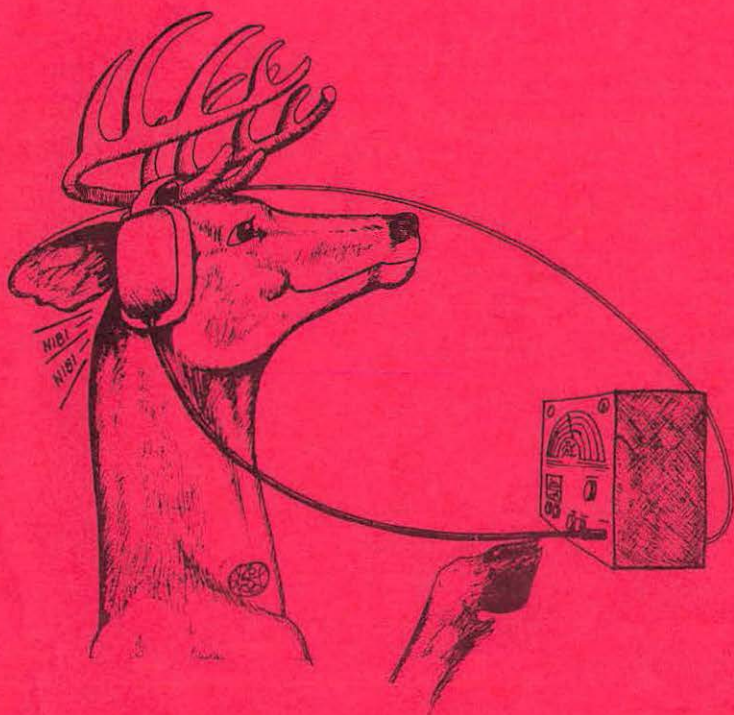

(This month I relinquish my usual column space for this exclusive interview of Mortimer Mansfield, a remarkable giant among men, as told to his close associate and biographer, Mortimer Mansfield. - CHARLIE)

I first met Mortimer Mansfield when he was but a very small child.

"Self," the already-destiny-bound infant told me when but a few moments from the womb, "this world may not be ready for you, but you are nevertheless its good fortune!"

That was 66 wonderful years ago.

Mortimer's (or my) mother, he told me, was often heard to say "My, what a wonderful and heaven-blessed boy you are!" And Mortimer, brilliant as he was, couldn't help but know the old lady was right.

"Yes, mother dear...and humble too," quoth the precocious three-year-old.

By the time he was 14, Mortimer had received two doctorates, journeyed to Antarctica with Adm. Perry, for whom he maintained radio communications with the U.S., been awarded two Pulitzers and a Nobel Prize.

That is an astounding record, Mortimer, I told himself.

"I know," himself answered.

All through his middle years his career -- as journalist, author, living legend and part-time notary public-- came first. There was really very little time to waste on the hobby of shortwave listening. But fortunately for Mortimer, it didn't take a great deal of time to log just about every SWBC station on the air.

"A few moments stolen here," Mortimer declared humbly, "a few seconds there and I had heard them all, some several times over."

A few stations, he admitted, have eluded him thus far -- Radio Nubby Nubby and the Voice of the Moon.

After Mortimer's retirement some months ago he finally found time for those pet projects that have been simmering on the back burner of his mind for so many years. And though his life had been fulfilling and honor-laden, something was lacking...the opportunity to share his wisdom with the lessfortunate.

First was his development of a new technique, which should be of interest to novice and veteran listener alike. Mortimer told me that it was a rather difficult concept to understand but that, roughly, it involved identifying stations by listening to their IDs.

He found a troupe of dedicated but technologically deficient bimbos masquerading as a shortwave club who could benefit from his instruction. For that club's bulletin he began churning out articles explaining simple concepts in such style that the subject matter immediately became obscure and seemingly complex.

I need not recount his contributions to hobby literature. (But you will, anyway, interjected Self, knowingly.)

"For best sensitivity, turn off your receiver and turn on to Idaho Red," proclaimed an early Mansfield feature. "Only dummies still believe in D-layer absorption," lectured another opus. "Plug your headphone jack into the TV and let Rhoda ID the language," advised the old master.

Antennas? Receivers? Listening techniques? My Gosh, the man was absolutely brilliant, in my opinion.

"Was I?" I just asked myself.

"Yes you were, now shut up while I finish the story.

Mortimer was also able, at long last, to devote long hours to the passtime of DXing. In the past six months 229 different countries have been entered in Mortimer's bulging log book -- some of which he actually heard.

With greatness, of course, there is a price to be exacted. It became lonely at the top. I soon found club members were afraid to approach my exalted presence. In awe, they failed to write. No one asked my advice any more.

"Self, it's just something you'll have to learn to live with," I told myself.

"Or live down," Self responded.

Keep it quiet

HOW TO STOP SEWING-MACHINE NOISE

Sewing appears to be a popular avocation among wives of SWLs. This was learned by chance in connection with the Keep It Quiet series published in FRENEX during 1975-76 and reissued by the SWC editor as NASWA's initial special publication.

