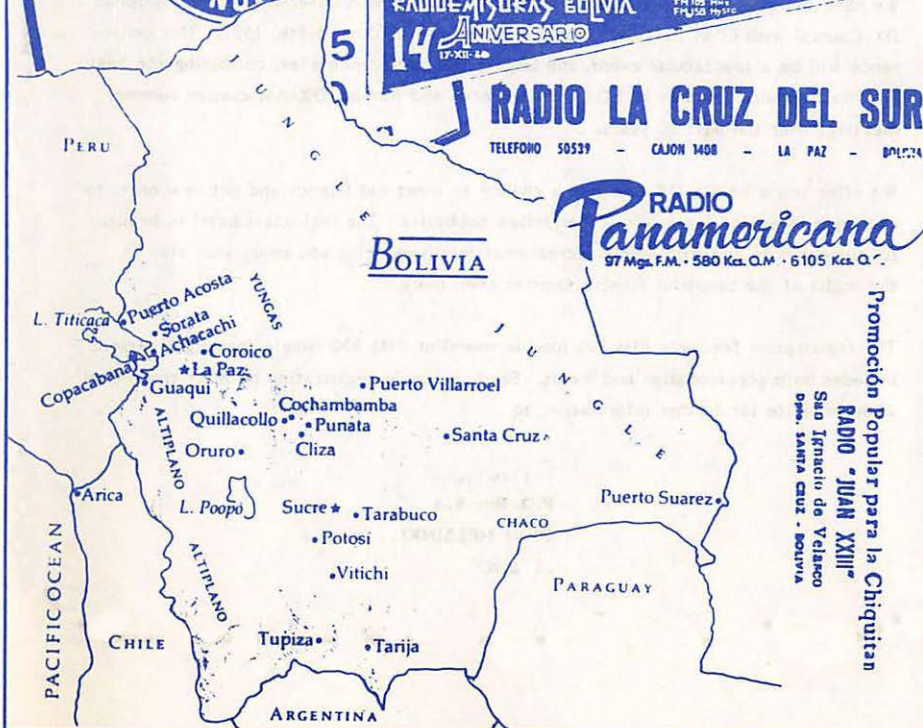

We had a very light turnout in the mailbox this month. As usual I am going to assume that all of you are so glued to your radios that you have not been able to tear yourself away from the Mighty Superheterodyne to write a letter. If that's the case, I forgive you.

Two letters did arrive, however. The first is from *Mike Nikolich* (Arlington Heights, Illinois) and he raises an interesting point:

My Christmas didn't bring me a new receiver or any QSLs of note. Instead, I enjoyed a bout with the Taiwan flu, and then gave my wife Susan a sample of it for about eight days, as well. I did note a signal from Zanzibar throughout the time I was off at Christmas, but still not enough to send them a report.

Scanning through the last several issues of FRENDEX, I note (with great concern) that support seems to be dwindling. Of course, I shouldn't talk because I haven't supported the club much lately, but I wonder if people either aren't interested in the hobby anymore, or if they simply aren't hearing anything worth reporting to the the club [I wonder if miserable propagation isn't to blame, at least in part -- sgm].

To spark interest, maybe we should take advantage of the power of the computer to set up a NASWA database that is directly linked to the Central Distribution Editor. I would be willing to contribute to a fund to purchase a computer, modem, and software for the Central Distribution Editor that could be used to send in the loggings. Maybe, if NASWA had an active database, slugs like me would be more interested in sharing their logs. Since many of us already own computers, I'll be interested to see how the membership responds to this proposal. An active database certainly would be a faster and more efficient way to send loggings to NASWA editors. --73.

Contact Notes

The season of catalogues is upon us: I have received no less than three -- very fine, and very tempting they are indeed. (The order in which they are given here is merely that in which I received them.)

From **Universal Shortwave** [1280 Aida Drive, Reynoldsburg, Ohio, 43068; (614)-866-4267] comes one of the biggest and most complete SWL catalogues I have ever seen -- 76+ pages. Just about any piece of equipment you could think of -- receivers; antennas of all kinds; RTTY, CW, and facsimile equipment; books; cable and connectors; etc., etc., etc... In fact, this catalogue is as much a work of reference as anything else. Fred Osterman has also apparently gone to much trouble to see to it that the product descriptions are as accurate and informative as possible. The catalogue costs \$1.00. (A separate scanner catalogue is also available.) Orders only can be placed by calling (800)-431-3939

A new catalogue from **Grove Enterprises** [P.O. Box 98, Brasstown, North Carolina 28902; (704)-837-9200; orders only can be placed by calling (800)-438-8155] lists a lot of interesting things in its 36 pages: a number of receivers (including scanners); antennas and antenna add-ons such as tuners and preamplifiers; books, with many written and/or published by Bob Grove. Of particular interest is the offering of FCC and FAA microfiche frequency listings -- a microfiche reader is also offered. The catalogue is free.

Finally, an excellent catalogue from **Electronic Equipment Bank** [516 Mill Street N.E., Vienna, Virginia 22180; (703)-938-3350; for orders only call (800)-368-3270]. Numerous receivers (including scanners) are listed. EEB has made something of a specialty out of ICOM products and provides a full range of services and modification options (none of which endanger the ICOM warranty because EEB is an ICOM-authorized service center). All kinds of accessories -- antennas and tuners, books, clocks, RTTY and CW materials, audio filters -- are included in this catalogue. The cost of the catalogue is \$1.00.

I was delighted to receive a letter from Larry Magne (Radio Database International, International Broadcasting Services, Ltd.) along with a selection of RDI White Papers -- excellent and thorough reviews of SW receivers:

"... These reports are meant to supplement the annual RDI reviews. The RDI's 'Buyer's Guide' section covers, after all, some fifty models, but with limited depth. If somebody has narrowed his choice down to, say, two models, and wants as many

details on these two before he goes out and makes a purchase, he can obtain just those two RDI White Papers he needs.

