And every day, without fail, Herman would sit down at his World Wanderer 4000RX receiver, tune to 3,958 and spend two hours being entertained by amateur operators in Texas, California, New Hampshire, ad nauseum. Once in awhile he might think he heard a faint, tantalizing something, but he could never be sure. Then, one day it happened. Herman missed his regular 2330-0130 GMT monitoring session. Now it also just happened to be that a neighbor, whom Herman had introduced to the hobby and who, on that day, was celebrating six months of listening, was tuning across the 75 meter band at 0045 GMT. Farley, wishing to show his stuff, dug into the shoebox where he kept his QSLs with the intention of showing his guest his most prized verification, namely 2AP, Apia, Western Samoa. Imagine his dismay when he discovered it was not there! He was even more perplexed when he could not find it laying around the shack. He was horrified when he realized it might actually be lost. He was aghast, panic-stricken. You might even say upset. He searched the house from top to bottom, then from bottom to top but alas and alack it was not to be. Farley almost didn't recover from the pain of it all. Then, some ten years later, Farley's wife was going through some of his old clothes preparing to take them to a charity organization. And there, in the pocket of an old suit coat, she found it! Farley was beside himself with joy. Apparently he had picked up the mail that day and stuck the thing in his coat intending to show it to someone. Three days after this momentous discovery, Farley made another discovery. He'd lost the darned thing again!

The record for the longest continuing attempt at securing a verification is held by Stan Idle of Devil's Canyon, New Jersey. A fantastic total of 23 years! Be that as it may, when L.Q. returned home he was astounded to find 391 pieces of foreign mail awaiting his well-rested letter opener. Unfortunately, all but 11 of them turned out to be program schedules and refusals.

And gang, the moral of all this is that while DX'ing may not bring you fortune, it can bring you fame. If you think you hold a DX record, just let me have your story and you may see it next time in "Charlie's Believe It Or Not."

ANARC Executive Secretary Nominations. Nominations for Executive Secretary of the Association of North American Radio Clubs are now being requested. Nominations should include complete details on the nominee's qualifications. This will be for term 1972-74.

Frequency Recommendation Committee. Chairman Glenn Hauser reports committee member participation has increased greatly, but that there is still need for monitors in the deep south and Rocky Mountain areas. Committee member Dr. Richard Wood has been awarded a silver medal and citation for his services as technical monitor and advisor to Vatican Radio. O.R.T.F. in Paris has informed the Committee that it stills hopes to begin English service to North America. Your letters to O.R.T.F., and perhaps the French Embassy in Washington, would be most helpful in this regard.

Radio Free Europe & Radio Liberty. Various news media have carried frequent news recently concerning the fate of these two short wave facilities. Unless they have the assurance of continued U.S. government funding, both organizations have indicated they will begin shut-down of services in late March with Radio Liberty being completely silenced by summer. RFE has also received some private funding and may be able to continue very limited operations.

International Radio Club of America. IRCA has appointed two new representatives to ANARC; Father Jack Pejza of San Diego, and Dr. Richard Wood of LSU in Baton Rouge. IRCA's 1972 convention will be held in San Diego 30 June to 3 July at Fabulous Inns in Mission Valley, California, a suburb of San Diego. IRCA is a superb BCE DX club.

BROADCASTING FROM KASHMIR

Kashmir has been the object of conflicting Indian and Pakistani claims since the partition of India in 1947. Today, Kashmir is divided into two parts: Kashmir, now Indian territory, and Azad (or Free Kashmir), linked to Pakistan. Both areas are represented by shortwave stations. This past winter saw receptions in the USA of both stations, Azad Kashmir Radio and the All India Radio (AIR) regional operation at Srinigar.

Frankly, little is known of Azad Kashmir Radio though it has been in operation since at least 1948. It has been called clandestine or semi-clandestine, probably because so little has been disclosed about its operations and because it seems to wander from frequency to frequency. But, in light of what is known about the station, there seems now to be little justification for terming it a clandestine. The station is under the authority of the Provisional Government of Azad Kashmir,

and, apparently Azad Kashmir is something of a protectorate of Pakistan.