The series triggered a considerable volume of mail from those confronted with a variety of reception-noise problems. The most frequently repeated question is how to keep sewing-machine motor noise out of SW receivers. Clearly, this is a troublesome problem for a number of SWLs. "Either my wife sews or I tune the receiver," one reader explains, "but never at the same time - the machine ruins reception."

Had I recognized the extent of the sewing-machine problem, discussion of its solution would have been a part of the noise-reduction series. This article is intended to correct that oversight and, hopefully, contribute to marital harmony in homes where SWLing and sewing are incompatible hobbies.

Some newer sewing machines contain factory-installed noise suppression and cause little if any SW reception interference. Virtually all older machines, however, and particularly foot-treadle models which have been converted to motor drive, are noise generators. This on-site electrical noise can not be reduced substantially by a line filter at the receiver. The noise-killing must be done at the machine or, somewhat less successfully, between the machine and the AC line.

Solution of the problem is simple. All that is needed is a pair of 0.01 microfarad capacitors across the motor brushes together with a larger capacitor - 0.05 to 0.1 microfarad - across the foot-operated speed control rheostat. But applying the solution may introduce other problems, depending upon how the machine motor was manufactured and installed.

The small brush-type motors powering most machines are compact, usually have closely-fitted cases, and on some machines are mounted in such a way that merely getting inside the case is difficult. If the case is made of plastic, the job can be even tougher. When there is sufficient space in the case to accept the two small ceramic disc capacitors, the installation can be simple. But some motor cases lack even this minute space.

The alternative, usually a less satisfactory noise-reduction method, is to place a

line filter between the machine and the AC outlet. The filter described in the Keep It Quiet series is suitable for this purpose.

Adding a capacitor to the foot control - a necessity regardless of how the motor problem is handled - usually is a simple operation. Most of these controls have some form of base in which a capacitor may be installed without difficulty. In both motor and foot-control applications, use components rated at 1,000 volts DC, make leads as short as possible and solder all connections.

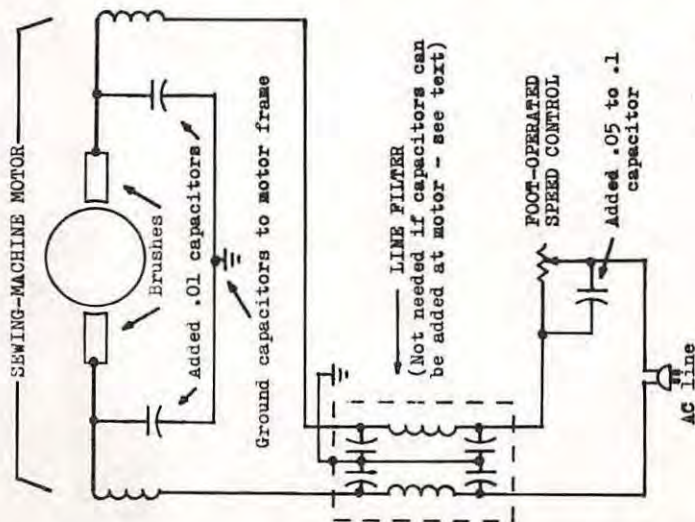
If you are not familiar with AC wiring and soldering in tight quarters, your best bet is to consult a reliable sewing-machine service center or electrical appliance serviceman. Show the schematic diagram and explain what you seek to accomplish. Get a firm price quotation before any work is done. Most of the charge will be for labor; the required capacitors cost less than a dollar. And it may be necessary to assure your wife that quieting her machine electrically will not affect its performance.

Properly installed bypass capacitors across motor brushes and foot-control rheostat will eliminate sewing-machine noise from your receiver. This is true even though machine and receiver may be operated in the same room simultaneously. A line filter at the machine should reduce motor noise but may not eliminate it. Success depends largely on how efficiently the filter is grounded and how close it can be placed to the motor. A poor ground or even a foot or so of AC cord between the two permits noise to get through.

A line filter at the receiver usually aids in reducing sewing-machine noise generated by neighbors. But a filter at the receiver is virtually useless in killing noise from a machine operated within your house or apartment. The only wholly effective on-site solution lies at the machine, not the receiver. This may take a bit of doing but results are well worth the effort.

The schematic shows both possible solutions of the problem. The filter circuit within the dashed-line shielding enclosure is the one described in Keep It Quiet. It is not needed, of course, if capacitors can be placed in the motor case.

The bypass capacitor treatment is equally effective in quieting noisy AC motors of mixers, vacuum cleaners, shavers, power tools, and other motor powered sources of receiver noise. It also works well in eliminating interference from noisy fluorescent light fixtures.

THE MCKAY-DYMEK ALL WAVE RECEIVING ANTENNA - AN OBJECTIVE EVALUATION

DYMEK DA100

The DA-100 antenna system consists of a collapsible 4-foot element affixed to a sealed unit containing a resonant circuit (no schematic provided), which in turn is fed via 52-Ohm coaxial cable to a broad-band RF amplifier, the final output being fed to the receiver used.