"By the way, as concerns the 'Bookshelf' section of your December column, may I make a few small corrections. First, I am not doing the WRTH reviews, at least as of the 1987 edition. Additionally, that 1987 WRTH, even though widely advertised as being 600 pages, is actually to be more like 570 pages. Both of these points have been public knowledge for some time, but for whatever reason – presumably inertia – the pre-1987 situation continues to receive widespread publicity.

"Second, the 1987 RDI is not 'organized entirely by frequency.' Mainly, yes; entirely, no. We added a by-country, by-broadcaster cross-index as one of our improvements for 1987."

My apologies most particularly for not pointing out the cross-index of RDI 1987 – this is a very valuable feature. In any event, the RDI White Papers are superb and ought to be consulted by anyone about to purchase a receiver. For those of you who are interested in such things, I would like to point out that this month's CONTACT was prepared on a desktop publishing program called MacPublisherII (v.2.69) from Boston Software Publishers Incorporated. It is a very flexible and extremely well thought-out program and well worth considering if you need something of the sort. It is, at \$195, the most reasonably priced program of its kind on the market. The font is 12-point Palatino, and was printed on an Apple LaserWriter Plus. Next month's CONTACT will be prepared on Aldus PageMaker1.2, and April's column will be prepared on Microsoft Word 3.0; by that time PageMaker2.0 should be available for comparison.

Easy Listening

SUNDAY

1435-1500: "Shortwave Feedback"(Radio Korea). Radio Korea's mailbag program featuring letters from a world wide audience. Unlike most mailbag programs which feature a man and woman host, this program features two women, one Korean, one British. Show also features interviews with visitors to the studio and those otherwise involved in shortwave or some other related human interest.(9.750/15.575. Repeated at 0035 on 15.575).

1620v-1630v: "Latin American Notes" (Radio France International).I'm not exactly sure what a program on Latin America is doing on a French station broadcasting to Africa, but there it is. This weekly program features brief items of Latin American news and Latin American human interest. (11.705/15.315)

MONDAY

0110-0125: "Outlook" (Radio Moscow). A daily program of news and editorial comments. Past programs have featured the cease fire in Afghanistan, American violations of the SALT II agreement, SDI deployment, etc. It helps to keep in mind when listening to this program that the U.S. wants war and the USSR wants peace (but if you can't remember that, they'll remind you.) (5.915/7.115/7.315.) Monday--Friday.

0145-0150: "Program Review"(Radio Prague). A brief look at the programs coming up on Radio Prague in the coming week, taken on a day by day basis starting with Tuesday's program. Usually they only mention the regularly featured programs, but occasionally they mention special features. Usually closes with a Czech pop song. (5.930/7.345/9.740/11.990. Repeated at 0345 on the same frequencies).

TUESDAY

0135-0145: "Youth Magazine" (Radio Prague). A program devoted to young people in Czechoslovakia and world wide, their interests and concerns. Past programs have featured interview with Czechoslovakian teen-agers, delegates to the World International Student Forum, and president of the Czechoslovakian Union of Students. (5.930/7.345/9.740/11.990. Repeated at 0335 on the same frequencies).

0305-0325: "The Traders" (Radio Nederlands). This is a new feature of Radio Nederlands and has had only two broadcasts so far (3 or 4 by the time you read this). It concentrates on various industries in Holland, but not the predictable ones. The first program featured the Dutch recording industry, and the second the Dutch Convention industry. (6.020/6.165/9.590/ 9.895. Repeated at 0605 on 6.165/9.715)

WEDNESDAY

1240-1255: "Interaction" (Radio Australia). This is a program that features issues in a "multi-cultural" Australia. Past programs

have featured the problems of the adolescent children of immigrants, church groups that help immigrants adjust to life in Australia, and they are currently doing a series of programs on the homeless in Australia. (5.995/6.060/9.580/9.770).

0110-0200: "Report to the Americas" (VOA). This program tends to concentrate on depth analysis of news items of interest to North, Central and South America. Past programs have featured the capture of Eugene Hassenfus in Nicaragua, the Contra-gate scandal, efforts to rebuild Mexico's economy, the change in the Trinidad/Tobago constitution, etc. Wednesday night also features "Mid-Week Sports Report". (5.995/6.130/9.455/9.650/11.740) Monday-Friday.

THURSDAY

2240-2245: "News of the Jewish World" (Kol Israel). A brief summary of items of news about the Jewish community world wide, including news of the refusniks in the USSR, the outbreak of anti-Semitism in Romania, and other items that would be of interest to a world wide Jewish audience. (5.885/7.465/9.435. Repeated at 0115 on the same frequencies).

0140-0150: "DX-ers Special" (RAE). There's not much discussion of issues and topics relating to DXing and shortwave radio in general, but there's an awful lot of DX tips. In fact, the program seems exclusively composed of DX tips gleaned from various publications, a different publication for each program. Very good for South American DX. (9.690/11.710. Repeated at 0440 on the same frequencies).

FRIDAY

2030-2130: "Science in Action" (BBC). A weekly review of current issues and topics in science, as well as some recent experiments. Program seems heavily oriented towards medical research, but other topics (such as the world's highest underground railway in Switzerland or a new radio telescope) also get their fair share of coverage. (15.260)

2130-2200: "Folk Box"(Radio Moscow). Each week features folk music played on native instruments from different republics of the USSR. Some weeks also feature special kinds of celebrational songs from a variety of different republics, such as wedding songs or, more recently, new year's songs. (11.840).

SATURDAY

1620v-1625v: "Focus on France" (Radio France International). A brief spotlight on the main events of the week concerning France. Past programs have featured the student demonstrations of a couple of months ago, the more recent transportation strike, and fighting in Chad. (11.705/15.315)

0200-0210: "Sports in Brazil" (Radiobras). Not a weekly scoreboard, but a more in depth look at the role of Sports in the country. Past programs have featured what the Brazilian soccer players were doing for the Christmas vacations, a look back at the year in football in Brazil and the competition for the national championships, the Pele Cup competition being held in Brazil, and even some amateur sports, such as white-water rafting. (11.745).



