LOG REPORT CONTRIBUTORS NOTE:

We wish to announce that we have a change in our Distributing Editor for the Log Report sections of FRENDX. Effective immediately, all contributors to the Log Report sections are to send their contributions to the new Distributing Editor, DAVE VALKO, P.O. BOX 155, DUNLO, PENNSYLVANIA, 15930. Dave has been a NASWA member since 1976 and a regular contributor to the LR sections since joining.

David Walcutt, the retiring DE, has indicated his desire to pass this job along to someone else after having the responsibility for the past year. Much depends on the reliability of the Distributing Editor to make sure the the LR section editors will receive their material as quickly as possible so they are able to complete their work within the publishing deadlines. Without the Log Report sections, FRENDX would have a lot of blank pages. Dave Walcutt has filled this need very well, and we are confident that Dave Valko will continue this tradition.

The deadline for the Distributing Editor to receive member loggings will continue to be the 12th of each month, and this means received in Dunlo, PA by that date. Reports should be mailed early enough ahead to allow time for them to arrive by that time. Past NASWA policy has been that late reports are not held over for the following month since many would be out of date by the time they would appear in print. We don't want to disappoint any contributor who has taken time to prepare a report, so we hope all will accept this reminder accordingly.

Any loggings intended for the July issue of FRENDX which may have already been mailed to Houston, TX will be forwarded on to the new Distributing Editor.

We would also like to mention another change in the Log Report sections which is presently being considered. It may be that we will divide the present LR-D section of the Log Report into two sections. In other words, instead of having all the loggings above 11700 as LR-D, it would become LR-D for 11700-17699 frequency range, and LR-E for 17700-up.

During certain months, LR-D receives by far the largest number of logging reports of all the sections. WARC-79

A CONDENSED VERSION OF THE REMARKS OF
*Ambassador John A. Gronouski, Chairman, U.S.
Board for International Broadcasting, at a meet-
ing of the NATO Cultural Affairs Committee
27 February 1979*

A major link that binds together the members of the NATO Alliance is the responsibility that we share for preserving and expanding the unimpeded free flow of information. I would like to concentrate on one critical aspect on which decisions are being made at the present time, and important actions will be taken later this year. I am referring to shortwave broadcasting in the context of the World Administrative Radio Conference of the International Telecommunications Union. WARC-79 will convene in Geneva for a 10-week session this September. If its results are favorable, it will insure a freer and more balanced flow of information among the countries of the world for the remainder of this century. If its outcome is unfavorable, this vital flow could be severely restricted and our shortwave broadcasting efforts, those of the VoA, RFE/RL, BBC, DW, RCI, RN, and of our other NATO partners, would suffer.

In the field of human communications, shortwave radio plays a unique role. Technically, it is the only mass broadcasting medium capable of direct, universal, personal, and immediate communication to individuals and audiences throughout the world. Unlike standard broadcast stations in the medium and longwave bands, or TV and FM stations that can be received only over relatively short distances, shortwave broadcasting has global reach.

Shortwave broadcasts, then, differ from all other media of communication -- books, newspapers, magazines, motion pictures-- in that they cannot be stopped at frontiers, refused an entrance visa, confiscated, delayed, or censored. These broadcasts do not require the prior consent of the recipient government. Shortwave broadcasts never intrude on individual privacy. They can enter a listener's home only by invitation, by the flick of a switch, the turn of a dial. Over more than a half-century, the shortwave broadcasting bands have become a market place for ideas and information, an arena for ideological and political argument, a vehicle for news and entertainment, a channel for the dissemination of a wide variety of serious and popular cultural programs.

Shortwave broadcasting is not the exclusive domain of the more powerful industrialized nations. It is the only practical information medium at present through which the voice of the smaller, less affluent country can be heard, and can reply to the major powers. Installations are relatively inexpensive, within the means of most of the developing nations. Along with the issuance of currency and postage stamps, one of the first steps often taken by a newly independent country is the creation of a shortwave broadcasting service to communicate with its neighbors and the world.

In the open societies in which we live, we have available a wide diversity of uncensored communication and information media. But to many millions of people, particularly those living in closed societies, shortwave broadcasts are the primary source of news and information from outside. Some countries know and fear this, and attempt to block reception by jamming.

What is the audience for shortwave broadcasts? While precise figures are not available, experts estimate that of the world total of more than 900 million radio sets, as many as 300 million may be capable of tuning shortwave broadcasts. The ongoing transistor revolution and the development of miniature components have made possible the manufacture of more compact, more sensitive radios than ever before, and at a price that more people can afford. On a typical day, it is estimated that as many as 200 million listeners throughout the world may be tuned to shortwave broadcasts. This is an impressive audience.

Shortwave radio appears to be the only viable medium for international broadcasting in the foreseeable future. This is why the WARC meeting later this year is so important to the members of NATO. Let me be specific. Approximately 150 countries presently broadcast on the shortwave bands. The number of transmitters in use has increased from 300 in 1950 to 1,500

today, and the amount of broadcasting has increased five-fold since the end of World War II. Most shortwave frequencies are now being used by double, and during preferential broadcasting hours, by three and four times the number of transmitters recommended as a reasonable norm by the ITU.

The results of this congestion, familiar to anyone who has tried to listen to shortwave broadcasts, is the all too common phenomenon of co-channel interference, when an otherwise clear signal is marred or blotted out by the program of another station on the same channel. A recent survey conducted by the European Broadcasting Union concluded that reception on two out of every three channels used for shortwave broadcasting is rendered ineffective by interference. This checks closely with what the VoA and RFE/RL have found; more than half the frequencies that they use are marred by interference and this does not include those RFE/RL channels which are intentionally jammed. I dare say that you will find the situation much the same for the shortwave broadcasts of your countries. The shortage of frequencies and the resulting high level of interference has in itself become a serious impediment to the free flow of information.

Traditionally, radio frequency management has been viewed as a highly specialized technical matter. But, in the case of shortwave broadcasting, there are strong political implications. They involve the East-west ideological struggle, for more than a third of the world's shortwave broadcasting stations are located in NATO and Warsaw Pact countries. The North-South communication imbalance is also involved, for developing countries claim to have been squeezed out by the industrial nations who were there first and who have greater resources. WARC-79 thus looms as a serious three-way confrontation between East, West, and the Third World for control of broadcasting frequencies. I don't see how it can be avoided, and we must be alert to politically motivated strategies disguised as technical proposals.

We must assume that countries which maintain closed societies, resort to jamming foreign broadcasts, and exercise censorship and other media controls, are certain to use WARC-79 as a platform to press for further restrictions on shortwave broadcasting under the guise of technical proposals. The Soviet Union, for example, which recently announced the bringing into operation of 29 of the world's most powerful shortwave broadcasting transmitters, is calling for no increase in frequencies for broadcasting. The Soviets can afford to take such a position. Along with most other countries of the Warsaw Pact, they have established "safe havens" for their broadcasting by pre-empting segments of the shortwave spectrum reserved originally for other communication services, most of which have subsequently moved to satellites or other technologically advanced telecommunication systems. By resorting to a series of reservations taken at previous ITU conferences for justifying the takeover of these frequencies, Soviet broadcasts escape most of the interference that the rest of the world is encountering. Obviously, the Soviets would like to keep these more or less exclusive broadcasting enclaves for themselves and their allies at WARC-79.

In 1959, at the last ITU conference where frequencies were reallocated throughout the entire communication spectrum, the technologically advanced countries had the voting edge to sort out their differences among themselves. But voting power and patterns have changed drastically since then. Following the voting rules of the United Nations, each of the 154 members of the ITU has a single and equal vote. Togo and Fiji, for example, have the same voting rights as the United States and Russia. In recent years the non-aligned bloc has on several important issues demonstrated its ability to control the voting pattern in the ITU, and we must assume that they will be in a similar position at WARC-79.

If the Soviet proposal for no increase in broadcast frequencies were to prevail and the Third World majority were successful in forcing a redistribution of the present congested frequencies to "obtain their share of the pie" as some have already threatened, members of the NATO Alliance could expect to lose the most. If an adequate number of additional channels are not made available for shortwave broadcasting, satisfactory accommodation of the scores of "have not" nations would entail substantial reductions on the part of the few "haves". If this were to happen at WARC-79, the entire shortwave broadcasting effort of NATO members might be seriously imperiled.

What can we do to avoid such an outcome? First, we must recognize that collectively the NATO community is responsible for the bulk of the free world's international broadcasting and that this mandates responsibility for leading the conference towards an equitable solution, which at the same time, protects our interests. If we fail to assume a leadership role, free world international broadcasting could suffer irreparable damage.

