for what this rx has produced for me in the way of DX. Concerning the price: well...it was worth the \$250.00 to me. Although I'd prefer an HQ180A, we take what we afford. For the price, the SX190 is unparalleled.

Late note: Ed advises that the SX-190 works extremely well with new 60 meter crystal and new 90 meters crystal (actually covering down to 3.0 MHz vice 3.5 MHz!)

"The El Cheapo All-Band Variable Antenna System--The DX #13"

Presently enjoying bestseller status is a work entitled Future Shock a book which argues the implications of the ever-growing transience of everyday life: people move, move, move. It seems to me that the author's point is not without merit, since for the last 3 years I have moved, moved, moved. Yes, Charlie, I was once an average run-of-the-mill DXer: living in a house with trees and a garage and telephone poles between which I could spin as big an 18 gauge copper web as my whims dictated. Then, in the fall of my 18th year, I was introduced to transient living (nine months at a college dorm, three at home; nine mo's..three..etc.etc.) For the first time I truly felt empathy with apartment-dwelling DXers living under the reins of unsympathetic landlords (OH no, none a that shortwave stuff here, 'ya don't...You're making spots on Matt Dillon's horse last nite...etc.). During my freshman year, the owner condescended a bit and allowed a small long-wire underneath his tangle of powerlines, and for the most part of that glorious year, I dined on a VOA and static stew...These brilliant QTH ex continued well into my 2nd year at the University, and it looked as if my fate had preordained by some power well above me and my quaint S-85.

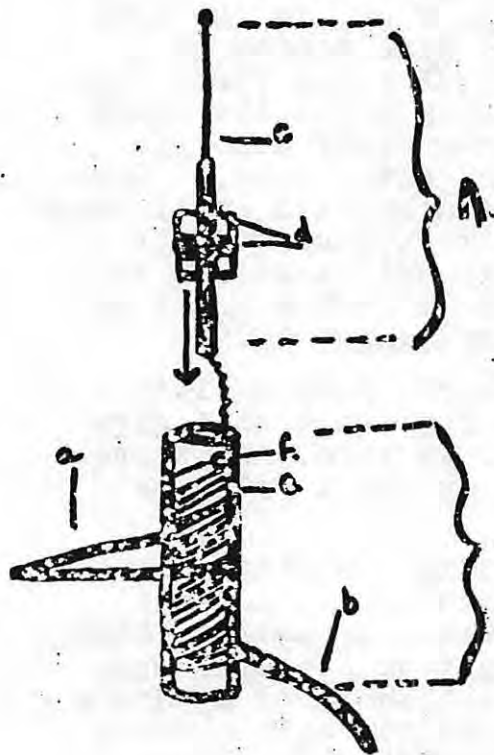
There's an old saying that the 3rd time's the charm. Perhaps it's true. This September I moved into a tiny weed-covered flat that sits girdled by two brick 'n mortar behemoths, and nary a tree in site. And there I sat with 150 feet of well rusted antenna wire wrapped around a Folger's can, and no place to put it.

I've always held that DX'ing is more of an art than a pastime, and hence that the DXer is innately creative. If it were otherwise, he'd be catching butterflys or collecting stamps in his idle time, or another more commonplace pursuit. So I looked to my creativity to get me out of a monumental mess; and indeed, I found my creativity---on the shelf of my dad's garage. There, amidst a clutter of screwdrivers and radiator-hose clamps, sat the seedling that ultimately blossomed into the (ta-da!) "El Cheapo All-Band Variable Antenna System", otherwise known as the "DX #13". The sprout of inspiration that became the mighty oak was an automobile antenna which had been discretely removed from the car proper via a baseball bat wielding Halloween prankster. Sawing a 1½ foot section off my mother's bamboo clothesline support and snatching up my coil of old antenna wire, I hurried off to my shack, little knowing that the course of DX history was to be changed...*ahem*. Now, here are plans so that you may construct your very own DX #13.