Soundwaves

330 You're probably thinking, "Can't this guy do ONE column without mentioning some BBC program?" I often wonder myself. It still remains, though, that the British Broadcasting Corporation is THE leading HF broadcaster when it comes to music, news, and cultural programming. And, it just so happens that it's my job, so to speak, to remind everybody about this fact.

The British Broadcasting Corporation is an enormous enterprise, with about 29,000 employees (3,000 of which are involved in the external service). It is neither government controlled nor commercial. It's a public non-profit operation, chartered by the British government, founded in 1922 to replace the short lived private commercial British Broadcasting Company. Similar to American radio beginnings, the Company was started by several radio manufacturers to provide programs for potential consumers, hoping that this would increase radio sales. (In the U.S., radio station KDKA was founded by Westinghouse in 1920 in order to create a demand for their radios). The British government wished to prevent radio in that country from mirroring the United States' progression into almost total commercialization of broadcasting. Their answer was to create a public corporation to handle the administration of the countries radio operations; in 1927, Company was dropped from the name and Corporation was added.

The BBC's control over broadcasting is more or less paternalistic, in that the government has no outright control over program content other than determining which languages and target areas are to be utilized for external broadcasts; but, it is still required that national interests be considered when planning programs which may be regarded as sensitive in respect to government policy. In one recent instance, for example, the government put pressure on the BBC to stop the transmission of a 1985 interview with Irish Republican Army leader Martin McGuinness. The program was cancelled, resulting in a 24-hour strike on the part of the entire BBC staff. Still, the BBC is regarded throughout the world as a paragon of free journalism.

The BBC's finance costs are paid for by the collection of licensing fees from its viewers, (television license revenues in 1983/1984 was 702 million pounds; licenses for radio were abolished in 1971), as well as from the profits derived from BBC Enterprises (which among other activities markets more than 10,000 hours of programs each year internationally), BBC Publications (such as Radio Times and London Calling, as well as computer software), and educational broadcasting efforts. It was my intention to also discuss the **BBC Monitoring Service**; however, the 1987 World Radio TV Handbook includes an exceptional feature article on it. Author Henry Pavlovich does such a fantastic and thorough job detailing the Service's operations and history that I would be foolish to try to add to it. I put this article on my list of required reading, as it expounds the importance of shortwave broadcasting and monitoring as a means of gathering information from closed nations, information that would otherwise be unavailable to the outside world.

Domestically, the BBC controls four national radio networks, carried on both MW and FM. **Radio 1** is devoted to pop/rock music; **Radio 2** leans more towards middle-of-the-road type stuff, "minority musical interests", and sports; **Radio 3** broadcasts serious cultural programming, i.e. classical music, drama, poetry, and fine arts; and **Radio 4** is strictly a talk-radio service providing news and current

events programs, magazine formats, entertainment shows, etc. In addition to these national radio programs, there are a number of localized MW and FM stations throughout the country.

The foreign service can be traced back to the early 1930's. The BBC Empire Service, as it was known, began in 1932 with English language programs directed to overseas listeners, mainly in the various nations of the British Commonwealth. Foreign language programming were initiated in 1938 with the Arabic Service targeted to the mid-east, and the Latin American Service in Spanish and Portuguese. Other languages were also added that year, particularly German, Italian, and French. Gradually, other English language services were added, including a European Service and a number of regionally targeted programs. Eventually, of these were combined to form the World Service, the main English program which operates round-the-clock to every imaginable target area. By the end of World War II the BBC had grown from eight to 45 language services.

Today, the External Service of the BBC broadcasts 4,165 hours each week (according to Radio Database International) to overseas audiences. The World Service is basically a combination of all four domestic radio services, offering the some of best programs from each, but placing a greater emphasis on news and current events. As of January 1985, the BBC World Service offered 202.5 hours of English language programs per week (BBC statistic) to its estimated 100 million weekly listeners. It is by far the most listened to international broadcaster on Earth. Although shortwave broadcasting is its principle means of transmission, longwave and mediumwave frequencies are also used for European coverage (200 kHz LW & 648/1296 kHz MW). In addition to reaching the world through its own broadcasting efforts, the BBC also supplies material for rebroadcasting to about 50 different countries.

By now you're probably wondering what my point is. Actually, I just wanted to tell everyone about another good jazz program on the shortwave bands (namely BBC's *Jazz Score*), when I began thinking that I find myself listening to the BBC more than local FM & television stations lately. Until the past few years, SW listening had always been more of a hobby to me than a means of information gathering. The entertainment I enjoyed wasn't really hearing the programming itself, but rather the actual fact of hearing a DX station's signal, of pulling a low power domestic station out of the static down on 60, staying up 'til the wee hours looking for new Africans or Latins to add to my list....you know the symptoms.

Now, when I get home from work or from school, instead of throwing on the tube, I throw on the shortwave. This in part stems from the fact that, aside from the New York Times, I have no real access to thorough, in-depth international news except for shortwave. As a student of politics I find that need sources of news and information that are independent of typical American points of view. An example of this is the press's handling of the Iran/Contra affair: for weeks, the U.S. media was dominated by this topic; meanwhile, many other major world events were all but ignored.

I've now begun to listen more to shortwave stations, as opposed to just listening FOR them. For my News Years resolution, I swore that I would publicly denounce my past unruly behavior towards all the responsible SW broadcasters who over the years have troubled themselves to operate a North American service, often against great odds and budget cuts. I guess I'm feeling a little guilty that I've taken this for granted over the years. Imagine all the time and effort gone into the production of the thousands of hours of broadcasts beamed to me (...well, not only to me...), and I have the nerve to abandon it all so I can listen to some low power station in West Nowhere-land, buried in noise and RTTY QRM, not even speaking my language...I'm so ashamed. I don't necessarily condemn DXing, but merely suggest that it should not overshadow the listening aspect of the hobby. As humble editor of a column generally devoted to programming, I feel that it's my divine responsibility to my faithful readers (all six of 'em) to express these views. The BBC seems like a good place to start.