Second, we must see to it through our proposals that a sufficient amount of additional shortwave spectrum is allocated to broadcasting. We should be able to demonstrate clearly that the reasonable and legitimate interference-free requirements of all countries, developed as well as developing, can be accommodated for the remainder of this century. It is a matter

of simple arithmetic that the present broadcasting spectrum must be expanded two-fold to achieve this. This would involve but a small reduction (less than 20%) in the number of frequencies presently reserved for what is called the "fixed service," which for the most part would encompass the Soviet broadcasting enclaves, making them available for the entire world. The fixed service, used mainly for commercial and military communications, has made far-reaching advances in the utilization of worldwide satellite, cable, and microwave technology, advances which have sharply reduced former needs for shortwave frequencies.

Third, if we are to gain majority support for our proposals, we must identify them with the responsible desires and goals of the Third World nations who want to improve their communications posture and want to develop a greater balance in shortwave broadcasting. We cannot hope to achieve our goals at WARC-79, I submit, unless we can gain the support of these nations or, at least, avoid their active opposition.

WARC-79

THE FINAL U.S. POSITION FOR WARC-79

On 17 April 1979, an informal conference of active members of the now disbanded FCC International Broadcasting Service Group was held at the offices of the Board for International Broadcasting in Washington DC. In attendance were the Chairman of the former IBSG, Mr. Stanley Leinwoll, plus former IBSG Members, Mr. Roger Legge, Mr. Arthur Thompson (WYFR), Mr. Darrell Bauguess (FCC), and myself. An observer from the VOA Frequency Division was present; and Mr. George Jacobs, Director of Research and Engineering at the BIB, attended as guest speaker.

The main purpose of the meeting was to present to the group details of the FINAL U.S. POSITION FOR WARC-79 for high frequency broadcasting. Although the Amateur-Broadcasting share in Region 2 (the Americas) remains largely unresolved by the proposals, they are, overall, a significant positive achievement for shortwave broadcasting.

First, INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING BETWEEN 5.8 and 22 MHz IS EXPANDED BY 93% IN REGION 2 AND 80% ELSEWHERE. This is very nearly a doubling of available in-band space.

Second, FIVE NEW TROPICAL BANDS ARE ADDED, EXPANDING THE AVAILABLE TROPICAL BAND SPACE BETWEEN 3 and 14 MHz BY 60%. NO INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING WOULD TAKE PLACE EITHER IN THE EXISTING OR PROPOSED NEW TROPICAL BANDS.

COMMENTS:

1. The U.S. position calls for selective sharing between Fixed Services ("Utilities") and Broadcasting in all added IB bandspace. However, it is not considered likely such sharing will be adopted by the Conference this fall.
2. The U.S. position urges, but does not give a specific date for, the adoption of SSB for IB. Again, it is not considered likely SSB will be mandated by the Conference this fall, although some further study of the issue may be called for, perhaps for resolution at a later Broadcasting Conference in the 1980's.
3. Power limits being considered translate to 50 kW for domestic operations, and either 250 or 500 kW for international operations. If the 250 kW limit is adopted, probably some sort of grandfather clause would be included to allow existing 500 kW units to continue operating throughout their useful life.

In closing, I would like to express my appreciation to the IBSG and its Chairman, Mr. Leinwoll, plus Mr. Jacobs. The final position is one shortwave listeners and DXers can regard favorably, and speaks well of the Government's commitment to international understanding through broadcasting.

WARC-79

CANADIAN PROPOSAL FOR WARC-79

A news release dated 5 March, 1979, was issued by Communications Minister Jeanne Sauve from Ottawa. It outlines a Canadian Proposal for WARC-79 and indicates that Canada considers WARC-79 to be very important for Canada.

Among the main Canadian proposals are the following:

- that additional spectrum be allocated for mobile communications in the UHF band;
- that the standard AM broadcasting band be extended to provide for additional channels to permit coverage of areas in Canada not at present adequately served;
- that the amount of shortwave spectrum employed for international broadcasting be substantially increased;
- that additional radio spectrum be provided for Canadian and international requirements for radio communications by satellites;
- that additional spectrum be provided for the amateur radio service.

More detail on some aspects of the Canadian proposal of interest to shortwave listeners were explained in more detail.

The standard AM broadcasting band, which provides the familiar and popular radio service in the urban areas of Canada, can no longer sustain the need for new AM stations. Canada is therefore proposing that this band be extended to provide for additional channels to permit coverage of Canadian areas not at present adequately served.

Canada is also proposing a substantial increase in the amount of shortwave spectrum allocated to broadcasting. Radio Canada International will benefit from this change, particularly from the allocation of a new frequency band near 4 MHz. This new band will permit more effective coverage of northern Quebec, southern Baffin Island, and the James Bay area from the RCI transmission station in Sackville, NB.

During the public consultations, some submissions noted the important recreational and public service aspects of the hobby of amateur radio. It is, therefore, intended to make several proposals that would greatly improve the regulatory provisions for this service. Canada will be in the forefront of those countries proposing additional spectrum for this service.

One issue in the Canadian proposals is the loss to the shortwave broadcasting service

of a small segment of the frequency band near 4 MHz. Currently, the band 3.5-4.0 MHz is allocated to the Amateur Service. It is proposed to reallocate 10 percent of this band (3.95-4.0 MHz) to the Shortwave Broadcasting Service to obtain improved radio coverage of northern areas of Canada. It is considered that this change will not unduly hamper the amateur operations, and that the small loss is more than compensated for by the additional bands proposed for amateurs at higher frequencies.

At the WARC the developing countries could raise some issues of a non-technical nature relating to their concerns and the new world information and communications order. However, in the view of Canadian government officials, the WARC should be able to find ways to accommodate the requirements of the developing countries.

DX-300

REVIEWS OF WORKING MODELS OF THE DX-300

It has been reported that approximately 50% of the initial distribution of DX-300 receivers to Radio Shack dealers had a defective first IF that allowed the loop to freely oscillate. Radio Shack made an effective effort to contact all persons who had purchased defective receivers and promised to replace them with working and checked-out models. Presumably, by this time, all available DX-300s in Radio Shack stores should be working receivers. We have now received several reviews from owners and share them with you.

The DX-300: A mini-review, or going where no man has gone before. by Larry Cunningham, 4707 Hilton Ave. Apt. 3H, Columbus, OH 43228.

On January 7, 1979, after months of anxious anticipation, I purchased Radio Shack's new digital-readout DX-300 shortwave receiver. After several years of using the DX-160, I was more than ready to move up to a better radio. However, I frankly couldn't afford to shell out \$600 for the likes of the FRG-7000, modified or unmodified. So, I had stars in my eyes as I carted the new radio home and plugged it into my system. My troubles began almost immediately.

For example, I would tune to 5 MHz WWV. If I was lucky, this "heartbeat of the world" would jump right out at me. However, the normal procedure at this point is to use the MHz tuning dial to "peak" this 5 MHz band. (The preselector has already been set to 5 MHz.) I admit to minimal knowledge of the innards of a receiver, but I understand that this adjustment of the MHz dial is supposed to lock the phase-lock-loop circuit into this MHz band. When I moved the MHz dial ever so slightly to peak the band, WWV disappeared! In fact, some station like Ecos del Torbes sometimes popped in in its place! I found that by rotating the MHz dial, I could more or less systematically tune through a good part of the 60 metre band, while the display serenely continued showing 5.000. Needless to say, I was pretty upset and disappointed!

On January 16, I marched the radio back to the Radio Shack store and said, in effect, "It's broken! Fix it!" And, the store manager forthwith gave me a replacement off the shelf, promising to find the problem in the original set and get it repaired. Taking this second sample home, I ran it through its paces hoping that the original had just had a fluke problem. Nope! As soon as I installed it and tuned to 60 metres, the same problem with the tuning cropped up. "This radio has a definite problem," I said to myself.

Between January 16 and March 8, I went through three more samples including my original sample presumably repaired. All showed the same tuning problem to one extent or another. The Radio Shack people, I must say, cooperated to the best of their ability. I explained the problem to the local quality control technician, who promised to look into it. It was because of this cooperation that I hung in there hoping for a solution and a working set.

Then Dave Walcutt published portions of my note to him in the March FRENDEX, describing my difficulties with the radio. That note brought quite a response! I soon learned from other DXers that the tuning problem was present in many samples, and that it was not a simple repairable malfunction, but a basic design problem.

Now, I consider myself a man of (almost) infinite patience, but enough is enough! I stormed into the local Radio Shack store on March 9 and demanded a refund. Call me a soft touch if you wish, but after speaking over the phone with Mr. Bob Thomas of the main office in Fort Worth, I agreed to try one more sample which has been thoroughly tested and found to be free of the tuning problem. I obtained that sample the next day, and I have found it completely free of the MHz tuning malfunction. Yes, Virginia, there are well performing DX-300s out there!