It has been reported that originally, Azad Kashmir Radio used some type of portable broadcasting facilities at a place called Trarkhel, but a few years back moved into a permanent broadcasting site at the capital city of Azad Kashmir, Muzaffarabad. However, other reports still place the transmitter site at Trarkhel. There have, to the best of my knowledge, been no reports of verifications having been received--although it is said that reports to AZAD KASHMIR RADIO, THE VOICE OF FREE KASHMIR, MUZAFFAR-ABAD, AZAD KASHMIR, PAKISTAN are deliverable.

As far as I know, the first USA receptions of Azad Kashmir occurred this past winter, when a number of NASWA members logged the station on 4,730-31 kHz, between about 1200 and 1300 GMT. Apparently the best chance for logging this one (assuming it stays on the same frequency) will be in late December and early next January. Some Radio Pakistan broadcasts, notably the news, are relayed by Azad Kashmir Radio. Other programs originate locally.

The station is said to sign on at 1157 GMT, with a Koranic chant, and signs off at approximately 1900. It is believed that the remainder of the schedule is 0130-0530, and 0600-0830 GMT, though not necessarily on the same frequency. Though frequencies are changed frequently, two that currently have been monitored are the 4730v kHz outlet and the one on 3409v-11 kHz channel.

In the Indian portion of Kashmir, about twice as large as Azad Kashmir, there is one station (one of the AIR regionals) at Srinigar. It seems to be even harder to hear than even Azad Kashmir Radio, though more is known about the operations of the Srinigar station. It was logged by two or three NASWA members during the



1971-1972 winter season, either tentatively or definitely.

Radio Kashmir, as it is called, uses a single 7,500 watt shortwave transmitter and operates on the following schedule:

0130-0250, 1130-1700 GMT on 3,277 kHz (Saturday to 1730)

0320-0440, 0600-1100 GMT on 7,270 kHz.

However, in early March it was expected that there would be a frequency change for the 0130-0250 GMT and possibly the 0320-0440 GMT time periods. The signal, according to the station, is radiated by a "dipole antenna".

Reports of reception should be sent to either Mr. R. Ali, Audience Research Officer, Office of the Station Director, Radio Kashmir, Srinagar, Kashmir, India--or to J.C. Bhargav, Assistant Station Engineer, c/o the same address. Both seemingly will reply, although Bhargav sends a "better" verification since he is quite knowledgeable about shortwave listening as a hobby. IRCs are sometimes used, sometimes returned.

That night I almost flipped because I heard a broadcast all the way from Ecuador!! And then--Moscow!! Wow-Wee!! I was having the time of my life until a week or two passed and HCJB and Mockba were two of the very few stations I could pick up at all. No offense intended, but the VOA Breakfast show just doesn't turn me on...

Don't let me sell the Grundig short. It really is a fine portable. After 3 1/2 mo's I had heard 33 countries. It's also really tremendous for AM-FM. The big problem was the selectivity: a giant station like the BEC would take up everything from 9.4-9.65 megahertz, making it impossible to tune any other station in that range. Oh yes, incidentally--I found it to be a big mistake purchasing an rx without a bandspread! However, with a great deal of patience I was able to pick up R.Luxy, R.Vilnius, and a few other xmtrs of power less than the BEC, RSA, and VOA breed. I'm currently considering another rx--a move upward on the DX Trail...

HOWEVER, in my heart, I know that my little Grundig will always have a place in my heart, like those first receivers of all DXers, upon which they had cut their eye teeth, spawning each's love for shortwave. Even though they are often kicked, punched and

"In reply to your letter of March 17, it is our pleasure to furnish you with the following information concerning our station at St. Denis.

"All the different services of our (1'0.R.T.F.) station at Reunion have recently been consolidated at new locations near the seashore. Our equipment is located in two radio broadcasting studios and one television studio, with all the peripheral facilities of a record library, film library, demonstration studios, and film development, etc.

"From the standpoint of transmissions, we have two 4 kilowatt medium wave transmitters hooked together which operate on 602 kilohertz. We also have two shortwave transmitters operating at frequencies of 4807 kilohertz and 2446 kilohertz. These transmitters are on the air every day for about 17 hours.

"We anticipate using automatic equipment to the fullest extent possible. Our equipment should be complete very soon and will give the latest possible methods employed for radio and television transmission. In the future we also anticipate a second chain of radio stations and one central more powerful transmitter especially for medium wave transmission.

"Finally, we also have a 4 kilowatt radio transmitter functioning on 664 kilohertz in the southern portion of the Island of Saint Pierre, which serves that region.