I'm afraid I've digressed a wee bit this month from the usual incoherent babble about music programming. So getting back to the show, **Jazz Score**: I had heard it a few times in December at 0330 UTC Sundays. It's a game show of sorts hosted by Benny Green, and features four top jazz musicians each week. The guests are played short musical selections, or read musician profiles, and are then asked to identify the musicians, or song titles, or bandleader, and so forth. The questions are broken down into different categories such as trombone players, vibraphonists, Hoagie Carmichael, etc. The show is recorded live at the Bull's Head club in London. In addition to 0330 Sunday, it can also be heard at 1715 UTC Mondays and 1030 UTC Wednesdays. (The big question is....has anyone heard this show in January? I haven't done much listening at all at these times recently, but did check for it once [Monday, the 12th] and didn't find it. My last regular issue of **London Calling** was in October, and it wasn't listed there; perhaps it was just a few special programs instead of a regular series. That would be unfortunate.)

Other notes As mentioned earlier, the new **World Radio TV Handbook** is out. In short, it's another fine job by the entire WRTH staff. A major change is that the receiver reviews are no longer done by Larry Magne, but rather by "...a team of experienced listeners and test engineers..." The tests include a number of travel portables, as well as the new Kenwood R-5000 & Japan Radio Corp. NRD-525. Other articles are the aforesaid piece entitled "The BBC Monitoring Service"; and "Broadcasting From the Shadows" by Gerry Dexter, a survey of clandestine broadcasting organizations.

I received a call from Tom McElvy in response to my query about the WRTH BBS. Seems that he's waiting to hear from the public relations department about it. I guess we'll just wait and see.... Thanks again, Tom.

New Years Eve was spent in several different countries this year via radio. My favorite was with ABC/Perth on 9610 kHz at 1600 UTC. Great fun....only on shortwave!!

The **Ray Briem "DX Special"** on 10 January sounded pretty good, at least what I heard of it before passing out....why did it have to be on so damn late!?! I think it would be a great show to rebroadcast on a major shortwave station, perhaps at a more reasonable hour.

A new semester at school has arrived, and I forsee an abundance of work cut out for myself once again. I will try to pump out another column for the next issue of **FRENDX**, and would appreciate any suggestions for topics that I might cover. Until then, good luck to all in the North American DX Championships & '73's.

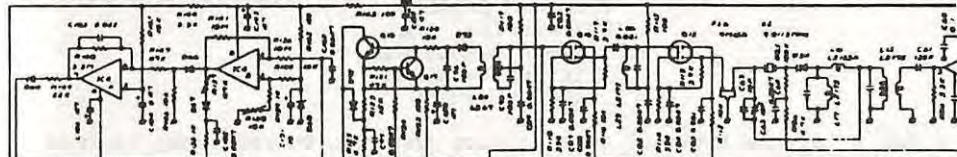

WINTER READING OR KATALOG KAPERS

The first mail of the New Year always brings all manner of interesting things. First you find all those belated holiday greetings. Then there is the infamous IRS form packet. This is the time of year that always brings out The Publisher's Clearing House Sweepstakes. Ten million bucks would buy a tidy little listening post on some exotic island complete with native girls to serve the Pina Colodas. And just in case there is a slim chance that you might not win the Clearing House Sweeps, you can fill out the form for the Reader's Digest contest. Just five mill here, slightly less exotic island with a more limited selection of native girls. But under this pile of more or less important material that comes out of Mr. McFeely's mailbag comes all manner of radio catalogs. Kind of makes you think that the commercial types in our hobby want to get us drooling for new equipment just at the same time we are dreaming of pocketing several million dollars in the contests. Several years ago the pages of FRENEX were graced by a column entitled "As I See It", edited by Mr. Al Sizer. Our efforts will attempt to bring back the spirit of the column as it once existed. It will be opinionated at times, even controversial. It will not be MY column, it will be yours. There are ground rules: No potentially libelous material or personal attacks, no off color material and no slurs of any type against any social group, be it racial, religious or political. Your contributions are most welcome, no deadline as such, I will endeavor to prepare this column around the Ides of each month.

In the past several years there has been some undercurrent as to what is going on with the radio clubs in general. Rumors of possible cutbacks in pages, and even suspension of publication by one or more of the major U.S. based clubs were in the air at the ANARC Convention in Montreal last summer. In the September and October 1986 issues of "DX Reporter", the publication of ADXR, an anonymous contributor known only as "WPS" made very critical comments regarding the organized part of the hobby, that is the clubs in general and ANARC in particular.

In rebuttal, the then Executive Secretary of ANARC, Richard T. (Terry) Colgan stated that the clubs are in good shape, suffering a miniscule loss of membership in the past 4 years. Terry mentioned the figure of about 8000 total members of all ANARC affiliated clubs. Allowing for the fact that many folks are members of more than 1 club, we can safely assume a ball park figure of 7000 different participants. The specialty clubs catering to the LW, MW and VHF-UHF aficionados make up about 30% of the total memberships, so we are down to less than 5000 folks interested in primarily Short Wave Broadcast activities belong to ANARC member clubs. It must be emphasized that virtually every active club in North America is a member of ANARC.

Less this article get to be a statistical exercise, we should get to the point. Of the number above, only a scant few hundred folks ever bother to contribute to their clubs. Even fewer do more than report their latest Radio Moscow and Radio Netherlands loggings. Take a look at Section A of this issue. With the sunspot count being what it is, this section should be the biggest in the book, yet the Editor has only enough material to fill one page. Could it be that no one actually DXes anymore? If that is indeed the case, the clubs are in more trouble than originally thought.

Today brought the news that the second largest SW oriented club in the U.S. is cutting back on pages and is considering other even more austere measures. Only 18 months ago they were touting that they would have bigger issues than ever.

Some folks grouse that the real DXers belong to the closed organizations such as Numero Uno and Fine Tuning. This could be indeed true, but it must be remembered that these outfits have to recruit their participants somewhere and that that somewhere is from the pages of the open club bulletins.

When this writer first joined NASWA in the Spring of 1976 there often were in excess of 100 names on the Contributors Page. Count them now. Short Wave Center, the finest section of any U.S. club publication in recent times is gone. Could it be that many of the good writers have gone on to the commercial publications where they can make a buck or two for their efforts, plus get the ego gratification that more than just a thousand or so folks are reading?

