Unity and Friendship

Reputedly, one never forgets his or her first receiver, especially if it was self-made. Whether this is due to simple human pride in achievement or to the desire to avoid the troublesome experience in the future is debateable. Yet the memory remains. . . .

Shortly after getting my own receiver going and getting a few stations, a new certificate went up on the adjacent wall. It said I was a member of the North American Short Wave Association, and that membership required only one thing, a curious thing it seemed to be at the time - - to uphold "the motto of Unity and Friendship in all ways possible."

"Now what could that mean?" I thought.

And frequently thereafter, while waiting for the VOA to back off a bit from a potential new catch or while pretending to decipher some fast-talking Latin American disc jockey, I've looked up at that certificate and thought again, "Now what in the world can they mean by that? Was it put there to really mean something, or was it just something to fill the space?"

Although my limited patience, and even more limited Spanish, haven't brought me too many more "stations verified", I've finally decided that the motto really does mean something. Something very important, too.

Unity. With who? First, with the other shortwave listeners of the world, and particularly those of North America. While the American, and to a lesser extent, Canadian governments rate international shortwave broadcasting as crucial parts of their foreign policies, they act as if shortwave listeners virtually did not exist within their borders. In fact, the 'benign neglect' shown to SWL's by the promoters of the electronic entertainment industry tempts one to think that somebody, somewhere believes we shouldn't listen to shortwave at all. It is sad, but true, that many North American youths grow up totally unaware that such a medium for international communication exists. So we band together to protect ourselves and our hobby. . . .

Unity with anyone else? Yes, surely. The international shortwave bands may be a haven for pompous dictators, a battlefield for religion and ideology, and a forum for the often-chauvinist (and even-more-often gaudy) display of whatever is preceived to be "national culture". But the truth remains that something really significant takes place amidst all the verbiage. There is a message in the medium: The international airwaves are a place where the peoples of the world meet to share, to exchange ideas, information, and, occasionally, even beauty. Hopefully, the fusion that results can bring to all human cultures the achievements the individual ones have made on their own.

There is the danger that the small cultures might be diluted into the big, but, despite superpower transmitters linked in vast networks, I think the chance is small. The important ideas are 'big' in their own right, no matter what their source. Their power, once given access to the international forum, can not be measured in such tiny units as kilowatts.

If nothing else, we are left with the conclusion that the solidarity of all humans transcends geographic, political, and economic distance, that mutual exchange is beneficial in spite of these barriers. This is probably the central theme underlying the "Unity" that NASWA tries to uphold.

And "Friendship"? Shall we forget about her?

No, it's impossible to do that. First, I think that for most of us the feeling and practice of friendship flows naturally from the recognition of our unity with other SWL's and with the peoples of the world. The spontaneous good-will that appears when those who

have 'met' by shortwave actually meet face-to-face testifies to this.

In this spirit, NASWA members take on the duties of international friendship.

Their evaluations of the broadcasts they hear are done in a fashion of open-minded curiosity and tolerance for cultural and technological differences. They reject what is alien to basic principles, but try to understand what it is that might cause another to think so differently. They search for what is common and valuable, and enjoy the beautiful or humorous when it is found. They recognize the motivations of the usual agencies sponsoring international broadcasts, yet try to retain an objectivity about what they hear. This last admonition is particularly hard to follow, for if we were goldfish with the gift of human intelligence we would no doubt believe the rest of the world was in a bowl and we were on the outside peering in!

In correspondence, there is an obligation to be amiable and, especially, courteous. We, users of the rude English language, must be particularly careful here. In many other languages, the routine use of what seems to us to be positively florid politeness can make a North American business letter read like a page-long insult. The addition of "Gimme a QSL" at the end only aggravates a bad situation. I think the insertion of an IRC or useable postage in each letter to which a reply is expected is mandatory, to the extent that it can be afforded. It is not just a bribe. It says something: "I know international broadcasting is expensive. Here's something I can do for you to help support something I believe in."

Finally, "Friendship" is what makes shortwave-listening a two-way experience. The communication is not restricted to what moves from transmitter to receiver. There is an effort to share ideas and cultures. Post cards, greeting cards, photos, telling a little about oneself, commenting on the programming-- all these are part of the process. What is said or shown may be ignored entirely, but when it is not, radio is being used to its full capability. Here, also, lies the greatest pleasures of the hobby.

Unity and Friendship. Cynics might regard this phrase as a cliché without real meaning. I'll take it as just about the best motto a shortwave club could come up with.

DXING - AUSTRALIAN STYLE

Here in Australia, the objectives, aims, philosophies, and operating techniques of down-under DXers are in many respects significantly different from the way in which the DX hobby is approached in other parts of the world. The origins of the Australian way of "DX life"

are obscure, as also are the reasons for the somewhat radical approach to the hobby pursued by Australian DXers, and I thought that DXing enthusiasts outside of Australia, and in particular the large DX grouping in the U.S.A. would like to share with me my observations on this subject.

Organized DXing here in Australia originated back in 1933 with the establishment of the "Australian DX Radio Club" (not to be confused with the present-day "Australian Radio DX Club," note the word order). This early club had its headquarters here in Melbourne, and was run under partial sponsorship of the weekly newspaper "The Listener-In", a publication listing radio programs for local Victorian transmitters. Membership notes and station loggings appeared in the "Listener-In", as well as in the Club's own monthly newsletter. At its peak, membership of this early club was in the thousands, due, mainly to the minimal membership fee required - similar to the membership requirements currently existing for such organizations as the BBC World Radio Club and Radio Australia's Listeners' Club. Members wishing to receive the monthly club newsletter paid an additional fee.

During the second World War, DXing involvement suffered a drastic curtailment, and for a variety of reasons, the early club ceased operations in the late 1940's. It was not until early 1965 that the present-day ARDXC was established, with headquarters in Sydney, NSW, and transferred to Melbourne in January 1967, where it has remained.

Some NASWA members will be aware of the extensive research I had carried out some years ago in tracing the origins and development of DXing in Australia, and which was combined into a publication which I entitled "The History of DXing in Australia". Unfortunately, that publication is now out of print.

Thus, it is seen that there was a period of some 20 years during which no national DXing organization existed within Australia. It was in this period, I would suggest, that the present day approach to DXing, as distinct from shortwave listening, was born in countries outside of Australia, generating a solid foundation for the many advances in hobby techniques which have emerged over the last decade. Here in Australia, isolated

geographically (and also ionosphericly!) from the rest of the world, DXing has evolved in a somewhat different fashion, which the reasons I am about to offer will perhaps provide some sort of general clarification.

Equipment. Until the early 1960's, DXing equipment of a commercial nature was virtually unavailable, unless the user wished to import gear from overseas, with the consequent heavy customs and importing charges. The 50's were the years of the "roll-your-own", and unless the budding DXer possessed some form of technical know-how, he was limited to war-surplus equipment, which at the time was relatively expensive. No national DXing club existed for advice, assistance, or general information, which compounded the problem.

Various designs for communications receivers appeared in national electronic magazines, but which all required a fair degree of technical skill and expertise to secure adequate operation and reliability. This factor, alone, that of unavailability of commercial receivers, contributed significantly to the general regression in DXing participation, and many would-be DXing enthusiasts turned, instead, to amateur radio, which was flourishing in the decade following the end of WW II. My own interest dates back to the mid 50's as a school boy, and I can recall the frustration and difficulty in attempting to obtain some sort of decent receiver for general shortwave reception. The inability to acquire reasonable gear, combined with the lack of a local DXing organization, contributed finally to a non-interest on my part, which was to remain so until a decade later.

