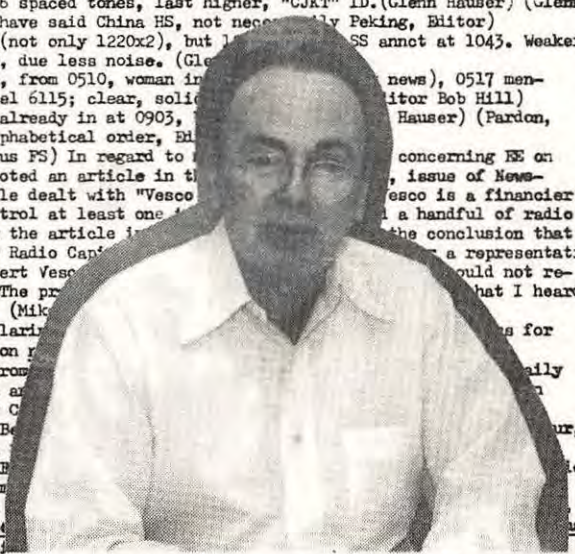

BOB PADULA AWARDED THE MEDAL OF THE ORDER OF AUSTRALIA

The following article appears in the July issue of Australian DX News.

The Queen's Birthday Honours List contained an award which honours not only a dedicated DXer and founder member of ARDXC, but also the hobby of shortwave DXing itself.

Bob Padula was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (O.A.M.) in the Honours List announced by the Office of the Governor General on 13 June 1981. Bob of course not only is a founder-member of ARDXC, but has had most to do with the growth of ARDXC over the years, and the recognition the DX hobby has gained in Australia.

It is believed to be the first occasion on which any DXer has received an honour purely for service to our hobby, and so is an honour not only unique in Australia, but also in the world.

Members of ARDXC will be well aware of Bob's efforts both within and outside the club, such as in his many articles covering the hobby and many of its aspects in the ADXN and in commercial radio magazines.

I am sure I speak for all DXers when I say congratulations to Bob Padula on his O.A.M. award, and I believe this is just recognition for his efforts for the DXing hobby over the past 16 years.

This is indeed a singular honor and we wish to join our Australian friends in offering congratulations to Bob Padula and to thank him for his many fine contributions to FRENDX.

A HISTORY OF THE NORTH AMERICAN SHORTWAVE ASSOCIATION By Don Jensen

Part Two, NASWA: The Middle Years, 1967-1972

In late 1966, the North American Short Wave Association switched from a general DXing club to all-SWBC. It also changed its initials from NASA to NASWA, to prevent confusion, club executive William P. Eddings said, with the national space agency.

The switch to all shortwave broadcast coverage in FRENDX was a major one that quickly made NASWA a leader in the hobby world, not just another club. It brought a number of changes to FRENDX. Feature articles took on a greater importance in Shortwave Center, along with interviews with radio-related personalities beyond the confines of DXing: amateur radio operator Barry Goldwater; then VOA director John Chancellor; New York Times Radio critic Jack Gould; William Haligan, head of the Hallicrafters Co.

FRENDX included a regular ANARC report. That interclub organization had begun to turn from its original role as peacemaker in the hobby to one of aiding the individual listener by serving as lobbyist with broadcasters and manufacturers. Two active ANARC committees were the Frequency Recommendation group, headed by Richard Wood, and the Manufacturers Liaison committee, chaired initially by C.F. Stanbury II.

Another new feature in FRENDX was the Flash Sheet, a collection of last minute tips by Indiana DXer, A.R. (Al) Niblack. Ultimately it would become today's Update, although it would be years before the midmonth version would be added.

In general, the improved FRENDX was the result of more input by more sub editors, who gained greater independence as the editorial roles were sorted out.

In February 1967, Eddings reported that the club had been contacted by Radio Nederland's Harry Van Gelder, who was seeking a North American member to tape a monthly DXnews segment for the station. The following month, Eddings announced: "On recommendation of NASWA, Harry Van Gelder, Radio Nederland, has accepted and approved Glenn (Hauser) for this position." Hauser would continue to tape these programs for many years.

A candidate for election as member of the NASWA Board noted, in early 1968, that FRENDX was well established as THE "journal for DXers." He noted five years earlier, when he joined, there had been five members with more than 100 countries verified. This had grown, he noted, until the number is "now five times as many."

But was the casual listener, the SWL interested in programs, not DX, the beginner being overlooked? It would become an even greater concern later, but in 1968 it was beginning to worry Eddings.

He editorialized: "Within the ranks of SWBCers are those with particular interests which they consider to be the best, the more important, the most worthwhile. Some seek nothing but rare DX, some prefer to just SWL in general,

others mainly quest Q&As. In cases, certain of these groups do not 'recognize' the others. They look down on them. This is, "Eddings concluded in his often unique writing style, "unrood."

Bill Eddings loved to write homely little editorials in support of his view of the hobby, and people in general. His style had odd quirks, filled with coined words and slash marks. Sometimes he seemed to feel NASWA was growing beyond his death.

"I never was and I never claimed to be (a top DXer)," he wrote. "Somehow I hope to think I did a bit of good somehow...that in the days to come, there will (be those who remember that NASWA)...was once run by an obscure, humble Q" who wanted nothing but friendship and goodwill between those he came to know as brothers...."