Perhaps those who have gotten this far in this piece are saying that olde kap is a Prophet of Doom. Maybe, but those same folks can change things around if they so desire. The Publisher of FRENEX would dearly love to get more material than he can get into the current page allotment. He won't if everyone sits there and says "yep, kap might be right but he's a fool for beating a dead horse".

Computer Corner

Welcome back! Well, it is time to get REAL serious with this computer column, and talk about what that little keyboard, and all the junk hooked up to it can do. Please forgive me if I seem Commodore slanted in my articles, but that is what I currently own (although MS-DOS is soon to arrive!). Anyway, enough talk, let's get into WORD PROCESSING!

WORD PROCESSING is the ability to use your computer to generate documents as though they were written on a typewriter. That is where the similarity stops. For example, by using a word processor, you can save the documents onto a disk, which could hold over a hundred letters, and allow you to retrieve them in a stroke of a key. If you make an error on your typewriter, just get out the white-out or correction tape; on a WP, just retype the letter! Need justification (a straight right margin)? No problem...just let your trusty WP do it's thing, and off you go...who knows, you might even start writing articles for FRENEX (no, my job is NOT open!!) (hi)

Word Processors are available in many shapes and sizes; you must pick one out that "feels good" to you. I have used several on my C64, including Easy Script, Word-Pro 3+64, and ultimately discovered Pocket Writer, which is what this column is produced with. In looking at processors, consider many things...ease of operation...will it work ALL the features of my printer...who can I call if I have a question? All very important, and that does NOT make the selection task any easier! So, let's take it a step at a time, and try to find what is best for you.

From talking with other SWLs, it seems the first thing they want to do is to create a "form letter" for usage with their reception reports, so that all they have to do is fill in the blank, and send off the report. If your basic intention is this, then select one of the public domain word processors and get a feel for its use...create a few letters, and save them to disk. Now, go back and fill in the blanks....easy isn't it? Now, if your printer supports it, try a few other type styles or sizes...On my Okidata 120, 3 pitches are stock (10, 12, 17.1). But, with some maneuvering of the printer codes, it is possible to generate 3 additional codes, using the double wide size, to give 5, 6, and 8 pitch! OK, hopefully you are getting the idea...play around with both your equipment and software to get a feel for your capabilities.

In addition to reception reports, word processors can enable you to set up simple logbooks for your DXing, such as the sample in figure 1. While not the perfect logbook, it is much better than the henscratching I used to do...and my entire logbook is on a disk, which I could grab in the event of a fire, so that my entire lifetime of DXing doesn't go up in flames! Running a SWL club and need labels to mail out the bulletins each month? No problem, just set up the file and your word processor will do the rest!

So what do you need to look for in a word processor? Well, that is going to depend on your pocketbook, but in the \$30-\$40 range, there are many EXCELLENT programs to choose from. If you already have your printer, check the printer list on the package to determine if the program supports it. If not, you have been spared the agony of wasted money (ever tried taking back software opened?). What are the capabilities of the program? Will it do MERGES (needed for form letters); how about right justification? Makes FRENEX articles look REAL nice! Other features abound, including placing headers at the top of a page, automatic

The Palomar Engineers Model PT-340 "Tuner-Tuner"

While attending the Virginia Beach Hamfest this September, I encountered what has turned out to be one of the more useful radio accessories I have ever purchased.

The Palomar Engineers Model PT-340 sells for \$99.95. Give consideration to obtaining your unit from a dealer who supports our hobby. One such dealer is Universal Shortwave in Reynoldsburg, Ohio. Fred Osterman, the owner of Universal informs me that he will stock the PT-340.

Designed for the amateur radio market, the Palomar PT-340 is a fixed 50 ohm antenna noise bridge which allows the operator to adjust his transmatch for minimum SWR without having to first key the transmitter. This eliminates the risk of damage to the transmitter finals caused by operating into an unmatched load.

Big deal right? What does an SWL care about damaging his transmitter? Answer: Nothing, most SWL's don't operate transmitters. However, many SWL's do own and operate a transmatch or antenna tuner.

Consider your antenna tuner. It's job is to match the characteristic impedance of your receiving antenna at a given frequency to the input impedance of your receiver so that a maximum transfer of energy can occur. A station is selected on your receiver and you adjust the controls of the antenna tuner until the signal is peaked on the S-meter. Never mind that the signal is fading or fluttering, you did your best to get the signal peaked with the means at hand. How many times in the past while trying to ID a really weak one did you frantically re-adjust the tuner controls trying to wring out that last db of signal? Wouldn't it be nice if there was an accurate way for an SWL to tell once and for all if an antenna tuner was adjusted for a proper match?

The model PT-340 "Tuner-Tuner" provides the SWL with the means to accurately adjust an antenna tuner and identify an optimum match on any frequency within the range of 1.5 - 30 mhz. This wonderful device is contained in a metal box about 3 x 5 x 3.5" square. It is designed to remain connected in the co-ax cable which runs between your antenna tuner and receiver. The PT-340 front panel controls could not be simpler, there is only an on/off switch and an LED which flashes when the unit is turned on. The rear panel has two SO-239 jacks labeled "tranceiver" and "tuner." There is also a clip to hold the required 9V battery (not supplied).

Operating the PT-340 is very easy. Simply tune your receiver to the desired frequency. Turn the single front panel control on the PT-340 from "off" to "tune" which puts the unit on line. A swishing sound comes from the receiver, the LED on the PT-340 will begin flashing and your receiver "S" meter will indicate in the S-9 region. Set your receiver AGC control to "fast." Adjust the antenna tuner controls for a null on your receiver "S" meter. The null indicates your antenna tuner is now adjusted for a proper match. Turn the front panel control to "off" and there you have it, an optimum match for the antenna you are using on the frequency you have tuned. No more guess work or trying to peak your tuner using a fluttery signal.

At my QTH, for both SWL'ing and low band amateur operating, I use a 130' inverted vee center fed with 450 ohm open wire and a Nye-Viking tuner. The apex of the antenna is at about 60 feet. The SWL receiver is an Icom R-71A.