During the mid 1960's, the first of the general purpose communications receivers appeared on the commercial market in Australia. This was the Lafayette HE-30, a rather conventional single conversion machine, covering from 530 kHz to 25 MHz, with separate handsread dial. The price of this was well within reach of the general listener at the time, as well as for the enthusiastic youngster who was able to borrow, beg, or save the necessary funds! At about that time, a flood of war surplus receivers hit the Australian market, including such equipment as the Murphy B40, the Marconi CR100 (my present main receiver), AR8B's, and others that I have since forgotten. The Trio organization also ventured into the Australian scene, with its "9R59" series, following the success of the Lafayette receivers which had expanded to include the HA-230, and various others covering VHF and long-wave. Around this time, also, Eddystone released its portable EC10 receiver locally, and the first of the multi-band Japanese portables were infiltrating the commercial market at competitive prices.

Simultaneously with this upsurge of availability of equipment within reach of the average hobbyist, the present-day Australian Radio DX Club was brought into being, and with it, a whole new chapter in DXing within this country. Clearly, precedents were not available, the club administrators of those times (and I was one of them) were required to adopt what they believed to be a workable and realistic overall policy of organized DX hobby participation. We had to establish the ground rules and virtually start up afresh many years after our colleagues overseas.

Isolation. Unlike North America, and to a lesser extent Europe, Australia is isolated geographically and propagationally from the rest of the world. During our summer months, and particularly in periods of low sunspot activity, and especially in winter too, direct reception from Europe between 0500 and 1300 GMT is most unreliable - corresponding to our local time of 4 PM to midnight, when maximum audiences would be expected to be available. The Tropical Bands don't 'open' until well into the night for Asian signals and have disappeared by around our local dawn. There is virtually no Latin American or African reception on the 60 and 90 metre bands for six months of the year, and reception during our local summer daytime hours is generally confined to the few stations in the Pacific and Asian areas that may be audible on their higher frequencies.

Thus, those facets of DX interest which are critical for maintenance of long-term and serious approach to the hobby are unavailable for a large part of the year. Serious DXing between September and March is virtually a weekend affair, with midnight efforts, unless one is unemployed or retired. Obviously, not all of us fit into either of those categories!

Of course, throughout the summer, there are the special "unusual openings" which occur from time to time for Latin America and Africa on the Tropical Bands, where conditions will unexpectedly revert to what is regarded as normal for the winter months. However, these are the exceptions rather than the rule, and are usually only observed by the serious DXer, or listeners who have sophisticated equipment and adequate antenna systems.

During our winter, from April through August, reception on the higher frequencies in our evening hours is almost non-existent. Propagation from Europe is almost impossible, especially in low sunspot years, but daytime reception is at its best. It is in the winter months that we are entertained by the Latin American and African stations in the

afternoon/evening, and morning periods respectively, on the Tropical Bands, and in low sunspot years, the long-path Africans (in our afternoons) and long-path Latins (in our mornings) pop up from time to time.

Naturally, Asian DXing is one facet of the hobby which is of importance to the Australian enthusiast. There is obvious recognition for the work carried out in unravelling the Indonesian broadcast scene over the past few years by Australian DXers, and also of the research currently being conducted into the summer "Asian mode" propagation pattern, the latter represented by dramatic and unpredictable reception on 6, 7, and 9 MHz from Asian transmitters in the midday time period in the Australian summer.

The term "DX-pedition", too, has come to be associated with the various trips to outlying areas for DXers who are normally bound to city and/or urban areas. Weekend excursions of this nature have multiplied in recent years, using facilities during the winter months such as on-site caravans, holiday apartments (known as "flats" to us), and even under tents. During 1976, particularly, some very worthwhile loggings were made "on location" at country areas, away from the RF pollution experienced at home.

Power line noise levels have increased tremendously over the past two or three years; this, combined with general RF pollution in urban areas has thwarted many endeavours of enthusiastic beginners to become involved with the "big-time" DX, further contributing to Tropical Bands DXing as a specialized component of the hobby. The DX-pedition had traditionally been associated only with medium-wave DXing pursuits, but noise levels in recent times have become so acute, as has general RF pollution, that these excursions have now become SW hunting grounds instead.

Hobby Involvement. From what I have discussed, it should by now be clear that there are severe limitations to the extent to which Tropical Bands DXing can be pursued by the Australian DXer. If we assume that this form of DXing represents the ideal in terms of development of individual skill, and in generating maximum personal satisfaction, then the constraints of isolation, distance, high summer noise levels, and propagation irregularities are critical. It is these limitations that have shaped the way of life for the Australian DXer into what it is, and which have contributed to perhaps the main difference to his DXing colleague overseas - that of the QSL. It is in the area of QSL collection that we see, possibly, the largest variation in hobby objectives, and which is not, perhaps, understood by DXing enthusiasts outside of Australia.

Recognition of hobby accomplishment within ARDXC is based essentially on the acquisition of verifications. There is no objective of the collection of stations or countries heard as is practiced by North American DXers. QSL acquisition is related to the systematic verification of broadcasting stations on as many distinct frequencies as possible. The term "station" is regarded somewhat differently to that in use in North America and in Scandinavia. Under current ARDXC rules, a "station" is a particular organization that possesses facilities to issue QSLs on its own initiative, even though a variety of transmitting sites may be employed. Thus we have such stations as AFPTS-Dixon, UN-Dixon, VoA-Dixon; Adventist World Radio-Sines, DW-Sines, RCI-Sines, IBRA-Sines, Vox Fidei-Sines, etc.

From this, one should not assume that Australian DXers are merely dashing ahead on the SW bandwagon in a mad race for thousands of QSLs; the reporting standards and guidelines maintained, at least for ARDXC members, are regarded as the highest possible, as the summary of reports received in response for the 30th Anniversary QSL card for DXers Calling in July 1976 revealed. Unfortunately, elsewhere in the Asian area, the quest for QSLs has become something of a farce, with what appears to be little or no consideration for the implied ethics of DX reporting, or what the real purpose of the QSL and its accompanying report is. Thankfully, the efforts of Australian DXers are not categorized in the same way as some of the reports originating in Japan, and I would hope that some form of proper guidance and responsible leadership will emerge in that country, before the QSL, as such, disappears. The 30th Anniversary QSL summary showed that NASWA members who submitted reports for this special QSL were much more aware of the requirements for a good report than those North American DXers who were not NASWA members.

The Australian approach to QSLs and station counting provides for the maximization of DXing targets; membership achievement is recorded in the "Ladders", based on the number of countries verified, the number of stations confirmed, and the total number of QSLs received. Specific and necessary guidelines have been established for these various categories, permitting a high standard of individual reporting and hobby involvement. Emphasis is also placed on the discovery of new operating frequencies for all broadcasters, local and international alike. In other words, the emphasis is placed more on international broadcasting than on the Tropical Bands, which may be regarded as a logical outcome of the geographical and propagational aspects of Australia's location.

All of this of course has been developed over many years of Club operations. Australia as a whole is unable to support a number of "general" DX clubs, and it would be tragic if

such a move was contemplated by any breakaway group. Localized, specialized SWL/DX groups have, in fact, appeared, producing newsletter type publications on an irregular basis, with membership of a restricted nature, perhaps being able to serve the components of the DXing/SWLing population which a general club such as ARDXC cannot.

Another major point of difference between DXing in Australia and overseas is that of the multi-club get-together. The concept of "area DXers meetings" in Australia is unknown; obviously, the existence of only one national group has contributed to this, and in its place we have meetings of "branches" of the national club. Such meetings are organized on much the same lines as the "area meetings" in Europe and North America. In Australia, branches exist in most state capital cities where membership is highest.

