LOUDENBOOMER REPORT

"Finally, upon retiring, I began this collection for my own amusement, and it just, well, sort of grew into what you see here today."

It was getting near dusk by now, so I gave him my thanks for a most interesting day, said goodbye, got in my car and headed back into town.

I was in my motel, near the point of sleep when it hit me. There was no statue of C. Loudenboomer in that Waxworks. No bust of Loudenboomer either! Not even a photograph! Why that ignorant so and so didn't know a DX celebrity even when he stood face-to-face with him!

The next morning I headed out at dawn's early light to go back and give that Mildew fellow a piece of my mind.

Four hours later I was still retracing my route. By dusk I had covered every road in the area a dozen times, asked farmers, gas station attendants and even tried a scarecrow once. None of them knew what I was talking about!

I spent the next three days searching, but to no avail. The NADSWAM had disappeared, if it ever existed. And that, my friends, is why I've slacked off a bit this year!

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HAPPINESS IN HILVERSUM

Tom Meyer, ebullient host of Radio Nederland's Happy Station program is a favorite the world over. This issue of FRENEX features an exclusive interview of Tom Meyer by our own Serge Neumann - himself formerly with Radio Nederland's staff.

NEUMANN: Tom, what makes the Happy Station happy?

MEYER: As one listener put it, we are non-political, non-religious, non-racial; but pro-humanity! We're not trying to sell any message; on the contrary, we ask listeners who they are, and what they think.

NEUMANN: How did the idea of the Happy Station originate?

MEYER: Eddie Startz, my predecessor, was asked in 1928 to present a program on short wave via an experimental Philips transmitter. He was to make station calls and to ask for reception reports, but to make no other comments. After doing the same boring announcements, he would begin to ad-lib, "This is PCJ from Holland, the Happy Station," and it caught on.

NEUMANN: The program is still going strong over 40 years later. When Eddie Startz retired, you joined Happy Station as its new host. Why was this?

MEYER: In 1968, I was about to leave Radio Nederland because I wanted to see and learn more of my profession. The management told me, to my surprise, that I should be capable of succeeding Eddie. So, I decided to do it... and in January 1970 I presented my first four Happy Station shows.

NEUMANN: What have you tried to achieve with the program?

MEYER: Well, first of all, to convince the people who listen that friendship exists for everyone, and that this show comes from Holland, and that Holland apparently is much more than windmills and barrel organs.

NEUMANN: How would you describe your typical listener?

MEYER: There is none...but, they all have something in common. Either they are isolated, geographically, socially, or physically - and in bad need of human contact, or they are fed up with all the commercials and bad news they see and hear, which for some reason is emphasized more than any good news by the press, radio and television.

NEUMANN: What has given you the greatest satisfaction about the program?

MEYER: To personally witness several occasions of listeners solving their biggest problems - loneliness. There are so many examples of people who have acquired good friends and acquaintances. (Cont'd next page)

Grandma Green in California, who adopted me as her grandson three years ago received hundreds of get-well cards from all over the world when she was in the hospital last year.

NEUMANN: How much mail does the Happy Station get?

MEYER: Approximately 19,000 last year alone.

NEUMANN: Certainly, you must have lots of help in answering letters, and to keeping Happy Station running smoothly?

MEYER: Well no, not lots. Hardly enough in fact, but this is not the place to complain about it. However, now that you have brought up the subject, remind me that I should bug the management again - just a little!

NEUMANN: How much time is required for constructing one Happy Station program?

MEYER: There is very little planning time, since I do 5 hours and 10 minutes each week. Recording one 80 minute show usually takes no more than 80 minutes.

NEUMANN: Do you like doing the live, Sunday morning program? Is there a thrill? How does it feel to be talking to an international audience?

MEYER: Yes, I like it, and there is a challenge. It's like getting together with a bunch of good friends for coffee or drinks. What I miss most, tho, is the lack of instantaneous reaction. It always takes at least several days before they can answer.

NEUMANN: Are most people regular listeners, or just seekers of QSLs.

MEYER: I think more and more are turning into regular listeners, even if they started out just listening to gather reporting details.

NEUMANN: You sing, too - don't you?

MEYER: Yes...at least that's what some people call it. I have had quite some stage experience before joining Radio Nederland, and singing was always my favorite artistic expression.