What tangible results can you expect from your \$99.95 investment in a "Tuner-Tuner"? Let me offer one example of how the PT-340 performed here. On 60 meters, I previously peaked the tuner using WWV on 5 mhz. I would use the same tuner setting across the entire 60M band. This seemed to work satisfactory. After installing the PT-340, I found that I had been peaking on a false null. This resulted in using the antenna in an unmatched condition. The bandwidth of the antenna/tuner combination is very narrow on that band due to the comparatively low operating frequency. Remember, generally, the lower the frequency involved, the more narrow the bandwidth of a tuned circuit. In this case, so narrow on 60 meters that using the PT-340 as an aid to retune after even a 30 kc movement made an audible difference during weak signal reception. These results carry over to the other bands, the results being more dramatic the lower the operating frequency.

An antenna and tuner combination properly adjusted to the frequency being used can have the additional effect of increasing the signal to noise ratio of the receive system. When an antenna tuner is used and properly adjusted, a resonant circuit consisting of the antenna, ground and transmatch is created and placed before the front end of the receiver. The goal is use the tuner to make that circuit resonant on your operating frequency. When this condition occurs, a center frequency for that tuned circuit is established. A maximum transfer of energy at the operating frequency takes place. The desired signal is peaked and hopefully, broadband noise such as lightning is not peaked quite as much. As you move from the center frequency, signals start to be attenuated as a mis-match begins to occur. The ratio of how far a tuned circuit can operate from it's center frequency and still maintain acceptable energy transfer is an expression of it's bandwidth. The ratio of how much a signal is attenuated per increment of frequency change is an expression of the "Q" of a tuned circuit.

Without getting any further into a college level dissertation on physics, let me say that matched antennas work better than unmatched ones in all cases. Since most SWL's don't have the real estate to build an optimum antenna system for each band, a compromise antenna system must be made. Sometimes, that compromise involves an antenna tuner. For the tuner to be effective, it must be properly adjusted. The Palomar Engineers Model PT-340 "Tuner-Tuner" provides an accurate means to do so. I highly recommend it!

HIGH PERFORMANCE ICOM OPTIONS

Just recently, the Swedish firm of ESKAB has produced several interesting options for the R71/R70. These include a special 4 khz high performance AM crystal filter (\$79 CAN/\$55 US) and a phase locked AM (PLAM) board that takes all the hassle out of ECSS/NSHD tuning. The PLAM board is \$229 CAN/\$165 US. In stock for immediate shipping. Specify R70 or R71 version. All prices include postage and complete installation instructions. The very popular R71 Performance Manual is also still available for \$10 US. The manual details "how to" modify your R71 for better performance including improved MW sensitivity, AM selectivity, notch filter, true passband tuning, infinite RIT, audio level increase and more. Many of these mods are very simple to perform even if you're not an expert. Just look at all the \$\$ you can save if you do the mods yourself! For more information or to order contact :

CHINA (PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC)

A new radio station which give an overseas service was born with ID "Voice of Jinling Broadcasting Station" on Nov. 12. This station which is located in Nanjing City, Jiangu Province broadcasts daily in Standard Chinese at 1155-1600 on a shortwave frequency of 4875kHz.

People's Daily and Xinhua News Agency reported this news on 13rd and Fujian PBS also broadcast it on 14th. According to these informations the service of V of Jinling (the ex-name of Nanjing) is for Taiwan, Hongkong, Macao compatriots and overseas Chinese in South East Asia. The stn reports developments and problems in economic and cultural construction in Jiangu Province and broadcasts news in its neighbouring provinces and cities.

The stn was first heard in Japan on Nov. 18. The reception condition is not so good. The address is announced as P. O. Box 268 Nanjing City, Jiangu Province.

in Russian from VOA, BBC, DW, RFE, R.Liberty, Kol Israel.

Reversed tape broadcast of Russian service from R.Beijing has
changed to 'forward' mode since about a week after of jamming-off.
This fact backs up the view that the broadcasts are feeder to the
border transmitting stations of R.Beijing and the tapes are re-
versed for a purpose to avoid jamming from USSR. (Shigenori Aoki)

The News of Soviet jamming stop was fed to Kyodo News Agency on
Nov. 5. RN Media Network broadcast this Kyodo press on Nov 6 and
BBC-MS also quoted it in Nov 7 issue. (Hideharu Torii)

CHINA (PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC)

On Dec. 15, 1986 CPBS "Nation-wide PBS Hookup Program" and
Hunan PBS "All Provincial PBS & Broadcasting Posts Hookup Program"
reported that a new radio "Zhujiang Economical BS" started to
operate in Guangzhou City, Guangdong Province on the day. A
survey for MW picked up this stn on 1062kHz at 1550 on the same
day. It broadcast programs in Cantonese and Standard Chinese and
signed off at 1608. An station announcement stated that it
broadcast on 95.6MHz in parallel with 1062kHz. Both freqs had

Here are two to try for their EG to SEAs, capable of being rcvd here. The better is 11920 at 1330, usually hrd w/G strength and w/out much QRM, tho REE in SP is co-ch; this fq, tho, consistently has multi-path echo. The other is 15240 at 1515, tho often ruined by VOA Russian splash from 15235, which is VERY heavily jammed. Still, 15240 is sometimes listenable. Unlike last winter, I haven't had any luck in hearing EG to Eu from RBI (William E Westenaver, Montréal PQ, 14/1)

All xmsns on 4557 and 1053 kHz daily to As: Korean 03-05, 10-14, 15-1630, 20-22, and relaying nx from KCBS Pyongyang at 22-2230; EG at 14-1430 (WBI 2/1)

Echo of Hope on this sked since 1/12: 02-05 6348, 09-12 & 14-17 3985, 20-21 on 6348 (Toru Yamashita, Japan, Asian Broadcasting Institute)

V of the People does not radiate from xmtr site of Echo of Hope. This was confirmed when traveling to S Korea (Toru Yamashita, Japan, ABI) [Cf Dec LN-30] Correction: bc time of this stn as 22-23 should read 20-21 (T Kondo, ABI ed)