Turnover within ARDXC, as in any non-profit hobby group, is a continuing concern. The numbers of serious, active DXers in the Club is small, and appears even smaller when compared with the relatively large numbers of members registered in the major North American and European clubs. Population density is of importance here, and over the entire span of ARDXC's existence, membership has never exceeded 200 persons. It is currently at that level. In the same period, though, some 700 people had joined, which represents a high level of withdrawal. With such a rate of turnover, continuity of hobby involvement is difficult and the drop-out problem is particularly acute.

Publicity. We are obviously fortunate of having closeby the facilities of Radio Australia. "DXers Calling" is produced by ARDXC each week (with four different editors- Robert Chester (Adelaide), and Robert Hanner, Peter Bunn, and myself, here in Melbourne.) In addition, a regular session known as "World at your fingertips" is presented by Robert Chester over a Victorian country mediumwave station on Sunday nights. For some months, a column "Shortwave News" is conducted by myself in a leading Melbourne daily newspaper and covers a variety of DXing and SWLing topics. There is no equivalent to the large national electronic magazines in which club notes and news of membership loggings are featured, such as are known in the USA and Europe. One such column does exist, in a national electronics magazine, but it is edited from outside of Australia, and information contained in it is necessarily outdated and of little value to the Australian listener.

Summary. As ages go, ARDXC is still an infant! However, it is hoped the points covered in this discussion will clarify some of the problems faced by the administrators of the national DX group in this country - problems attributable to our geographic and propagational isolation, and to the historical absence of any form of organized DXing organization for two decades. Australian DXers are just as keen and enthusiastic as their colleagues overseas, but our approach to the hobby has been adapted to the rather unique listening conditions existing in this part of the world, an approach which we hope will be understood and accepted by those who are perhaps more favorably situated for serious DXing in other countries. We're all part of the DXing team - it is only our style that may appear radical.

Beginners Patch

Most shortwave stations around the world are owned by governments. There are some however that are private. Most of these private stations, as most of you in NASWA already know, are religious stations. Here is a list of some stations easily heard in North America

Trans World Radio has many sites all over the world. The one which is easiest to hear in the USA is the Bonaire site off the coast of South America. It broadcasts at 1105-1225 on 11815 and 1230-1400 on 15255. It is on the air in the evening at 0030-0130 on 11925 kHz. This last time is not for NA but is easily heard here.

4VEH is a missionary station in Haiti. 1100-1400 the station is on 9770 and 11835. From 1930-2000 the station is on 11835.

HGJE is one of the biggies. It broadcasts from Quito, Ecuador from 1215 to 1615 on 11745 and 15115, also 0040-0645 on 11915, 9560, and 6095. This station is on the air to North America longer than it is off the air.

IBA, the Israel Broadcasting Authority is not a religious station, but it does have some religious programs. It can be heard 2230-2300 on 5900, 7415, 9435, and 9815. On Fridays there is a Sabbath eve program.

IBRA Radio broadcasts from Malta on 6080 from 2100-211. The transmitter is privately owned in Malta. IBRA Radio's access is in Sweden.

EPLF in Ethiopia is easily heard in French from 1915-2000 on 15365. It IDs in English. It is scheduled to broadcast in English at 1945 until 2030 on 11830. It might also be on 11910 or 15300.

Adventist World Radio broadcasts from 2100 on 9670. The transmitter is in Sines, Portugal.

ELWA in Liberia broadcasts in English and some vernaculars from 1945-2050. The frequency is 11945.

Recording DX

FILING AND RECORD KEEPING TECHNIQUES

by Sam Barto, Watertown, CT

In my many years of DXing I have used several filing systems. None of them seemed to fit the bill; however, in the early sixties I stumbled on the following method. I have been using this system ever since. With over 40,000 cards in my files, I can locate my complete logging information on any particular station ever logged within a few seconds. Check out the following, it really works!

The above is a standard five by eight inch index card with ruled lines.

TOP LINE: The station's call letters and slogan are on this line in the exact location as shown above. The two check marks to the far right signify that this particular station has been verified twice. In flipping through your cards, the checks are an easy reference guide as to whether or not you have QSLed the station.

SECOND LINE: Leave this line blank. On this line or on any other blank line to follow, you may want to add any other station data which you deem important.

THIRD LINE: The station's location, and, if necessary, the exact transmitter site or grid coordinates is on the left hand side. To the right of the location is the frequency on which the station was heard. The check mark in front of the station's location simply means that a reception report has been sent to the station. The exact date of the report is listed below in the programming information section.

FOURTH LINE: Leave this line blank.

FIFTH LINE: In the center of this line you may list the receiver that you used to hear the station. In my case it was a Hammarlund Super Pro model BC-794. This line acts as a ballance as far as appearance is concerned for the top six lines.

SIXTH LINE: Here we have the date of reception and the time of reception. You may wish to use GMT; however, I have found it simpler to use local time from wherever the station was logged from. You can do all of the conversions when reporting to the station or to your favorite club (we all know what that is).

SEVENTH LINE: Leave this line blank. This line acts as a separator between the station data which appears in the top six lines and the programming information which appears below.

EIGHTS LINE: On this line we start listing the programming material which was heard. Make your own system of abbreviations. The line reads from left to right: Spanish identification by a man at 0014 and at 0017. Spanish talks by a man from 0013-0014 and again at 0017. Interference was from WWV.

NINTH LINE: This line translates: Vocal music was sung by a woman along with instrumental backgrounds and was heard from 0014-0017 and from 0020-0024, and again from 0024 to 0028. A vocal selection was sung by a man from 0017 to 0020.

TENTH LINE: This line says: Latin American instrumental music was played from 0010 to 0013. The SINPO reading can be on this line.

ELEVENTH LINE: You may use this line for any purpose which you want. I decided to include the following: 1) The location of reception. One does not always receive stations from his home QTH. 2) Power of the transmitting station. 3) Date of follow-up report. 4) Date of verification.

TWELFTH LINE: Leave this line blank. It is used as a separator between receptions of the same station.

THIRTEENTH LINE: Date of the second reception is here with a check mark signifying that a report was sent to the station. From this line on to line 16 is the same type of station data as expressed in lines 8 through 11.

You do not need to follow the exact line pattern as I have done; however, I do recommend that the setup for the lines 1 through and including 7 be followed. This will keep a uniformity among your card file. Starting on line 8 you may use as many lines as you wish for recording your station information. If it takes the entire card, you can start another card or use the back of the first one.

In the case of receiving one station on many frequencies, such as Radio Moscow, I would suggest using the following: Make out your card exactly as the sample 'Andina' card. If you heard Radio Moscow on 9500, 9530, and on 12050, make out a card for one of these frequencies - let's say 9500. List all of your station information on this 9500 card. Insert the symbol 'D' on this card somewhere near the end of the station information section. This symbol stands for DUAL. In other works it would appear as such: D-9530, 12050. Make separate cards out for 9530 and for 12050 with all of the pertinent information contained in lines 1 through 6. On line 8 you would simply list the signal report and D-9500. This will refer you back to the master card of 9500 for all station information. It does save quite a bit of writing. The only difference on these three cards in lines 1 through 6 may be the transmitter location.