NEUMANN: Are your records available to anyone, and how can they get them?

MEYER: I presume you mean the record I made specially for Radio Nederland's 45th anniversary. This is available to any person, free of charge, provided they listen to the show and ask for the record personally.

NEUMANN: Looking to the future, what do you see for the Happy Station?

MEYER: What I have in mind is not necessarily what will happen. So, I shouldn't answer. Suppose I tell you that I will go to the moon on the next Apollo or Soyuz mission...imagine all the explaining and apologizing I'd have to do later, if, say, the microphone failed to work.

NEUMANN: Do you ever listen to similar shows on other shortwave stations?

MEYER: I bought a very good 11-band radio just for that, but I hardly ever find the time.

NEUMANN: Do you ever encounter frustrations in producing and airing the Happy Station?

MEYER: Not too many, actually. There is one thing, however, which I mentioned before...I wish I could get in closer and more personal contact with the people who listen. I wish I could make at least one big trip a year to personally see under what circumstances my faraway friends live. I'd like to experience some of the things they write about. As my father always used to say, you can learn from other people's experiences, but you can only live by your own!

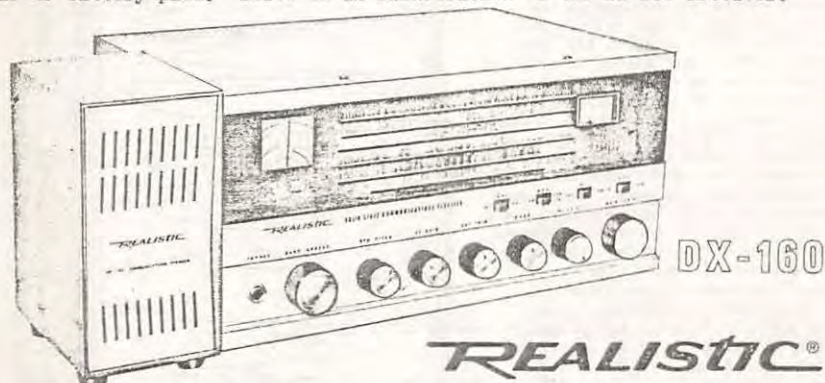

AN On-Shelf Review of Radio Shack's Realistic DX-160 - by Edward C. Shaw

I suppose I could have talked the store manager into letting me take the receiver home with me for a day or two, but he seemed to think he could sell it the next day, and it was the only one he had left. Two of his initial order of three had gone within a week after they arrived. Therefore, this review of the DX-160 must be given from an on-the-shelf inspection and trial. Even with these restrictions I was favorably impressed.

The DX-160 actually appears to be twin to its DX-150 series predecessors at first glance. Closer inspection, however, revealed that the dial plate now had an additional band - for LW DXing below the AM band. I wondered just how much use anyone would get out of that, but then remembered recent mention of a California group of LW enthusiasts. Suddenly, I noticed the single most important feature improvement in this new 160 series. The bandspread dial now had a logging scale! This was a meaningful addition for DXing, since a logging scale is essential for preparing a set of graphs to enable one to determine nearly exact frequencies.

A run-down of the DX-160 features include: Front panel headphone jack; a bandspread knob, BFO switch and pitch control, separate AF and RF gains, antenna trimmer, automatic noise limiter, automatic volume control for either fast or slow recovery, main tuning, S-meter, and general coverage from .15 to 30 MHz, except for a small gap between 400 to 535 kHz. The rear panel had antenna inputs for single wire lead-in or for dipoles. A receptacle on the rear accommodated any speaker, and a handy provision was found to operate the receiver on any 12 VDC source, such as from a car or battery pack. Below is an illustration of the DX-160 receiver.



As mentioned, the most appreciated improvement was the addition of the logging scale. The owner's manual had some worthwhile instruction for the SWL/DXer which is evidence of Radio Shack's acknowledgement that they realize there is a hobby out here. The author was able to calibrate the receiver easily, using the bandspread. The owner's manual has scales for each of the bonafide short wave broadcast bands and the calibration is fairly accurate after some practice. I was exceptionally pleased to see that the 60 meter band was nearly six inches long (on bandspread) and 5 kHz was easily read. A practiced DXer may even get within 2-3 kHz or less. I regret that the DX-160 still has no variable selectivity; but the schematic shows a mechanical filter and gives specifications of 4 kHz at 6 db and below...which is adequate for general DXing. 2 kHz at 6 db would have been better, and still retain adequate fidelity and gain.