R Red Flag (Chinese Std: Hongqi guangbo diantai), believed to be in or near Khabarovsk, continues untraced as of 19/12; last IDed on 995 kHz 29/11/86. First noted 11/9/71 by ABI member Hideharu Torii; had bc contry and nx critical of Chinese policies in Std CH at 1245-1250, 1315-1320, 1345-1350, 1415-1420. The number of bc days per month has decreased since late Oct 1986: monthly tallies of bc days per month: Jan 26, Feb 22, Mar 28, Apr 26, May 25, Jun 20, Jul 22, Aug 4, Sep 19, Oct 16, Nov 7 (S Suga, ABI 3/1) & see below

First August R Kyodo nx agcy, Tokyo, reported 25/12 in EG from Tokyo: Radio stns opd by USSR to stir discontent in China have gone off the air, per sources here. They speculate that Moscow has halted the bcs as another move in its effort to improve rels w/Beijing. The so-called First August Radio [Radio Ba Yi] and Red Flag R, both based in Soviet Siberia, have not been hrd for a month. FAR, named after the date the PLA was founded in China, began bc in Mar 1979 shortly after Chinese forces pushed across the Viet border to 'punish' Vietnam for invasion of Kampuchea. Stn purported to speak for disgruntled elements w/in Chinese armed forces and was regarded as a Sov effort to undermine policies of Chinese leader Deng Xiaoping, per the sources. Its sharpest attax were directed against China's relations w/the US and Japan. Red Flag R, which started in 1971, attacked Maoism during the Cultural Revolution and later claimed to represent dissatisfaction in China w/Deng Xiaoping's reform policies after Deng was rehabilitated. [BBCMS ed note: FAR last obs on 12120 at 1215 2/12; however, in the past it has been absent from the airwaves for long periods] (WBI 2/1)

V of [National?] Army of Democratic Kampuchea, hostile to Viet-backed govt of Kamp, in Kamp on 5200 2315-00, 10-1430; noted w/stronger signals. Pgming is also changing from the dreary format to one w/lot of modern Kamp songs w/modern accompaniments and lively anmts (Supratik Sanatani, Dec IDXCI ADXR)

V of the People of Malaysia ancd 29/12: From 1/1/87, Cantonese will be discontinued, while Malay, Std Chinese (Mandarin) and Tamil svcs'll be bc twice daily --Malay 22-2230 & 13-1330; Std CH 2230-23 & 14-1430; Tamil 23-2330 & 1330-14. [BBCMS ed note: til now this stn on 7050 supporting Malaysian Communist Party, had bc three half-hour xmsns a day in Cant & Std CH] (WBI 2/1)

V of Tamil Eelam of the Tamil Eelam Communist Party is a Tamil separatist stn hostile to the Sri Lankan govt in Colombo; first monitored 6/11/86, tho stns w/this name have been known to exist since latter half of 1983; hrd on 7010 at 0430-0530 & 1330-1430 in Tamil, w/occl items in EG (WBI 19/12) V of Elam [sic] hrd on 9705 // 7010v, both jammed, in Tamil 1332, SINPO34543 (A J Sampath, India, IDXCI ADXR) At 1405 21/12, VOTE ancd it was on new 9700 // 7010 (WBI 2/1)

There is still a great deal of confusion since there are two stns claiming to be VOTE, one the real claud, and the other 'black' claud operated by the SL govt. From this distance it is very difficult to sort out, but I suspect the BBC MS of assuming the fake one is the real one; you would think that they would bring their usual expertise in content analysis to bear. Parts of the following lengthy reports from IDXCI also seem contradictory, but are reprinted here as given (gh)

V of Tamil Eelam, operated by the People's Liberation Organisation of Tamil Eelam (PLOT). Recently I took the risk of writing to this stn, and got a reply from their 'Madras addr' w/pgm sked and letter. The sked in UTC, on 41 & 49m: Tamil: S/S/W 0230-03, 1030-11, 1330-14. EG: Sat 03-0330 & 14-1430, Sun & Wed 11-1130. Singala[sic] Sat 11-1130, Sun & Wed 03-0330 & 14-1430. The stn was last hrd 20/11; as of 10/12 still not hrd here at Neyveli (G R Pahlada, IDXCI)

Eelam Radio (Tamil: Eelam Vaanoli) hrd for first time 15/11; believe this to be operated by another Tamil group, Eelam People's Revolutionary Liberation Front (EPRLF). Hrd only in Tamil, daily 0330, 0930, 1430; does not mention duration of ea xmsn, but it's 35 mins. Doesn't give any info about fq or addr. Is strong w/good mod on 41m hamband; but not hrd here for past few weeks at sked times. More info needed (G R Pahlada, Dec IDXCI ADXR)

Puligalin Kural, operated by Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE), only in Tamil. Latest sked as ancd: 7010 at 1030-11 and 1545-1615; also says testing at 0130-02 UTC on 7010, asking for listener comments and reception reports. Is using 2 fqs on 4lm w/same pgm, both severely jammed, worst at 0130. 20/11 anmt of 6150 and 7010, but due to unavoidable circumstances and poor security for members in the xmtg stn, unable to bc on 6150; at present on 7010 only. If this fq disturbed, listen on adjacent fqs. There is a small change of addr, previously given as: A. Rajaram, No. 928, Adayar, Madras 600020. Now it's Radio Section, No. 928, Adayar, Madras 600020. In recent days, not hrd at sked times on 7010, perhaps due to jamming; wrote to this addr but no reply yet (ibid.)