NASWA was continuing to grow in size, beyond 500 members, a very large club a decade ago. Features section editors changes from time to time, including Richard Wood, William Matthews, Ralph Perry, Al Sizer. LR sections headed by Del Hirst, Jerry Berg, Dan Ferguson and in later years by a number of others as the log was broken into component parts to ease the work load. After a brief discussion in early 1968, LR changed from a "by time" listing of loggings to a "by frequency" approach.

But the workload on Eddings was growing with membership. It was later estimated that in years of producing FRENEX bulletins by mimeograph, the executive editor-publisher cranked the handle some 100,000 times. The administrative chores, keeping track of subscriptions also increased. Then there was the labor of love for Bill Eddings, personally answering all the mail that arrived at the Altoona headquarters.

By the middle of 1969m FRENEX was containing pleas by Eddings for more volunteer help. By 1970, a career Navy man, Ed Shaw, stationed in California, then Norfolk, Va., was taking an increasing role in the production of FRENEX.

On Oct. 16, 1970, an overworked Eddings suffered a heart attack. Since the administration and production of the bulletin had been -- at Eddings' insistence -- totally centralized at Altoona, club operations halted abruptly. There was no November 1970 bulletin. But Shaw stepped in and published a December bulletin. Headquarters temporarily moved to Norfolk in January 1971, where the first two bulletins of that year were published.

By March, Eddings had recovered sufficiently to resume operations, although Shaw became corresponding secretary, taking over much of the administrative burden. Eddings was happy to be back at the helm. NASWA seemingly had weathered a storm. Bill proclaimed himself recovered and feeling well. In July he scorned rumors that NASWA was about to merge with another club.

The longtime Newsroom column, essentially information about new station schedules, was expanded in content and renamed by its new editor, Dan Ferguson. At first called Listener's Digest, it was soon modified to Listeners' Notebook.

Just before Christmas 1971, however, Eddings returned to the hospital for surgery. In the December FRENEX, he repeated -- for the last time -- his traditional Christmas editorial, based on a favorite theme of an old timer passing along his knowledge and friendship to a beginner. It had been one of his pet topics. The same editorial had appeared annually for a number of years.

The publication again shifted to Norfolk and Shaw for the January and February 1972 issues, during the hospitalization and recovery of Eddings.

In March 1972, Dan Ferguson became the FRENEX publisher and introduced a most important change. That issue was the first published by offset printing, not mimeo, in the current booklet size and format. Costs were greater, but professional printing was the only way a major club could operate without putting an impossible load on a publisher. Eddings remained as editorial director, but never did return to active operation of the club, due to his health problems.

Ferguson had taken on the job of organizing the publication. But he found himself, in effect, running the club.

An early discovery was that Eddings was no business manager. The club, never a financial pillar of strength, was limping from month to month. It literally was necessary for the new members to be enrolled each month in order to finance the publication of the next month's bulletin. NASWA had a case of "waling bankruptcy."

An immediate dues increase from \$7 to \$10 a year was instituted in April 1972. It helped. In time, NASWA would become fiscally healthy.

A few additions to the FRENEX staff that spring and summer included Larry Magne as LR editor, and later clandestine section specialist. Shaw created a popular question and answer column that kept him in close touch with the membership. Shaw shared Eddings' conviction that NASWA had a teaching job to do where younger members were concerned.

Despite health problems in the preceding couple of years, it still came as a surprise and shock to members to learn, in the September 1972 FRENEX that

Bill Eddings had died on August 23, at the age of 51.

Like all persons, he was not without his faults. But he had accomplished a very great deal in building an insignificant hobby club into perhaps the best example of its kind in the world. He had put much of himself into NASWA along the way, not the least of which was his time, well over two normal working weeks, 80 plus hours, of his "square time," monthly.

He was proud of the result, but he always had a tinge of regret because the size and complexity diminished the small club folksiness he relished. But even as NASWA grew and improved in quality, he tenaciously had insisted that the personal touch of friendliness remain, regardless of the amount of members. Bill Eddings' spirit of Unity and Friendship remain in the club today.

A fitting eulogy was a line from a poem which must have been one of his favorites, since he printed it three times in FRIENDX between 1964 and 1968:

"And when, in time, it be willed that I must leave, let me then deserve to hear my friends say, a Mighty Tree has fallen."

SOUTH AMERICA

"THE CITY OF ETERNAL SUMMER" By Pitt McNeil

While I was in Cusco, I met several people who originally hailed from Quillabamba who told me I should visit the town if possible. It also had a couple of stations worth visiting. But the real clincher in my decision to go there was that it was off the beaten track--way off. The ever authoritative South American Handbook simply said the railroad was being extended

there, that it had a Dominican mission and there was a hotel on the square. Nothing more. Gotta be worth a looksee.

No buses went there from Cusco, but the railroad extension had been finished less than three months previous. Quillabamba, being situated due north of Cusco, was 80 km onward from the site of Machu Picchu. The only train going there was the infamous local train, which only hard-core backpack gringo types take to M-P, while the softies take the sterile Tourist Train, costing about eight times as much. I was on the local train and believe me, there is a lot of local color, the passengers about 95% Peruvian, mainly people from the countryside going back home for the weekend (this was a Friday) after a week of work in Cusco. It was a 7½ hour journey, following the Urubamba River much of the way. After Machu Picchu, when all the few gringos--except me--got off, the scenery got breathtaking, jagged towering mountains now taking on lush vegetation as we descended in altitude, with the whitewater rushing river always close within view.

After being used to the cooler temperatures of the high sierra, the temps seemed downright hot, leaving me sweaty in my sierra layered clothing. We finally rolled into the railroad station, an improvised affair. After crossing the "peones" foot bridge, over the now calm Urubamba, I negotiated along with everyone else, the winding flight of some 100 odd steps, and came upon the "Plain of the Moon" -- which is what the name means in English.