I have used this sample for ten days and have been unable to "fool" the MHz dial into malfunctioning. In the meantime, I have received a letter from Fred Osterman, District Manager for Radio Shack, offering to help resolve the DX-300 difficulties. Just tonight (20 March) a Radio Shack technician in Fort Worth called me to tell me they have isolated the problem (see below), and offered to send me a sample for testing purposes if I was still having troubles. The Radio Shack personnel I have dealt with to date have displayed real dedication towards coming out with a good digital-readout SW receiver, and have shown real concern about the problems which have arisen. For that I am respectful and thankful.

Now, about the cause of the DX-300s MHz tuning problems. As it was explained to me, the 52 MHz first IF stage oscillator in some samples has a tendency to become free-running, causing a failure of the phase-lock-loop circuitry to lock onto a particular MHz band. As a consequence, the receiver's tuning circuits cause unpredictable frequencies to be received in spite of the frequency displayed in the readout. The solution appears to be a modification of this first IF stage, including physical repositioning and a modified grounding arrangement. (I do not profess to have much technical knowledge regarding PLL circuitry, so I hope I got that right!). Radio Shack is now in the process of modifying the DX-300 to eliminate the malfunction.

Finally, a mini-review of the DX-300 minus the MHz tuning glitch. After operating the good sample for ten days, I have come to the following conclusions:

- 1) SENSITIVITY: Certainly adequate, and up to current standards for a modern receiver.
- 2) SELECTIVITY: Admittedly, leaves something to be desired. I ran listening tests similar to those reported by Jerry Lineback in his March article, and in summary, would say that the selectivity is about the same as, and in some cases better than that of the unmodified FRG-7000. I would strongly suggest that Radio Shack incorporate better ceramic selectivity filters in any upgraded model.
- 3) EASE OF OPERATION: With a working sample, frequency tuning is a breeze. The method is basically the same as used with most frequency-synthesis receivers; but I do wish they had included a lock-unlock light for the MHz tuning! The RF attenuator (3 position) switch and audio bandwidth switch seem to help only in extreme cases in the SW bands, but are quite helpful for DXers who also tune the standard broadcast band. The ANL position of the "Mode" switch seems fairly effective in attenuating some types of impulse noise.
- 4) STABILITY: After a one-hour warm-up period, my sample shows basically no drift over a 24 hour period. However, a certain amount of idal backlash does occur causing the frequency to drift up about a kHz a few minutes after dialing a new frequency, necessitating readjustment.

In conclusion, I would say that, in spite of problems with MHz tuning which should be resolved soon, Radio Shack has tried hard to produce a decent, competitive shortwave receiver. When the MHz tuning problem is licked and all sets are properly modified, the DX-300 would appear to be a receiver capable of competing with the unmodified FRG-7000. Considering the fact that the DX-300 retails for \$380, and the FRG-7000 for \$600, DXers such as myself with not unlimited funds would do well to investigate the DX-300 more closely. With the expected design modifications, if I had to make the choice between the FRG-7000 and the DX-300, I would save some money and get the DX-300.

BUT MAKE SURE THAT THOSE CIRCUIT MODIFICATIONS HAVE BEEN MADE!!!

The following notes on the DX-300 were also received.

I finally got my hands on a good working DX-300. My first DX-300 was defective. The problem in the MHz knob is now gone. The Wadley Loop in my first receiver was defective. Jeff White, Larry Cunningham, and I all had the same problem with our first DX-300 receivers. Mr. Frank Roberts of Radio Shack in Fort Worth talked to the three of us about our problems. The MHz knob should NOT tune in any other stations, other than the one you are tuned to. Example again: go to HCJB on 9745 kHz Q200-0700 GMT. Tune in HCJB, then turn the MHz knob, the only thing it will do is to change the S-meter reading, it will not tune in stations. If you do hear other stations (in the same MHz band) your receiver is defective. The MHz knob should change the S-meter reading and the signal strength of HCJB. I now love my DX-300 and I am going to keep it. If you would like more information on the defect in the Wadley Loop, just write to me. If you decide to buy the receiver you better ask if their problem with the Wadley Loop in the receiver has been corrected. It is a very fine receiver and I recommend the Realistic DX-300 receiver. -- Rob Harrington, President of the Colorado Assoc-

iation of DXers, 3181 South York St., Englewood, CO 80110.

. . . I am of the opinion that my DX-300, which arrived yesterday (3-15), being more recently off the assembly line, has had better quality control, and/or has been de-bugged. The adverse reports appearing in various bulletins must have been caused by faulty or hurried production, not unusual with a new product. I can find very little to fault, mostly in design, not performance. Sensitivity is outstanding. Selectivity is quite good, a strong signal covers only 8 kHz. Two medium strength signals 5 kHz apart can be separated nicely. It's selectivity is superior to that of the FRG-7, but serious DXing will require a sharper filter, as do most of the new rigs. The audio offers a three position bandwidth, and is excellent. SSB and CW tune very professionally and exhalted carrier tuning is very effective. Side by side comparative operation with my Dymek DR-55 fails to downgrade the DX-300 in any way. Negative features encountered include a rather sloppy calibration of the preselector drum, and a rotary switch frequency control would have eliminated the need to retune the MHz dial after having tuned in the signal on the kHz dial. The DX-300 is a business-like piece of gear, both to operate, and to look at. I am very pleased with it, and it immediately goes into surgery for a Collins filter implant. If I am correct in my assumption that the early models may have been faulty, avoid or double check all serial numbers lower than 8-00762 (the number of my receiver). --From the San Diego DXers Club, Larry Brookwell, 1826 Cypress St., San Diego, CA 92154.

I am 100% satisfied with my DX-300 receiver. I had a friend who has a FRG-7000 try out my DX-300 and could find very little difference between the performance of each set. I would not hesitate to recommend this model. -- L.P. Benjamin, 3986 Mesa Circle #201, Lompoc, CA 93436.

THIS & THAT

Your editor recently had a chance to tune the Radio Shack DX-300, one that worked this time. In general, my observations concur with those comments made earlier in this month's SWC by several users. The DX-300 will probably find favor with those who want digital readout instead of the FRG-7, but do not want to pay for the clock timer on the FRG-7000, that runs the cost of that machine \$200 or more above the DX-300. Serious DXers may find the DX-300 very useful if selectivity modified. Time will tell, we would like to have more reviews on the DX-300.

HELPING HAND: Tom Mooningham, P. O. Box 8512, Camp Lejeune, NC 28542 wants a Hallicrafters S-38 B, C, or D in good condition and a Hallicrafters SW-500 in good condition with manuals if possible. Tom has available about 10 extra Radio Moscow QSL cards in various styles, one per request if you send a SASE.

QUESTION: Bob Rankin, 920 Rockledge, Lawrence, KS 66044, writes that he recently received a packet of old QSLs from the late 50s and early 60s. Among them is a strange one 'verifying' a VoA transmission. On June 14, 1961, I had received transmissions from an obviously experimental U.S. shortwave station using the call sign WW2XAJ on what my log lists as 11.925 MHz. Since my equipment at that time was not terribly well calibrated, I cannot be certain if this is exact. Clearly, the station was well within the 25 metre band. I have no notation on whether the ID was voice or CW, nor do I remember what, if any, programming was carried. On a hunch that these were tests similar to those carried out a few years earlier by VoA's KK2XEZ at Dallas, TX (VoA's first 500 kW transmitter), I sent a reception report to VoA. They "verified" about a month later with a QSL that was entirely blank except for the date of reception -- no freq. and no location. It seems likely that the transmissions were not theirs at all and that they were as baffled as I was. But the question remains: What and where was WW2XAJ? Can anyone help?