"I hope that this information proves satisfactory to the members of your club, and we thank you for the interest shown in our station, and offer you our sincere best wishes."

NEW GUINEA.....Prologue: Future of ABC Xmtr in Pt. Moresby

In last month's Shortwave Center, attention was called to the fact that Papua is presently vying for independence---the conjecture being: what is to become of the ABC regional station at Port Moresby?? The following info was received direct from the ABC, in the "39th Annual Report of the ABC":

"The Commission has devoted much time to consideration of the future of broadcasting in Papua/New Guinea, and has taken particular note of the resolution of the P/NG House of Assembly resolution which urged the establishment of a Nat. Broadcasting Authority in the Territory. The Commission believes that the integration of the 2 existing broadcasting services shouldn't be long delayed, and that control of broadcasting should pass to a local authority, representative of all sections of the community, free from direct governmental control in formulation of its overall programme policy...

"The intensive training of Papuan and New Guinean Officers has continued throughout the year...98 Papuans and New Guineans are employed by the ABC in the Territory out of a staff of 173. Of these 11 are employed as Journalists; 31 are employed as Programme Officers; 5 as Technicians-in-Training; 6 Clerical Officers; 3 Technical Operators...."

It was also noted that the training of Papuan & NG Officers includes English and the study of techniques of programme production at the ABC Head Office in Sydney and at State and Regional Offices.

Your editor's contact w/ the London office of this firm, in regard to a Dubai QSL, was quite fruitful, and was characterized by a quite anxious to please and extremely friendly manner on the part of T.I.E. This tip is by no means guaranteed, but if nothing else, should at least offer a break in the monotonous silence with which Yemen's QSL policy has bequeathed the mails. -rwp-

For the present time, this is the latest news we can submit to you."---direct from DW

3rd of July, 1971, the Radiodiffusion Television Algerienne (RTA) inaugurated an HF transmitting station at Ouled Fayet, some ten kilometers from Algiers, on a site of area 70 hectares. The new station contains five 100 kW transmitters and three 50 kW transmitters. The aeriels provided include 14 curtain arrays, one log-periodic aerial, two quadrant aeriels and two dipole aeriels.

-New Transmitters-

The curtain arrays are designed to cover all the HF bands allocated to the broadcasting service, and the azimuthal directions of maximum radiation are at 20°, 55°, 98°, and 145° E of N, and their reciprocals, with provisions for slewing the beams by + 10°. The dipole and quadrant aeriels (the latter consisting of two horizontal elements at right angles) provide coverage of the Sahara region for the three national programme services. The curtain arrays and the log periodic aerial are used for international services, mainly directed to the Middle East and Africa.

The main building, constructed on two levels, accommodates the transmitters, together with their control desk. Another building houses the aerial switch-

ing frame and the electricity sub-station. The aerial-switching frame, which is of the cross-connection type, makes it possible to connect any of the aeriels to any of the transmitters. Both the actual aerial-switching frame and the electricity sub-station are remotely controlled from the control desk in the transmitter building, which also carries all the controls for the programme-input equipment.

At present, the Ouled Fayet station is temporarily broadcasting programmes produced in the Broadcasting House in Algiers, but from 1973 its programmes will come from a new production center for international programmes, the construction of which is scheduled to begin by the end of 1971. The transmitting station is connected to the Algiers Broadcasting House by a buried cable having a capacity of 26 pairs of broadcasting quality.

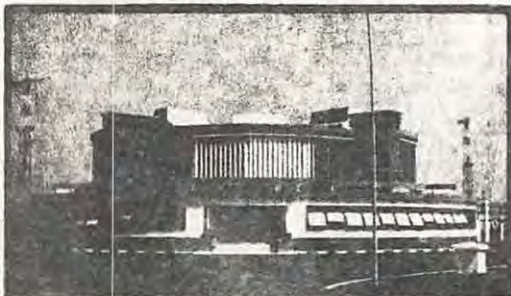

NASWAers Comment: The Gilfer A-20 Presselector

TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

The Model A-20 PreSelector is an active radio frequency amplifying device tuned manually through the frequency range 4.0 to 22.0 MHz. The device is coupled to the input of a short wave receiver of comparable tuning range. One or two receiving antennas are coupled to the input of the device.