The initial element is affixed directly to the sealed resonating unit by a swivel-socket, tightened by screw. The collapsible element/unit is designed to be installed out of doors, preferably high and away from other objects, while the amplifier unit is installed indoors near the receiver. The appeal of the DA-100 is to serve hobbyists who do not have adequate room to install a more sophisticated length of antenna, or otherwise do not desire another antenna for aesthetic reasons. Specifications for the DA-100 system claim equality with a 100 foot wire, but did not say in words how it was equal; one must interpret the chart provided. Although advertisements say that the DA-100 may be used as a short wave antenna, the specifications do not claim the unit is an especially good short wave antenna, which it is not. McKay-Dymek does not tell us what antenna system was used as a reference to establish their plots of gain on logarithmic graph paper. However, one might assume from the comparison claimed, that they used a 100 foot long wire.

TECHNICAL PERFORMANCE DATA: According to the chart, the DA-100 added 2 dB of gain over the reference antenna at a frequency of 100 kHz (?). I don't know who is interested in 100 kHz.

At 1000 kHz (middle of the BCB band) the DA-100 claims to be on a par with the reference antenna with a zero dB gain reading. We can assume that the DA-100 stops being equal to a 100-foot antenna at that point.

The DA-100 performance figure declines somewhat below the reference antenna between 1 MHz and 10 MHz, actually dropping about 1/2 dB. From 10 to 30 MHz the performance falls off to - 2dB below the reference antenna.

PRACTICAL OBSERVATIONS: In testing the DA-100, the author installed the element/resonating unit atop the roof corner over a backyard patio. The base of the element affixed to the resonating unit was approximately ten feet above ground. The nearest metal structure of any consequence was one of the wrought-iron stanchions supporting the roof a foot or more below the level of the element base. I considered this to be a reasonably typical installation likely to be performed by the average apartment dweller or homeowner with a modest-size lot. Later, the antenna element and resonating unit were moved to a position outside an upstairs window, supported on a 2x4 board extending about four feet from the side of the house, at about 30 feet height.

McKAY-DYMEK DA-100 ANTENNA SYSTEM (Continued)

SET-UP FOR OBSERVATION: To aid in an objective comparison test, the author used three other antenna systems; a 60-foot random wire antenna suspended at 20 feet above ground; an 18-foot vertical element erected with its base at 30 feet above ground; and a homemade amplified loop of 15-inch diameter which resonated for 3-10 MHz.

Two receivers were used: An R-390A and an FRG-7.

A period of two weeks was devoted to various observation situations during daylight and darkness, evening and morning, rain, sunshine, warm and cool temperatures.

SPECIFIC OBSERVATIONS: The author's tests indicated that the DA-100 antenna did NOT perform equal to another antenna of 100 feet. It did not perform as well as the test comparison 60-foot antenna, regardless of receiver used or circumstances, or of frequency tuned. The DA-100 did perform marginally better than the 18-foot vertical element on frequencies below 31 meters; 25 meter reception was essentially equal for the DA-100 and the vertical element. The DA-100 system compared well with the homemade amplified loop. On frequencies below 6 MHz, the DA-100 provided about 1 S-unit stronger signal, but was on a par with the homemade loop on frequencies above 6 MHz. The homemade loop, however, provided a less noisy signal on ALL frequencies tuned, thus delivering a more usable signal to the receiver.

No evaluation was made on the standard BCB, since this is not within the scope of NASWA. Specifications do claim advantages for BCB frequencies.

Since the DA-100 system is designed as a complete antenna system, rather than an amplifier system for another existing antenna, the author had no choice other than to compare the system en toto to other antennas. However, signals received on the unaided 60-foot antenna were received with an average increase of 3 S-units when connected to the resonating unit where the normal 4-foot element should have been, and the amplified product fed to the receiver.

Also, with the amplifier disconnected from the wall plug, the author observed that the DA-100 center-lead wire ALONE provided either receiver with a stronger signal than when the unit was plugged-in and operating with power.

A change in location of the element from porch top to outside an upstairs window resulted in NO discernible differences whatever.

Results of all observations were essentially identical regardless of which receiver was used.

SUMMARY: The DA-100 does not perform as well as a random 60-foot wire for short wave frequencies. The DA-100 performs marginally better than an 18-foot element on frequencies below 31 meters, and performs less well above 25 meters. The DA-100 delivers a slightly stronger signal but with more noise, compared to a small amplified loop at frequencies below 6 MHz.

In the author's opinion, the DA-100 should not have been advertised as a competitive antenna for short wave frequencies. The \$125 cost seems very high for the benefit realized, considering also that the owner still must accomplish some outside installation. The author suggests there are other less expensive amplifiers available which can be used with very short antennas.

THINK

BEFORE YOU BUY THAT RECEIVER

You read a lot of good advice about sensitivity, selectivity, stability, and other technical factors you should consider when buying a shortwave receiver. All well and good. But there are some other considerations you should take into account before you go in hock for that set. Here are a few:

(1) SIZE. How big is the receiver? How much does it weigh? Do you have room for it? Does your wife think you have room for it??? Is it too heavy to be easily transported? In other words, non- or only semi-portable?

Another thing to be considered, although not usually mentioned, is how easy will it be for you to ship the receiver to the factory it came from, or to any repair place, for repairs? (The last time I sent my SPR-4 back to Drake in Ohio from Connecticut it cost \$2.50 UPS. Beat that.) A smaller and lighter receiver will also be easier to package for shipping.