Quillabamba is a small town, perhaps 15,000 people, whose famous slogan is "la ciudad de verano eterno" -- the city of eternal summer. At an altitude of 1052 meters the town never gets cold, even during the normal winter. The plaza is the center of town, and is one of the nicer ones I saw in Peru, with colorful shrubs and flowering trees garnishing it. And appropriately in this small out of the way town is one of the smaller, more out of the way stations on SW in Peru. Facing the south side of the plaza, with a pale blue front that looks like a gargae door, is Radio Difusora La Convencion. The name is painted on the front, with the call letters and frequency as 3.335 MHz.

There's a door in this facade, that opens up to the "office" of the station, but the real way to get to the station's studios is to go through the open door to the side, under a Coca Cola sign. This leads to an open courtyard, shared with the neighbors, and their various kids and animals. Back here is a sort of one story addition, which somewhere else in the world might have been a garage, but here is the home of the studios of Radio Difusora La Convencion. Two turntables, a fancy Akai reel-to-reel, a simple console, a modest record collection, and a clock with the wrong time adorn the one room studio.

The whole station has a rather informal air about it. People drift in and out, and there are various part time DJs. They announce 3.3 MHz, say they are on 3.335 MHz, and admit they probably are somewhere near 3552 kHz--but it really doesn't matter to them, because they consider themselves rather insignificant in the radio spectrum of life, and let's face it, how many Quillabambinos have R390As to measure the frequency? That's their view, at any rate. Their main information on where they are frequency-wise comes from

DXers--mainly Scandanavians. (Editor's note: Indeed, when I first heard this one a couple years back and sent them a report, they sent me a letter verie indicating my report was correct, but they were somewhat surprsied that I had heard them at a distance from their frequency! hi john)

The station is named after the province, La Convencion, of which Quillabamba is capital. They say they have about 1 kw, but that a 5 kw transmitter is on order from Germany. It may be, but I'd bet a bundle of money the 5 kwer won't be on the air for many a moon, if ever. All types of music are played--criolla, tropical, folkloric, and US pop stuff, which is mainly disco. A friend in town, for example, has his own program Sunday mornings--the Sunday Music Fever Program, featuring the latest disco from the States, which is on a 6 month delayed basis before it hits Peru, apparently. (Editor's note: It should be noted here that Pitt visited this one about two years ago, so they are most likely out of their Disco period by now. Disco is dead, isn't it?)

The station in town, however, is Radio Quillabamba, a high powered outlet run by the Dominican padres who have a mission here. It's located on the other side of this small town, near the mission, but in a separate building, which also houses the Investigator Police (versus the Guardia Civil). Being a weekend when I was in 'Bamba for the mostpart (I arrived midday Friday), the station offices were all closed up, and there was a particularly persistent cop who didn't want me to go inverstigating for the studio. So I satisfied myself with hearing the station "like a local," listening to songs such as Rod Stewart's "Do You Think I'm Sexy" and Donna Summer's "Hot Stuff" on the Holy Fathers' radio station.

THE SHORTWAVE CENTER INTERVIEW: Gordon Darling

(Editor's notes: Gordon Darling is a very well-known dxer who just happens to also be employed by the BBC Monitoring Service. He has long been noted for his work at a radio for his esteemed employer, and also for his own personal enjoyment. We sent Bill Whitacre off in search of an interview with Gordon. A top-flight dxer in his own right, Bill needs no introduction to these pages. Over the years, however, he has spent considerable time in England, becoming friends with Gordon Darling and other English hobbyists along the way. A more obvious and finer choice for an interviewer was not possible. My thanks go out to Bill for doing this interview, and to Gordon for taking time out from a busy schedule to answer Bill's questions. Want to know what it's like to work at the radio all day and then come home and turn it on for enjoyment? Read on...

SWC: On behalf of John and myself welcome to SWC. How did you get started in DXing and what are your major interests?

Darling: I first got involved in listening due to my father's interest in Amateur Radio, TV and Electronics and my first introduction to "DXing" was whilst idly tuning a portable across the medium wave band late one evening. I came across Lille in France on 1376 kHz carrying an English programme after the close-down of the normal French domestic service. They were asking for reception reports so I wrote. (I shudder to think what that first report was like, hi!) That was in 1962, and I've been collecting pretty postcards ever since! Main interests then as now are ECB and SWBC DX.

SWC: Good, can you tell us something of the differences in reception from Europe and the states?

Darling: I'm not sure that the differences are that great. In general terms, reception is easier for US DXers of Pacific area stations but that advantage is outweighed by European listeners better reception of the sub-continent area. Overall any location has equally balanced advantages and disadvantages, as, for example, NAM DXers can hear PNG locals at 1200 GMT in the appropriate season. I can't but I can hear them at 2000 GMT when NAM DXers cannot. The one obvious difference is that in Europe 7, 9 and 11 MHz are far more crowded in local daylight than in North America and we suffer in Europe with gross overcrowding of 6 and 7 MHz in our local evenings making DXing on these bands very difficult.

SWC: As one who is quite interested in unofficial radio, can you give us a feel for the European scene?