Radio signal amplification by the device is of the order of 18 to 20 dB with a noise figure of not more than 1.8 dB at any frequency. Amplification by the device may be adjusted manually within the range of -40 dB to the maximum of the device at the frequency to which it is tuned. The -3 dB points in the tuned pass-band are not less than 200 kHz apart at 4.0 MHz and 300 kHz apart at 22.0 MHz.

The electronic circuit of the device is contained on an epoxy-glass PC board. Two r.f. transistors (Fairchild 2N3564 or equivalent npn type) amplify the radio signals in a tuned emitter configuration. Bias to the first transistor has been optimized to virtually eliminate cross modulation under most operating conditions. The device will accept signals from any antenna feedline impedance without prior matching. The impedance of the output of the device is of the order of 60 ohms.

An ON-OFF power switch and a PREAMP IN-OUT switch are provided as operating conveniences. Power to operate the device is obtained from the 117-volt a.c. line at a current drain under 6 watts. The device is protected by a fuse and has power transformer isolation from the a.c. line. The device measures 8" wide, 3 1/8" high and 5 1/2" (overall) deep. Weight of the device is 2 lbs.

receiver's meter. It provides the gain without a corresponding increase in noise, thus improving the signal-to-noise ratio. I would expect that on a less sophisticated rx the owner would notice a substantial reduction of images, but since I am not particularly plagued with images, I'm not able to give much of a personal evaluation on that matter.

"Because the front panel is calibrated for the standard A-20 model(4-22MHz),

As most of our club members well know, Gilfer has recently marketed a pre-introductory model of a new presselector, the A-20, for the SWL. Price was quoted at \$48.00. The following is a small collection of comments from current A-20 owners, and to the left you will note a description of the unit, per Gilfer. The SWC encourages further comment, especially from A-20 owners using the unit in conjunction w/rx's not represented below.

Frank Peters, Ill....Collins 51S-1

"The question here is whether a hi-price rx like the 51S-1 really needs a presselector. I was greatly surprised that the sig's on the HF bands were greatly increased w/the Gilfer unit. While only a 10 DB gain was obtained at 6MHz and lower, gain did increase over 6 mhz, to a whopping 20 to 25 DB gain from 15-22 mhz...which to me makes the A-20 a good addition to the shack. I am curious as to its performance in other receivers, however.

"Since no wiring diagram is supplied, it is difficult to judge its cost/efficiency ratio---but I presume that excluding profits and price markup, it could probably be built by the skilled hobbyist for less than half the price, and even less if one has a well-stocked junkbox of parts.

"If you can afford it, buy it; if you can't, then build it. I myself am satisfied with the A-20."

Don Jenson, Wisc....Drake R4B

"I've used the low-fq special model of the Gilfer A-20 Presselector for several weeks and I'm very pleased with its operation. I've used it with my Drake R4B and find that the signal gain is significant over the entire range of 3.2 to 18 MHz. Gilfer says that it will increase the signal by 3 S-units: I find this claim conservative. Frequently the gain is on the order of 5 or more S-units on the

the calibration markings are incorrect for the modified low frequency model, but this is not a serious problem, as the amplification "peak" was considerably pronounced and so it can be found merely by tuning the unit without reference to the calibration markings.

"I have also had the opportunity to use the standard A-20 briefly, and the operations were similar. The only significant difference in the two models tested was that the "peak" was considerably sharper on the low frequency model A-20, that is, as with the old DB22a preselector, it is necessary to repeak the PreSelector within a band, whereas the standard A-20 is broad enough to allow only one setting for an entire shortwave band.

"Contrary to some who have observed that they get less a pronounced gain on the frequencies below about 6 MHz, I have found it improves signal level from about 3 to 5 S-units on 90 meter band checks as well as on 16 meters."

Al Sizer, Conn.....HQ180 and Drake SPR4

"I have been using the A-20 preselector, a low frequency model which spans 3200-18000 kHz, for several weeks on two receivers, the Hammarlund HQ180A and the Drake SPR4. Before that I had been using the Ameco PIC-P preamplifier on the HQ180 but found it of little, make that none, use with the SPR4.

"Although somewhat skeptical of advance claims for the A-20, its performance on both my receivers has made me enthusiastic and I have found it one of the most valuable DXing aids to have come along. I have found that the prediction of a gain in signal strength of 3 S-units is an understatement; it ranges from 3 to 5 on all bands and averages nearer 5. And although it was also said that it would work better on the higher bands than the lower, I have not found this to be true---the A-20 is uniformly effective throughout its range.