SWITZERLAND SRI J79 SSB extended to Nam: 1315-1515 21545, 0145-0415 15130, 0430-0630 15305 (SRI) 21545 is useless as 21570 is always better with much higher power on AM; 15130 is useless due to jamming/QRM against R. Liberty; but 15305 is OK (gh)

U S A VOA inaugurated a service in Persian 8/4, 1830-1900 on 21600 15155 9715--international news, news-related features and items on the US, amounting to 3h 30m per week (BBC MS 19/4) VOA J79 shows 21600 as Tangier 35 kW, 15160 ex-15155 as Kavalla 250, 9715 Kavalla 250. In keeping with IGA's knee-jerk policy of ignoring 'friends' until they turn into enemies (gh)

U S S R R. Moscow's twice-weekly news in RS to the western Arctic & Antarctic announced that from 19/4 it would be on 9590 9480 7120, still Mon & Thu 1530-1600 (BBC MS 19/4)

VATICAN RV J79 on new 15285, ex-15120 SP 2300, PT 2330-2355, good sigs in Melbourne (Bob Padula, 8/5) Also noted here (gh)

VIETNAM (Cf May LN-3) Phu Khanh is new stn, hrd weak at *1030-1400* on 5139, opening with Hanoi Pgm-I relay and cutting away for own pgm at 1200-1230. VOV in Ho Chi Minh City is on 6166 & 9622 until 1625* including local pgms at 1145-1400 & 1515-1600; relay Hanoi news 1100-1145 & 1600-1625, relay Hanoi People's Army & News 1400-1515. VOV Pgm-I (or, it seems, only pgm, as Pgm-II no longer obs), *2110-1625*. Language lessons have been moved onto I from II: 2115-2130 FR, 2130-2145 EG, 2145-2200 RS. Std Chinese unfound. 4945v 6450v; 10060v is apparently off the air in the morning. Local stations: Gia Lai-Kong Tum 4762 hrd weak around 1045. Hoang Lien Son on 5603 weak but constant at *1200-1315*. ALGERIA Algiers FR svc hrd 1455 1/4 on 19020 //251, 2 x 9510 unhrd at this time (Sennitt MM)

ANTARCTICA AFAN McMurdo on SSB in EG on 6012, excellent 0805-0930 tho w/increasing het QRM. Country mx, wx, ID at 0859 11/4; also hrd well 0810-1040 20/4 (David Nicholls, ACT, ADXN) EG pops 0730, peaking 0800 23/4 w/AFAN jingles, and wx report at 0815 (Leigh Morris, NZ, ADXN)

BRAZIL R. Triângulo Mineiro de Uberaba on 4965 now IDs with the new name R. Sociedade de Uberaba. R. Record de São Paulo now 50 kW on SW. R. Panamericana de São Paulo on 6055 and 11965 is now R. Record (Baillo Pedro Povrzenic, Asociación DX del Litoral Apr/May) 2YF905 on 3245 hrd at 0830; it's R. Aruanã, not Kraunã as in WRTVH 79 (Povrzenic, ditto)

R. Nacional, Brasília reported 10/4 that Radiobrás had put five new SW xtrs into operation, designed to broadcast special pgms in the langs of Brazil's leading trading partners to promote Brazilian exports. Beamed to S/C/NAm, WEu, Arab countries, and India (BBC MS 19/4) So far I haven't heard a hint of more than one xtr on the air, and in EG only (gh)

CANADA Last week CPRX suffered a minor problem with their antenna. One of the towers got damaged and became completely out of phase. Has been operating on a temporary make-shift antenna until they can repair the damage. They have scheduled a day this week to go off the air so as to repair the damage. This accounts for their lousy signal lately (CMS 14/5)

CHINA Recent changes in CPR foreign policy have affected the FEBC ministry. HK staff once received an average of 18 letters a year; in the first 21 days of March, 2368 letters (FEBC via Marlin A. Field, MI) In a report on the 'avalanche' of mail now received from listeners in China, R. Australia stated that the majority came from southern China, where its signals were much clearer. R. has been unable to transmit an adequate signal to northern China since 9/74 Hurricane Tracy destruction of its three Darwin xtrs (BBC MS 3/5) R. says they used to get 50 letters a year from China, but since opening a PO Box in Hong Kong they're getting 5000 a week, more than they can answer, so they have had to stop giving the box number on the air (Alan Roe, Herts, May REVIEW OF INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING) China hrd on 30027 kHz with Chinese-English lessons up to 0540 and closing after Chinese music at 0600 (Arthur Cushen, NZ)

COMORO ISLANDS Moroni, 7260, hrd with local mx and vernacular annts 1440; ID and fqy annt 1456, then xtr off in mid-pgm. Clear channel but for some jamming 31/3. Audible most nites with mx showing East African and sometimes slightly Indian influences - rather Malagasy in style. S/off varies between 1455 and 1500 (Robert Yeo, Victoria, May ADXN) Should be possible in WNAW a bit earlier (gh)

COSTA RICA R. Casino anc'd 17/4 that it would be off the air on MW & SW 1200-2400 Fri & Sat for duration of campaign to save electricity, but would continue on FM. 5955, 1175, 98 MHz (BBC MS 19/4)

CUBA RHC noted closing EG at 1800 on 2905k, presumably 3 x 9685 (SWNS) New time (gh)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC (Cf Apr LN-7) LVFA was heard 3/4 with band mx, IDs, SIO 423 on 4825 (John C. Merrill, Bartlesville OK, May ASWLG)

ECUADOR R. Quito has been jumping around between 4920 and 4875, but seems to have stabilized slightly on 4920. I hrd it on 4875 weekends, but usually 4920 rest of week (Kevin L. Meyer, Peru) R. Nacional Espejo, Puyo on 5040 is on the air only sporadically as the owner is more

interested in political activities than in broadcasting. R. Pastaza and Voz de Oriente have merged and can be hrd on 1370 and 3315 at 1100-0400 with 2 1/2 kW. R. Visión, Manta is on 650 and 6140 with 5 kW (Björn Fransson, Ecuador, SGDX 17/4) Ondas Cañarlas has reactivated 5046, hrd to 0330; Ondas Amayas 4980 can be heard after Torbes closes 0400. The WRTVH address for it is wrong, confused with R. Reloj, Cuenca (Jan Tunér, DX Juke Box 10/5) Since 23/4 R. Quito has been calling the Cadena del Triunfo, of which it is the key stn, "Cadena Ecuador Radio" instead (BEG MS 3/5)

EGYPT (Cf May LR-D-5) 29115, Voice of the Arabs, hrd 15/4 at 1544, when presumed fundamental 9705 was inaudible, sked 1500-1900 (Andy Sennitt, WDXC MM) So not Algeria as I thought (gh)

GUAM KTRR is in the clear J79 at *1100 Chinese on 11765 (Stu Klein, FL)

GUYANA (Cf May LN-4) GBS also says in QSL that 5950 uses vertical incident aerial arrays having a gain of apx 3 db (Nick Pappas, PA)

KOREA SOUTH R. Korea test xmsn previously on 6240 now on 6480, noted 14/4 with same long anmt by woman at 1931, off in mid-record 1933; not very strong, and spoiled by CW QRM (Sennitt, MM)

LAOS Houa Phan regional on new 6182, noted between 1300 and 1400 ex-6198 (Robert Yeo, Vic., R. Australia DX 22/4)

LESOTHO BEC WS J79 freq skeds show their new relay here on the air; used on FM only, 87776 kHz at 0400-2030, for Maseru area only. What's so important about having a local relay in Lesotho? I wish they'd put an FM relay on in Knoxville (gh)

LIBYA Unid Arabic stn hrd on 1610 12/4, 0333-0412, chanting, no mx, no IDs, some bad fades about every 10 minutes (Dave Valko, PA) Libya measured on 1611.0, hrd occasionally in the 0350-0420 f/out period in mid and late April, fully // 6206 (not 6205 and not 6210) and some nights neither is hrd (Bob Foxworth, NY) MoBo II hrd several times during April at SWNS HQ on 1611 before 0400. This xmttr serves as a good pilot stn for high band ECB TA openings. Meanwhile // 6205A noted with Islamic chanting before 0300 (C. M. Stanbury, SWNS)

MONGOLIA Have been hearing RUB at 1715 EG, and 1945-2015 FR on 8892, which may be unintended radiation of the first or an intermediate stage of the 17785 xmttr (Paul Karaglanis, England, SGDX 1/5) 8892 is one half of 17785, WRTH lists 8892, describing it as a 'possible overtone' from the 16m fq. Since there is no such thing as a 'half harmonic', Paul's explanation makes more sense (George Wood, SGDX Ed.) But I have seen copies of RUB's schedule actually listing 8892, tho maybe not currently (gh)

MOROCCO Rabat hrd on 19080, DS in AR, 1915 14/4 // 15160: 2 x 9540, just audible but unreadable thru QRM. 19080 was quite good (Andy Sennitt, World DX Club mid-monther April)

NETHERLANDS (Cf Apr LN-9) Per Madagascar data sheet, relay there uses the same audio process as to Bonaire, "MOTM"--modulation over two telephone lines, with the INTELSAT satellite. The upper audio frequencies are electronically lowered and remixed the same way it is done at Bonaire (Dean Fick, OH) Despite a claim by Ian McFarland on RCI DX Digest 13/5, quoting RN's rep in Canada that Bonaire is fed by satellite, not cable, the J79 R. Nederland EG pga guide reconfirms in an article that the "Columbus" sub-marine cable is indeed used to Bonaire. It is easy to check this yourself in the 2030 xmsn, as the audio on Bonaire fqs 21610 and 17810 is a word or so ahead of // Madagascar 11740 & 11730--more of a difference than the greater distance here from Madagascar than Bonaire would explain. But the additional 80,000 km out to synchronous orbit and back would nicely explain a delay of about 1/4 second. However, on 17/5 at 0730, Bonaire had lost the cable feed and had to play fill music; at 2330 18/5 on 6020 they appeared to be using an HF feeder instead (gh)