Filing Systems

There are several advantages available to the DXer if you use an index card filing system. You may index your stations by call letters, station slogan, frequency, continent, country or by any combination of the above. I prefer to index them by continent and then, in that continent, by ascending order of frequency. For example, if some night you are listening to the 90 metre band Africans, all you need to do is to pull out your first few cards from the Africa section to quickly review what you have logged, verified, or what should be coming in at your particular listening area. By pulling cards in this manner, one can get a very good idea of what might be heard at different times of the year. This can be especially helpful when you are chasing those elusive Papua and Indonesian station. I have over 40,000 cards in my files from all bands and modes. Believe me, it is much easier to locate a station using a card filing system. There is no need to flip through dozens if not hundreds of log books to find a particular logging which may have occurred years ago. By using the card system all of your data is on one card which usually can be located in just a few seconds. The basic problem is that most DXers just don't want to take the time needed to set one up. Remember, by sticking to the format in lines one through six, an index filing system can offer the DXer a tremendous variety in the way they can be arranged. You can always change the way in which you file the cards without changing any writing on the cards. Be sure to choose the method which suits you the best.

Individual Station File

About now you are probably asking yourself about your individual country and station heard and verified totals. This problem can be solved very simply. I would suggest using a standard 3 by 5 inch index file card. Refer to the sample Radio Andina card below. All that you need on this card is the call letters, station slogan, transmitter site, and frequency. You may wish to include other data for your system. Index these the same way that you index the larger cards. I prefer to index them by call letters under each continent. If

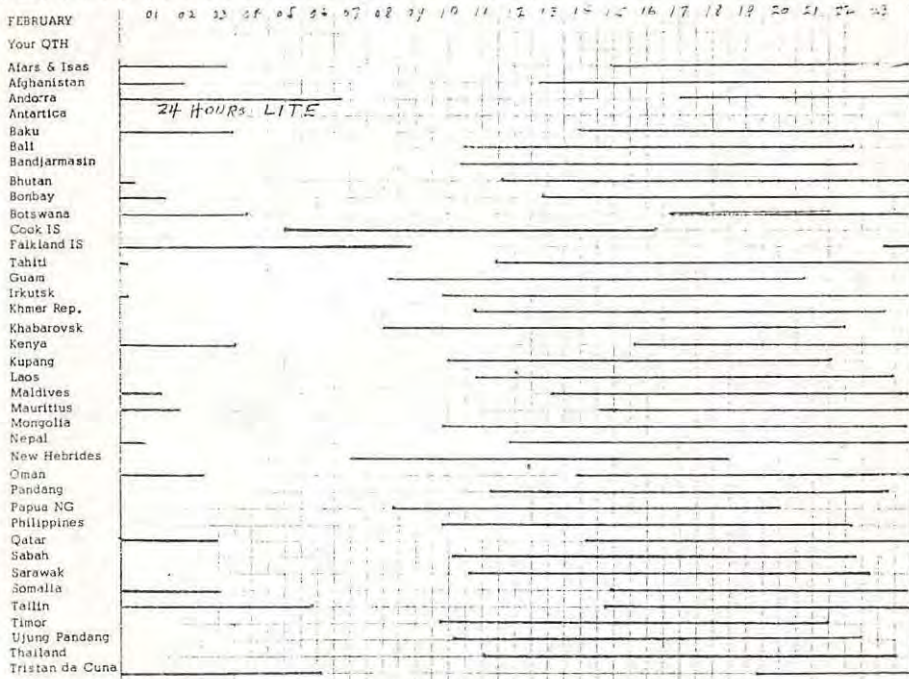

no call letters exist then place the cards in your file by station slogan. Only one card is needed per station. Be sure to place the check mark in the upper right hand corner once the station has been verified. Place a blank card in directly in back of the continent heading card. On this card list your totals for that continent, such as C/H, C/V, S/H, and S/V. Each time you log or verify a new station or country change your totals. The sub-totals can be added very quickly to obtain the correct results.

I hope that I may have helped a few of our members in setting up a working logging system. I would appreciate it very much if you would send along your comments.



Mailbag

John D. Tuchscherer, Neenah, WI, sends in the above chart. The numbers at the top are time in GMT. The black lines are the night time hours at various exotic DX transmitter sites. You draw in your nighttime hours on the top line. Overlap between your nighttime and nighttime at the transmitter location indicates a darkness path and possible reception.

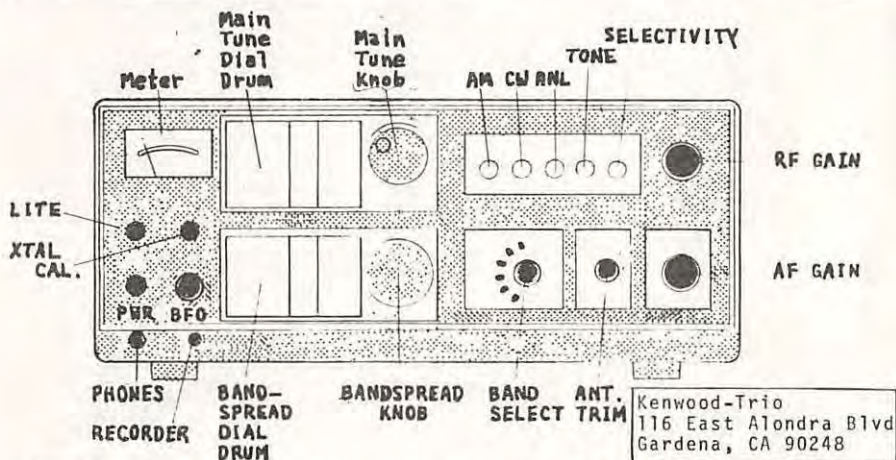


NASWA PREVIEWS THE R-300 BY KENWOOD

by Edward C. SHAW

By preview, we mean to say that we have not actually seen the R-300, but we have on hand the technician's repair manual, and have compared it with Kenwood's earlier QR-666 receiver and the latter's manual and schematic. It is essentially the same receiver with some few refinements, namely:

1. Addition of a crystal calibrator.
2. Option of either ham or SWBC bandspread drums.
3. AGC amplifier improved with a better semiconductor.
4. Mechanical filters: a) after 1st IF; b) between 2nd & 3rd IFs.
5. Dual-conversion above 18 MHz (Conversion osc. freq is ≈ 3580 KHz)
6. Beefier AF gain by adding one more stage.



One can see by the illustration above that there are enough controls for adequate DXing functions, including the ever-useful antenna trim. Frequency readings easily within 2-3 KHz, sometimes 1 KHz at low freq.

YOU TOO CAN EARN AN AWARD (for \$1.38)

Yes, you can get a NASWA award for that price, and a little cosmic help. And, believe it or not, it can be the 50 kW QRP certificate. Sound incredible? It shouldn't, as it is possible to do with a little diligent DXing, a working knowledge of English, and a little cooperation from the ionosphere. Here's how.

There are six "radio continents", North America, South America, Europe, Africa, Asia, and Oceania. All but South America can be verified for a 13¢ stamp on your report. Let's start with North America.

Almost anywhere in North America you can hear one of those domestic, low powered Canadian SWBC stations. The most widely heard is CFRX, Toronto, on 6070 kHz, in the 49 metre band. Local twilight is the best time to hear this one, and a QSL will arrive in about three weeks. The station uses 1 kW of power, send your report to 2 St. Clair Ave. W., Toronto, Ontario.

The 75 metre band presents us with our next two continents, Europe and Africa. The Voice of America operates an 8 kW transmitter in each of these continents, and both can be heard in North America. The main problem in logging these two is the interference (QRM) from ham operators, whose chatter will dominate the band most of the time. However, if you try 3980 kHz between 0300 and 0600 GMT, you might hear the "Breakfast Show" to Europe, and on 3990 kHz, "African Safari" may be audible after 0500. Send reports to the VoA, Washington, D. C. 20547.