My initial impression was that Radio Shack had made some concessions for the SWL/DXer in the DX-160 model. I am inclined to believe the circuit for the DX-160 may be improved over the 150 series, which I have tuned. I am advised by the owner's manual and by a seemingly caring and knowledgeable dealer that the quality control for the DX-160 is superb. Price is \$160.00 without speaker, and it just may be worth it. In any case, it seems to be the best receiver readily available to the seriously inclined hobbyist for under \$300.00 at present.

CYCLES OF SOLAR ACTIVITY

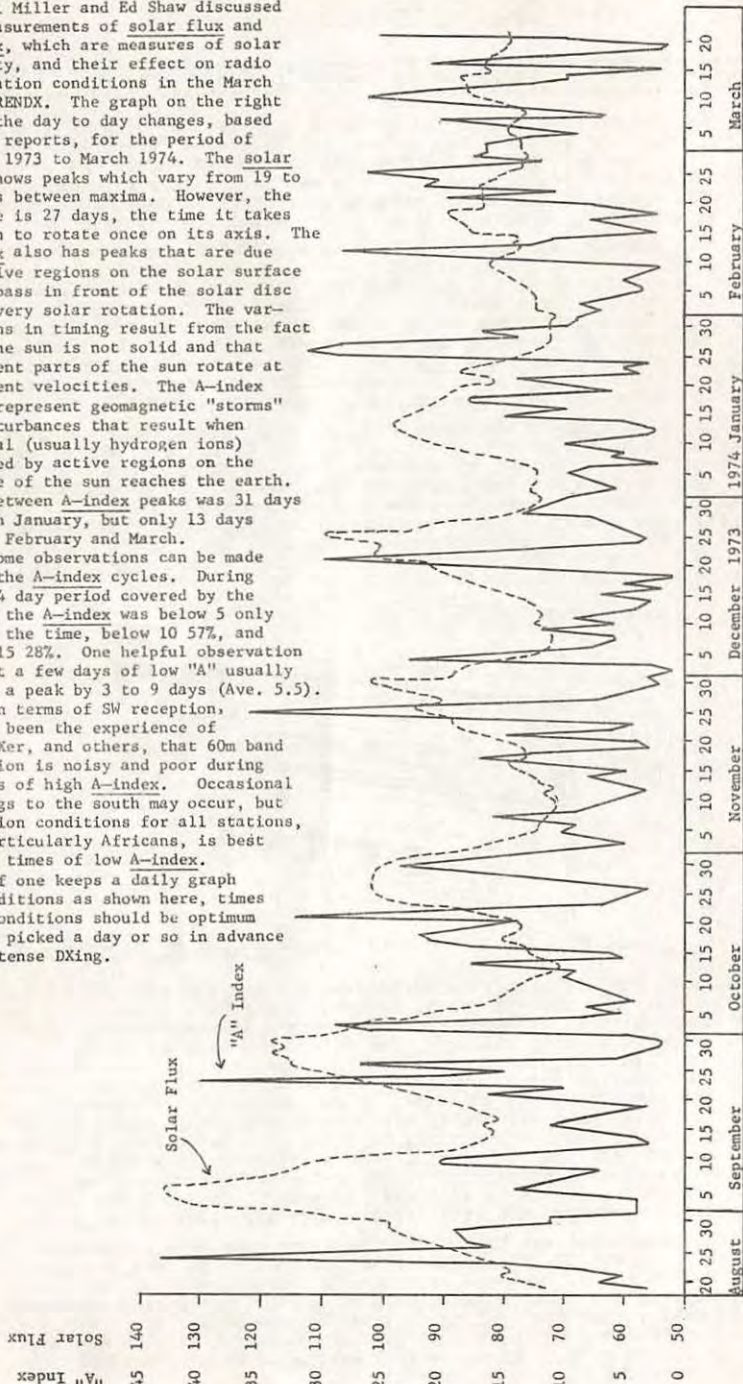

Al Miller and Ed Shaw discussed the measurements of solar flux and A-index, which are measures of solar activity, and their effect on radio propagation conditions in the March 1974 FRENDX. The graph on the right shows the day to day changes, based on WWV reports, for the period of August 1973 to March 1974. The solar flux shows peaks which vary from 19 to 36 days between maxima. However, the average is 27 days, the time it takes the sun to rotate once on its axis. The A-index also has peaks that are due to active regions on the solar surface which pass in front of the solar disc with every solar rotation. The variations in timing result from the fact that the sun is not solid and that different parts of the sun rotate at different velocities. The A-index peaks represent geomagnetic "storms" or disturbances that result when material (usually hydrogen ions) released by active regions on the surface of the sun reaches the earth. Time between A-index peaks was 31 days through January, but only 13 days during February and March.