Darling: Pirate or "free radio" had a long and illustrious history in Europe stretching back to the days of the offshore stations like Radio Caroline, Radio London, Radio Northsea International, etc. Also, some of the more lunatic fringe don't (as yet) have access to legal CB radio. So a whole sub-culture has grown up around "free radio". Free radio has by common consent concentrated on Sunday mornings in Europe for SW and ECB activity and Sunday evenings for VHF-FM activity. Dealing with SW only any one Sunday morning will see half a dozen to twenty different stations in two distinct frequency ranges--6200-6300 kHz and 7300-7400 kHz. Some activity has taken place outside these ranges, but these frequencies are the most heavily used. The stations can be

divided into a number of categories. First those that do provide regular, well rounded and produced programming, on stable transmitters (eg. E.M.R.) then those that appear for one or two weeks and vanish as fast as they came (transmitting from a cold, wet field at 0900 on a Sunday morning after climbing trees to put up antennas is no fun after the first week), then the Dutch stations which are a whole sub-culture on their own with overmodulated, distorted, drifting carriers, and lastly the lunatic fringe who are on their own self-indulgent ego trip believing they are another Wolfman Jack. Probably the stations which have appeared (and vanished) over the last 5 years can be roughly equally divided into the above four groups. The level of activity seems to go in "bursts" and then quiets down again. Currently there are anything up to a dozen stations active every week from around 0900-1300 ocal time.

SWC: You have been able to sample some US pirate programming during the past couple of years, how would you compare it to that of the European pirates?

Darling: In general, standards of programming and broadcast quality are better from European pirates than from their U.S. counterparts (though with Euro-SW stations if they are bad they are downright diabolical!) but some U.S. pirates (eg: - Radio Confusion) have stood out from the rest.

SWC: As an employee of the fabled BBC Monitoring Service, do you see it as a great advantage to a DXer such as yourself?

Darling: No! There tends to be a widely held idea that BBC'S is a large DXers paradise. It isn't. The BBC'S is first and foremost a very large news agency. World Broadcasting Information or "WBI") is the part of the BBC'S' operation with which DXers are familiar but in fact represents a very small part of the whole newsgathering operation. Also, a job which involves wearing headphones for a large part of the working day tends to be counter-productive as far as DXing at home is concerned. After eight hours of wearing headphones your ears hurt!

SWC: In the past you have been described as a "hard-core" DXer. How do you respond to this?

Darling: I like the word hard-core! Seriously though, I am all for the increase in those interested in SW broadcasting. But, let's define the terms. The best description of the DXer versus SWL I've come across is that a DXer is interested in a station for its geographical location regardless of its programme content and the SWL is interested in a station for its programme content regardless of its geographical location. It is a neat summary but is far too simplistic. We have a very wide-ranging hobby with room for people with an equally wide ranging variety of interests and those that stay in the hobby for a number of years tend to change outlook with the years. What I do object to in our hobby at present is the "holier-than-thou" attitude adopted by a number of SWLs who wish to inflict their views on the hobby as a whole. In particular those who wish to inflict the gospel according to Patrick - this is a radio station not a supermarket - Humphries on everyone. In general the same people who use the words elitist and elitism without bothering to look them up in a dictionary!

SWC: What value do you place on collecting QSL cards?

Darling: Probably quite a high value but a personal value - it's not something you can quantify.

SWC: What are some of your most memorable QSLs?

Darling: The best QSL is always the next one. Apart from that I cannot say there is one I'd "treasure" over others. The ones that stand out are those that required more effort to obtain either in terms of difficulty of reception (Falklands, Radio New Ireland, etc.) or difficulty in obtaining a QSL (Lesotho, Niger, etc.), and the friendly letters (Radio Padilla, etc.) rather than the plain cards. But they all represent x hours of time and effort so as I said earlier it's a personal value and it cannot be quantified.

SWC: In the few years I have known you, there's been a fairly constant parade of receivers through your shack. Can you tell us what your latest fancy is?

Darling: I tend to change receivers rapidly as something new takes my interest! Currently I'm using two Muirhead M100M partial-synthesis ex-marine communications receivers (digital readout to 10MHz) which cost a list price around 3500 dollars which I managed to obtain for around 600 dollars each (I can't resist a "bargain", hi!). Since they outperform most communications receivers available to the hobbyist at this moment in time I think I'll probably be keeping them for a little while. Apart from receivers I have the usual collection of add-on "goodies", audio-filters, tape recorders, etc.

SWC: Do you find used receiving equipment difficult to find in the UK?

Darling: The short answer is no. At least not in Britain as surplus equipment is relatively easily available (eg. the Racal RA17, RA117, and RA1217) as are most pseudo-communications receivers made in Japan but DXers in many other European countries do have great difficulty in obtaining equipment at a reasonable price and of course that's even more true of the third world. In many respects DXers and SWLs in the U.S. and Britain have it easy!

SWC: Here in the states the DXing hobby seems to be a solitary one with little contact between DXers. It appeared to me that there was much more personal contact in the hobby in the UK. Would you agree with this?

Darling: I don't know whether that is strictly true. We still have problems organising any kind of get-together despite the fact that distances between us are less in the U.K.

SWC: In behalf of John and myself thanks so much for doing this interview.

MILLER'S DETRACTORS!

(Editor's note: the following argument was sent in by David Newkirk in response to one of Al Miller's thought and gripes.)