Asia is a toughie! Your best bet for 13¢ is the AFRTS station in Japan, also on the 75 metre band. 3910 kHz may be heard in the early morning in North America, with 10 kW power. Tie-off to this one is US pop music and English announcements. A correct report will be verified in about three weeks. Send it to Far East Network, Headquarters FEN, APO San Francisco, 96267.

Oceania is E-Z. WWVH can be heard under WWV many times on 5, 10, and 15 MHz. Time is announced by a woman at :45 of the minute, with IDs at minute 29 and 59. Reports to box 417, Kekaha, Kauai, Hawaii 96752.

That is all you can get for 13¢ stamps, but South America is not that hard to QSL. For an international air mail stamp and one IRC you can get a verie from a variety of South American stations. A good bet is GBS, Action Radio, on 3290 kHz, in the early morning or in the evening. Not an easy catch, but worth the chase. Reports to Guyana Broadcasting Service, 68 Hadfield Rd., Georgetown, Guyana.

There you are, six stations with a total power of 47 kW. Good luck.

And when you get your veries, send a list of these to the NASWA Awards Chairman, along with 50¢, and you've got your award. Now wasn't that easy.

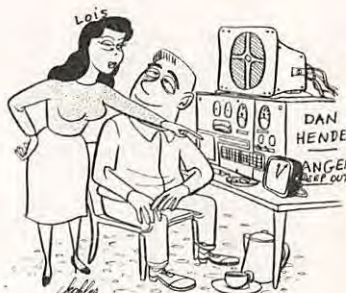

(As suggested by Bob Hill, who claims to represent an untold silent constituency, and would call it "The Wacky World of gh" we have attempted to cull out non-schedule info from the previous two sections. Is this further fractionalization of LN worth it? --gh)

ALGERIA Very strong but very distorted signal, frequency-modulating around 17540 noted 17/1 1430-1500 with English lesson. No telling where this Algerian was supposed to be (gh)

CANADA BBC on 6175 didn't come on at 2300 28/12(?); rather, RCI IS, announcing tech. diff. and Muzak--by Canadian artists, I assume. Was // 9510 and all the other RCI channels, and the problem lasted at least two hours (Kim Andrew Elliott, MN) Lost Montreal-Sack. link (gh)

COLOMBIA La Voz de la Víctor, Bogotá, hrd at 1010 with ID, then off abruptly. Used to be on SW, but hrd on 3880, 4 x 970 (Jerry Berg, MA, NU 1/1) Close to Cabo Verde-3883; nice! (gh)

COOK ISLANDS RCI hrd nightly, 75% of time without any audio. 12/21 as early as 0342! By 0350 sure of French, nearly gone at 0425, Togo OC 0500 wipes them out; 0725 relaying RNZ-11780, till Brazil *0800. Maybe French was Tahiti relay? Program night to night varies. Relays RNZ guess 75% and RA 25% but still suspect other programming. Looks as if 0400-0430 best for ENAm, maybe a bit later in WNAm; consistently between 5044.9 and 5045.0 (Jim Young, CA, via TDXN)

ECUADOR HCJB had as few as 2 xmitters on the air, neither full power, in early January because of trouble with the hydroelectric plant, which had to be dismantled and reassembled (DX Party Line 15/1)

EGYPT On 16/12, Dr. Jamal al-'Utayfi, the Minister of Info and Culture, inaugurated two 250 kW SW xmitters, built at a cost of 600 Egyptian kilopounds, at Abis in al-Buhayrah govern-orate. GERMANY WEST/PORTUGAL/SPAIN D76 sked shows R. Liberty via Lampertheim, Playa de Pals, Biblis and Holzkirchen. RFE via Biblis and Holzkirchen and Glória=Lisbon. Some fqs used from a variety of sites, e.g. R. Liberty on 7220: Lamp. 00-06, Bib. 08-15; Holz. 15-17, Playa 17-24 (Bob Padula, Victoria) So RL using RFE German sites now but RFE not using RL's (gh)

HUNGARY 4748 heard at 2140 7/11, 4 x 1187! (Carol Feil, Denmark, DSWCI) GERMANY more below!

INTERNATIONAL VACUUM Beeps and occasional swift clicks found on approx. 20015 during lucky first try 17/1 1625-1628 fade. Matches' sound of Chicom satellite recently played on BBC World Radio Club. Its 'sked' depends on orbital factors, could be hrd anytime (gh)

IRAN Per xmsn data from the NIRT, Kalamabad seems to be the only site for SW xmsns, begun in 1970, altho MW sites have been greatly expanded (DSWCI Dec via Heckenlively, SD)

MONACO A stn on 15576-15578 from 1200 to 1400, French, Arabic and I think, some Yiddish. Figured IBA HS, but not // any other Israelis; mod. poor, xmt drifts, pgming irregular; no ID for Israel in over 2 hours, the Damascus frequently mentioned. Interesting! (Mike Willis Victoria) As you can see by the heading (actually, FRANCE), I ID this as the PTP feeder of R. Monte Carlo to its Cyprus relay, recently discovered by Magne. I caught its other freq, 17555 17/1 1420 with pop mx and amnts in French and Arabic, on RCSSB (gh)

PARAGUAY This year's April-joke was R. Ipan on 4045. Wonder who puts out such rumors.... (Tor-Henrik Ekblom, DSWCI 1/77)

USA WYFR has a double spur on 5815 and 6325 0400-0500*, 170 kHz from 6155 and 5985, which are also 170 kHz apart. Since I get this on both the SP-600 and XCR-30, I surmise the problem is theirs and not mine (Tom Overcamp, SC, 14/1) Causing harmonic happiness is KBIO on 4080, 3 x 1360, where KGB covers; 25/12 2319 Xmas mx, 0000 ID (Mark Bixby, CA) Mark, I'm wary of the other 'local' harmonics you hear, which due to strong signal levels on the fundamental, may arise in the receiver rather than the transmitter (gh)

VATICAN The Jesuit-run station here will be beaming daily Chinese-language broadcasts to Asia starting this month. Increased Chinese programming is part of an overall step-up in transmissions to Communist countries in Asia (Catholic Universe Bulletin 7/1 via D. Filka)

VENEZUELA Radiovisión is a new network on the move, with powerful MW stns, but may also be heard mentioned on SW, so don't think it's a new local stn ID (J. Berglund, Arctic RC, via DSWCI 12/76) One superpower is to be RV Marabina on 1420 with 100 kW, but probably just 5 kW now (more from above) Well, what a coincidence they harmonize on 2840 recently! (gh)

VIETNAM Hanoi paper "Nhan Dan" reported 15/11 that the Central Transmitting Station had recently installed nine large transmitters and set up three south-facing antennas, increasing its capacity by 45%. Also, the old VOA xmttr at Hue (on 760 kHz -gh) has been rechristened Radio Hue, according to a Hanoi English cast 6/12 (BBCMS 16/12)

DOGHOUSE Greece insists on 9530, under Spain; 15345 u/VOA-Phil for 0900-0950 Sp. to Aust; & at 2100-2250 on 6140, u/ABC-Perth! R. Australia on Port Moresby's 9520, 2100-2400 (Padula)

FUTURE PLANS

AUSTRALIA New HF installations are proposed for the ABC to improve NT services. One xmtr is to be at the MW "8DR" site in Darwin, to serve the northern part of the Territory; the other is to be near Adelaide, SA, to cover the southern part of the NT. Original plans to operate from the R. Australia site on Cox Peninsula were varied due to the effects of Cyclone Tracy (ABCB 75/76 report, ADXN) (Cf Jan LN-6) RA reported 1/12 that Foreign Minister Peacock had given assurances that RA would retain its independence. He said the government did not believe RA should come under the control of his department and any recommendations that it should be closed down would be ignored. (BBC MS 9/12) ABCB = Australian Broadcasting Control Board.

