I was singing, half muttering under my breath actually, my favorite Gilbert and Sullivan line as I sat in my study opening the mail.

As you know, a few months back, during one of the regular editorial crises in the International World Wide Continental DX Association, I'd volunteered to take on the job of loggings editor. And after a couple of months in the saddle, I was beginning to feel my lot was not too different from Gilbert's cop!

"Dear Charlie," the first letter read. "I have some constructive criticism of last month's column. You listed Radio Borborema's frequency as 4,964,3275 kHz. Actually, I measured it as 4,964,3278 kHz. As you must know, frequency accuracy is of paramount importance to us all. How can a beginner be expected to find a station if you list incorrect frequencies? With an editor of your experience I'd expect more..."

I quit reading it and shuffled the letter to a stack on my right. I grabbed a second envelope and tore it open.

"OM Charlie, not a complaint, mind you, but some helpful, friendly, constructive criticism. I couldn't help noting the glaring errors on page five of the September bulletin. THE BARLOW-WADLEY XCR-30 RECEIVER

A couple of months back, many of us got the first indication that a new receiver was soon to be available --- Leo Van der Walt's column on the back page of RSA's monthly schedule featured preliminary information on the XCR-30, a crystal-controlled, dual conversion, direct frequency readout portable rx manufactured in South Africa. The following information was obtained as a result of a letter of inquiry to the inventor Mr.C.S.Barlow.

This receiver was designed specifically for the LISTENER who requires a shortwave receiver with high calibration and resetting accuracy, with excellent sensitivity, selectivity, and image rejection characteristics, together w/SSB---all in portable form, without the frills and at low cost.

To achieve these objectives, many luxurious and superfluous features were omitted without detracting at all from the receiver's specific purpose. The rx is general coverage (500 kHz to 30 MHz) and incorporates a whip antenna. All-metal construction makes a ferrite core antenna impractical. There are no dial lights to drain battery power, yet the dial design permits maximum visibility even under poor lighting condx. The XCR-30 operates on 6 "D-size" batteries (9V) and has no built-in provision to facilitate use of an 115-V wall socket; an external transformer must be used for that. The rx will actually work from a range of 6V-12V, so it may be used thru an automobile's cigarette lighter. These limitations are just some of the ways the cost has been kept down to a minimum. Pin-jacks allow the use of external antenna and grounds, if so desired---altho these would only be needed in cases of heavy indoor interference.

Despite the involved design and complexity in alignment and adjustment in the manufacturing process, routine repair and maintenance are well within the scope of an efficient repair establishment, and components are easily available. It should be noted that since a 1-MHz xtal oscillator is utilized to control stability of the rx, a low level "break-through" will be noted at the 0 & 100 settings of the kHz dial ---this serves as a deliberate confirmation for dial accuracy and also acts as a claribrator should the rx ever need realignment. The signal is quite suppressed, however, and permits easy reception of WWV and other such time stations on such frequencies.

As of the moment, there is still no distributor for the model in the U.S.A...Unit price, F.O.B. from Durban, South Africa, is \$157.50 at the present international rates of exchange. Air freight will entail another \$31.50. The address is: Barlow Manufacturing Co. Ltd., P.O. Box 23, New Germany, Natal, South Africa...AND if, after persons have written for further info, they wish to pool their resources, ten buyers may form one large order at great savings, reducing unit price to \$120, and sharing freight charges. THIS IS NOT AN OFFER SPONSORED BY NASWA!!! We advise all DXers to exercise caution--look before you leap!While the XCR-30 sounds like a "dream rx", only time will tell if Mr.Barlow's claims are to be substantiated.

SHORTWAVESHORTS.....News from the World of International Broadcasting.....Radio Uganda Expansion

Uganda is actively investigating the possibilities of setting up external broadcasting facilities. According to informed sources, Mr. Wm. Naburri, the Minister for Information and broadcasting, was in Paris and London primarily to look into the technicalities and finance involved in this major undertaking.