Some observations can be made about the A-index cycles. During the 214 day period covered by the graph, the A-index was below 5 only 26% of the time, below 10 57%, and above 15 28%. One helpful observation is that a few days of low "A" usually follow a peak by 3 to 9 days (Ave. 5.5).

In terms of SW reception, it has been the experience of this DXer, and others, that 60m band reception is noisy and poor during periods of high A-index. Occasional openings to the south may occur, but reception conditions for all stations, and particularly Africans, is best during times of low A-index.

If one keeps a daily graph of conditions as shown here, times when conditions should be optimum can be picked a day or so in advance for intense DXing.

Purchasers of the Autek Q-Box probably found this instrument of limited value to them in SWLing due to the too-high center frequency of 800 Hz, which is nominally best for CW. By replacing C6, C7, C8 and C10 capacitors to .003 uc values (1/2% tolerance), center frequency can be lowered to a more useable 295 Hz - about midway in the normal voice range. A METHOD FOR KEEPING LOGS OF YOUR DX - by Ed Shaw

Whether one uses a simple sheet of paper, a lined school composition book, or specially made forms, all short wave listeners should try keeping track of what they have heard and what they want to hear.

These two pages will illustrate one method that I have tried and accepted as a system to accomplish both logs keeping, and a "wanted" list. To aid in this I designed my own special form (see facing page). It is reproduced on this page in reduced size, but the actual form is printed on standard 9x14 paper. I drew in the lines by ruler and felt tip pen, then typed in the letters and numbers on a borrowed typewriter which could accept 14" paper.

My specific method entails simple use of a composition book or notepad in front of my receivers to jot down all pertinent information while actually doing any DXing. Later, when time permits, I transcribe the rough notes to the special forms I keep. Usually, I do not keep scrupulously precise loggings of every item I hear; I omit the easier loggings which are regularly heard, and I might not continue to log more difficult seasonal catches if they are showing up several days in a row - logging these once or twice seems enough for me. After I have completed transcribing my rough loggings to the special forms, the forms are filed by date. I continue to save my rough notes until I have accumulated a week's worth, and I then compile a complete list of all catches in ascending frequency order for submission to Log Report and other DX news sources.

One can see at a glance on the special form which catches were logged at which hour. In this manner, the special forms can be used for jotting down desired catches and supposed times to listen.

The facing page special form example shows how I keep permanent log records in the top half of the form. The bottom half shows how I keep a "wanted list".

One more use for the form - if you want to keep even more detailed logs - is to have one form for each country, listing the frequencies and stations within the country and the times you hear them. I keep such a file of forms on a long clipboard - one clipboard for each of the continents. Each continental clipboard has countries in the order found in the official NASWA Country List (25c from HQ).

The only detracting point I can admit about my system is that the remarks section leaves small amount of room to jot in details. I use logical and obvious abbreviations whenever possible, and occasionally some known only to me.

The form I designed was not expensive. I took my original to a fast-copy service and ordered a couple hundred for about \$3.00. I am willing to provide a full-size copy suitable for use as an original to any NASWA member sending me a legal size envelope with return postage affixed and addressed.

In summary, using these special forms I can keep detailed logs of all my catches either by country or by date. The forms kept by date have all the loggings in frequency order and illustrate at a glance the time period heard.

A special gizmo at the bottom of the X-190 accepts stereo headphones to permit simultaneous monitoring of the SP-600 and X-190, one to each ear, respectively..... a good way to check for parallels.

RADIO SIGNALS PORTUGUESE COUP

Lisbon -- Shortly before midnight on April 24, a local radio station began broadcasting a song judged best in a recent nationwide Portuguese contest -- "E Depois do Adeus" (And After the Goodbye).