"I find its main advantage over the Ameco preamp is that it does not raise the noise factor as well as the signal and is, in fact, extremely quiet in operation. Although some have complained that the A-20 causes cross-modulation and spurs, I have not found this to be the case with my receivers. However, it does work a little better with the HQ180A than with the SPR4, perhaps because the former is a tube-type receiver, the latter solid state.

"My two complaints are minor. It is easy to leave the A-20 turned on by accident since there is no pilot light. I understand that this has been remedied in new models. Also I wish the feet of the A-20 were made of rubber or some non-sliding material. The hard surface supports now used cause the A-2- to slip on the top of a receiver, where one would usually position it."

So there you have it...from the tone of our contributors' comments, the A-20 has been well-received. For further information on this unit, contact Gilfer Associates, and Larry Magne's excellent review(which I have caught a pre-publication peek at), scheduled to appear in the May SPEEDX, is heartily recommended.

DARKNESS

PATTERN: The Phenomenon Explained, Part II --- by Edward C. Shaw, W.Va.

In this episode, we will present another exciting example of how to figure the sunrise and sunset for a U.S. city and a target transmitter for the purpose of determining the dark-of-night pattern between the two. The charts this month are a continuation of last month's charts. Ultimately we hope to provide you with a complete set of annual sunset and sunrise times.

Now, for our example, let us determine the sunrise and sunset for Fort Wayne, Indiana, and Singapore. Turning to our atlas, we find that Fort Wayne is at $85^{\circ}W$ and $41^{\circ}N$; and Singapore is at $104^{\circ}E$ and $1^{\circ}N$. Referring to our chart below, we determine that local sunrise for Fort Wayne is 0440 and sunset is 1913 on the 21st of May, our hypothetical listening date. As we recall from last month, we must add to these local times 1 hour for each 15° , and 4 minutes for each extra degree of West longitude. So, now we see that Fort Wayne is an extra 5 hours and 40 minutes west of GMT, and this must be added to the local sunrise and sunset times. The result will be a Sunset at 0053 Sidereal Time, and Sunrise at 1020 Sidereal.

Figuring the same process for Singapore, but subtracting for East Longitude, we find that local sunrise and sunset times of 0551 and 1805 are really 2255 Sidereal and 1109 Sidereal for sunrise and sunset respectively.

We can now see that at Fort Wayne's sunset at 0053 Sidereal, it is still very much day in Singapore, who had had sunrise a few hours earlier at 2255 Sidereal Time. We can also see that at 1020 Sidereal Time when Fort Wayne is having sunrise, we find that Singapore is still in daylight for another hour since the sun doesn't set there until 1109 Sidereal Time.

Thus we see that reception of Singapore is not going to be very likely for this season of the year, the reason being that there are not enough hours of darkness to stretch between Fort Wayne and Singapore. We shall most likely have to wait until much later in the year when the nights become longer.

SPORTS ON SHORTWAVE

It was a very cold nite in the winter of 70-71 when the shortwave fraternity felt that finally, FINALLY we were about to receive the respect due to us. I savored the delicious prospect. There in my shack, a scene no doubt duplicated from coast-to-coast in the abodes of every down-trodden DXer in NA, sat all the "friends" who had so found delight in scoffing at my beloved hobby, always ready to chuckle at Ralph's seeming addiction to static and dependence upon the mailman's daily visit. "The fools," thought I with a smirk.

I fired up the rx while all of those sinister figures who had previously enjoyed naively asking "...but where is your Morse Code machine...??" now sat on the floor and in old stuffed chairs nursing Budweisers, squirming and occasionally breaking the tense silence with a nervous cough.

"Yes, it seems," I sneered in a tone which hardly concealed my vengeful satisfaction, "...it seems that the only place to hear a live transmission of the Ali-Frazier fight is via AFRTS.....uh, shortwave radio, y'know...". It felt so good! But it was the last time I smiled for the next three hours. In that time we managed to log DW, sample the SEC's Dateline, tune the DX-Party Line, and catch the close of South African Panorama. Altho we all got a kick out of Clayton Howard's panting and huffing, there was no Ali-Frazier fight to be found on the shortwave bands. My palms broke into a profuse sweat as I flung the main tuning knob.