Any hollow cylinder will suffice as a base, altho I found bamboo pole to work advantageously. The length is actually indeterminate, altho it must be long enough to lend proper support to the antenna whip. Drill (punch, burn, cut) a small hole from one of the bamboo's extremities. Through this you thread a end of your antenna wire, fixing the internal end of the wire to the edge of the whip (see illust.). Use your ingenuity to solder, wrap, or tie the wire to the whip, the better the connection, the better the unit. Next required is the mounting of the whip inside the tubular base. I accomplished this by sandwiching the whip between two grooved pieces of wood, fastening these with a wire wrapping. Make sure that it is a tight fit, tho---we're attempting some semblance of permanence here! hi. Next, take the end of the wire extruding from the hole in the base to the outside, and coil it around the base itself. I just wound a copious amount, although attention to the number of windings will ultimately determine the general frequency area in which the unit will best resonate---the more windings, the lower the frequency. When this coiling process is completed, wrap it well, using an entire roll of electrical tape (it can well use the protection from the elements). Finally, you will need a mounting bracket for the unit. I made the original out of a coat hanger, affixing it via bell wire.

"El Cheapo -- DX #13" (cont'd)

Place this unit as high and isolated from power lines and telephone wires as possible. This is the beauty of this antenna: its very nature will allow you to situate it on your chimney, or on your external window sill, and out of the shadow of Ma Bell (whereas a good longwire usually invites eventual intersection of power lines, etc., even when in other planes.)



"DX 13"

This unit must be coupled with an antenna tuner such as the one of Al Niblack's design (which follows this article). The tuner is built from 2 variable capacitors, a switch and some wire. The unit's entire cost, at the most, should not surpass \$5.00 -- and will vary according to your ability to scrounge. If you don't have an old car antenna kicking around, check out the local car wash (I used to work in one, and they break off whips like crazy!).

Using the DX #13 the day after its construction at my midwestern QTH, I logged RRI 5047, RMS 4950, FEBC 7225, Kenya on 4915, and HNBI 15424 kHz-- a wide range of frequencies and areas for an omnidirectional antenna. This unit is superb on freq's 41 mb - 90 mb, and is adequate above. However, if your forte is above 31 meters, that wide range can be implemented by lessening the number of windings, thus making it responsive to that so-desired spectrum.

Strangely enough, I don't mean to present this antenna as a 2nd-best choice to the other various types. I've had a number of dipoles, longwires, etc., but in deference to the scattered DX areas of my interests, after using the DX13, I've ventured to say that this rather haphazard model is one of the best DX antennas that I've ever had !!

Crazy, huh???

"The Add-A-Decibel Antenna Tuner"

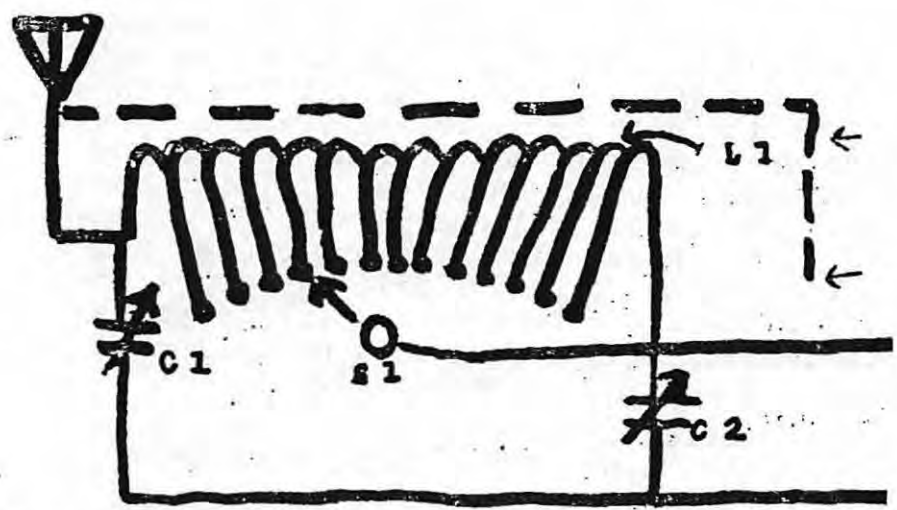
This text includes instructions for building a simple antenna tuner which will add a few precious decibels to the received signal. The simple schematic and parts list below should allow you to easily do so. The construction of the antenna tuner will involve the drilling of the cabinet; or it could be done "breadboard style". Parts layout and wiring are not critical, although they should be straightforward. Wiring should be kept as short as possible (This is a good practice to follow in all electronics work). And of course, some rudimentary ability to solder is required.