Small groups of tense young army captains and majors huddled over radio sets throughout Portugal straightened up, grimly wished each other good luck, roused their troops and began moving into this then-sleeping capital.

Portugal's recent, astonishing military coup was under way.

Shortly after midnight, still clutching their radios, the officers tuned to another Lisbon station, one operated by the Roman Catholic Church (listed in WRTH 74 as Radio Renascença on 6155, 1286 & 1169 kHz, plus several FM outlets). The announcer was reciting calmly the words of another popular song, this one about a Portuguese village -- Grândola Vila Morena:

"Grândola, sunburned

Town of brothers

Where the people take first
place.

A friend on every corner,
Equality on every face."

"That was the signal that everything was OK, to keep going," explained an acquaintance of some of the young army rebels. Relieved, the coup-makers went ahead with their plans. And as the radio station broadcast their song signal, they went into action.

Early April 25 they seized all radio stations, television transmitters, key telephone exchanges, and the government's military administration school which maintained the nation's armed forces communication network. The government was no longer able to reach those military units not involved in or aware of the developing coup. Rebel troops also surrounded army headquarters.

Shortly after 4 A.M., the rebels first announced they were in action. A radio broadcast from the "Movement of the Armed Forces" warned Portugal's police, national guard and the right-wing Portuguese Legion not to try to foil the coup.

Shortly before 7 A.M. the rebels announced that Lisbon had been surrounded, that Portugal's "hour of liberation" was at hand, cautioned the public to be calm, and warned they would tolerate no police or military opposition. That seemed to indicate they still were uneasy that some of their armed forces' compatriots might come out against them.

At 8:30 P.M. on April 25, the "Movement for the Armed Forces" announced by radio it had taken power in Portugal. Some five hours later, General Spínola appeared on television as the head of the "Junta of National Salvation", which now is governing this country.

RADIO FREE PORTUGAL CONTINUES BROADCASTS

Despite the new role of the Portuguese Communist Party as a minority member of the just-formed civilian government in Portugal, the clandestine radio of the Party, "Radio Free Portugal" ("Radio Portugal Livre"), continues, as of May 19, active from a site in Romania. It appears to be the only active clandestine station beamed to Portugal.

Its current schedule, as provided by the BBC Monitoring Service, is:

Although there are no known verifications from this station, it may now verify via the newly-established headquarters in Lisbon. A letter sent merely to Secretário-General, Partido Comunista Português, Lisboa, Portugal, could well bring a response, especially if you write in Portuguese and comment on the programming.

Best Bets: 1800-1955 on 15483v kHz, or 2320-2350 on 8333v or 11509v kHz.

KURDISH REBEL STATION NOW IN ENGLISH ON SHORTWAVE

via BEC MS, IBA & John Campbell

As we suggested last month, the pro-Barzani clandestine radio, "Voice of Kurdistan of Iraq", has expanded its programming hours and languages.

The station is now traced in a new language -- English -- from 2000-2030 GMT on the usual frequencies, and is heard easily in Israel and, less easily, tentatively in Europe. Although propagation to the Americas is highly unlikely until late fall or early winter, there is still the possibility of a further-expanded schedule making reception here feasible.

The IBA's engineer, Fred Stockheim, in a report from Jerusalem, states, "Offer Barth (of the IBA) reports he has recently had good reception of the Voice of Kurdistan without jamming in Haifa (north of Israel) on 1200v kHz, 1700-1900 Kurdish, 1900-2000 Arabic, 2000-2030 English. Their identification: 'This is the Voice of Kurdistan of Iraq'. He estimates power of at least 20 kw."

John Campbell writes from Dublin, Ireland, "I think I've heard the Voice of Kurdistan on 3623 kHz to 1948 s/off in Arabic May 2, but not since."

As for who is behind the Barzani operation -- at least outside the Kurdish Nation -- The New York Times senior commentator C.L. Sulzberger writes, "This time -- unlike previous occasions -- there is no evidence that the United States is helping the martial Kurds. The Soviet Union has even sought to bring them and Baghdad together. But Iran is delighted every time the Kurds make trouble for Iraq, the Shah's bête noire. Iran has been shipping military equipment to Mulla Mustapha Barzani, the aged Kurdish leader. Israel, hoping to handicap an Iraq that favors unending Palestinian war, is likewise thought to be giving Barzani funds."