NICARAGUA R. Nicaragua hrd in SP 0800-0835 on 6116, SINPO 43333 (John Rossi, Ocean Springs MS) I don't know of any such stn, but there is a Nic listed on 6120; Colombia? (gh)

PARAGUAY returned to GMT -4 on 1/4, a month later than in previous years, due to a govt decree. The only stns currently active on SW are 5995 La Voz de Amanay, 6015 Emisora Paraguay, 6025 R. Nacional, 6110 R. Charitas. R. Nacional's 9735 xmttr is awaiting new tubes from USA (Tony Jones, Paraguay)

PERU You'll be lucky if you hit R. Sicuani. It has been moving up and down the band like mad these days. I once hrd it on 4965. R. Jaen seems to have had tech problems, with their signal popping on and off (Kevin L. Meyer, Peru) R. Qollasuyo, Juliaca, hrd 6/5 0407-0429 on 3250--fair sig, the bedevilled by high QRM levels. Mx ranging from US soul to soulful SP ballads--nothing sounded typically Andean. Lots of ads, mostly prerecorded. Definite ID at 0424; someone threw the switch in midword 0429 (Richard M. Utter, NY)

SA'UDI ARABIA Riyadh hrd on 6955 14/4 with HS in SSB // 15060, excellent till swamped by Peking 2000, but SSB still readable w/ Peking carrier (Andy Sennitt, WDXC MM)

SPAIN REE J79 sked shows trend to higher freqs, and no operations at all on 49m: (Bob Padula, Victoria) (Cf May LN-1) I recall that 9360 was used by RNE in EG in 1957-58, 2020-2100, beginning with an intro in the Irish lang, perhaps the only recorded use of Irish in international BCing, from outside Ireland. It was one of my favorite stns (Richard E. Wood, MO) Very interesting, but in current checks at 0515, I find nothing on 9360 (gh) REE has a mail drop for SP-speaking residents of NAM, CAM and Caribbean--Apt. 7-889, México 7, DF. (Miguel R. Naranjo Sarosa, Sancti Spiritus, Cuba, 31/3) Convenient, domestic postage, EG OK? (gh)

TAIWAN Central News Agency reported from Taipei 10/4 that AFNT stn would continue to operate after 15/4 as "Taipei International Community Radio". US gave AFNT equipment to the govt. American Chamber of Commerce in Taiwan would be in charge of day-to-day operations (BBC MS 19/4) Presumably MW only; for the record, as AFNT was once on SW (gh)

UGANDA A more-or-less chronological summary of the radio-related aspects of the fall of Amin: Radio Uganda has a reputation for outright fabrication (John Darnton, NY Times, 13/3) On 24/3 the UBC Nam svc announced that any citizen found collaborating with the enemy would be treated as a traitor. Citizens were asked to refrain from using any electricity. Entebbe airport and airspace closed, dusk to dawn curfew. 29/3 UBC said anyone violating Ugandan airspace would be shot down without warning. Mostly music, but on a few isolated days, regular pgs saying the army would 'fight to the last man' (Joe Tangredi, REVIEW OF INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING) From somewhere in hiding, Amin managed to interrupt an R. Uganda external service with an assertion that he was still in command. The tape, relayed from a mobile xtr that linked up with a broadcasting tower in Soroti in NE Uganda, was repeated several times (undated, unID press clipping) R. Uganda came on the air a quarter hour late this morning, broadcasting intermittently, only music. Incongruously, the music included "Mack the Knife", "Mrs. Robinson" and old favorites by Tennessee Ernie Ford (Jonathan C. Randal, Wash. Post, 10/4) Instead of usual martial music, and news they played music from "Oklahoma!" and "West Side Story" as well as Glenn Miller's "In the Mood," etc. (Carey Winfrey, NY Times, 10/4) The next morning Amin in his red sports car--flanked by a half dozen carloads of bodyguards--was seen coming from the direction of Tororo in eastern Uganda. "My guess is he'd been up in Soroti, where he organized to make radio broadcasts," a diplomatic source said. Since then Amin has made several broadcasts claiming he was in the Kampala studio. Radio employes, however, deny that he has been there. Various sources speculate he has been using the Soroti station or the mobile transmitters fitted into several of his cars. (unID undated press clip) Since amat 1259 11/4 that "Amin is no longer in power" Kampala DS on 5976 has IDed as Radio Uganda, rather than UBC. Currently on air 0300-1930, EG nx 0400 and other times. On 9/4 lis teners were urged to avoid listening 'to imperialist foreign radios who broadcast baseless and distorted info to cause confusion and unrest amongst the peaceful and progressive peoples of Uganda.' The ES xtr at Soroti, some 190 km NNE of Kampala, carried intermittent mx on 6030 10 to 12/4, not // 4976. Evening of 11/4 it broadcast an Amin speech. Suddenly left the air 12/4 1800 after ID at 1736 as "External service of Radio Station Kampala". Mx was hrd from a second Soroti xtr on 9515 1615-1700 12/4. No xmsns observed from Soroti since 1800 12/4 (BBC MS 19/4) At 1420 8/5 light mx on 6030 was interrupted as the announcer stated they were happy to inform listeners that they were now liberated, and thanked Presidents of Tanzania and Uganda and the Liberation Front Army for the wonderful job they had done. Then light mx continued as they were unable to get connections with the Kampala studios (BBC MS 10/5) For Reuter, Soroti did not fall to anti-Amin forces until about 27/4 (SWNS) VOA announced that Tanzanian troops reached Soroti 7/5, so it may not be long before we hear the external service of UBC again (Steve Webster, GMS) Any govt that would put up the money to resume R. Uganda ES would be an inconsiderate one. I hope we won't hear Uganda loud and clear in America for many years (Bruce Boomer, WV, RIB) As 15325-watchers noted, R Moscow quickly occupied the frequency. Tnx to Bob Foxworth for the press clippings cited above (gh)

U.S.A. WFT613, Traffic Information Radio at Greater Cincinnati Int'l Airport hrd for last month or two on 1610 kHz, ID is given by WCKY news guy, then female anc'r w/message lasting a minute or two; audio clarity varies, best after 0400 (Bill Coleman, Rocky Mount NC, 7/5) Another 1610 kHz outlet is KNBS24, it sounds like, IL Dept. of Always Advisory Radio, with two xtrs in parallel, one at each end of repair zone on Edens Expressway 12 mi from Riverside IL. Signals fair, repeated woman's voice loop (Earl Higgins, KX9DHA, 8/5)

U.S.S.R. R. Moscow's live coverage of the May Day parade was broadcast from Red Square in RS for domestic and overseas, and for the first time since 1969 in EG. RS relay lasted from 0650 to 0906, on 52 channels between 5.9 and 21.7 MHz. EG obe 0655-0730 on RMWS 27 SW fgs (BBC MS 3/5) In case you missed this, make a note for next May Day; and for the October Revolution parade in November (gh) RMWS undergoing heavy self-promotion, prizes of books, records, sets of postcards, offered to listeners who write in and tell about their favorite WS pgs; also "50th anniversary of RM" competition--when did you first hear RM? And why do you listen? Deadline 1/9 (Jay Novello, NY, 8/5) I tried Moscow's SSB xmsn on 7920 and mentioned it in a reception report. I have just hrd that it is used in a broadcast from the studio to a transmitter (Robert Fraser, Cohasset MA, 8/5) In which case it is not a broadcast, but point-to-point (gh) (Cf Apr LN-11) R. Moscow does not 'broadcast' on SSB like R. Sweden or SRI. All Moscow's SSB channels are feeders, registered as PTP with the ITU. So RM are correct in stating they do not broadcast in SSB (Gordon Darling, UK) Alma Ata hrd on 29800, 5 x 5960, weak but solid, 31/3 1400 local mx, IS and ID just like the good old days on 10530. Fundamental is never audible (Andy Sennitt, WDXC MM)

FUTURE PLANS BANGLADESH Per R. Bangladesh, an agreement was signed in Dacca 14/4 by the GE and a rep of a French firm for installation in Dacca of two 250-kW xtra and aerial systems (BBC MS 19/4) MW or SW? (gh)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC (Cf Apr LN-11) RTVD will soon start a SW service on 9505 and 5970 at 2300-0200 mainly in SP with SP-EG DX pgs Wed /GMT Thu/ 0030-0130. There will be pennants, QSL cards and tourist booklets. IRCs required for airmail reply. We appreciate your comments and reports, and accept cassettes (Teo Veras, Dir., RTVD IS, Box 969, Sto. Domingo, 26/3)