BRAZIL R. Ataláia has been authorized to set up a tropical band station in Obidos, PA (BBC MS 6/12) See WRTVH or FBIS for key to Brazilian state abbrs (gh) R. Cultural Calari has been authorized to set up a tropical band stn in Pôrto Velho, Rondônia (BBCMS 22/11) Continuing the list in Jan LN-6 of projected stations, copy hampered by RHC QRM to RAE: 3245 MT, 1 kW; 3255 GO, 3285 PA, 3295 SP 1; 3345 ?; 3385 BA; 3396 Goiânia GO 5 kW; 4835 MT 5; 4915? CE 1; 4935 MA; 4935 Manaus AM 5; 4965 or 4975 MG 5 + one other (Sérgio Dória Partamian, RAEDX 1/1)

CAMEROON R. Garoua will raise power from 30 to 100 kW in 3/77; and the station will be operating out of a new facility (Jim Achanyi-Foutem, regional correspondent of R. Yaoundé, in Garoua, via Neil Schulman, NY, 23/12)

FRANCE The Director of France-Inter wrote me that they are studying the question of making programs intended specially for SWLs, but he does not mention when this will be in operation (André Pineault, PQ)

HONG KONG (Cf Dec LN-8) There are no plans for re-commencing SW xmsns. RHK used to have a 2 kW xmtr at Hunghom, Kowloon, to broadcast to fishermen, but the need for it was removed by more modern equipment. It is not simply a case of plugging in the old SW xmtr; it no longer exists. In fact, the old site at Hunghom has become a subway terminal.

MONGOLIA (Cf Dec LN-1, lines 29-30) Here is exactly what Mr Tuvdennyam of RUB wrote to me some time ago: "We have no English transmission to Australia at this time but we do hope to have it in the future." (Mike Willis, Victoria)

NETHERLANDS RN is planning a new xmtr park at the cost of 50 megaguilders, pending approval by The Hague in 2-3 weeks. At the same time, the Minister of Culture has decided to cut RN's budget by 5 megaguilders per year. Tho his decision is to be protested, if it goes through, cutbacks in programming are expected and plans to increase languages used will be shelved. The xmtr park expenses are considered an investment, while day-to-day operating expenses are not (RN's 'Report on the Arts', 3/1 via John Wegener, IL)

PHILIPPINES R. Veritas will add another 300 kW xmtr on SW this year (Kirche & Rundfunk SCDX)

RWANDA AWR is considering tests via DW-Kigali in early 1977. Programs would be prepared by both AWR-Europe and AWR-Asia (Adrian Peterson, AWR-Asia, Poona, India, ADXN 12/76)

SOUTH AFRICA Besides R. RSA's new 500 kW xmtrs, expected on in Jan, additional 100 kW HF xmtrs are being prepared to extend the present MW-only youth orientated "Radio Five" to SW (R. RSA Monitoring Panel via Padula, ADXN) Tests expected around Mar/Apr 77 in 90/60/49/41m (Gerry Wood, R. RSA DX Editor, via John Jeffrey, ADXN 12/76)

TRISTAN DA CUNHA A new xmtr replacing the modest 40 W unit, will be installed at ZOE, per a letter from the director of Post and Telegraphs (Klaus Hüsgen, GFR, SCDX 12/1)

(USA) Look for announcement of the NAM Committee for the International Broadcasters Year 1978. NACIBY will try to mobilize support of the IBY, coordinate activities to commemorate the IBY, and encourage international BC listening as a complement to domestic media consumption. NACIBY will promote quality SWBC programming and support the international free flow of information (Kim Andrew Elliott, MN)

YUGOSLAVIA SAWPY (Socialist Alliance of the Working People of Yugoslavia) was expected to adopt a decision at its Jan conference on forming R. Yugoslavia. Preparations for setting up this SW stn have been completed; it is to "inform the world about developments in the country and make a significant contribution to the promotion of its information-propaganda activity towards foreign countries". (BBCMS 6/1)

CLANDESTINECRANNY

BURMA V. of Burmese People 6304v at 1330-1430v is now on Sun/Tue/Thu/Fri only, ex-daily, and Burmese only, while 5110 is heard daily 1200-1300v in Burmese, Jingpaw, Shan, Std. Chinese (Ugusa, FEDXR 27/11) Mr. U, a R. Japan ancr told me Patriotic Youth Radio, headed by ex-premier U Nu, was active from Thailand when he left Burma 1/75. ID is "Pyichi lunge athan hlwin tana". The two stations are jammed by the Burmese government (Ugusa, FEDXR 27/11) A new name was adopted for the latter in 12/74, Patriotic Voice Radio ("Pyichit Athan Hwint Htaana") is anti-communist, anti-socialist, anti-Burmese govt. Xmtr is at Bins, Burma, near Thai border. Stud 0030v-0115v and 1230v-1315v on 7195-7240v (Carol Feil, DSWCI 12/76)

KOREA Voice of the Revolutionary Party for Reunification acted 30/11 that it would relay the Korean CBS pgms at 2200-2230, no freqs given (BBCMS 16/12)

IRAN Pro-communist Peyk-e Iran, was last heard 30/11 (BBCMS 9/12) But the National Voice of Iran believed via Radio Baku, continues as usual (BECMS 16/12) MORE CLANDESTINE bottom LN-4



CHILE R. Magallanes via R. Station Peace & Progress, is monitored at 0930-1000 on 12020/12070/15170/15455, announcing 16mb also, sked daily, and at 0200-0230 on 31/41m; "...the radio station which fascism cannot silence. For the sake of Chile build up the widest possible anti-fascist unity so as to bring down the dictatorship...." (BBCMS 6/1)

ABIE NATHAN's 400-ton peace ship, a floating xmtr broadcasting music and peace pleas, was allowed thru the Suez Canal 2/1 after several refusals. Permission had been requested from Pres. Sadat. It traveled with an Egyptian security escort. (AP 2/1 via Brandon Lovett, OH) IBA later reported that the only Red Sea port welcoming Nathan was Israel's Eilat (gh)

ZIMBABWE The 15-min African National Council (ANC) pgms in Eng/verns via R. Tanzania on 15435 have been retimed; announced 13/12 as Sun/Wed 2000, Mon/Fri 1930. On Mon 13/12, ANC pgm was followed at 1945 by the sked 30-min "Voice of Namibia" SWAPO BC in Eng. (BBCMS) **PIRATES** A stn playing "Man of Action" with repeated IDs as "Radio Nordzee" was heard on 6880 22/10 1324-1328 (W. Martijn, Leiden, Holland, BDXC) 6250 bears a new stn 12/12, European Music Radio, irreg. Sun sked 1130-1300. 6260 19/12, R. Valleri was back 1000-1200. 6220, Black Shadow Radio, Dutch, testing 19/12 1034-1107 with tremendous signal but distorted. 6275, R. Free Midlands, 19/12 1020-1130+, promising regular SW service. A Dutch stn on 6217-18, hrd 19/12 1155-1300*, ID sounds like R. Brona, Verona or Verana (Campbell, NU)

DX PROGRAMS

PIRATE R. Solent City, 6280 had a DX pgm at 1230 24/11 (Edward P. Englehard, UK, DSWCI) That was a Wednesday! (gh)

BRAZIL RNB's DX show called on all Japanese listeners sending them reports in Japanese to use some other language because RNB can't read Japanese. Claims reports in JJ are of "no use and they are wasting their time and money by sending them." (Dave Hammer, OH, 14/1) Shameful situation, considering the huge Japanese minority in Brazil (gh)