Best Bet: Between now and next winter, the only hope of picking up Voice of Kurdistan of Iraq is from a site in the Middle East or nearby. Vacationers in Europe may have success using high-quality SW receiving gear, but visitors to Israel and nearby countries can probably try for them successfully on their AM/MW portables.

PHANTOM STATION: VOICE OF THE UKRAINIAN LIBERATION FRONT

In the 7th Edition of How to Listen to the World (WRTH/Billboard, 1973) there appeared an article on clandestines by me. One of the items listed was entitled "Voice of the Ukrainian Liberation Front", and read, in full, as follows:

"Proposed new Chinese-based station, possibly 'black', nominally to be operated by the 'Ukrainian National Front.' It purportedly will broadcast messages urging the Ukraine to secede from the U.S.S.R. in accordance with the provisions of Article 17 of the Soviet Constitution. The main force promoting this station appears to be the Ukrainian Society for Study of Asian Problems (USSAP) of Munich, Germany, with Canadian offices at Postal Station 'A', Box 683, Toronto 1. The station allegedly will be beamed both to the Ukraine and to Ukrainians living in the Asian RSFSR near the Chinese border and broadcasts will be relayed via Albanian transmitters. At the moment, nothing is known of its proposed operating times or frequencies, except that it plans to broadcast three hours a day and will surely be jammed. Earliest date of commencement, unconfirmed by USSAP, is said to be summer, 1972."

As none of the compliment of clandestine radio station monitors throughout the world heard this proposed station ever come on the air, it was finally presumed that either negotiations for its establishment fell through, or that the whole scheme was dreamed up by USSAP for some ulterior motive, e.g. raising funds.

So you can imagine the surprise that was felt when reports of this station's being active appeared in respectable organs of the Western lay press. One report had the station as "too weak for West European monitoring". A later report, in the April 17, 1974, issue of Variety, went somewhat farther. It stated, "Heard also is a clandestine station called 'The Voice of the Ukrainian Liberation Front.' It is run by an emigre organization to keep alive the underground independence in the Ukraine. Since Moscow is extremely

sensitive about any Ukrainian independence movement, the Russians have gone all out to jam these broadcasts. Only Western intelligence knows for sure whether the Voice of the Ukrainian Liberation Front is sponsored by the Chinese or by America's CIA."

Do they know something we don't? Probably not. The more likely answer appears to be tucked in a writeup by Clyde Farnsworth, onetime Vienna correspondent for The New York Times.

According to Mr. Farnsworth, Radio Free Europe not long back did a "survey of broadcasting by the two main camps of communist world leadership headed by the Russians and the Maoist Chinese." Mr. Farnsworth, in discussing "black senders", continues, "It (the RFE survey) draws heavily on Lawrence E. Mague's handbook 'How to Listen to the World.' This often revised reference work devotes a section to 'Broadcasting Stations of Clandestine, Exile, Intelligence, Liberation and Revolutionary Organizations.'"

Judging from the Farnsworth article, the RFE study is quite good, probably as good as has heretofore been made available to the lay press. But somewhere between the HTL article and the RFE study there appears to have been made an assumption that the Ukrainian station had already gone on the air. China has black clandestine stations, the article pointed out, "but its clandestine stations along the borders of the Soviet Union are too weak for West European monitoring. One of these appears to be affiliated with Ukrainian emigrant organizations in the west."

There are enough other items in the Munich-dated Variety article to suggest its source was also the RFE study. Although we have not had the privilege of seeing the study firsthand, it appears that a cautiously-stated assumption that the Ukrainian station was actually on the air -- albeit weakly -- served as a springboard for an understandable set of deductions concerning the details of the operation.

So the Voice of the Ukrainian Liberation Front exists, the Great Pumpkin of the air-waves.

Doesn't it?

NEW SCHEDULES FOR SOVIET BLACKS

Via Hiroyuki Nagase & Isao Ugusa, Tokyo

Thanks to recent surveys of Soviet black clandestine radio activity by our Tokyo colleagues, we were able to present the first complete updated report on these anti-China stations in last month's "Clandestine Bulletin".

Their continuing monitoring efforts have revealed new data on schedules, ID's, and so on, including the observation that "Proletarian Battle Division" and "Voice of the Liberation Army" now have been merged into a joint operation.