(2) REPAIR. Before you buy a receiver you ought to have a firm and realistic answer to this question - where can I get this set fixed if it breaks down? Does the manufacturer repair his equipment at a reasonable price? Are you buying it from a dealer who stands firmly behind the equipment he handles?

Repair facilities are especially important for receivers bought secondhand and from surplus. You'd better be sure you scout around in advance to locate a repair place before you plunk down that money.

(3) POWER. How much power does it take to run? Will it work off flashlight batteries, car cigaret lighter socket? This is important if you want portability.

If heat is something you want to avoid in your shack, then you will want to have solid state equipment, not tubes. Some receivers like the famed Hammarlund 180 and the R-390A use heater tubes that remain on so that the receiver will not have to be warmed up to avoid drifting. Heater tubes can cause problems if you are technically inexperienced as we are. Once we got several frightening electrical shocks with an HQ 180A when we were moving an aluminum ladder and the top of it came in contact with an antenna. It had been made "live" by heater tubes. The Receiver probably was improperly grounded.

So remember, in buying yourself a shortwave receiver, you should carefully weigh all the angles. Sometimes the buyer tends to ignore factors that may become problems when it is too late to make a change.

FALKLANDS

F.I.B.S. - A TALE OF EXOTIC DX

F.I.B.S. is certainly one of the most wanted SWBC DX catches and, to the handfull of North American DXers who have heard it, the thrill of a lifetime.

F.I.B.S., the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Service, operates from Stanley, the capital of the Falkland Islands, a British colony in the South Atlantic off the coast of Argentina. The Falklands are almost totally isolated, until 1973 the only regular transportation link to the outside world being a monthly mailship from Montevideo, Uruguay, a thousand miles away. There is not an air service from Argentina. This isolated life greatly increases the importance of radio.

The first known landing on the islands was made in 1690 by the English captain Strong. The Spanish and French had settlements on the islands for a short time, but were soon pushed out by the English. The Falklands were designated a Crown Colony in 1892, due to their importance as a coaling station for ships going around Cape Horn. The British claim to the islands has been disputed for 140 years by Argentina. On Argentine maps, the Falklands are designated as "Las Isles Malvinas".

The island group consists of two large islands and about 200 small ones. The climate is severe, because of biting winds from the Cape Horn region and icy Antarctic currents. At the time of the 1962 census, the population numbered 2,172, at least 98% descendants of British immigrants, the remainder being immigrants, usually temporary, from Uruguay and Chile. The islanders call themselves "Kelpers" after the rich seaweed which surrounds the archipelago. About half the population lives in Stanley, the remainder being scattered throughout the islands. The principal occupation is sheep farming, although oil deposits are suspected. Except in Stanley, no roads exist on the islands. The landscape is barren and consists primarily of rolling hills and peat bogs. According to a 1973 AP dispatch, "there are four pubs, no movie houses, and a lot of signs saying 'keep the Falklands British'."

The Falklands were the first British colony to have their own broadcasting service. The F.I.B.S. was established in 1929, using a small transmitter which covered Stanley and

part of East Falkland. In 1942, coverage was extended to the entire colony. A system of wired rediffusion was set up later. Apart from the normal 34-36.5 hours of broadcasting weekly, special announcements may be transmitted at any time. Programming includes music (pop, light orchestral pieces, and Latin American dance music), local news, shipping news, BBC World Service news and many BBC transcript programs, which may be two years old by the time they reach Stanley. A weekly feature is "Visitor's Box". The following comments are by Margaret Stewart Taylor, author of Focus on the Falkland Islands, who visited the islands for three months in 1969:

I had only been in Stanley a few days when the Reverend Peter Millam, Senior Chaplain at the Cathedral, escorted me to the studio for an interview. I was asked, "Where have you come from? Why are you here? How long are you going to be here?" Peter wanted to know what kind of a book I intended to write and the titles of books I already had published. Then I was asked to give my first impressions of Stanley.

The studio was very informal and I was introduced to Nadine Campbell, responsible for the programme, and a technician. They sat in the main room from which transmitting took place. It was also the recording-room and a store for discs and tapes, while a glass window looked into the interviewing-room. Peter and I were in the latter, and the technician signalled through the window for us to begin.

Special odd-hour radio announcements might have times of Beaver flights, passenger lists for planes or ships, new goods on sale in shops, and individual messages of general interest. I was struck by Kelper honesty when it was considered worth while to put over the information that someone had lost a sum of money "in an envelope during Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday morning so would finder hand it to . . ." It seemed marvellous to me that the finder could be so honest, but the Falklands are islands where property and order are respected.

The last positive receptions of F.I.B.S. in North America occurred in August 1972 and January 1973, during severe auroral conditions which wiped out ham radio interference and brought enhanced southerly reception. NASWA member Al Sizer writes about his logging:

My catch of Falkland Islands was one of the most memorable and frustrating episodes of my DXing career. . . . It (5 August 1972) was a day of remarkable reception. The ham radio operators which make life miserable for DXers in the 75 metre band were completely blotted out in my area. That left the way free for Falklands . . .



Sizer did not ID Falklands, but Dr. F. Earle Hall of Winchendon, MA, did. Hall subsequently reported and received the only F.I.B.S. QSL in recent years.