Parts List

- L 1 : 40 turns of #20 enameled wire wound on a 1" (O.O.) polystyrene form. Taps taken off at turns #2, #5, #8, #12, #18, #25, #30, #35, and #38.
- S 1 : Single gang, single pole - 12 position rotary switch (non-shorting).
- C 1, C 2 : (one each) .000365 MFD single-gang tuning capacitors.
- 1 aluminum minibox: (Bud or equivalent) cabinet size not critical, as long as it will comfortably mount all components.
- 1 Polystyrene form: 1" in O.D. , approximately 4" in length.
- Misc. Hardware: terminal posts, insulated hook-up wire, knobs, and 1/8" diameter bolts with nuts.

When the Europeans faded, the LA's replaced them; then Pacifics and Asians came in. The reception of low-powered stations, like Papete or Honiara, real trophies, could only be achieved thru long hours of patient listening... The ITU is supposed to assign specific fqys to each country, yet there there seems to be no rule in the SW Jungle: stations of 1 KW or less share identical or neighboring fqys with 250 KW giants. Despite the 5 kHz channel decision, the use of split channels and its results is known to all listeners: Talks in different languages, Beethoven's 9th and maybe the latest pop, all mixed in the wildest scree ever!!!

"Your Friendly Repair Man"
by Al Sizer, Conn.

If you're really into the DX hobby, with more than just peanuts invested in equipment, then the repair problem is a vital one. Sooner or later you're going to have mechanical or electrical problems, and unless you are one of the lucky few who can do his own repairing, you will have to enlist outside help. Looking forward to this unpleasant eventuality, it is an excellent idea to start shopping around now for a capable, experienced radio man. Sounds easy? Not really...consider: you have equipment, often expensive, which infrequently shows up in the runofthemill repair shop, which are accustomed to such makes as "Zenith", "Realistic", "Panasonic". Let's face it, there aren't many SWL's around, unfortunately. Once my receiver got knocked out, and when asked, the biggest radio-TV dealer in town said that although he was unfamiliar with the trade name "Hammarlund", if supplied a manual, he'd give it a try. I gave up on him immediately! Another consideration is that a lot of inexperienced, incompetent and perhaps part-time people are working in repair shops because of the heavy backlog of work (in turn due to a fairly alarming level of the same in the manufacturing plants). The larger radio stores usually sublet their abundant repair work to outsiders, often "moonlighting", who may or may not know their trade. The risk is yours--so look before you leap!

The solution? Be prepared to go far afield, as you won't find your repairmen nearby unless very lucky. Try to find someone who might be interested in your equipment -- If a "ham" operator is running a repair shop, he's likely to be familiar w/the type of equipment you use. Although I'd rather not name him publicly; in my case I go to a city 35 miles away, where "Elmer" (a ham operator) will often drop anything he is doing to help me out, occasionally fixing my rx on-the-spot. He may charge me a little more, I'm not sure, but I pay him without question since I accept this as a condition of prompt and expert service. I've shown "Elmer" an article on SWL I've written and he's shown me his ham QSL's. We have a friendly relationship, based upon mutual interests. And there's a bonus: if my rx is going to be out of service for a long time, he'll let me rent at a nominal cost almost any set in the shop that does not belong to someone else.

"Your friendly repair man" --- a difficult man to locate, but one worth his weight in QSL's when you can find him! If you haven't, better start now.

.....and now, our noted in*depth reporter uncovers for us another timely and relevant story on the shortwave scene:

"Chilean Radio Station Suspended"

Chile's left-wing government has suspended broadcasting by Radio Presidente Balmaceda, the outlet which aits the views of the opposition Christian Democratic party.