Teo Veras has resigned his post as director of the RTVD IS. A source at the govt stn gave this info to this column, saying that for several days, Dr. Bruno Pimentel, director-general of the organization, has had Veras' resignation letter. According to reports, Teo resigned because Dr. Pimentel did not want to consider suggestions made with respect to the RTVD SW transmissions. It happens that RTVD SW put a 50 kW xtr on the air, but on the same frequency is R. Moscow with 250 kW, which prevents our native station from being heard anywhere. R. Moscow is five times more powerful. Reports from the US indicate RTVD is very difficult to tune in, because of RM QRM. It was suggested that there was no point in operating on this frequency and that a new one should be sought. Since the management would not consider this, Teo resigned. This is the third important resignation during Pimentel's term. In none of these cases has he done anything to resolve the conflicts. The departure of Veras is an especially great loss, because this announcer has a lot of experience in producing international pgms at another station. Teo keeps informed on international radio, and maintains very important international contacts (Arte Nacional column by Joseph Cáceres in Sto. Domingo paper 8/5, via J. R. Cabrera) I'm afraid this is partly my fault, as I had been pushing for a frequency change; however, Moscow currently seems to be gone, and RTVD is being received well enough during its tests. I hope Teo will return and go ahead on 9505. The QRM problem was blown all out of proportion (gh)

GABON France-Inter reported that RFI ES was discussed at a 2/5 Council of Ministers meeting. In order to improve reception in Africa, it was hoped to make use of xtrs in Moyabi when agreement with the Gabonese govt had been reached. The Deputy Dir. said the Af svc was at present poorly received in the early morning and late evening since RFI has xtrs in France only, while other important broadcasters had relay stns. At one time, France operated a relay in Brazzaville, but it was nationalized in 1972/. A relay in Gabon would be a big step forward. Per AFP 8/5, the Gabonese President has said RFI would rent Moyabi IB Centre at certain times (BBC MS 10/5)

FRANCE More to above--the Deputy Dir said improvements could be made by broadcasting during the evening to NAM or by producing pgms especially designed for NAM listeners, not just France-Inter relays. It was also hoped the C&ESu svc could start earlier than 0500, when Muscovites are already at work. There should also be more pgms produced specifically for African listeners (BBC MS 10/5)

LIBERIA It would seem that AWR publicity about establishing a stn in Liberia is premature. There is no news here about any new radio stations. Only a few weeks ago, the govt said they had given no permission for a new stn. Whatever they have in mind, they are going it alone, as they have no contact with ELWA (Bart Bliss, ELWA Dir., via Jim Conrad, IA)

NAMIBIA Per R. RSA 27/4, the Administrator-General of SWA has proclaimed the establishment of the SWA Broadcasting Corp, to be all-commercial, and a SW xtr to be constructed near Windhoek to serve areas not covered by present VHF/FM net, initially relaying certain S&BC * pgms, but increasing production of local pgms (BBC MS 3/5) Chairman of SWA radio board said 1/5 that negotiations for building a SW xtr were well-advanced (BBC MS 10/5)

PANAMA The SW outlet for HOXO has been shelved for the present. If we do go on it will be in one of the tropical bands, I suppose (Bob Hall, P.D., HOXO, La Voz del Istmo, via James Smallwood, 7/5)

U S A VOA intends to go ahead with closure of Dixon and Bethany, despite some opposition. Closures are necessary to finance new permanent satellite pgs feeds for all relays except Colombo. It is proposed to discontinue Dixon from 2 Sept 1979, probably at 0700* AFRTS a/aff. From 1100 3/9, AFRTS to FE will be carried by Delano DL-4 and 5, 100 kW Problems for VOA Au svc, as DL does not have any 247° antennas, the a new 302° wideband curtain has recently been erected which can be slewed plus or minus 30°, so VOA may try it out for Au on 272°, centered on PNG. Also probably increased usage of Philippines for Au. Bethany closure is planned for Sept. 1980. The 50 kW ISB xtrs at both sites (DX-9 & 10, BY-9 & 10) will be moved to Greenville which will continue using ISB feeds as a backup to the satellites, but the AM xtrs at Dixon & Bethany will remain in mothballs and will not be moved to other sites (Robert Jones, May ADXN)

U S S R (Cf May LN-7) R. Moscow announced 14/4 that it would retain 1900-2000 time for GB&I service for time being. Retiming would be reconsidered for next winter sked (BBC MS 19/4)

VENEZUELA Per a note from R. Nacional, "Our new 1000 kW xtr is not yet installed and I doubt it will be functioning before the end of the year" (SWNS May) So the report of their being on 880 kHz must be erroneous (gh)

CLANDESTINE CRANNY Eight-One (cf May LN-10) "Ba Yi" hrd since 9/3 on 12120 at 1230-1700. Probably controlled by the Vietnamese govt (Shigenori Aoki, Nagoya, Japan, SGDX 24/4) Obs since 11/4 on 12120. On 12/4, 1240-1447 it relayed a number of 5-min xms in Std. Chinese; breaks were as short as one minute. 13/4, xmsns 1300-1539 were 9 mins long, consisting of two 4-min talks separated by a minute's silent carrier. All xmsns appeared identical. Each pgs attacked policies of Chinese Vice-Premier Deng Xiaoping and ended with this annt: "The foregoing is a broadcast of the 1st August Radio Station" (Std. Ch: Yi shang shi ba yi dian tai de guang bo) (BBC MS 19/4) Recent xmsns 14 mins long, at various times 1200-1600; not obs 21 & 22/4. possibly indicating that they are written by non-Chinese. Technical obs indicate the xtr could be located beyond the borders of NE China (BEC MS 26/4) Last obs 23/4 (BEC MS 3/5)

Voice of Democratic Kampuchea, pro-Pol Pot regime, believed to be in China, first obs 16/1/79 operates in Cambodian as follows for 55 min each: 0400 17705 11725, 0900 15600 11980, 1200 11990 11660 11600, 2330 11685 9470 (BEC MS 5/79) 11660 is an unannounced freq, and also hrd at 2330 (Shigenori Aoki, 27/4, DX Front Line)

Voice of Burmese People still following monthly sked change pattern last reported on 6304. On 5/11, daily at 0030-0130-unconfirmed, and 1200-1300 in Burmese on Su/Tu/Th/Fr, in Jingpaw --also known as Kachin--on Mon, Shan Wed (these two langs unconfirmed) and in Std. Chinese on Sat (Isao Ugusa, DX Front Line 3/5)

Voice of the Namibian People's source of support for 7180 kHz broadcasts continues the subject of speculation. The prime candidate is the breakaway group SWAPO Democrats, a.k.a. SWAPO-D, a leader of which is Andreas Chipanga, recently released from detention in Tanzania (For disagreeing with the official SWAPO line?) (John Campbell, Apr ISWCI SW News)

Zimbabwe People's Revolutionary Voice (ZPRV) via reactivated R. Zambia ES 7250, hrd 16/4 0628 opening with recording of machine-gun fire, pgm prepared by the Publicity & Info Bureau of the Patriotic Front of Zimbabwe, with nx in EG, Ndebele and Shona. At closing 0730 referred listeners to next ZPRV pgm at 'half past six' (local) via R. Nacional de Angola, which however continues to be broadcast at 1700-1730 (BEC MS 19/4) Continues at 0615-0730, however inaudible at times due to QRM; 22/4, interfering stn was dominant and announced as "the General Service of R. Zambia broadcasting from Lusaka". However, QRM is similar to that currently degrading the Voice of Zimbabwe pgm relayed by R. Mozambique at 1800 on 4855 & 3265 (BEC MS 26/4)

R. Sandino hrd w/excellent sig 29/4 on 7587. At tune-in, ID w/tape of K-37 machine gun. Gave sked 1730 & 2300 Nicaraguan time, "la voz de todos los nicaraguenses derechos" (Earl Higgins, IL) Hrd 1/5 0446 on 7586, SIO 333; spirited remarks against Somoza; bits and pieces of Latin mx along with singing by a chorus featuring revolutionary type mx. Many IDs and parts of Schubert's "Marche Militaire" several times; suddenly off at 0504 (Bob Donly, SG, SPEEDXGRAM) Noted at 0400-0500 on 7600 (Jan Tuner, DXJB 10/5) Rounded-off freq? (gh) I heard them 7/5 announcing that in the next few days they would use a new freq in the 49m band: (Jose Rhamades Cabrera, Sto Domingo, Dominican Rep.) Also said they had decided to increase power (BEC MS)