Re Albert Miller's first random thought -- or is it a gripe? -- on page 6 of FRENDX for May 1981:

Although there are probably exceptions, the utility stations Mr. Miller hears in the 90 and 60 meter (3.2-3.4 and 4.750-4.995/5.005-5.060 MHz) bands belong there every bit as much as do broadcast signals. 90 and 60 meters are internationally allocated to tropical broadcasting in particular areas of the world; where they are not they are allocated to other radio services. In the United States and Canada, these bands have nothing to do with broadcasting services. Thus, the utilities on these bands "insist" on nothing other than their rights. The interference Mr. Miller has to contend with is truly a botheration, but since he is outside of the prime coverage areas of tropical broadcasting stations, in a zone where these bands are legitimately used for other purposes, his complaint can be nothing more than a blowing off of steam. In my view, we should complain only when things are not as they should be. In this case, both the tropical broadcasters and their utility brethren are within their rights. For our part, we should avoid any complaining unrecognizant of international radio regulations and bordering on the demagogic.

Incidentally, I daresay that more broadcasters may invade frequencies allocated to other services than the other way around. Have any of us tuned to Cairo-9475? BBC-9410, 12095, 15070, 18060, 9915? Radio New Zealand 15485? Nederland 9895? Vatican-6210? Pakistan-21785? Guyana-5950? Moscow, Peking, Albania, Prague, Budapest, Angola and others all over the place? All of these stations operate, in many cases, on frequencies allocated to other services. Some get by through "reservations" at national radio regulations and allocations table that attempt to legitimize a country's flouting of the Frequency Allocations Table by recording disenchantment with particular tenets of the Table.

Some nations have operated transmitters on such out-of-band frequencies since pre-World War Two and claim "squatters" rights.

The blaster on 4975 kHz is a facsimile transmitter -- weather maps and the like -- that, according to international law, belongs there. According to Gilfer's Confidential Frequency List, it's station NAM, Norfolk Naval Radio out of Virginia, 1 kW. Why not log it the next time you hear it? It's legitimate DX, another logging just like any other signal on the band -- you can get your feet wet in utility DXing. Surely, this doesn't make it any easier to accept NAM when they blow away my copy of Cayenne-- but both stations are doing their respective things by the book, and I consider that an example to follow. The way I see it, every station that makes it through such an obstacle course is alegal "loophole" in the most practical sense; we can try to regulate radio only by controlling it at the transmitter; the sun, ionosphere and chance do their mysterious work once it's on the way. Magic! The signals fall from the sky like manna.

THE BASICS OF THERMIONICS

Many years ago, a fellow by the name of Edison; who was tired of spilling kerosene on his floors, and fought constantly with his guests who kept blowing out the gas lights as they left a room; sat down and invented the carbon filament light bulb. To his surprise, he found that a carbon film was deposited on the inside of the glass envelope. Edison found that this was due to carbon atoms being energized by the electrical current. Subsequently, he inserted a plate into the bulb and was able to prove that an electrical current would flow in a vacuum. This process was to be called the "Edison Effect", and it also constituted the first diode tube.

For the next 20 years, from 1880 to 1900, the Edison Effect would lie more or less dormant. In 1899, an Englishman named John Ambrose Fleming, began to work as an assistant to Guglielmo Marconi. Fleming discovered that a vacuum tube could be used as a detector, and thereby replace the inferior contact crystal or ferrous types. The date was October of 1904. This vacuum tube diode was called an "Oscillation Valve". To this very day, with the exception of cathode ray tubes for television, all good and proper Englishmen have been referring to vacuum tubes as "valves".

Meanwhile, back in the states, Lee DeForest was experimenting with thermionics. In 1906, he announced the discovery of his "Audion" vacuum tube amplifier. Dr. DeForest had experimented with a "flame audion" set-up from which his Audion tube was born. In this experiment, a burner flame heated a spoonful of sodium; a wire was suspended over the spoon which led to an electrical circuit that ended back at the spoon; and, finally, the hot sodium ions flowing upward from the spoon carried the current to close the circuit.

These, then, were the men who laid the groundwork for modern electronics. They established that heated filaments would emit electrons and that positive plates would collect them. No longer were communications to be hampered by distance limitations due to inferior circuits. Tubes were more reliable and more sensitive. They were operable at higher frequencies. The labs soon took over and developed triodes with grids (a third element) to vary plate current. Tetrodes followed which employed a screen grid to limit the effects of grid-plate capacitance; and the screen grid was located between the control grid and plate. The pentode tubes were blessed with a suppressor grid, located between the screen and plate, that helped to stop secondary emission of electrons leaving the plate when the plate was struck by the primary stream from the filament or cathode. There even exists a good argument for tubes being the first ICs; some tubes having as many as three discrete components bundled into one shell or envelope; g.v. duodiode triodes (1H6), (6SQ7), etc.

And to think ... it all began when Edison had a better idea.

He is the man to contact when it comes to information. His collection contains almost every receiver, transmitter and accessory ever made by Bill Halligan and friends (including the extremely rare Dual Diversity DD-1). His sets are 100% restored both electronically and and physically.

As a favor to me, Chuck gave me the following list of ratings. TOP OF THE LINE: DD-1, SX-28, SX-42, SX-73, & SX-88. GOOD: SX-17, SX-25, SX-32, SX-43, SX-62, SX-71, SX-100, & SX-122. AVERAGE: S-19, S-20, SX-24, S-35, SX-99 & S-40series.

I own an SX-25 and an SX-28 ... and I concur on the ratings for them. The 28 just pulled in Cook Islands, 11760, 500 watts. Not too shabby for a 40 year old rig.