Jaime Suarez, Sectetary General of the presidency announced that a forty-eight hour suspension of Radio Balmaceda was for "...serious offenses against the President and the Armed Forces..." The specific offenses were left unstated. The suspension was the second this month (December)for the station which operates on 9590 kHz shortwave with one kilowatt of power. Several weeks ago, before a state of emergency was decreed due to violent street disorders over a protest march staged by the women of Santiago, the government banned Radio Balmaceda and two other opposition radio stations off the air for twenty-four hours. At the same time General Augusto Pinochet, Santaiago army garrison commander who assumed control of the public order under the State of Emergency opportunely closed down the right wing newspaper TRIBUNA for the same period of time.

The action against Balmaceda Radio and the paper TRIBUNA reflects the hard line taken by President Salvador Allende Gossens and his supporters against all opposition since the start of the bread riots. The legal powers of the executive to act against communications organs curtails in practice the ability of the opposition Christian Democrats and National parties.

The operation party controls three radio stations...Balmaceda Radio, as mentioned, Radio Sociedad Nacional de Agricultura on 11810 kHz short-waves with five kilowatts from Santiago; and on medium waves, this station is noted at 1200 kHz with ten kilowatts from the small mountain town of Los Andes. The third station is Radio Cooperativa, operating also on the MW band, on 640 kHz with just one kilowatt from Temuco, a small place three-hundred eighty miles due south from Santiago on the Panamericana. It is said that all three broadcasters have wide national audiences through provincial radio stations, forming networks with stations in the capital.

"XMTRs in Enugu"

A prevalent mistake in some shortwave circles is to confuse the sources of broadcasting from Nigeria's East Central State, formerly Biafra (with captal and transmitters at Enugu).

The NBC, the Nigerian Broadcasting Corporation (the national broadcasting outlet with headquarters in Lagos) operates a regional station at Enugu, which mainly carries a nationally-oriented type of programming; rather than an Ibo or Yoruba or Hausa based transmission. The NBC-Enugu, as of a letter of 11 Sept. 71 transmits on only two frequencies: 6035 kHz and 1320 kHz, with 10 KW's of power---this from Mr. J. O. Okongwu, the Engineer-in-charge.

On the other hand, the "East Central State Broadcasting Service", or ECBS, is a state-owned broadcasting organization based in Enugu, catering to the local needs in way of programming to the residents of the East Central State; this locally based operation is as separate an entity from the NBC as is RTV Kaduna. ECBS also uses 10 KWs, and is scheduled on 7305A at 0500 GMT-2305 GMT daily. The 41 mb fqy is beamed from a simple folded dipole, acc. to Mr. R.F.Obioha, Senior engineer of ECBS. Interestingly, tho both are vy friendly, neither claim the 4900 kHz unid. as theirs.---via ed.

...for some time now, we've all been noticing Larry Magne's ultra-detailed frequency quotes in the IR, and the fine DX that his rig has afforded to him; here's his stats run-down on a really fine rx,

"The Drake R-4B"

The Drake R-4B is a 120/240 vac, 50-60 Hz, high fqy (1.44-30.06 MHz) receiver with nine tubes, ten transistors, seventeen diodes, two integrated circuits, and utilizing a 620 kHz-wide linear VFO. It has variable selectable sideband, excellent image rejection (measures 60 db.) and ample sensitivity for all DX requirements.

The IF circuitry includes a variable passband, three AM selectivity positions, and a notch filter. Unlike commonly-found switchable sideband arrangements, the R-4B variable passband allows for infinitely-flexible selectable sideband, as one tunes in exactly that portion of the sideband that provides maximum readability for that particular signal. The 4.8, 2.4, and 1.2 kHz selectivity positions offer flexibility and excellent shape factors (3.8 at 4.8, 3.4 at 2.4, and 4.0 at 1.2 kHz).

Its less critical features include a 25 kHz crystal calibrator and an amplified slow/fast/off AVC., with fast and off in exalted carrier mode only. The AVC is outstanding under stress flutter conditions, such as those resulting from Polar-path signals from Asia. The S-meter is honest, not "hot" or faked in any way, and the noise blanker is effective in reducing pulse-type noises. With a two minute, two-cent modification to minimize parallax error, the VFO can read out accurately to better than the nearest $\frac{1}{4}$ kHz. Finally, the R-4B is reasonably priced for a "luxury" receiver: \$475.00 fully-equipped for SWBC, except for speaker (\$22) and extra VFO crystals (\$5.00 each).