"Wait a minute," I alibied. "I've heard that the fight'll be televised live in Japan. Maybe the NHK...". This met with a chorus of grunts. At 0500 GMT they all stomped out, muttering in unison venomous expressions relating to the blood-line ancestry of DXing and one DXer in particular. What a bummer.

The Ali-Frazier fight fiasco notwithstanding, sports programming is one facet of the SWEC spectrum which I have found most pleasing. During the season, R.Canada offers a weekly pgm en-

titled "Hockey Nite in Canada". The BEC, R. Australia, and even WIBS broadcast cricket matches, and the BEC can also be counted on for rugby games--football's considerably more physical English cousin. Of course, soccer games are broadcast by all the major LA networks. Baseball strikes are of no concern to the SWL--tune NHK. And for the die-hard baseball nut who refuses to admit the end of another season, even be it January, where else but on the SW bands can he hear the names of his favorite stars, performing in the Venezuelan and Dominican leagues....

Yet, the Armed Forces Radio & TV Services, AFRTS, the very same station which I often find myself cursing out for blocking out major portions of the SW bands--covering DX--is without a doubt the premiere sports broadcaster on shortwave. Big game blacked out in your area? Check AFRTS. According to sports season, AFRTS carries without fail the big games: the Bucks and the Lakers, the Bruins and Rangers Cubs and Pirates, Penn and Oklahoma, UCLA and USC. AFRTS has em all !!

At the 15-20 minute mark of most transmission hours, the AFRTS runs a sports segment, offering a rotation of varied features from each of the major nets: ABC, NBC, CBS, Mutual. But the BIG BOPPER is their 25-minute "Sports Call Feed" on Tues.-Sats. at 0635-0700 GMT, during which they shoot a succession of sports shorts guaranteed to satiate the appetite of even the most ravenous sports fan. A veritable bucketful of those Howie Cosell et.al, 5-min. sports segments---back-to-back. No commercials! Also, AFRTS's "mini-big-bopper", the "Expanded Sports", is a similar 15 minute collage 7 days a week at 0115, 0715, 1315, and 1915 GMT. Speaking solely from the pt. of view of a sports fan: this is unbelievably good stuff; if you're as hooked on sports as I am, you owe it to yourself to check out these AFRTS xmsns. A great way to while away time when you're waiting for the bands to open up. The frequencies, you ask?? Just close your eyes and tune across the best band---you'll find 'em..the one w/the cheering crowd, overloading your speaker.

However, it is felt here that it merits special consideration since it represents the first results of a test of the new Gilfer A-20 PreSelector with a single conversion rx, to my knowledge. In order to give a "balanced picture" of this new accessory, I deemed it mandatory to run Larry's article concurrently with the preceding A-20 piece. ---rwp

THE GILFER A-20 HF PRESELECTOR

by Larry Magne

The new Gilfer A-20 HF Preselector comes in two versions: the standard 4 to 22 mHz version and a special 3.2 to 18 mHz model. They have been tested here on a Drake R-4B, a Drake SW4A, and a Heath Mohican GC-1A.

Operation of the A-20 is quite simple. Basically, you only have to retune the smoothly-operating frequency control every so many kHz (every 100-300 kHz for the 4 to 22 mHz model, and every 50-200 kHz for the 3.2 to 18 model). Additionally, you may regulate the degree of gain or attenuation by a panel control, choose between two antennas at the flick of a switch, and even bypass the PreSelector altogether by flicking two rear panel switches. All connections are via RCA phono jacks.

The results are impressive. The unit is designed to do two key operations: 1) boost signal strength by "at least 3 S-units", and to 2) reduce images by "4 to 6 S-units". Although not stated, this last statistic apparently refers only to receivers with an IF frequency of around 455 kHz (a larger IF freq would further reduce images, whereas a smaller IF freq would reduce images less). The unit clearly meets and often exceeds these specifications. More importantly, it has done so here with no untoward side-effects, such as cross-modulation or spurious signals. Furthermore, the unit itself, when used with the gain control set at 12 o'clock or greater, is very quiet; on the other hand, when set at very low levels to attenuate signals, it tends to become rather noisy relative to the low-level signal.