Marconi said the Minister visited their Chelmsford works this week but declined to say whether this was purely a facilities tour or whether there was a business discussion. Marconi knows the Uganda position, having supplied equipment over many years, most recently 4 xmters for the internal service in the regions. An external services xmttr would set Uganda back at least 250,000 pounds, when considering the need for serials and more studios. General Amir has said that he is anxious to give Uganda a stronger voice outside its own borders and has spoken of the need for external broadcasting. ---ICB Bulletin via R. Anderson

Walkout at the CBC

Ottawa, Jan. 22 (Reuters): Technicians of the Canadian broadcasting Corp. walked off their jobs in 5 cities today. The action by members of the Nat. Assoc. of Broadcast Employees and Technicians shut down live radio and TV programs by the publicly-owned CBC from Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal, and Charlottetown. The 2,170 technicians termed the walkout a "study session", to consider a full strike against the CBC. ---NY Times via George Schnabel.

Papua looks to Independence.

A Parliament is scheduled to meet in 6/72 to consider bills aiming at self-gov't and finally independence from Australia. ---Chi Sun-Times. (No doubt another new chapter in SWBCing to watch in the future: drastically revamped pmgng, retention of ABC xmters, etc.etc.etc. from an independent Papua.)

VS18---Grand Turk Island (CANWI)

At presstime, your editor has received word from VS18 manager that an exclusive, in-depth article w/pix will be forthcoming for the SWC. Watch for it! However, in the same communique a cryptic reference was made to the fact that: "...We shall shortly be handing over to a local broadcasting authority so the station VS18 will not continue in its present form for very much longer. ---D.R. Mattocks"....The specific meaning of this and its impact is yet to be made clear.

Radio Nederland--25th Anniv.

Although this item is sure to be redundant for most SWC readers, RN will celebrate its 25th anniversary with a Jubilee Program on April 15, 1972. The fascinating rendition of the RN story contained within their current program sked is recommended reading for all SWC'ers. I take this opportunity to congratulate one of the all-time greats in SWBCing: and continued success, gentlemen!

BBC Pips Become Peeps

Every hour on the hour since 1946, BBC radio has gone "pip-pip-pip-pip-pip". Starting from New Years Day, the world's most famous time signal became "pip-pip-pip-pip-peeseep!". Announcing the change, the Royal Greenwich Obsv. at Herstmonceux, which provides the time sig, said it was adding the peep--a lengthened pip--in the interests of better timekeeping. Under an int. agreement from Jan. 1, '72, the radio time signal will be based upon the international atomic time scale. ---Ft. Lauderdale News, via Gary Tenere

Bangladesh Radio

THE SAD SAGA OF RADIO TELEFIS EIREANN'S SHORT-LIVED SHORTWAVE

adapted by ye olde editor Malphus Perry

When questioned as to whether Ireland maintains a shortwave outlet, the average SWL/DXer might make reference to the island's aeradio terminal. To my surprise, I recently learned that Radio Telefis Eireann still has the 100 kw shortwave xmtr in Athlone which has been doomed to the realm of spiderwebs since circa 1950A.....Read on:

"Ireland was however thinking of embarking upon a bigger venture: shortwave broadcasting to distant countries. As long ago as 1932, the Advisory Committee had recommended that a shortwave service be established to keep Irishmen in far-off places in touch with affairs at home---and the answer had been that the cost would be too high. By 1938 however the tide of radio propaganda was rising high. The Axis powers had begun it, and Britain was following suit....In 1938 Oscar Traynor announced that an experimental shortwave was being installed at Athlone. The Voice of Ireland should be heard, too.

"The transmitter was installed and in March 1939, it began broadcasting the whole of Radio Eireann's daily programme, except for sponsored programs. But no satisfactory wavelength had been secured, the transmitter was of only 1.5 kw's power, and with the increasing use by the larger countries of multiple wavelengths and higher-powered transmitters, it was becoming steadily harder for a single small voice to be heard. Then came the war, and soon the end of Ireland's venture for a while.....