What follows is the complete known black Soviet radio activity at present.

PROLETARIAN BATTLE DIVISION ("Wuchanzhe Zhandoushi"), a/k/a VOICE OF THE LIBERATION ARMY ("Jiefangjun-zhi-sheng"):

What used to be two Soviet-based black propaganda clandestine operations has, since at least April 5, 1974, been more or less merged into one, judging from the use of both ID's during programming these days.

The former Proletarian Battle Division, then widely referred to as "Fighters", was first noted around December, 1966, and was on the air from then until late June, 1972, then on again briefly to around early 1973, on 7520 kHz.

The former Voice of the Liberation Army also came on the air around December, 1966, and was traced until roughly late June, 1972. It reappeared in late 1973 and was first traced in December of that year.

The present operation, besides being the result of an apparent merger, also differs in that the Chinese national anthem, "March of the Volunteers", is no longer played at sign-on and sign-off, as it was with the old Voice of the Liberation Army. Instead, the Communist anthem, the "Internationale", is played.

The current schedule is likely to change suddenly. Channels have recently been alternating without notice, possibly in error, but perhaps to create a sense of amateurism to enhance the effectiveness of the ruse.

All transmissions are in Chinese and are jammed; times vary slightly.

This is Proletarian Battle Division. Today broadcasts for real Marxist-Leninist proletarian comrades"); "Qing zhu-yi! Xia-mian qing ting Jie-fang-jun-zhi-sheng" ("Please pay attention! From now please listen to the Voice of the Liberation Army"). Sign on and sign off with

the "Internationale", Radio Peking disc version.

RED ARMY RADIO STATION ("Hongjun Guangboshan"): This Soviet-based black clandestine has been traced irregularly since late June, 1972. It may share facilities with "Sparks" (believed inactive, but one unconfirmed report suggests otherwise) and appears to be allied with Radio Red Flag on 995 kHz MW.

Red Army Radio Station was noted reactivated on March 13, 1974. Programming is in Chinese and all transmissions are jammed.

Transmissions are irregular and, when heard, their broadcast times vary slightly.

1400-1410, 1415-1425, 1430-1440, 1500-1510 & 1515-1525 on 7210 kHz (7190 & 7240 alts.)
 ID: Chinese: "Zhe-li shi Hong-jun guang-bo-zhan. Xian-zai xiang quan-dang tong-zhi, quan-jun zhi-zhan-yuan he quan-guo ren-min guang-bo" ("This is Red Army Radio Station. Now broadcasts for comrades of the whole party, all commanders and soldiers of the whole army and the national people"). Sign-on & sign-off with "Liberation Army March" ("Jiefangjun jinxingqu"), march of the Chinese People's Liberation Army.

RADIO RED FLAG ("Hung Chi Kwangpo Tientai"): This Chinese-language black clandestine appears to be located in the Khabarovsk-Vladivostok region of the Sino-Soviet border. As with all Soviet stations of this genre, Radio Red Flag's programming is anti-Maoist.

The schedule, as traced by Lars Ryden of Tokyo, is:

1130-1143, 1230-1243 & 1330-1343 on 995 kHz

ID: Chinese: "Che-li shi Hung Chi Kwangpo Tientai" ("Here is Radio Red Flag"). There are no interval signals, signature tunes or anthems played.

UNIDENTIFIED: An unidentified anti-Maoist black clandestine appears to be operating in the 41 meter band, according to Sri Lanka's Victor Goonetilleke.

Its schedule appears to be:

1445-1452, 1500-1507, 1515-1522 & 1530-1537 on 7120 kHz

Nothing more is known as of this moment.

ANGOLAN REBELS EXPAND BROADCASTS

The "Voice of Free Angola", reported on in the "Angola" section of April's "Clandestine Bulletin", has gone from a twice-weekly to a thrice-weekly program, according to the BBC Monitoring Service. They find it now as follows:

1800-1830 Mon/Wed/Fri (Wed new) on 11865v (Lubumbashi), 15245v (Kinshasa) kHz

A small aside is provided by Thomas Johnson of The New York Times, via Myron Reamy. In another Portuguese colony, Guinea-Bissau, the rebels communicate with the populace via their clandestine radio station, "Radio Liberation" ("Radio Libertação"), which CB has reported on in detail last December and at other times.