There are shortcomings, of course, such as that LW/MW is obtainable with only modest results via an optional converter. Also, there is no balanced antenna input. There are only fifteen VFO crystal sockets; although one can be left empty for rapid insertion of extras. "Birdies", such as the one on 4978 kHz, are a minor annoyance. There is also an "IF hole" between 5 - 6 MHz, although if one uses a highly resonant antenna and is in an area of heavy static, usually almost all this range can be still be used effectively.

The R-4B is lightweight, attractive, uses quality parts, and is backed by Drake's excellent Service Department....(vy important; see piece by Al Sizer.--rwp). If you, like the BBC Monitoring Service, consider direct frequency readout essential, the R-4B is probably the best SWBC receiver you can obtain outside of the very expensive receiving systems produced by RACAL and a few other top-notch firms.

WRTH 72 The 1972 edition of the World Radio TV Handbook arrived just after the January LN section was mailed. The WRTH is an essential reference for anyone listening on the shortwave bands. The 72 edition runs 384 pages, with well over half of that devoted to information on shortwave broadcast stations. WRTH can be ordered from Gilfer Associates, P.O. Box 239, Park Ridge, NJ 07656. Price is \$6.95 ppd, and well worth it. Tell them NASWA sent you.

BBC MS NASWA has made arrangements with the BBC Monitoring Service to receive the schedule information compiled from their monitoring activities. This information, when it is something which would be useful to members, will be given in this section. Such information will be credited (BBC MS). The material is copyrighted by the BBC, and is used here by permission. We cannot, of course, give permission for this material to be reprinted.

SCHEDULES The arrangement noted above for use of BBC MS material was made in line with a previously stated preference for material derived from actual operations/reception, and not just from schedules published by the stations. As noted before, stations' schedules are useful, and are more useful for this section if they have been at least partially checked out on your receiver. However, if you are unable to check out a sked, send it anyway and I will try to get it checked. Not all of the schedule information in this section has been checked out, but most of it has been.

With the dropping of the summer editions of the WRTH, it has been suggested by several NASWAers that there will be a big gap to be filled, and that the LN section can do a great deal to fill that gap. We will be keeping watch on the operating schedules of the major broadcasters, and as many of the smaller ones as we can. When changes warrant, we will compile schedules of operations of these stations, and publish in LN. Some have suggested that full sheets devoted to a single station are useful, as it allows one to insert the sheet in a notebook of schedules. Of course, this would cause problems, what with additional information on the back of the sheet....I would be interested in knowing how many of you keep schedule notebooks seriously. There is a possibility that we could offer such schedules, printed on one side only, and each sheet containing info on only one station, for easy insertion in a looseleaf notebook. There would be no charge other than postage(SASE), and the offer would be to NASWA members only..... This would be one method of at least partially filling the gap left by the deletion of the WRTH summer editions. Perhaps there are other, better methods. I am open for suggestions of other methods, comments on the possibility outlined here. (DF)

CLANDESTINE Several DXers have reported hearing broadcasts in Spanish from Radio de Luego, La Voz de Cuba Libre, in the 41 meter band. Usually heard weekends and very weak, the clandestine was recently reported on 7019 kHz on a Sunday at 1200 by Al Sizer. Al wrote to the U.S. Citizens Committee for a Free Cuba in Miami, and came up with the following information from Paul D. Bethel, the committee's director:

"Radio Free Cuba does operate on something of a clandestine basis. This is to be expected. However, it does exist and may be an outlet for some pretty frustrated Cuban exiles. Actually, the location of the station fluctuates, suggesting that it is a mobile unit. Moreover, the signals you refer to often come from the Caribbean and my own suspicion is that it is beamed into Cuba 'por la libre' from a ship or boat. That is about all that I can say about the station. You may also have noticed the sporadic nature of the 'casts, prompted, no doubt, by Coast Guard and FBI vigilance."