"The attempt to establish direct communication with the USA by shortwave radio from Athlone had been partly intended to remedy (the lack of direct communications links between Ireland and the USA, except via Britain) but the 1.5 kw transmitter that had been installed had been ineffectual. A last attempt was made during the three months from December 1940 to March 1941, when the shortwave transmitter went on the air for an additional half-hour in between 4:00 AM and 4:30 AM in Ireland---a good listening hour in America, allowing for the time difference between the two countries, though a bad time so far as reception was concerned (QRM-wise....rwp). When it too failed, shortwave transmissions from Athlone were reduced to daily relays of the 640 and 1010 news---hardly the brightest jewels in R.Eireann's crown. Before this reduction had been made, Mr. de Valera had called in the Emergency Research Bureau which he had established, and asked it to investigate ways of increasing the power of the transmitter from 1.5 to 20 kw's...after working from February to September they had to report that they had failed." (The little used shortwave transmitter for the most part lay fallow after that, except for being utilized for a special V-E Day broadcast in 1945. And then, in 1947, the idea of SWBCing once again germinated,----rwp)

"Introducing his broadcasting estimate in the Dail on April 30, '46, Paddy Little announced that the amount was up by more than 112,000 pounds and that total expenditures for the year would exceed revenue by more than 119,000 pounds. The reason for this outburst of expenditure was the high-power shortwave station which he had hoped might be able to open by the end of 1947. This development had been under consideration for a long time...but it was not until 1946 that a contract had been signed with the Marconi Company and serious preparations began...

It was a tremendous enterprise, compared with the scale on which Irish broadcasting had been run in the past. It involved not only a new station and arrays of aeriels but also new hours of broadcasting and a new outlook on programmes; without any guarantee of success.

"From the practical standpoint and also technical, there were(next page please!)

formidable difficulties in the way. First of all there was no wavelength available, any more than in the days when the low-power shortwave xmr had failed... A series of international conferences had failed to hammer out a scheme for allocating the shortwaves, and since the war began the larger nations had been putting batteries of transmitters to work on all possible frequencies. Ireland's single transmitter would have small chance of being heard. During the war, when I was running the BBC's shortwave service to America, I was consulted informally by a member of the Irish High Commissioner's staff in London as to the prospects of a shortwave service to America. As far as I remember, my advice was that shortwave broadcasts alone had little impact; even when London was the focus of world interest, few Americans took the trouble to tune in to London direct. The few who did might be valuable as opinion leaders, but the only way of reaching a real audience was to get your programmes rebroadcast by American stations and networks. To complicate matters, shortwave listening to distant countries was rare in countries like the USA (!!!!---rwp). All these obstacles were explained to the government, but the political motive prevailed, and plans for the shortwave station went ahead...The sums spent on broadcasting reached altitudes never before even contemplated....

"Some of the best Irish experts were in America at the first big wavelength conference since the war, trying to get a suitable shortwave allocation. New difficulties were constantly arising; there were shortages of everything: steel, electricity, cement, even timber were in short supply, both in Ireland and in England, where the transmitter and masts were being made. But all difficulties were overcome. The 100 kw transmitter was installed at Athlone; an aerial array stretching over some 40 acres was erected to carry directional broadcasts to the USA; another set of masts for broadcasts to Europe was obtained but not yet erected. By March 1948, T.J.Monahan was able to report that test transmissions should be able to begin by the end of April.

"But in February the government had changed. In May 1948, the new Minister for Finance announced in his Budget speech that for reasons of economy the government had decided to abandon the shortwave project. The decision was bitterly attacked---all made the point that when a crisis came along it was important that Ireland be able to state its case directly to the USA...but the government was obdurate. It was decided that the shortwave equipment should be sold, but enquires disclosed that the amount that could be had for it, when the cost of dismantling it had been met, would not be more than 60,000 pounds. The history of the shortwave station was not yet ended, however....

"There was still the possibility that a suitable frequency allocation could be obtained at the next international conference to be held in Mexico City in 1949. The threat to sell the station had had its effect: it had frightened some of the nations that had previously ignored Irish claims. The very real fear of one's competitors in the "cold war" receiving the Irish equipment was enough of an inducement to get countries to vote for Ireland where they had previously voted against her. But the Mexico City plan was unfortunately only a basic plan, and there were more frustrations in store. Subsequent conferences at Florence and Rapallo failed to agree on details, and no final plan emerged. Without it, a single station would have little chance against the multiple transmissions of the big countries.