Well, so much for this month. We're half-way through a year of this column and I'm extremely encouraged by your support. I've received letters from Europe to New Zealand. It is comforting to know that others like to warm their coffee on a rig lid, too. 73 de Bill

DX SMORGASBORD

Bill Martin, of Wilmington, Delaware, was the only reader to identify to me the name of the DXer who suggested the use of the asterisk to indicate sign-on and sign-off times. The abbreviation was suggested by Bruce Ted Goldman and was introduced in the log report for October, 1969. Bill's prize, an obsolete Radio RSA program schedule, has been mailed to him.

ON DXING: NIGERIA

This country provides a number of targets for DXers. In fact, since the NASWA Country List comprehends the fact that reception of radio signals does not depend on political boundaries and provides that, in effect, "once a radio country always a radio country", for one who keeps track of how many countries he has heard, Nigeria provides two "radio country" targets - Nigeria and Nigeria (Biafra) (Nigeria). Thus, one who had not begun DXing until after the fall of Biafra can still count that radio country in his "countries heard" totals.

The former Biafra, or, as it is listed in the NASWA country list, Nigeria (Biafra) (Nigeria), is heard via the stations of the Federal Radio Corporation at Enugu and Owerri. Enugu, on 6025 khz, can be heard from fade-in (assuming fade-in is prior to sign off) to the sign off which is listed by WRTM as 2305, but which appears to vary a few minutes between 2305 and 2310. The station signs on at 0430 and, when the channel is clear, can also be heard at that time... Owerri, on 4755 khz, has been occasionally reported at times which tend to indicate a schedule similar to that of Enugu.

The rest of Nigeria can be heard via several outlets. The schedule of the Voice of Nigeria was given in Listener's Notebook, on page 21 of last month's Frendx, and need not be repeated here.

From Kaduna, Radio Nigeria operates on 3396, 4770, and 9570 khz on a listed schedule of 0430 - 2305. Some reports place the sign on around 0400. All can be heard, if the darkness pattern permits, in the late afternoon period, from fade-in to sign off at 2305. The channel most frequently reported in the afternoon period is 4770, as early as 2100. The 0430 - 0600+ period will also provide reception of all three outlets. Again, 4770 is the channel most frequently reported in recent months.

The Plateau Broadcasting Corp, in Jos, on 5965 khz, is heard in the period after 0600, according to the pattern of recent reports. The station broadcasts in English and native languages.

On 6050 khz you will find the Ibadan outlet of FRCN, most often reported in the 2130 - 2305* time slot.

Lagos, on 4990 khz is an often reported outlet, as early as 2030, when darkness permits, to sign off which varies around 2305-2310. The 3325 outlet also is heard in the same period.

Cross River Radio, on 6145 khz from Calabar, is a good catch usually heard in the *0430 - 0600 period.

Other Nigerian outlets can be heard on 4932 khz (Benin), 6100 khz (Maiduguri), 6195 khz (Sokoto), and 7145 khz (Ilorin).

ON DXING: NIGER

Situated to the north and northwest of Nigeria, Niger has but one SWBC outlet, in Niamey. It is best heard on 5020 khz in the 0530 - 0600 period. During winter months, when the darkness pattern permits, it can also be heard from around 2100 to sign off about 2300. Try also for 3260 khz around 0530 - 0600. It is more difficult to hear, but does make its way through on occasion. You will find announcements to be in French and African languages.

SWLING has been around a long time. Some of the most avid listeners were expatriates in places like Southeast Asia. A copy of the Manila (Philippines) Daily Bulletin for Feb. 8, 1930 lists 11 SW Broadcasters heard regularly in Manila, but some combined entertainment and news with radiotelephone transmissions and few were on the air seven days a week.

The Dutch, who needed to keep in touch with their nationals in what was then the East Indies and now is Indonesia, had two transmitters in Holland and two on Java. These were PHI and PCJ in Eindhoven on 16.83 and 31.4 meters, the forerunners of Radio Nederland and PLE and PLF at the mountain resort of Bandoeng, Java on 15.74 and 17 meters.

The British used G5SW on 25.5 meters and CBX on 27 meters while VSIAB on 41.3 meters broadcast from Singapore and XPM on 49 meters did irregular testing from Hong Kong.

The pioneer Australian station was VK2ME in Sydney on 23.5 meters, which was on the air every night with phone and music transmissions.

The Soviet Unions station in Leningrad was heard in northern Luzon as early as 1928, but in 1930, Manila listeners received RA97 from Khabarovsk, Siberia on 70.2 meters every night except Wednesday from 1000 to 1400 GMT.

Germany pre-Hitler had only AFJ in Nauen on 56.7 meters, which broadcast most weekends after 1400 GMT. The U.S. had KEL in Bolinas, California.

Surprisingly, Thailand already transmitted from HS2PJ Radio Bangkok Tuesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays on 29.5 meters.

Manila listeners also heard (as they still do) mediumwave stations elsewhere in Asia: CMB Canton, XYZ Nanking, and a station in Shanghai as well as Japan's JOCK Osaka and JOEK in Nagoya, as well as KZRI, and KZIB in Manila itself.

Probably the first formal worldwide broadcast was made at the conclusion of the so-called Disarmament Conference in London from 1431 to 1520 GMT on October 27, 1930, when KZRI and its SW affiliate KBK relayed KEL Salinas and G5SW as well as a Japanese station. British Premier Ramsay MacDonald's voice came in well but President Herbert Hoover was almost drowned out in static. Japan's Ambassador in London, Matsudaira and Premier Hamaguchi in Tokyo talked in English and Japanese respectively. Earlier that month, on October 9, Manilans heard a test rebroadcast from Japan, the first doubling of the Pacific.