Our information had indicated the real location of the station was near Conakry, in the neighboring Republic of Guinea. This is now confirmed by The New York Times reporter, who writes:

"Many villages have pooled their rice to make up the 1,000 pounds needed to get a transistor radio. With it they can hear the African party radio station in Conakry, and the programs in Portuguese from Radio Moscow, the British Broadcasting Company (sic) and the Voice of America."

IRAN

Yet another "new clandestine station" based in Iraq and attacking the Shah of Iran has appeared, according to the BBC Monitoring Service. In fact, these appear to be only minor reshapes of deactivated operations put out by Radio Baghdad. A name change, a shuffle of frequencies and times, and -- voilâ! -- old wine is made new.

This latest operation was first traced by the BBC MS on April 27, 1974, with anti-Shah, anti-Iranian Government, and pro-Palestinian broadcasts. The program language is Farsi and the 1515 broadcast is a repeat of that given at 1030. It is called Radio of the Patriots. 1030-1130, 1515-1615 on 7230 kHz

The BBC MS also reports that what was originally understood to be "Radio Khorush" ("Radio Clamor") turns out to be, during periods of clear reception, "Radio Sorush" ("Radio Inspiration"). It appears to be the successor to the "Voice of Iranian Freedom Lovers" and may therefore be via a 50 kw transmitter of Radio Baku, USSR. It was first traced by the BBC MS on December 22, 1973, and is audible in North America, Europe, the Middle East and Asia. The 1930 broadcast is a repeat of that given at 0230.

0230-0330 & 1930-2030 on 7099 kHz (also reported 7099½ kHz)

ID: Farsi: "Mein, Radio Sorush", according to our friend Victor Goonetilleke of Sri Lanka.

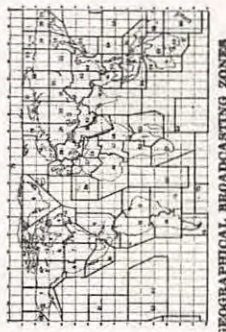

I've recently been using some equipment sold by MFJ ENTERPRISES, P.O. BOX 494, MISSISSIPPI STATE, MISSISSIPPI 39762. I have here their LPP-1, low pass audio filter, and a CWF-2BX; the latter with a center frequency of 400 Hz, instead of the higher center frequency normally used. You can write MFJ for a brochure describing the items. We will have an evaluation of these audio devices at a later date. At this time all I want to say is that the devices are useful, particularly with the less expensive receivers which do not have adequate IF selectivity. Also, they are useful with more expensive receivers, too; though the difference is not as great as in receivers with poor IF selectivity....More later, after more extensive and careful evaluations.

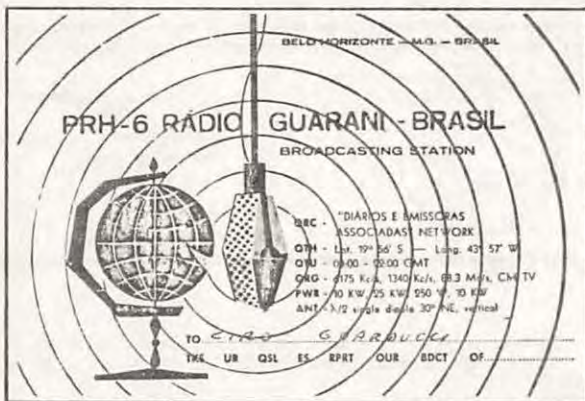

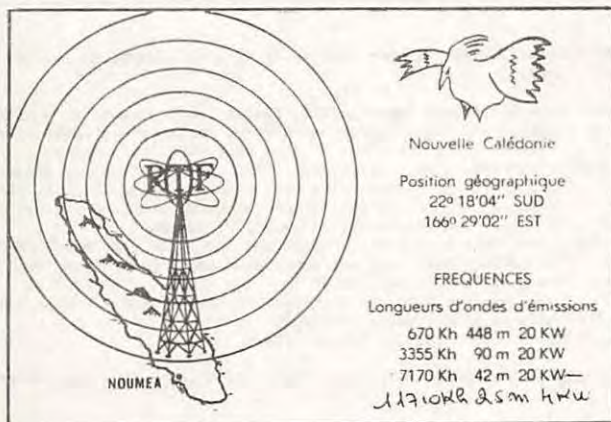