"In the meantime, various schemes were being considered in Dublin for a service. One was for a half-hour's nightly broadcast to the USA, repeated so as to reach different time zones there, w/pgms from the newly-formed Irish news Agency. But once again the project petered out...It was revived once again when a Fianna Fail government took office in 1951 again, but the same difficulties presented themselves and no regular service ever began..... (next page, please!!)

"In the end, the project left the country with an unhappy legacy: a station which had originally cost 1/42,000 pounds, and an array of aerials stretching over a lot of other people's land, all fast becoming little more than scrap."

THE COLLINS 51S-1 RECEIVER

The direct frequency readout Collins 51S-1 receiver utilizes 17 tubes and 28 semi-conductors, tunig from 200 kHz to 30 MHz in 29 one-MHz ranges. The 51S-1 is offered with a choice of 2.75 or 2.4 kHz bandwidth, mechanical filter for side-band reception and also an AM bandwidth of 5 kHz using a normal IF transformer. The receiver is also optionally equipped with a 6 kHz MF for the AM mode.

A preselector is necessary when tuning from 200 kHz to 2 MHz; and although no antenna tuner is furnished, the receiver compensate very well in all tuning ranges. After some correspondence with Collins, a 3.1 kHz MF was installed for AM mode reception---Collins claims that this is the best they can do.

In evaluating the performance of the 51S-1, I used as a standard the performance of what I consider the best DX-receiver on the market--the HQ 180. In my opinion, the 51S-1 comes fairly close when directly pitted against the performance of the HQ 180. While the 3.1 kHz bandwidth is still a little too wide, by using the side-bands and zero-beating, an improvement in AM reception is noted. The rejection tuning-control performs superbly!!! It works well even on weak signals, and can even be used as a noise limiter if one is plagued by power-line noises, as I am.

Except for the one drawback in the 51S-1's performance--the wide bandwidth--I feel that it compares quite favorably w/the HQ 180....and with the added luxury of direct frequency readout. I can't help thinking that if the HQ 180, while retaining the same basic circuitry--altho modernized and miniaturized--incorporated a direct frequency readout, then it too would fall in the high price range of the Collins 51S-1....Such are the economic facts of life in our country. hi.

HONEST LOOK
AT QSLs

Let me make it clear at the outset that these are but one man's views. Nor do I insist that they are necessarily correct (alho I obviously feel they are, or I wouldn't happen to agree, that is your

privilage and your are invited to register your opposition.....

PROPOSITION ONE: A large percentage of QSLs are phony, involving little or no checking on the part of the stations sending them out.

PROPOSITION TWO: An unscrupulous DX'er could easily obtain most QSLs without ever turning on his set, providing he has a little know-how. It is easy to determine the times and frequencies a station maintains from the WRTM and club bulletins, etc., and these will generally indicate also the languages of xmsn and also a general idea of the type of format the station runs.

PROPOSITION THREE: At least 75% of all QSLs received lack some vital bit of information which could render them as truly legitimate---i.e. date, time, frequency, verification statement, etc.

PROPOSITION FOUR: The arguments of some DXers making a verie out of a non-verie would do a Philadelphia lawyer credit! Unfortunately, none of them would stand up in a court of law. Examples: "...While they don't actually use the word confirm, they do "thank" me for my report, and surely they wouldn't be thanking me if they thought that possibly I hadn't heard them..." or else there's "...They say that 'we are glad you heard us'. They wouldn't be glad if they didn't think I had heard them." And they go on and on, ad nauseum...

PROPOSITION FIVE: In most cases, not all, a DX'er is really off his rocker if he is counting on a reply from the station proving to him, the listener, that which he had not been sure of---whether or not he had actually heard the station. I must say that this is the most serious of my propositions and one that never ceases to astound me. I've seen numerous cases where it appears that DXers have heard no IDs, and are not sure of what they've heard, and then--suddenly--they are counting it on the basis of a verification. I believe that this is very risky. I indicated that I feel that there are indeed exceptions. If there is evidence that the station actually checked out the program content you reported, and providing you gave them enough material to check out--or if you sent a tape and are reasonably sure that it was played at the station--then you are justified in claiming such a logging.