In the days before trans-Pacific air service when a letter took three to four weeks to go from New York to Manila instantaneous reception was a marvel indeed. I persuaded my parents to buy an Atwater-Kent in 1932. When I returned to the Philippines in 1940 after graduating from Duke I brought the latest in receivers; a battery powered three band set.

By then World War II was raging in Europe and the Japanese had begun their war with China. One of our favorite newscasters and certainly the most dramatic was an American named Carroll Alcott, who used the sancturary of the International Settlement in Shanghai to rake the Axis over station XTHA three times a day. On the same 25 meter band was the German financed propaganda station in Shanghai, soon joined by a Russian station.

But the big broadcasters were by then the BBC, Rome and Berlin. The Germans came in well from 0730 to 2300 on a variety of transmitters. The Italians were generally heard best in the early morning Philippine time (GMT plus 8) but one of their transmitters managed to interfere with the sole U.S. Pacific coast station of that time, KGEI in San Francisco on the 31 meter band. East coast stations were heard occasionally, but not well. BBC was heard at 0800 on 19 meters, 1100 on 19 and 25 meters, 1300 on 25 and 31 meters and 1600 on 31 meters and 49. Transmissions intended for the U.S. gave the time in EST and London identified itself as "the last outpost of democracy in western Europe."

When the Japanese invaded the Philippines we were interned and stayed prisoners for 37 months. During much of that time we operated a radion smuggled into the camp at great risk (even people on the outside were forbidden to listen to SW and their sets were "reconditioned" to eliminate SW reception). We found the BBC accurate except when the British were losing (when they had "strategic withdrawals") but one of the best sources of news was Saigon Radio run by the Vichy French. The Russians refrained from giving news about their hosts, the Japanese.

Nevertheless, some dichards keep going and scream that there's a lot of good DXing out there if we'll be patient with the static and look for the good ones. Others just shut up their shacks until autumn. Most of us, I guess, don't shut down but occasionally turn on the set to see whether we're missing anything. But the great outdoors beckons and there are too many other things going on--like vacations.

If we're very active in the winter we probably have a guilt feeling right about now because we're neglecting the receiver. I don't think we should though. One needs a vacation from one's hobby now and then, too.

Whenever SWLs and DXers get together--and this is the time of the year for that-- you hear someone ask: "Whatever happened to Joe Doakes? Remember how he used to log everything in sight and the bulletins used to be full of his stuff? Now he's just vanished." Usually the answer is not forthcoming and, instead, someone chimes in with: "Yeah, and how about John Doe. What happened to him?"

I had a letter recently from a DXer who seemed a little upset by these defections from the hobby. And I confess it has sometimes bugged me. Sometimes the people in question apparently leave the hobby completely; in other cases you see their names once in awhile on the fringes of activity but they have left the mainstream where they once were prominent.

There are a lot of reasons. One loses interest in avocations that once appealed and one moves on to something else. No crime in that. Others have changes in lifestyles. A youngster gets into the hobby and is active until he or she goes to college and then interests change and there just isn't the time any more for much DXing. Later in life they may well return to the hobby.

Marriage, too, may result in loss of hobby interest or a shift to a hobby to be shared too. On the other hand it could intensify interest in DXing.

If a person is close to a fanatic in the way he pursues the hobby, then it is probably more than likely that a day will come when he loses interest; perhaps he feels there are no new worlds to conquer, too few targets left.

In such cases summertimes are valuable. You ease off, take stock, realize you have a spouse, kids, friends you've been neglecting. In the meantime you have a chance to look over the equipment, rehabilitate the antennas, plan targets for the winter and reminisce over those QSLs.

Personally, I've found that only in my first years of the hobby did I ever spend much time at the dials in summer. And as the years have passed, that time has lessened. Granted, I keep a close watch on what's going on and if I learn of a new station being logged I'll make a beeline for the shack. Other than that, I find that whatever time I spend at the receiver is as a SWL, listening to news and music on the higher bands.

As I look back over my logbooks covering 13 years of DXing it is easy to see this summer pattern of decreasing activity. I did a lot of listening in my first years, not so much recently. I did log a new country in 1980 in August, Radio Dublin, and then have to go back to August of 1976 to find another new country log, Ulan Bator on 6383.

Does this bother me? No more than I think it should bother you if your pattern is the same. What I know from past experience is that this is just an interlude. Time is working in favor of renewed interest in the hobby. The days are already getting shorter, imperceptibly it is true but the length of the darkness span is already increasing. When you are reading this September will be only a month away and the Africans will start to be heard again on afternoons in the Eastern time zone. And the Asians will be coming in again mornings.

Already I can feel the old DX blood stirring in my veins. What will be the new stations this season that will come on the air? Will a new country be available? I'd better check those aeriels. I can hardly wait!

This is The Way it Sounds To Them! (Feedback on June column about trend to non-native music on shortwave.)

Not many comments on my June column criticizing the trend to non-native music on many shortwave stations. Incidentally, one of the stations I cited as being off the air made a liar out of me by returning before I could get into print. It was Radio Juventud, Venezuela, with a steady menu of rock and who did I find praising their programming in Update but my own editor, John Moritz. How could you do that to me, John-John? hi.

Here are the other reactions:

WILLIAM E. MCMAHON, Oxnard, CA: "Regarding your comments on foreign shortwave stations broadcasting Western pop tunes, I agree with you. I hate to be tuned to a foreign news program and have the station announce 'and now for a musical program' and have them broadcast the same type music that can be found all over the domestic broadcast band. Like you I tune to the foreign station to hear their view of the news, local happenings in the country and, hopefully, some of their national music."