Numbers On 16/4 to 0050* on 7444, "KPO2" repeated over and over amid QRM 4/5 on 4670 *0400, "649" repeated thrice in SF, then count 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 0, local quality sig to 0408 tune out, in 4-digit groups at 0417 (Jay Novello, NY)

"JONT-FM" was a 20-watt FM pirate in Nishi-Tokyo on 81.25 MHz, midway between two legit Tokyo stns, covering a 30-40 km radius; run by two college students; quite popular with jr & sr hl school students; operated for 3 months and received about 600 letters and cards from listeners Hachioji City police busted them Tuesday. Punishment is a maximum fine of ¥50,000 or a max prison sentence of one year (Asahi, 12/4, via Bill Yohana, NJ)

R. Tic-Tac (?) New French pirate hrd Sun 22/4 0800-1000 on 6282, also anc'd special FM outlet for Paris region (Thomas Drescher, GFR, RVDXW 30/4)

Diamond Radio, the Voice of Rosck, new stn first hrd 22/4 1030 60 watts on 6278, nom 6277. Gave an address in Holland (Oscar Hansson, RVDXW)

R. Oxygene International is a new Swedish stn, 22/4, 1000-1045 on 6231, mainly disco-soul, 100 W (Oscar Hansson, RVDXW)

R. Galaxy, new pirate on "41m, 6940" hrd on 6939 19/4 0445-0515 with rock mx, claiming 1000 watts; also 8/5 0025-0104* with British accent claiming to be in (New?) Mexico. Said would be back on Saturday but wasn't. At first, USB, then more like RCSSB. May have mentioned Reynosa or similar-sounding city; another time claimed 850 watts on an RCA xtr (Walcutt, TX)

"HOOP", Hoople, ND (after P.D.Q. Bach) hand-drawn stuffer for unsolicited First Day Cover says 50 watts, 7425 kHz, Sats at 0600 GMT, relayed via Fernwood OH (gh)

"KVHF" on 6430a, hrd 0223-0700 12/5 with rock songs, oldies, C&W, IDs "You're listening to KVHF, for a festival of hits" and "You're listening to KVHF broadcasting(?) to (or from?) South America" Otherwise very little talk (Terry Concannon, Whittier CA)

Clear Channel 85 hrd on 3813a, probably hams, faking xmsns, "We are broadcasting from the cave! whoops! the stalagmites (sic) are starting to drop" "This is the WDO-W3WDO Clear Channel 85!" mentioned "BMT". They also told of old pirates. No records but many sound effects and one belch (Dave Hascall, Fortville IN) Checked 3850-3900 area 14/4 at 0300 and came across some rock mx on 3885-6. Ancr came on after song and said was going for more records, then turned off xtr like a ham would after a QSO. Half an hour later, a couple of hams were on, one pretty foul-mouthed, with same signal strength as before. This was an AM ham net freq amidst a pile of SSB 'slop buckets'. Maybe they're responsible for pirate activity (Brett Saylor, Altoona PA)

Voice of Venus Recheck May LR-C-1 for test dates and times (gh) VOV will be on the loop every Sunday night 0600-0615, 212-283-9979. They had said they were going to quit broadcasting until June, but changed mind and were back on. Last pgm better organized (F. Schumacher)

"CFAB", Fruitland ON, 1620, QSLed on 3 x 5 index card. Said mine was the only report sent to him before the feds warned him to stop transmitting. V/s John Reid. Card came from 1363 Logan Ave in Winnipeg. Doug Miske says this is an empty building with a mailbox (Greg Wilson, May DX Ontario)

"WIZN", 1620 kHz on Long Island, hrd 8/2 0125-0200, Don Kirby & Scott the Watt are DJ, Top 40 mx, no phone, bad audio, talked about WFAT and WSCS. I only got them once (Stephen D Ehrbar, Nesconset NY, IRCA DX Monitor 5/5)

"WFAT" Yes, 15/4 at 4:40 AM we heard those fatal knocks on the door. Larry McRae and I, Hal Hall, decided that since two months ago we spotted the FCC cars parked outside the FAT studio just as we were about to go on the air and as we learned later, in one of those cars was Wayne McGee, an FCC agent, waiting for us to go on the air so he could bust us. We went off the air for about two months. So on Friday April 13, Larry and I and Frank Footer decided to go on the air for a "Good-bye for now Show". About 15 minutes after we started taking calls, Larry and I both heard noises outside the FAT studios. Larry immediately handed the phone to me and looked out the window. What he saw was a light blue station wagon with two men taking equipment out of the back. We said our last good-byes and shut down and dismantled the station. Three minutes later, was the knock on the door. Two agents came in and took some information and left. That was just 15 hours ago. We still have the mailing address open if you would like to write for info or anything else--WFAT, 1637-77 St., Brooklyn NY 11214. We will be setting up phone lines for you to call up and talk to us too. WFAT was on 1628 kHz, with 60-100 watts to an end-fed Zeppelin, horizontal at 120 feet. First sked broadcast 11:30 pm 31/12/77 to 6 am 1/1/78. Last sked broadcast, 15/4/79 2:45 pm-4:40 am. Staff: Larry McRae, Pres & GM; Hal Hall VP, Air Personality; Fat Frank Footer, PD, AP and Alcoholic (sic) (via Charley Hoffman, PA) Listened to their "Farewell for Now" show. They seemed to be worried about adverse publicity of pirates in the NY Times, and the strain on their health keeping those late hours (not to mention on mine listening to them!). Really professional-sounding outfit, including singing IDs. Still maintaining that the area needs this kind or radio, asking if communicating was a crime (Brett Saylor, Altoona Pa.) "Larry McRae" is Perry Cavalieri (misspelled in May LN), and "Hal Hall" is John Calabro, both of whom formerly ran "WCFR". Cavalieri said FAT is dead for him, but Calabro notes that he himself has never been warned. The FCC's current crackdown on pirates has been very effective, according to one addict listener who knows where to comb the AM and FM dials. This fan has logged two dozen pirates in recent years in the New York area, only to hear them disappear one by one. WFAT was the best lately, and the listening now is very thin, according to his log (Francis X. DXing the LOW-POWERED CANADIANS

For the past five months or so I have been pursuing the Canadian local outlets on 49 meters. I finally logged the most recalcitrant of the lot about a month ago, and all have now verified except CHNX. For those who lack one or more of the seven sisters one or two tips might be helpful. My observations hold for the midwest (Kansas is about as mid as one can get), but should apply elsewhere to a greater or lesser extent. I treat the stations in what I found to be increasing order of difficulty.

CFRX Toronto, QNT, 6070 is easy late at night around 0800 GMT, give or take a couple of hours. Often audible other times as well. ID is CFRB with occasional CFRX ID's played in the middle of songs. News on the hour.

CHNX Halifax, NS, 6130, is in the clear from before 0500 (Deutsche Welle fadeout) until 0600, after which HCJB shares the channel but is often overridden. As the days shorten next autumn try 2300 (GBS s/off) to 2400 (VOA s/on). ID is CHNS, and format is top 40 pops with news on the hour.

CFXC Montreal, QUE, 6005, is not easy; good selectivity is important. ECSS-LSB gets rid of some of the splatter from R. Reloj on 6006. The frequency is used by European broadcasters during the evening, so reception is best well after 0600. CFCX beams 340/160 degrees (NNW/SSE) and is pretty well shadowed into parts of the midwest. Reloj occasionally goes off the air for an evening or two and then is the time! ID is CFCF; format is pop music with a late night phone-in show. News on the hour.

CKFX Vancouver, BC, 6080, is completely in the clear from 0730 (VOA s/off) until about 0930 daily. If you hear a weak signal with snatches of country music programming—that's it. Just relax and wait for the ID. Sooner or later, that night or some other, it will be audible. Their ten watts sounds like half a KW; they've often been S7 or 8 this spring. ID is CKWX, and there are always at least three ID's during the news, the first five minutes of each hour, one at the beginning and two at the end.

CFVP Calgary, ALTA, 6030, is tough. The only window is between 0700 (AFRTS s/off) and 0855 (R. Japan s/on). During this period it is covered by someone's unmodulated carrier. Some nights CFVP overrides and can be logged with top 40 pops and news on the hour. Other nights they appear briefly when the interfering carrier fades, so the time to watch for them is when the S-meter takes a dip. ID is CFCN, oft repeated.

The two CBC outlets on 6160 present special problems, chief amongst which is Emisora Nueva Granada, the 10 KW Colombian which dominates the channel. When ENG is off the air, which it has been most of the winter and spring, try the following times:

CKZN ST. Johns, NFLD, 6160, is best at s/on, 0927 daily. It can often be heard earlier in the evening mixing with the Russian service from VOA Woodferton around 0300-0500, s/off. Full ID's at s/on and s/off with "CBC radio" common at other times. If the Colombian is off the air, CKZN is easy and should be ranked just after CHNX for accessibility. Otherwise, good luck.