POSTSCRIPT, by Richard E. Wood

Petrozavodsk (in Finnish: Petroskoi) is the capital of the Karelian Autonomous Soviet Socialist Republic. Until July, 1956, it was the capital of the Karelo-Finnish Soviet Socialist Republic (technically a "Union" republic), one of the 16 that then existed. At that date, however, it was demoted to the present Autonomous status. The reasons are interesting. 1956 was the year of the signing of the Soviet-Finnish treaty & evacuation of the Soviet base at Porkkala, FINLAND. With the signing of the treaty and with the dropping of the word "Finnish" from the title, Moscow dropped its claims to govern Finland.

The status of the Karelian A.S.S.R in the NASWA Country List may be regarded as a historic relic, a left-over from pre-1956 days. Judged by its present status, however, if one Autonomous Republic active on SW is listed as a radio country, should not others, equally active, and of equal status, be so listed? Examples which come to mind are the Yakut A.S.S.R (Yakutsk, 4395) and Buryat A.S.S.R. (Ulan Ude, 4795 kHz). Petrozavodsk is on 5065 and has been heard in NA, especially in mid-winter. (Richard E. Wood)

PRESELECTOR Gilfer Associates, P.O. Box 239, Park Ridge, NJ 07656, announces that a preselector capable of tuning 3.9 to 22.5 MHz will be available 18 February 1972. (It has been a while since a true preselector has been available. DF) The unit is solid state, will match any antenna, has "very low noise figure". Those interested should write Gilfer direct. Initial quantities will be limited. (Gilfer, Bill Berghammer)

PROPAGATION COURSE R. Nederland will be broadcasting a Shortwave Propagation Course in the weekly "DX Jukebox", beginning Thursday, 9 March (local time-DF). The course will deal with many problems related to shortwave propagation, and how it is influenced by distance, season, time of day, atmosphere, solar & cosmic waves, ionospheric layers, one-hop & multi-hop trajectories, absorption, fading, the sunspot cycle, solar flares and storms, etc..... Printed text material is available free of charge to active participants, and full details of the times and wavelength of the broadcasts will be sent together with the first four lessons and the complete set of diagrams. No technical knowledge is required to follow the course.

WEST AFRICA For those who may not have heard all of the West African countries, here is a list of actual operating schedules of a number of the stations there.

Dahomey Cotonou can be heard on 4870 from s/on 0515, past 0630, and from 2030-2200 s/off. S/off is 2300 Saturday. Best time is 0515-0600.

Gambia R. Gambia is often well heard on 4820 kHz from 0625 s/on, to 0800 s/off. BBC news is given at 0700, in English.

Ghana is well heard at many times & on many fqys. One of the best ways to hear the HS is on 4915 at 0530 s/on, past 0700. Also on 4980 at 0530-0700 & later. Both these fqys heard in the 2100-2215 time slot, too. 6130 can be heard around 2000 past 2100. 9545 noted 2100 past 2200. There is a bcst to NA at 2000-2100 on 11850v kHz, in English and well heard in much of NA.

Guinea Conakry can be heard on 7125 in the 0200-0400 period. 9650v audible 0300-0500 & later, also at 2300 past 0000. 4910 audible in the 2130-0000 period.

Port. Guinea Bissau audible in the 0700-0730 slot. The clandestine "Guinea" stn also said to be in P. Guinea. Can be heard on 4970 at 0615-0645. Bissau fqy is 5041 kHz.

WEST AFRICA(continued)

Ivory Coast RTVI can be heard on 4940 from s/on 0600, and from 2200-0000 s/off. The 1920 outlet has English news at 1830, and is heard until 0000 s/off.(see Jan LR)

Liberia Try for ELWA on 3227 in the 0630-0700 slot, on 4770 around 2200-2300. Also on 15170 around 2200....ELBC on 3255 is most often noted in the 2200-0030 time slot, at times with strong signal. It should also be available in the 0600-0700 slot.

Mali R.Mali is probably best heard on 5995, at various times. Currently the signal is good at 2345-0000 after Sines leaves the air. Mali s/off is 0000. 5995 also well heard in the 0600-0800 transmission, mixed with VoA till 0730, then clear till 0800 s/off. There is an English transmission Tuesday at 1500-1600 on 17725.