At that time, F.I.B.S. was operating on the 75 metre band, on a frequency which varied between 3941 and 3943, despite the nominal 3958 listed. According to a cable from the station received by Numero Uno editor Don Jensen in March 1976, F.I.B.S. now operates on 2370 kHz nominal, plus 536 kHz mediumwave. Tony Jones, an English DXer working in Paraguay, reported reception on 2385 kHz on 18 June 1975, so it is likely that the 2370 nominal varies considerably. (Editors Note: A Falklands reception on 2370 kHz was noted from Brazil in the April DX Hotline). The schedule is as follows:

There are no Sunday transmissions. Power is 500 watts. The best time to try for F.I.B.S. in North America is seemingly between 0100 and sign-off at 0130 or 0200. QRN is now the major problem. The best possibility for an NA logging would still be during the extreme auroral conditions associated with an ionospheric storm.

Beginners Patch

With the winter months ahead, now is a good time to plan for an award. Yes, plan for an award, because you do have to plan for it. This is because you have to concentrate your DXing efforts on getting the countries that are included in your award. There are many awards to choose from (see previous awards lists in FRENEX by Awards Chairman, Dan Henderson), but I think the European award may be the easiest. The only problem is getting those last two countries. So far I have received 23 European countries, 22 of them in English. But whatever award you get (or try for) it is something to hang proudly in your shack.

The Congo is easily received in North America from *2130-2144* in English. They ID as the "Voice of the Revolution". Before 2130 they are in French. The frequency is 15190.

Radio Nederland has an English broadcast everyday from Talata, Malagasy Republic (Madagascar). They are on the air from 2000 to 2100 on 11730, which is the same frequency as their North American broadcast at 2130.

Radio Denmark has a broadcast in Danish at 1730-1800 GMT on 15165. Be sure to look for the English IDs at sign on and sign off.

A SERVICEABLE GROUND by William Alder San Antonio, TX

Ground

I have used this ground for almost seven years and find it quite good, particularly here in the southwest where we have prolonged dry spells. When it becomes dry, I pour one or two gallons of water down and around the ground pipe. Due to its construction, the earth is thoroughly moistened all around and even below the pipe. Before filling the hole with dirt, pour several gallons of water in and you will be off to a running start.

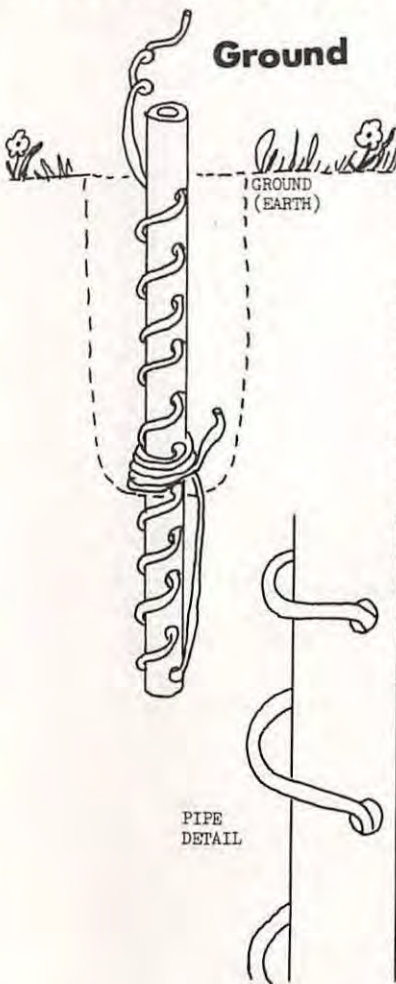
Specifications

Use a 40 to 48 inch long piece of galvanized water pipe. Inside diameter should be at least 3/4 inch. Drill 1/8 inch diameter holes through pipe 5 to 6 inches apart, the last hole 1 inch from the end.

You will need about 16 feet of 12 gage bare copper wire. Leave about 18 inches at top and thread wire through holes as shown in the diagrams.

Dig a hole 8 inches wide and 2 feet deep. Drive pipe into bottom of hole until the top is 4 to 5 inches above ground level. Take the 11 or 12 feet of wire left and wind it around pipe at the bottom of the hole after the pipe has been driven into the ground to the correct depth. Wet down ground around pipe and fill hole with dirt.

Make all electrical connections to the 18 inch long piece of wire at the top of the pipe and be sure to twist and solder connection.

CHANGE IN FORMAT by Jerry A. Lineback

Users of the solar-terrestrial conditions reports now issued only at 18 minutes past the hour on WWV should note that the format and time of update has been changed from that which was previously used. They now give a current K index number, presumably updated at 6 hour intervals and then the solar flux and A index for the previous day. This is followed by a forecast for the current day. The time of daily update has been moved up to 0018 UT from the former 0418 UT. Reports are by telephone circuits and the audio quality suffers.

USSR

SOVIET RADIO INTERFERENCE

Thanks to Bill Coleman, Jr., Arnold Iausevich, Larry Magne, the Washington Star, and others

A mysterious and very powerful radio signal, apparently from the Soviet Union, has been disrupting radio communications periodically for some time. These transmissions are heard throughout the world, almost daily since July. Several hundred complaints have been filed with the U.S. FCC which has in turn filed complaints with Soviet officials and with the ITU in Geneva. The Soviet officials have not acknowledged the source of the signals.