CLAYTON C. SHORTRIDGE, Fort Wayne, IN: "I agree with you 100%. I am new to SWling and I just cannot get over the fact that the music is the same thing I hear on my car radio or at work. I really enjoy programs that feature what the country is all about."

"For me SWling is finding out how the other half of the world lives and how different their lifestyle is. This can be done with music, art and other programs."

"Your comment that international stations have to influence others leads me to say they will get more people to listen by sticking to their own kind of material. If you build all the cars in the world the same shape and same color what would you have? The guy that comes along and builds a different car with all kinds of colors will be the rich kid."

"So I believe a SW radio station needs to beam different material to different parts of the world. If that station is going to beam rock music to North America every night I know I'll sell my radio. But if he throws a variety of material trying to tell me and show me what his country is doing or has been doing I'll be around for some time."

DIANE LEVESQUE, Murphey'sboro, IL: Diane makes the point that much of the music being played these days, Presley, rock and roll, reggae, etc. is not national but worldwide in scope and in playing it a country is only playing what is currently popular in that country. Diane may be right but my point was that I personally do not turn to shortwave to hear this kind of fare.

She concludes: "Let us not lose sight of the fact that many shortwave outlets abroad are for the benefit of a particular region, not the American DXer, and the programming is not less and no more than what the stations believe their listeners would care to hear. (providing, of course, that the country doesn't fit the communist category where stations program only what they are told is good for the people to hear.) If historical tradition is your bag, then you'll have to be happy tuning to stations specifically for international service, stations that represent their countries and their countries' history to the international community. Big difference between what was then and what is now; and that's the matter in a nutshell."

BBC's foreign operations to be trimmed

LONDON — Seven foreign language services of the British Broadcasting Corp., heard by millions of listeners around the world, are being silenced by government cost-cutting measures announced last week.

The BBC described as "savagely" the move to end its broadcasts in French and Spanish to Europe, in Portuguese to Brazil, and its entire services in Italian, Maltese, Burmese and Somali.

BBC now maintains 39 foreign language services.

The BBC's transcription service, which sells its top programs to radio stations in more than 100 countries, also will be eliminated.

The Conservative government of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, in announcing the cuts, estimated a savings of \$6 million.

Douglas Muggidge, head of the BBC's external services division, said, "The policy is not only short-sighted, but could bring a serious decline in the reputation of the British voice overseas."

'Radio Free Cuba' Label Ordered for Broadcasts

The Senate added a little-noticed amendment to the State Department authorization bill this week requiring that U.S. government broadcasts to Cuba be designated as from "Radio Free Cuba."

The amendment, sponsored by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.), would affect Voice of America broadcasts. "There are two wars that can be waged," Helms told the Senate, "the war of words and ideas, and the war of bullets.... Should we give Castro the field in the war of words, not even contesting him?"

Sen. Claiborne Pell (D-R.I.) said he accepted the amendment "reluctantly." "By re-labeling present U.S. government broadcasts, I hope this amendment will not have the effect of undermining the objectivity or straightforwardness of the Voice of America," he said.

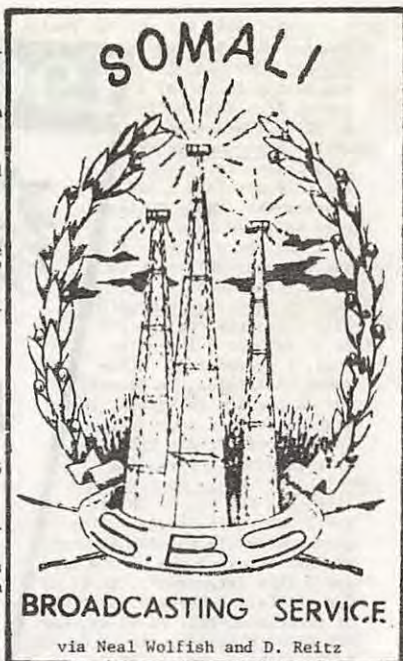

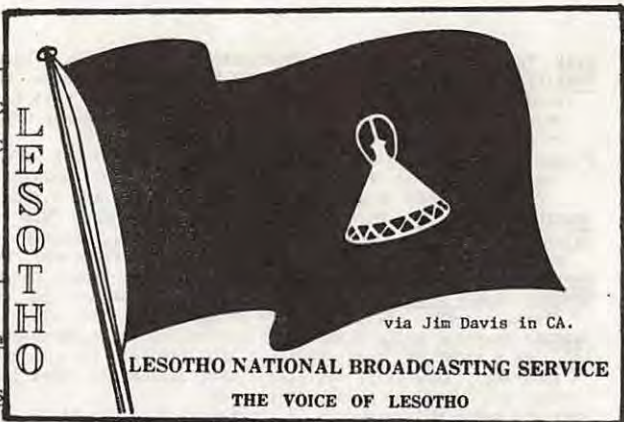

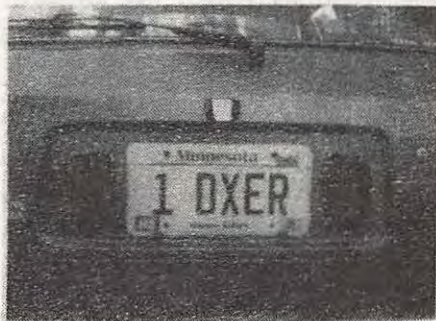