BULGARIA R. Sofia's DX pgm (Sat 0445 on 7115) continues to loosen up, with tips 22/1 on lots of western stations, even WFR, but a feature on safe socialist BGR R. Bucharest. Great political implications can be inferred from this, hi (gh)

CANADA Unless some disaster prevents it, I'll be starting the 8-part Frequency Management series on Weekend Magazine, 12/2. It'll run two parts per weekend for four weeks. (Ian McFarland, RCI, 5/1) Ian deserves a lot of credit for his continuing interest in DXers, in the face of a format preventing specific programs for them, and despite having been shunned by some DX clubs for a decision he could not prevent (gh) RCI's French DX pgm "À l'16 DX" is now aired 10-20 mins into each xmsn, with the "Club des Amis" in the last 10 min (Wegener)

CZECHOSLOVAKIA "DX Chat" is on R. Prague, Suns, every 2nd weekend; offers souvenirs to listeners sending in questions about life in Cz, used on air (ADXX 12/76) As of 1977 the German DX pgm is weekly, ex-twice monthly; also longer; Sun 1700, Mon 2100; once a month a special report on foreign DX activities (Rudolf Heim, EDXC Sec'y Gen'l, GFR, SCDX 14/12)DX

ECUADOR HCJB's French DX pgm "À l'Écoute du Monde" is on Fris 1615-1630, on 15435 (Cany, SC)

FINLAND In Jan, R. Finland revamped pgms, moving Finn-DX from Tue to Sat, but monthlyizing it, ex-weekly, not sure yet which week of month. And, repeated on Monday (gh)

GERMANY WEST (Cf Aug LN-9) DLF's "DX Circle" with NASWA's Alan Thompson has moved from Wed to Tue at 1900, on 1268 kHz (Stewart Fenwick, Scotland, SCDX 12/1)

NETHERLANDS Beginning 7/4, DX Juke Box will broadcast a new technical course by Jim Vastenhou, "Communications System Course", covering radio, TV, radar, navigation, radio astronomy. Texts free upon request in sets of four (Dick Speelman, SCDX 12/1) **ANTILLES** RN's new Portuguese DX pgm, called "Radio Atividade" began a weekly run Thu 20/1, at 2320-2334 on 15425, repeated Fri 0005-0019 on 9715, produced by Jacob Bornstein, with contributions from ex-Rio DXer for 2½ years, Roberto Levenstein, now in London, who was interviewed (gh)

PORTUGAL R. Portugal to air an Italian DX pgm produced by Dario Monferini's "Play-DX" group, Thu 30/12 in the 2200 xmsn on 9745/6025 (Play-DX 16/12) Regular?

SEYCHELLES FEBC (they mean FEBA -gh) Mahé has a DX pgm in English each Saturday at 0535-0550 (NHK DX 26/12) "DX Postbag" is sked for 1st and 3rd Sats at 1235-1250, on 11945 or 11925 and 15330, presided over by Victor Goonetilleke of Sri Lanka (ADXX 12/76)

SOUTH AFRICA R. RSA's French "Coin DX" airs Suns 2040-2045 on 11900/11800/9585/7270. Installments I heard included talk about bands used for SWBC, utes, etc. Not exceedingly useful, but there are worse ways to spend 5 min (John Wegener, IL)

SRI LANKA Worth it to keep trying for SLBC's "Radio Monitors International", Sun 1350-1400. I finally heard it 2/1 on 15425 when Adrian Peterson had a fascinating talk on DXing in the 30s, and lifted a few items from LN without credit; last part mixes with IBA IS, but if you are lucky, the Soviet jamming won't hit until the program is over at 1400 (gh)

SWITZERLAND SBC's German "DX-Ecke" heard on 2nd Sun 9/1 at 1402, opening with same theme as English version; so last half of German xmsns; reviewed Swiss MW stns; one voice sounded like Bob Thomann's, who is more at home in his native German, but I couldn't be sure (gh)

USSR (more) This pgm apparently differs from the DX Program in the NAM svc, in which 13/1, Paul Kuznetsov said RM was thinking about starting a DX club, due to popular request (gh)

(USA) A net for hams who would like to discuss all phases of SWling and DXing, has been proclaimed by Charles Mitchell, WB9NWF, Carmel IN, Weds at 2130, on 7275 ± 5; also 7107 will be monitored for novice check-ins and Europeans; was to begin 19/1 (DX Party Line 10/1) 7107 is too high for European hams, who can't go above 7100 (Swiss DX 22/1)

CAMBODIA R. Phnom Penh has adapted graceful native melodies with devilishly complex rhyme schemes to propagate tough revolutionary messages.

Expatriate Cambodians find the language hard to grasp; now 'revolutionary' rhymes with 'imperialist' and 'aggression' and 'gangster'. (Melbourne Age, 13/11 via DUDXS; much more)

CHINA Foochow R. 17/12 said spl pgms exposing and repudiating crimes of the Gang of Four would begin 20/12 Mon-Fri on Pgm I 0800-0830, 1430-1500; and Pgm II 0930-1000 (BBCMS) R. Peking HS from 9/12 BCs a special pgm 'on learning from Tachai in agriculture', 2130-2200 and 1130-1200 on Pgm I and 0400-0430 on Pgm II (BBCMS 16/12) R. Peking HS Pgm I includes Peking Opera: 2040-2100, 2220-2230, 0815-0830 exc. Tue, 1430 M-F, 1615-1700; Pgm II at 2200-2220, 0240-0300, 0715-0745 exc Wed/Fri, 1030-1040, 1200-1300, 1400-1430 (People's Daily via H. Nagase, FEDXR 27/11, excerpted from a complete sked by gh)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC R. Commercial net has news and comment at 0930-1200, 1600-1730, 2130-2300 and 0130-0200 on 4880 and various other affiliates (BBCMS 16/12)

FINLAND R. Finland's revamped sked for 1977 puts Profile on Tues, Finland in Focus on Weds, Spotlight on Thurs, each following News. Fridays Magazine; Saturday Review of the Week, and then What, Where, When, alternating Finn DX/International Scene/What Finns Talk About/Humor, and repeated Mons after Weekend Report. Suns, Letterbox (gh)

FRANCE "Paris Calling Africa" besides news, reports and commentaries features French language lessons -Mon thru Fri- reviews of Fr/Af press, letterboxes, features on politics, economics, arts, daily life in Africa and France. African, French and Black American music are played and many musicians are interviewed (RFI via André Pineault, Ancienne-Lorette, PQ)

HUNGARY RB's "Overview" looks at events, ideas, exchanges and development trends between Hungary and NAM, GMT Thu 10/2 at 0212, and Fri 11/2 0312 (Budapest International, via gh)

LUXEMBOURG R. Luxembourg actually take their news from the Sunday Times! Unbelievable! Oh, well, at least it's more interesting than a re-hash 'on most domestic AM stns (Jim Conrad IA)

UKOGBANI While many listeners may not be able to afford the price of London Calling, it is the only way the publication can still be offered worldwide (Letterbox 8/1 via Conrad) \$1.25 of the \$10 goes for bank exchange (E.M.O. "Mike" Williams, BBC, letter to gh) Lacking LC, make a habit of "Looking Ahead" previews daily 0940; 1943 exc Sat/Sun; Weds 1055. They really ought to sked some during NAM peak hours. Also check my fortnightly "Short Waves" column in the Sunday Denver Post, for frequent BBC programme information (gh)