The signals are extremely wide band and it pulses 10 times a second. Broadcasts are being made on shortwave frequencies and are interfering with ship-to-shore, point-to-point, amateur radio, and international shortwave broadcasting. Direction finding equipment indicates that the signals emanated from the eastern side of the Baltic Sea. Some FCC officials speculated that the transmissions might be coming from the area around Minsk, the capital of Byelorussia, about 300 miles southeast of the Baltic.

The transmissions have been heard on frequencies ranging from 6 to 28 MHz with band widths of 30 to 300 kHz. The length of transmission ranges from 30 seconds to 30 minutes. It is unlikely that such transmissions contain intelligence. Speculation has been made that the Russians are developing a system of over-the-horizon radar.

Propagation Conditions by Jerry A. Lineback

Solar-terrestrial conditions continue at a low ebb, with only minor indistinct monthly peaks. Solar flux peaked on 25 October and 19 November giving a solar month of about 25 days. The next solar flux peak is expected about 16 December, but don't expect much. It may be several more months before solar activity picks up significantly.

The geomagnetic field was also very quiet. A prolonged low took place between 19 and 29 October and again from 15 to 22 November. Recurrent geomagnetic activity continues to take place about 5 days after and 10 days before solar flux peaks. The A index peaked on 31 October and 11 November. Peaks in geomagnetic activity are expected again about 24 November, 10 December, and 20 December. Major disturbances are unlikely.

Well, that is all for this month and this year. Thanks are due to all those who contributed material for SWC. It is their efforts, rather than mine, that have insured the quality of this section of FRENDX. I hope you all resolve to keep up the flow of good material to SWC and the other sections of FRENDX in the new year. Thanks and 73s

INTERPRETATION OF THE RESULTS The results of the questionnaire have yielded a wealth of information about the U.S. shortwave listener who belongs to a "hobby" organization such as NASWA. Probably the most interesting and revealing question is the fourth one, asking how much time is spent on DXing vs. program listening. The outcome on this one shows that NASWA members tend to spend more time DXing -- but not much more time. Arithmetically, the "average" NASWA associate spends 53.8% of his/her time DXing and 46.2% listening to program content. //Also of interest is the even breakdown of amounts of money spent on shortwave listening equipment (question 8); here is more proof that we are not a hobby limited to the very wealthy. //The question about the various types of shortwave programs shows that DX programs are the most desired, followed by talks about lifestyles, folk music, and home news. Political comment is the least popular, followed by popular music. //Congratulations to Radio Nederland's DX Jukebox for being the hands-down favorite DX program, and to the BBC for winning NASWA's version of the Nielson Ratings. But notice the obvious relationship between ability to hear the station and how often the stations are heard. //Question 129 shows that NASWA spans the generations, and question 134 indicates that we are a very well educated group. But, alas, question 130 gives us the bad news that females are very poorly represented in our organization -- something will have to be done about that! //NASWA associates may feel free to quote excerpts of these results provided NASWA and the author are acknowledged. The above summary is a mere digest of a large amount of information provided by the computer readout (using a program of the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS)). Further analyses, such as cross-tabulations, will be made, and the results will be shared with FRENEX readers as space permits. A complete description of the results of the NASWA Survey will be contained in an upcoming NASWA Special Publication. To be sure, all results will be distributed to shortwave broadcasters and manufacturers. DON'T YOU BELIEVE...

...that 'old style' IRCs will no longer be redeemable after 31 December 1976. The USPO, responding to UPU inquiries prompted by complaints from amateur radio DXers has announced they will be accepted. (PO letter in the West Coast DX bulletin, via CG, August, via NU 30/10)

...that SBC's "Swiss chronometer" always gives the exact time. 26/9 on 6045 they piped at 0433 and called it 0430. No tape on hand for delayed starts, I guess (gh) ...R Australia's TC for 2211 GMT heard at 2011 GMT 14/11 on 9540; Rdif. Nacional-Colombia's assertion 12/11 at 1229 GMT that the time in El Salvador was 9:26: heard on 9682. (gh) ...those time pips on RTVE's Nam svc on 6065/11880--17/9 pipe for 0300 were a full minute earlier than BBC's accurate ones (Richard Wood) ...the pronunciations of proper names by the new generation of BBCWS announcers. Since hiring standards were relaxed, standards of phonetic mastery of foreign names have slumped. Ex.: E. German Party Secretary Honecker mispronounced as "Hock-ener", a flubbed initial consonant in the Welsh Llandudno, mispronunciation of the Polish forest Katyn and the name of Maltese opposition leader Borg Olivier. ...that BBC behaves with British gentlemanliness toward the established frequency usages of others. BBC-Montse-rrat hogged the long-established Vatican frequency, 5995 (Richard Wood) ...that Radio RSA's Wednesday program on the Transkei isn't significant, though BBCMS pointedly omitted it (gh) ...that R. Nederland's Dutch program is always in Dutch. They had an English music dedica-tion 16/11 at 0416 on 6165; ...that stations which overpromote the ISWC popularity poll don't unfairly influence the outcome (gh) ...that RFE doesn't broadcast in English, or Ger-man. During the listed Polish program 12/11 at 1323 on 21665, "The Music Studio of RFE brings you a selection of popular tunes" and the same announcement in German (gh) ...that Radio Moscow ever broadcasts in Russian, as sometimes reported. If it's in Russian from the USSR, it's some other 'station' (gh) ...that the "Revolution Centrafricaine" ID from Bangui is anything new, as BBC WRC 13/10 implied (gh) ...that Ulan Bator has any plans at this stage for establishment of a service for Australia (ADNX 10/76) ... that F.M. King (Oct LN-9) is the first to show a link between planetary alignment and sunspots. Research on this goes back to 1954. John R. Gribbin and Stephen H. Plageman discuss this in some detail in their 1974 book "The Jupiter Effect". They predic' the next sunspot maximum will be in early 1982, when all nine planets are aligned on the same side of the sun. (Adam Gaffin, NY)