Mauritania R.Mauritania can be heard in the 0700-0800 time slot on 4850 kHz. The signal is weak, and often impossible to hear. Sundays try 9610 from 0800 to 0900, which should be clear.

Senegal 4890 consistently hrd in FF in the 0600-0800 period. 11895 around 2200.

Sierra Leone SLBS on 3316 often heard after s/on 0600, past 0700.

Sp. Sahara, Aiun on 7230v from s/on 0800v. Is weak, but has been heard as late as 0900 in NA.

Togo Lomé can be heard on 5047 kHz from 0530 s/on past 0700, and 2030-2300 s/off. Strong, and easily heard.

.....This list is by no means complete, but can serve as a guide to hearing the stations in West Africa. As always comments are welcome, and be sure to report your loggings of these, and other, stations to Log Report Editor Jerry Berg.

Some comments on WRTH 72, from Bill Berghammer. (Please remember that these are only comments, not criticisms. The comments generally refer to changes that have been made since WRTH 72 went to press. DF)

Italy - RAI sked is from Fall 1971. The sked in WRTH 71 is a better guide to RAI's current operations.

Monaco -TWR sked now outdated, neglects many recent(short-term) test fqys.(Bill, is the omission of the test fqys the main difference, or is the sked completely changed now. WRTH cannot be expected to include test fqys. DF)

Poland - Doesn't mention 2nd net on 7180, 11715, elsewhere. (See this issue of LN for current sked for Poland, from BBC MS. DF)

Sweden - has new sked. (See changes, page LN-3. DF)

CONGO(ZAIRE) - 15265 should read 15245v.

Egypt- no mention of many recent test fqys, since 7 Nov.(Again, I don't think they can be expected to include test fqys.

Ethiopia - add 9587v to R.Ethiopia, maybe ex: 7190.

Libya - add 8630(listed in back).

Seychelles - 11950, ex: 11935

China - new sked in effect

India some changes listed Jan ADXN.(We'll try to get those included-DF)

Japan - sked given is fall sked. Change 15310 to 15390 to LA.

Pakistan -Karachi, add 6235, 7290 for 1945-2130 to Eur. E.Pak.sked meaningless now. (see Bangladesh sked, page LN-1)

Syria - changes shown in back. (page 383-DF)

Pacific - Tahiti- add 9735v, maybe ex: 3223. (Noted here 9730-DF)

Solomon Is - is old 7235 or list 9775 correct?(Ralph Perry also noted this. SI has been missing from 7235 for some time. 9775 bears some checking! (DF)

Neth.Antilles - TWR sked is Fall 71, now outdated.

Bolivia-9607 still not listed. R.Pirai active here, ex: 3320

Colombia -R.El Sol now 5980, ex: 6140. LV de Cali now 6140 ex: 6195. R.Vision now 6200v, ex: 6105v.(But latter noted back on 6105 recently; don't know if still there-DF)

Ecuador- HCJB 1800-2200 to Eur now on 11780, 15300, 17740, ex: 15300, 17780, 21460.

No mention of Dutch pgms, no mention of test fqys. (I would submit that 11780 is ex-21460, and that there has been no change in the 15300 fqy, hi. DF)

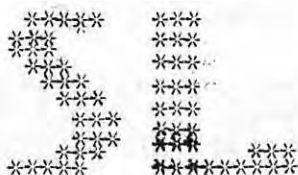

FOREIGN LANGUAGE REPORT FORMS

Members are reminded that your QSL Editor still distributes foreign language report forms in Spanish, French, Portuguese and Indonesian. The forms are written by experts in these languages, and are in the form of a personal letter which the DXer copies out, adding the relevant details of his catch, thereby sending a personal letter to the station. Hundreds of SWLs have found these forms useful in obtaining QSLs.

The forms are available for 1-IRC per form (only one of each language is needed), plus 1-IRC for every two forms or less if you wish an airmail reply. I regret that this change is necessary, but the high air postal rates for overweight letters require this. Airmail, incident is recommended for letters from Mexico.