PROPOSITION SIX: A QSL should be regarded in most cases as proof of little or nothing---only an interesting souvenir of an unusual listening experience. To have a book of them and go over them some nite when the QRN is too high for good reception, or to show them to friends, is all a fine part of the hobby and excuse enough for getting QSLs....but please, Fellows..let's not take them too seriously!!!

PHENOMENON OF THE DARKNESS PATTERN --- EXPLAINED.....by DXer Ed Shaw, Superstar

Shortwave radio broadcasts are of course heard most anytime of day. Even the most fledgeling beginner in the hobby has discovered, however, that only the higher fays are audible during the daylight hours when lower fays are silent, except for the "noise"; and conversely, that darkness brings better reception on the lower fays and reduced effectiveness on the higher bands. After a short time the beginner, gaining experience, finds that the DX he is seeking comes most frequently during those darkness hours. Simply stated, the best DX will be found only when there is a continuous darkness pattern between the listener's location and the location of the site of the desired transmitter. In this article, we are presenting the first in a series of charts which will enable the DXer to determine within a very few minutes when the likelihood of catching a desired transmission is possible.

Please keep in mind from the outset that there is one specific phenomenon that controls the greatest portion of optimum DX conditions--the sunspot cycle, rising and falling cyclically in a period of about 11 years. At present the sunspot count for each month is steadily dropping until about Winter-1974, when the low ebb will have occurred and the resumption of the rising count will have begun. It is at this lowest ebb that low-fay DXing should be at its best---and high frequency DXing at its worst. For now, let us concentrate on the good DX that is available. With proper computations and the knowledge of when and where to listen, your log will surely swell with new catches never before dreamed possible!

The first step is to determine your exact Sidereal Time. All of us probably know how many hours difference we stand from GMT. However, within our same time zones there are many miles to the east and west of us, and the sun rises either earlier or later at those points than at our own location. It is thus necessary to determine within a minute or so exactly what our difference is from GMT...Hence:

With the aid of a good atlas, determine within one degree what your longitude is at your listening QTH from 0.0° at Greenwich. For example, here in Norfolk, the longitude is most nearly 76° West. When this is determined you may now compute one hour's difference for each 15 degrees, or 4 minutes for each single degree. So, you will see that for my location in Norfolk, Va., at 76° West Longitude, I am really 5 hours and 24 minutes EARLIER than GMT. I make a permanent note of this, my Sidereal Time. It remains forever constant.

The next step is to determine within a minute or so when my local sunrise and sunset will occur--in Sidereal Time. This may be found by referring to the chart on the next page, and then by adding to this the Sidereal Time difference I have computed for my longitude. For instance, if my local sunrise according to the chart is at 0534, I should add to this the computed 5 hours and 24 minutes for Norfolk. My answer is a simple 10 hours and 54 minutes Sidereal Time for Norfolk sunrise.

Now with the knowledge of our local sunrise/sunset times in Sidereal Time, we can begin to determine if that DX-catch we desire is within the darkness pattern necessary to propagate their signal to us. Turning once again to our atlas, let's determine the longitude for the desired xmtr site to within one degree. For example---in the case of Kampala, Uganda, we find that the transmitter is located at nearly 30° East Longitude, and on the Equator, 0.0° Latitude. The WRTH will often note the coordinates of various transmitter sites. Now, remembering that there is a one hour difference for each 15 degrees of longitude, or 4 minutes per degree, we can see that Kampala is exactly 2 hours east(or later) than GMT. To compute Kampala's Sidereal Time for sunrise/sunset, we will always work with this: always subtracting exactly 2 hours from the chart to get Sidereal Time. Note---- Always subtract hours for east longitudes, and add for west longitudes. (next page, pls!)

The following chart will help you determine the sunrise/sunset times for your QTH and that of the transmitter site. There are a few minutes difference between the latitudes listed, and also between the dates listed. However, an estimate may be closely made for the dates and latitudes in between, by simple interpolation. Just keep in mind that transmissions will propagate between points with darkness between them. This includes periods of twilight before sunrise and after sunset.