...that reception problems in Europe for RCI have been 'largely solved' thanks to its telex hookup with official monitoring stations...that Mt. Logan, YT, is 'about 6000 km high', as claimed by RCI 16/8 1945 on 15325 (Richard Wood) ...that 2340 kHz is the first harmonic of 1170 as stated by Jan Tuner on DX Juke Box 13/8; should be 2nd harmonic--1170 is the first; ...that North Americans must 'get up very early in the morning' to hear "Good Morning Africa" at 0256-0426Z as announced on Radio RSA 7/8 (John Wegener, IL) ...that 'freak reception' is responsible for Springbok Radio being heard 'thousands of miles away', as Arthur & June asserted 13/6 at 2301 on Radio RSA (Dave Walcutt, IL) ...that QSLing is useless. It helps keep gh supplied with skeds (Tom Overcamp, SC) Yes, but stations should send out skeds upon request, with or without a reception report (gh) ...that SPEEDX is a radio station, despite being accorded that status by ARDXC for the weekly tape on DX Party Line (gh) ...that BBCMS doesn't reprint some skeds published by Eastern European stations, though they never admit that haven't compiled them only from monitoring. ...that the high error rate of BBCMS items from Latin America is their fault; they get it from FBIS, and assume it's correct (gh) ...frequencies reported by FBIS. Despite their Collins equipment's facility for 100 Hz readout, they only note the announced frequency or 'hat listed in WRTVH. Even 5-10 kHz deviations are not deemed noteworthy! I visited the FBIS set-up in Paraguay some two months back; a nice family atmosphere but little of the organisation which exists at BBCMS. They seemingly have only one monitor for cruising the bands, and he only works till 2400 GMT. I had about ten Bolivians he didn't know existed. I was quite surprised, considering the difference in equipment--he with the latest Collins and a massive dipole beamed on Peru/Bolivia, and I with my XCR-30 and a short length of wire. However, delayed publication of the station lists is not the fault of FBIS; they usually have it ready on time, but the US Government Printing Office has such a backlog they cannot cope with it (Tony Jones, Paraguay)

...that the FRG-7 tunes only 500 kHz--29.9 MHz; mine covers 300 kHz to 31.0 MHz (gh)

Orth, TX: "LN, SWC and QSO/NASWA are communicative, professionally presented, and complement each other in a manner unusual to find in any specialized periodicals other than FRENEX, to which I have subscribed off and on for about 50 years. GH should own four of the world's BEST RECEIVERS, if he is to give accurate REPORTING EVERY MONTH. I plan to buy a Sony CRF320 for \$1,600 and will get better results than GH!!!! #this space intentionally left blank: (gh)

Dan Stainer: "The one thing I find most inadequate is the lack of good critical commentary on program. Simply reporting that a given program is on the air is for me, not enough"

Brandon Lovett, OH: "Would like to see more background info, such as the Peruvian item excerpted from Numero Uno. Also some other interesting info could be taken from NU when there is room, as the majority of us can't get in, hi!" #I cannot comply (gh)

Charles A. Taylor, IN: "SWling or SW DXing should not be widely promoted to the public; otherwise, a truly decent hobby which is still a refuge of the unique individual may go the same route as the plasticine, mass marketed pastimes of our people. Direct your attention to CB and professional sports, two examples of what can and will happen, if SW becomes a mass activity." #of course, with few exceptions, SW programming is already geared to the LCD(gh)

Jim Conrad, IA: "The powers that be at RNZ were sooo apologetic when they came back on the air with a simple relay of station "2YA". Apologize, hell! Some of the best programming on SW comes from SW outlets relaying domestic stations. For classical music buffs both the CBC NS and RNZ provide weekly programs, both quite well done. When will these people finally realize that not all SWL's/DXers are total news freaks? Although I make my living as a newscaster, enough is enough!!! I personally much prefer hearing a domestic service SW xmtr simply due to the varied programming available. Another dandy domestic is Perth-9610. I wish SWL's/DXers would tell a station what they really think of a broadcaster's programming, and not worry so much about whether their honest opinion will lessen their chances of a verification... International Broadcasting: A New Dimension of Western Diplomacy, by David M. Abshire, is the latest of "The Washington Papers" published by the Center for Strategic and International Studies at Georgetown Univ. Abshire is the Chairman of the Board for International Broadcasting, the federal entity serving as liaison between RFE/RI and Congress. This deals with western broadcasts to the USSR and eastern Europe, and domestic services there. It's a good source for those interested in the politics of international broadcasting, but I would not recommend it for those seeking technical information. The 90-page booklet is available for \$3.00 from Sage Publications, 275 S Beverly Drive, Beverly Hills CA 90212. Specify publication no. 480035 and include title and author. (Kim Andrew Elliott, MN)