Where spurs or cross-modulation have been reported, it seems that these are due to one or more of the following factors: 1) receiver out of alignment, 2) spurs existing all along due to corroded antenna connections and the like, but which are now made more evident by the boosted input, 3) operation of the A-20 at maximum gain when it is fed by an already highly efficient antenna array receiving very high powered signals, and 4) existing cross-mod products, such as Havana 11760, which are independent of the unit. Of course, the first point is solved by re-alignment of the receiver and checking of the RF, mixer and IF tubes; the second by cleaning all antenna terminals and applying contact spray, plus checking for other local sources of spurious signals -- for example, nearby FM or TV antennas; and the third by decreasing the gain slightly when such problems arise.

In terms of clarity of stations heard, the A-20 has been a big help with the R4B and the SW4A for several reasons, even though they have no need for the image reducing properties of the A-20. First, weak signals are now much stronger and override receiver circuitry noise. Second, the boost in strength allows the receiver circuitry to operate more efficiently with marginal signals. For example, with the R4B the AVC is made more effective, the T-notch more useful, and the selectable sideband operation far better (these last two points because the T-notch and selectable-sideband usage tend to weaken signal strength, while the A-20 more than offsets this loss). Modulation through the diode detector is slightly improved, as well.

Countless stations in the tropical bands and elsewhere have seemingly "come to life" with the preselector in a most dramatic and effective way. For example, just this morning Radio Rebelde's nineteenth harmonic was readable on 11400 (19x600)---which may well be some sort of record for flushing out a weak signal. I might add that this was done from a heavily-shielded high-rise apartment using a mere 6-foot long antenna. (next pg, p88)

With the single-conversion Heath Mohican GC-1A, which is a rather poor receiver which has been long-discontinued by Heath, images were definitely reduced by a large margin, especially when operating "out-of-band" in those areas where many SWBC images have a tendency to appear. Without the Preselector, HCJB is very clear on the frequency of 10835 kHz; with the Preselector, it is nearly gone and the UTE on 10835, previously inaudible, comes in well. However, the GC-1A is prone to overloading and the A-20 did not help this in the least. Nor were most of the "in band" signals really any better with the A-20 (this is partly due to the fact that the GC-1A is already very "hot" when operated as it is here with an attenuating capacitor bypassed). And, although images were reduced, some were still present. Also, tuning the 3.2 to 18 megaHertz version, which retains the calibration intended for the 4 to 22 megaH tz version, is considerably more difficult with the GC-1A than with wither Drake. Hence, I tend to feel the A-20 simply will not make a good receiver out of a basically poor one. However, with a good single-conversion receiver, the improvement should be more significant.. The owner of such a receiver may want to consider the easier-to-tune 4 to 22 megaHertz version, also. Not only is its dial correctly calibrated, but it requires less in-band re-tuning than the other model.

In all, feel it is a most significant aid to listening, particularly DXing when your antenna situation is not the best, UNLESS you are already plagued by nonstop electrical noises (which would be merely amplified by the A-20---but not that if such noises abound, serious DXing may be had in the lapses). And although the Gilfer flyer doesn't state this, it appears a 50 - 75 ohm unbalanced input is required on your receiver. If your receiver has a different input, it would probably be wise to check with Gilfer before placing an order.

There have been production flaws, such as loose hardware, mismounted vernier dials and shorted tuning capacitor blades. These are usually easily fixed at home, but if not, Gilfer will make the repairs in or out of warranty. Some of these problems may be due to the original packaging, which was not really up to the rigors of shipment...I'm told, however, that all units have been repackaged in a more adequate fashion of late.

Other recent improvements made since the original units were shipped out include modification of the rear panel switches so that only one switch need be flicked to bypass the A-20. In addition, there has been the inclusion of a pilot lamp.

As to which frequency fange is most suitable, I should think that for moderately serious listeners who operate mostly above 4.6 megaHertz and have pretty good single-conversion receivers, the 4 to 22 mHz version would be more suitable in that it requires less in-band retuning, is properly calibrated, and covers the 13 meter-band (actually, a 4.7 - 26 mHz model would be even more appropriate). However, for the serious DXer or for anyone who owns a double or triple-conversion receiver, the 3.2-18 mHz version covers the tropical bands pretty fully (and this is where the really weak signals abound) while only the 13 mb is sacrificed: a band which contains mainly powerful international SWBCers anyway.