USA Russian dissident Andrei A. Amalrik, testifying at the U.S. Capitol, said VOA is widely listened to because it is not jammed, but he criticized the station for showing little understanding of the preferences of Soviet listeners and acting as if it was broadcasting "to Americans who happened to speak Russian." (Bernard Gwertzman, NY Times, 7/1, p. 2 via Roger Wirt, MA) Among VOA's more interesting pgms in English: Forum, Fris 1130, 1730, 1830 to Af; New York, New York with Ben Grauer, Sats 1130, 1530, 1830 to Af, 1930; VOA Magazine Mon-Fri 1330, 1530, 1930 (via Robert Heckenlively, SD) Some are also in 0000-0200 block (gh)

Moscow Mailbag, Sun 1200-1220; 2130-2150 on Sun/Wed/Sat. But Moscow never mentioned the rest of the story. Corvalán's freedom was traded for the release of Soviet dissident Vladimir Bukovsky, imprisoned because he told the world about the asylums where anti-Kremlin thinkers are kept. So ABC, CBS, NBC, VOA, BBC, DW, SBC and many others told the true story--a political prisoner swap between two oppressive dictatorships. Typically, RM told only one side of the story... it's that kind of imbalance that turns off listeners. (Kim Andrew Elliott, MN)

There are those who called some columns brilliant. There are those who called them all stupid and sophomoric. The truth is that they were probably somewhere in between. Charlie is loved by some, detested by others, perhaps tolerated by most. Over the years there were few, however, who tried to shut me up. There were none who were successful, until now. I go now, but I am not dead. Charlie will still be around wherever SWLs gather, where you least expect it...even those who think they know who I am are wrong. For I am Loudenboomer. I depart after 11 years. If you read this you will know there is still a small spark of free speech in NASWA. You may not have heard the last of me either. Happy trails to you from C.L."

The preacher man at the Pentagon

Flacking fundamentalism to the armed forces

WASHINGTON—Deep in the Pentagon an unknown communications czar directs an empire of more than a thousand radio and television stations around the world. He is John C. Broger, a dapper, determined man with a walrus mustache and an evangelical zeal. He controls the flow of news to our far-flung soldiers and sailors through the newspapers, magazines and radio-TV stations of the armed forces.

The private world of John C. Broger is populated with good guys and bad guys. The good guys are conservatives, anti-Communists and Christian fundamentalists who believe in the God-given, American right to make a buck. The bad guys are liberals, hippies and Communists, although sometimes he has trouble distinguishing one from the other.

Citizen Broger rules a vast communications empire, which resembles an Egyptian puzzle on the organizational charts. Its principalities are designated, in the way of a bureaucracy, by letters. Broger himself commands the IAF. Spelled out, this is the Office of Information for the Armed Forces. His most important principality is the AFRTS, which, in longhand, is the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service.

Broger's domain is connected by a tenuous political umbilical cord to ASDPA. This is the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs. The office was occupied last year by William Greener, who was besieged with complaints about Broger. As the charges multiplied, Greener called in the Defense Department's general counsel and the Air Force's special investigators.

We have obtained a copy, meanwhile, of the Defense Department's confidential investigative report. Here are the highlights:

- Within AFRTS, investigators found widespread mismanagement. The report alleged that "AFRTS-Washington had not established a formal property account, and property records were fragmented and incomplete."

- Equipment on hand, costing about \$516,000, was not identified in the records. Various government items were located at the homes of AFRTS employees.

- AFRTS-Los Angeles had on hand 59,405 reels of audio tapes worth approximately \$68,000. This was enough tapes to last five years. They had been requisitioned for a Navy program that doesn't exist.

- Broger's boys often awarded contracts without bothering to seek competitive bids. Investigators found "several which seemed questionable from both a requirements and a cost-benefit standpoint."

- Investigators found a \$91,000 contract, which was awarded to Arbitron, Inc., to conduct a listener survey. This produced information which was largely available in AFRTS files.

In a lengthy interview with our associates Jim Grady and Howard Rosenberg, Broger denied his empire was mismanaged and offered to match it "with any organization in or out of government." Yet a management study, initiated by Broger himself, concluded in part: "The organization and management of the AFRTS system is inefficient and ineffective and not responsive to policy guidance and direction." Broger acknowledged that he is a member of the National Association of Evangelicals.

YOU'RE NOT LIKELY TO READ ABOUT IT IN NUMERO UNO, BUT... Your LN editor, a charter member, has been expelled for failing to provide sufficient DX-oriented contributions (as defined by the editors, Don Jensen and Ralph W. Perry). I had also vigorously opposed a recent policy change stifling the free flow of DX info from NU to other clubs where more than 25 people would have a chance to see it. Thus there will be no further new items from NU in LN. NUers (or, rather not yet ex-NUers) are therefore urged to send copies of their reports directly to this or other NASWA editors, as this is not yet prohibited. NUers may still get certain DX news first, but in my experience very little of it did not eventually appear in other freely accessible sources, which I will continue to glean (gh)

INTRUDER WATCH **THE SOVIET PULSER** The editorial staff at the Norwegian paper Verdens Gang called the CIA in Washington, where Mr. Jim Ratray confirmed these come from a powerful over-the-horizon-back scatter radar that is part of a new Soviet defence system, not operative yet, only testing. There are at least four transmitters in the Kiev and Nicolayev area. The point seems to be to spot ICBMs as soon as they are fired off from the USA. Also the USA are erecting similar OTH radar stations, one on the West coast and one in Maine, constructed by General Electric. The interference problem is enormous. Norwegian telecommunication reps feel SW radar will push forward satellite communication. Speculation that this will mean goodbye and farewell to DXing if it goes on, unfortunately is only too true (Rolf Løvstrøm, DXer and journalist at Verdens Gang, Oslo, in SCDX 4/1) Its directional beam sweeps across northern Europe and reflects off the Arctic ionosphere to scan the U.S. for missile launchings. QRM seems to be most severe in Scandinavia ...the Russians have cut back the Kiev buzz saw's schedule from hours at a time to one- and two-minute bursts... (Time, 10/1 p. 27 via Mark Bixby, CA) Tnx also for newspaper clippings from Bob Foxworthy, Diane Levesque, Daniel Luce (gh) Bandwidth also reduced, noted on 7350 at 2300 6/1, only QRMing Prague-7345, not Moscow-7355! (gh) Military at it again. 6/1 at 0917-0924 on 5995, blanking Melbourne, on AM, heard RIKA and RIK, then pulsing tone (Jim Conrad, IA)

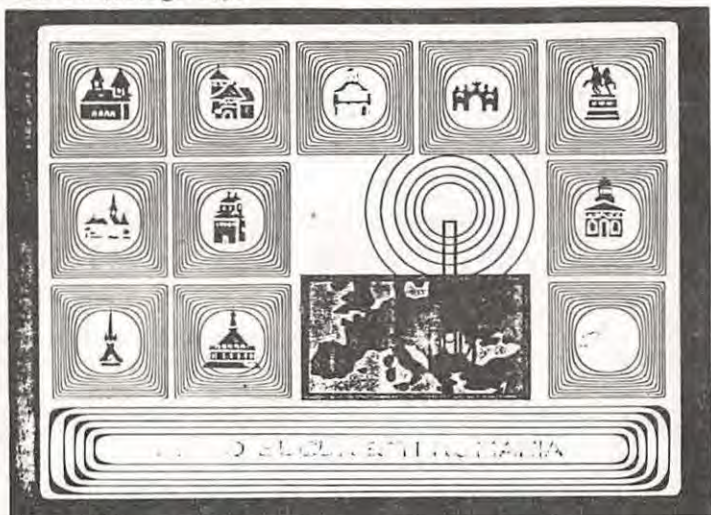