Communications World, Fall-Winter 1976 is on newstands \$1.35. As usual Don Jensen's communications section is well done and most useful to the DXer at large. Included are sections on SW stations by frequency and English broadcasts to NA by time. (Ed Insinger, NJ) I wonder if, for the last, Don's prime data source is the same as Richard Wood's? (gh)

INTRUDER WATCH

THE PULSER is getting wide press attention, per clippings received via Ciffin, Potter, Irvine, Odlin and Mackes, at least, including a false alarm that they had ceased. The most discouraging thing is that SWLs and DXers are nowhere referred to as users of SW--just hams two-way outfits, etc. It would seem that the SWL apathy has reached a new low--as the FCC apparently has received no or few complaints from them. A Washington Star piece by Stephen M Aug was reprinted widely. IARU QRM coordinator Colin Thomas thinks there are three xmtrs involved. The extremely wideband signal pulses 10 times a second, on freqs ranging from 6 to 28 MHz; they are 30 to 300 kHz wide and may last for 30 seconds to a half hour. Soviet Embassy played dumb. MORE:

(MORE PULSER) David Mackes, MD, says it's undoubtedly over-the-horizon high-frequency radar, using pulse compression--a wideband pulse is transmitted and is compressed in the receiver to make the pulse seem much greater in amplitude. Most likely it is being chirped, with linear FM the modulation method. David forwards a copy of an article in the 8/11 Aviation Week and Space Technology, p. 19, which speculates that the pulse may be too slow for Doppler shift techniques, to detect high-speed targets, and may only be useful for slow-moving targets, such as detecting surface shipping in the North Atlantic.

HARMONICS

I do not intend for this to be a regular LN section, as harmonics ought to be treated just like any other DX. RCI's in Russian, noted Sun 14/11 at 1615 on 17820 (gh) The Royal Canadian Air Force is now on Sats at 1630-1700 via NS on 9625 11720: an amat said Dr Bundolo's Pandemonium Medicine Show is on Tues at 0104...but I'm not sure this is on SW... try the CBC MW outlets on 740, 940, etc., and at later hours further west on 990 540 1010 (gh)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC As of 25/10 Radio Clarin has an international service in English Mon-Fri at 2330-2355. A clearly understood, professional but casual announcer is a highlight of the broadcast, along with excellent program material and music, including the native merengues. Reports are encouraged. I'm impressed with this. I could name a few stations who've been broadcasting in English for a number of years that can't even come close to R. Clarin. It's the best thing to come along in a long time. (Robert Butterfield, MA) "This is Santo Domingo" is very tourist oriented. On 10/30 the announcer was giving hotel room rates, and it was heard on a Saturday too (Mark Bixby, CA) R. Clarin is now providing the Dominican government all those propaganda and PR services provided in the past by R. Caribe and Radio-TV Dominicana (SWNS) Host is Rudy Espinal, who also greets listeners in Dutch (gh) 11700/4850

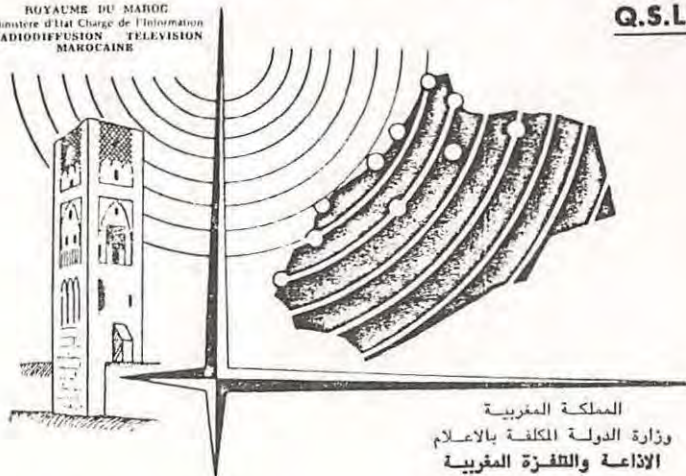

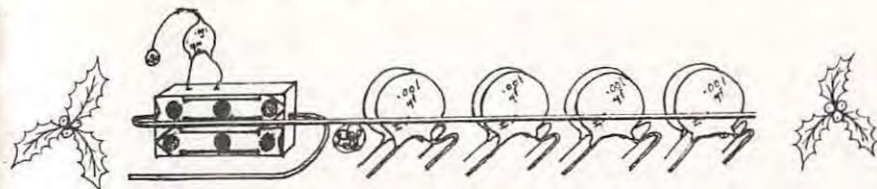

One other thing: Please try to remember to put names on every item, and please write legibly, especially new reporters. I am pleased to see so many new reporters to LR, but I wouldn't want to lose you just because I couldn't read the name on an item or envelope, right?

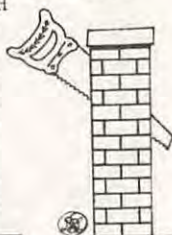