To continue, let's determine when we may possibly receive an xmsn from Kampala. We recall that Kampala was located at 30° East Longitude, or exactly 2 hours later than GMT. Referring to the chart above, we can also determine that Kampala, at 0° latitude on the Equator, has a sunrise of 0558 on 11 April. But we want to determine the Sidereal Time of sunrise, so we subtract from the figure 0558 the 2 hours difference we computed earlier for Kampala. Thus we now know that Kampala's sunrise occurs at 0358 Sidereal Time. Referring again to the chart, we find that Kampala's sunset occurs at 1804 local time, or 1604 Sidereal (minus 2 hours for Kampala's longitude! Equaling 1604..). If we hope to catch R.Uganda, we must be sure that there is darkness between them and us. On 11 April we find that my local sunrise at Norfolk (35° North Latitude) is 0534, or 1058 Sidereal Time (+5hr24Min). We can see that Norfolk will be in broad daylight when Kampala has sunset. Reception is not possible...BUT Norfolk's sunset is at 1829 local, or 2353 Sidereal Time. Here we can see that there is darkness all the way to Uganda, which will not have sunrise for a few more hours...

The important points to remember are: reception is possible when darkness is between the listener and the transmitter. Subtracts hours for east longitude and add hours for west longitudes. It's as easy as A, B, C, DX!! Next month's chart will cover another later period. Address all questions and comments to Ed Shaw, 621 Bursleigh Ave., Norfolk, Va.23505.....Good DXing!

TRICKS

OF THE TRADE.....Exalted Carrier AM Reception
by Ace DXer Al Niblack

Better shortwave reception is an art. There is more to it than going to your favorite electronics supplier, throwing a bundle of the green stuff on the counter, lug-fing the receiver of your choice home, splicing it to the handiest skyhook, and at once having DX stations roll in, with the postman simultaneously beating a path to your door with verification cards. Sure, you will hear the USSR, the BBC, the VOA, and Radio Peking, and myriad other loud voices---but if you are looking for real DX it is necessary to gain some know-how. The method outlined in the following paragraphs is but one of the many that will help you along the path to some exciting DX-catches.

In SWBC reception, it often happens that transmission conditions are different for waves of slightly different frequencies. In the case of voice-modulated transmissions which involve sideband freqs differing slightly from the carrier freq, the carrier and sideband components may not be being received in the same relative amplitude and phases which were present at the transmitter. This effect, known as "selective fading", can cause severe distortion of the signal and hence ensuing loss of readability--rough copy!! Selective fading can be reduced somewhat, rendering the signal more readable, through utilization of Exalted Carrier AM Reception.

In actual practice, a receiver with a product detector, designed for SSB exalted carrier reception must be used. Examples of such are the Hallicrafters SX-122A, the SX-100 series, and the SPR4. There are others, of course.

To tune an AM signal via this method, set the receiver to USB or LSB, then follow the normal procedure for tuning single-sideband; tune the receiver to select (accept) only one of the two sidebands being transmitted at the station, letting the rx's BFO re-insert the other sideband, detecting the signal as in the same manner as a conventional SSB signal. In utilizing this selectable sideband feature, the transmitted carrier is positioned out of the rx's IF bandpass along one sideband, producing a suppressed carrier single sideband signal. Depending on the make of rx, the listener may or may not have to insert the BFO into the circuit....in some late models the BFO is tied in with the mode switch and is automatically switched into the circuit when the rig is used for SSB reception.

Of course, in receiving SSB, the rx's variable selectivity is always set to a sharper selectivity reading---this makes tuning more difficult, critical, and sharper. The BFO makes a first-class tuning control for fine tuning and crowded condx when in the exalted carrier mode.

Exalted Carrier Amplitude Modulation (AM) Reception can be the difference between copying and not copying a signal. Sometimes it means bringing a distorted signal (ex: an "over-the Pole" Asian xm) to readability--one which would otherwise be lost.....Exalted Carrier AM Reception. Try it, you'll like it!!