CKZU Vancouver, BC, 6160, is a real bear. It should be in the clear from around 0700 (Algiers fade out) until 0900 s/off. But it isn't; it is covered by an unmodulated carrier (I suspect CKZN's but can't be sure). If the Colombian is off the air, CKZU can be expected to break through once or twice a month around s/off time. ID is generally "CBC radio" with full ID as CBU, etc. at s/off.

Both CBC outlets sign off with "O Canada" followed by "God Save the Queen". CKZN/CBN signs on with "O Canada" and the provincial hymn.

On April 24, 1979 reception conditions were such that I was able to log all seven stations in the one and a half hour period between 0800 and 0930 GMT. Now if CHNX will only verify... (Robert L. Rankin, Lawrence KS)

Tropical DX Newsletter I hear is kaput but no details known. No issues received for a couple of months (Foxworth)

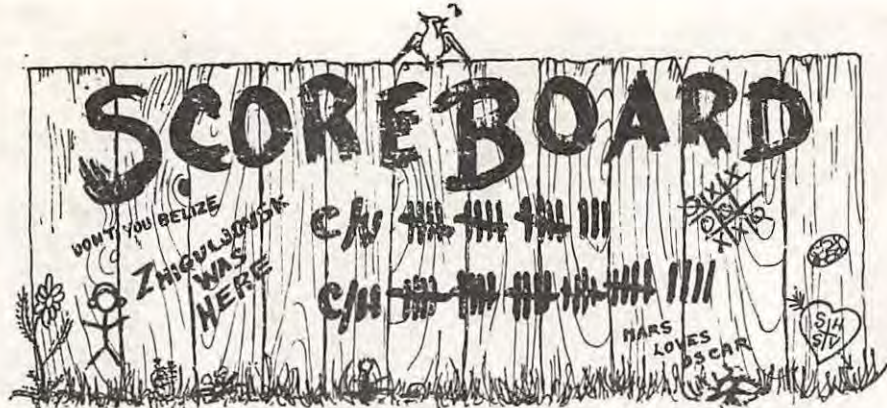

Officially this new section is only a trial, but I believe it will be able to stand on its own and become permanent. I can state from experience that the number of reports for the old "D", month after month, amount to as many as the other three sections combined. While this does not imply anything about the quality of the loggings, the fact is that there are so many reports for 17700 and above that 80% of the editor's time is spent on sorting out the items by frequency country etc. -- rather than on actual editing and typing. The original sections were divided by frequency when NASWA had, maybe, 850 members. But now there are 2000 and there is a definite tendency for new members to prefer the higher frequency bands in their reports. So the situation is that "D" has become too big a job for one person; we are going to try doing it this way. Music Page

Just about anywhere that shortwave programming is discussed at length, it is inevitable that a number of people indicate that listening in on a foreign country's regional transmission is preferable to listening to the same country's foreign service because there is a more ethnic flavor, and--thank heaven--less of the Western music that seems to have invaded the world, especially annoying with the current wave of disco music. These people never tire of relating the thrills of catching an African regional and admit great fascination with their traditional music.

Strange? Not at all, you might say--this is the very essence of the "DX bug", the motivation to seek that which is new, to adventure into that which is not familiar... Yet in a way, it is strange for there is as much difference between disco and traditional African music as there is between the computer and the abacus, or between a Cadillac and a Model T: one is simply an evolved version of the other.

When one looks at "Western music" from an historical standpoint, it should be hard to see that the term "Western music" is at best an indefinite catchall term used to refer to whatever is currently popular with North American/European recording industry. Go back far enough, and "Western music" was nothing more than your medieval troubador armed with nothing more sophisticated than lyre or lute, the predecessor of the Renaissance style, which borrowed a bit from the Greeks, which proceeded to lead to the Classics of Bachs day...which somehow never made it across the Atlantic successfully with the Europeans when they colonized North America where survival was the name of the game rather than preservation of a growingly distasteful culture that was eventually rebelled against.

With a musical mainstay of hymns and home-made folk songs in North America and nothing but Classical music in Europe, how on earth was rock, then disco, born?

Blame it on the slave trade of the 1800's. Yes--Africa.

Recall a previous Music Page that described most sub-Saharan music as being based on a difficult-to-shift pentatonic scale that translated to the European music system as sharps and flats (basically speaking). When Africans started coming into North America and Europe it was of utmost necessity for them to learn European languages and European ways, and the simplest European/American types of music to learn was the hymn. However, it was difficult for the slaves to learn the hymns as they were written because they simply weren't used to the European idea of note progression and they would sing a note here and there as either too sharp or too flat...leading to the development of the "Negro Spiritual" and the standard four-bar blues. "Soul" came into being, and the European (white) saw it was good and incorporated it into his own music, especially in the United States where we will now focus our attention because its development of the recording industry had developed to be a world influence in conjunction with its developments in electronic communication.

Blacks became entertainers on plantations, the "jesters of the court" so to speak, as well as laborers, and in an effort to artistically thumb their noses at their masters, slaves invented the "jam session" the purpose of which was to make musical noise--and for some reason or other it caught on as major entertainment on showboats. You know it as "dixieland" music. Jazz had similar beginnings, when blacks were looking for another means of nose-thumbing and came out with a more involved study of disharmony and expression of soul...which again caught on with the white population.

Yet in the early days of the recording industry the nearest thing to a black performer was Al Jolson, while composers like Scott Joplin went undiscovered until recently. Bing Crosby, the Andrews Sisters, Glenn Miller...just about anywhere you turned for music those days, you could find the traditional African sharp/flat characteristic used as a technique of vocal expression, if not outright borrowing of the four-bar blues, jazz, and dixieland. Then inroads were made into the entertainment world by "Jelly Roll" Morton of boogie-woogie renown, Louis Armstrong, Billie Holiday...

Popular music, folk music, country/western, and soul--classifications of music familiar to us in the USA, classifications that really aren't well-defined these days as they used to be because of all the intra-company material cross-over--all have exhibited some version of blues and other black music technique, like Elvis Presley who made hit after hit in each of the above-mentioned classifications by extensive use of black-style music (and dance, in his films). And so it was, even to today--whatever was

popular on the soul scene was later adapted to the popular/rock scene.

And that brings us to disco. The Afro-American had his version of it a good while before the Euro-American decided he could make money on it by turning it into what the Afro-American terms "blue-eyed funk"--alias "disco". And it all came about due to yet another black music experiment in going back to traditional African beats and dances while retaining essences of the Afro-American experience.

Are you one of those who doesn't like the "disco craze"? You are not alone--you have company with those from whom it was borrowed. Does it sound like a re-run of the era when the watusi took over the twist which took over the jitterbug which took over two-by-two dancing? You're right, it is. Yet disco, a type of music that can't be fully appreciated if it isn't danced to, is apparently a world-wide popular success especially with the under-25 segment of the population as they are more prone to "strut stuff" than those in their prime (though I've seen exceptions up to the age of eighty!). Perhaps it's because it's just plain fun, so think twice about what you may possibly be missing by avoiding it!

THE KOTO

Let's take a brief look at a string instrument which most of us confess to know little about: The koto. What does the koto look like and when and where did it originate? The instrument averages about six feet in length and ten inches in width, and has thirteen strings of wound starched silk of equal thicknesses. There are thirteen small bridges, one for each of the strings.



Tuning is changed by shifting the movable bridges to a new position. The strings are struck with three ivory picks which are attached to the thumb, forefinger, and middle finger of the player's right hand.

If you've never seen a koto before and are still puzzled by this brief description, check with one of your DX friends who collects QSL cards. Your friend's collection might include a very beautiful color card of a "Doll Modeled After A Court Lady Playing the Koto" from Radio Japan.

Japan, by the way, is only part of the answer to the question "when and where did it originate?" The exact date of origin is not known, but it can be safely said that the koto is one of the oldest musical instruments in the world. The instrument originated in China and its introduction to Japan is also filled with much mystery. This much is known: China presented a koto as a tribute to the Japanese Todaiji Temple constructed in 755 AD. Later a certain Sadatoshi Fujiwara travelled to Japan and taught koto techniques learned in China.

My first experience with the koto was in 1971-73 while stationed with the U.S. Army on the island of Okinawa. Countless hours were spent on guard duty with a Japanese counterpart whose portable radio would be tuned to a local NHK station with endless hours of koto classical music. I must admit that at first I disliked the strange sounds emitted by this strange oriental instrument, accompanied by gongs, drums, and the samisen, a form of banjo which usually accompanies the koto.

You too can experience this unique music. Try tuning to the international and domestic services of China and Japan, and you may become hooked on the fascinating music of the Orient.