V of Tamil Eelam (pseudo stn operated by Sri Lankan govt) A small change in ID, previously just V of Tamil Eelam, but now "You are listening to Voice of Tamil Eelam operated by the Communist Party of Tamil Eelam". Hrd w/TM pgms 4 times a day: 02-03, 0430-0530, 10-11, 1330-1430; latest sked is ancd as 0430-0530 & 1330-1430. Also says has cancelled xmsns at 02 & 10 UTC; "we are not responsible for any other pseudo (false) bc". This stn's sig is vy strong compared to others; on fixed fq on 4lm (must be 7010 used by LTTE stn Puligalin Kural) [sic]. Stn begins w/comtry in Tamil for first 5 mins then comtry in EG or Tamil songs; after first half hour, nx in TM hrd for 10 mins, then TM songs for 10 mins, and finally EG nx. Any important anmt will be made after comtry or nx. I don't find this stn on 3lm. Sometimes suffers jamming, starting w/nx & anmts part of bc. Jamming seems weaker and not very effective. Sig from the pseudo is vy strong to overcome jamming. Stn does not move to adjacent fq when jammed. Recently I was monitoring pseudo at 1330 on 4lm to end of pgm at 1430; immediately I hrd anmt in Tamil by another stn on same fq: "Dear listeners, the stn you hrd was a pseudo stn ID-ing as VOTE". Next day, pseudo stn 1430* followed by strong jamming, no such anmt hrd. 7/12/86, hrd this anmt from the pseudo: "The Sri Lankan govt jammed our pgmms last Sunday at 10-11 UTC. The govt, after jamming our xmsn, has come to a decision, that it has won the game by jamming. Fortunately our eqps were out of order that day. If the govt further jams our pgmms, we'll oppose the govt. We are on 7010. We also understand the SL govt is being another stn like our secret stn and w/same ID; dear listeners, please listen to our bc for genuine nx."

The daily newspaper Indian Express, 8/11/86 reports about this pseudo stn, headlined: Pirate Anti Indian Lanka Radio on Air - EPRLF. Says existence of a radio clandestinely opd by SL govt to beam anti-India bcs has been brought to notice of govt of India. The stn, from an undisclosed location in Tamil Nadu, has been carrying on anti-India bcs for about one hour daily for the past four months. Existence of this was noticed when bcs beamed by EPRLF, PLOT, and LTTE were being continuously jammed. However, PTI [Press Trust of India] quoting the same source, made no mention of SL operating the pirate stn. It also located the stn somewhere outside India and said the half-hourly bcs in the morn & eve were put on 4lmb. I hear that listeners in Australia have hrd TM cland, per Talkback on RA 16/11--stn on 7010 at 1310; maybe the pseudo VOTE. From Nov ADXR I also understand that member J F N Kalyanvala of Mhow, Madhya Pradesh has monitored VOTE on 3lm at 1330; he is not sure if it was genuine or spurious one. That must have been the pseudo (G R Pahlada, Dec IDXCI Asian DX Review)

V of the Tigers, monitoring 8/12 Jan: On 10/1 at 1330 stn in TM on 7010 as V of the Tigers, the spl bc of LTTE; and "this bc is on 4lm, 7010; (?for several days) the racist SL govt and its stooges have been interrupting this fq. We are therefore making our unscheduled bc". Previously, only stns IDing as VOTE have been hrd on 7010. 9/1 & 11/1, nothing hrd on this fq at 1330, but 12/1 VOTE was again hrd, describing itself as 'the authentic bc of the Communist Party of Tamil Eelam' (WBI 16/1)

V of Muslim Mujaheds of Afghanistan [sic] on 11490 0130-0230 & 1530-1630, opposing Russian presence on Afghan soil. S/on w/flute IS, fq anmt, addr in Hamburg. G sigs but P mod. Exotic pgming w/lots of slogans w/echo effects. Nx abt Mujahed activity at 0140 & 1540; 19/12 after this stn's s/off at 1630, V of Liberation of Iran appeared briefly on this fq w/IS and opening anthem // 9027 & 7080. Not noted thereafter. Guess they are coming from same site but diff xmtrs --morn xmsn is jammed by a Russian unit IDing in Morse as "UR" (Supratik Sanatani, India, Dec IDXCI ADXR)

V of Mujahadeen/Mujahadeen-e-Khalque, hostile to govt of Iran, in Farsi is now on two MW channels 1431 & 1539, switching from other pgms at 1800 // 3240 4220 5960(?) 7110 9525, past 2000 hours. 7110 is 24h and pgming on this channel leads others by 90 seconds, variable. MW fqs are known to be used by Iraq and 9525 actually carries Baghdad R pgms at arnd 1230. That leaves little doubt regarding Iraqi origin (Supratik Sanatani, Dec IDXCI ADXR)

V of the Crusader Monitoring 5-12 Jan: this stn, a.k.a. V of the Mojahedin-e Khalq, which bcs pgms in Persian & Kurdish hostile to Iranian govt, hrd at 1400 5/1 on 3515 3930 4220; fqs changed to 3511 3940 4225 at 1445 to avoid QRM and continued varying until 1520*. 1702, hrd again on same SW fqs, and at 1800 also found on 1431 kHz, but lagging behind other fqs by several secs. VOC s/off 2000 w/amnt in Persian on 1431 IDing the stn as V of the Republic of Iraq. On subsequent occasions, VOC continued hrd on or near 4220 3950 3515, and also at times on 1431 & 1539. 12/1, 1431 & 1539, which relay Persian svc from Baghdad, hrd w/VOC at 17-20 (WBI 23/1)

R Iran, 9525, 1330 14/12 s/on w/8-note IS and "Inj Radyo Irona," anthem // 9685, SIO 344 (Supratik Sanatani, India, IDXCI ADXR)

R Iran Toilers (Inj Sedyee Sahamatagane Iran), hostile to govt of Iran, in Farsi on 6230, 1530-1630; communist-backed, and pgming not restricted to Iran, e.g. 19/12 a talk on the regime of Gen Pinochet of Chile (Sanatani, Dec IDXCI)

RIT ancd 1530 8/1: From Sat 20th Dey [10 Jan], pgms of RIT will increase by one hour, at 1530-1630 UTC. Same pgms repeated 1630-1730 and 0230-0330 on 28, 49 and 60m. Confirmed; previously, stn from xmtrs believed in Afghanistan in support of Iranian Tudeh (communist) party, had bc half-hour pgms at 0230 1530 & 1600; still hrd on 10870; previous fq 6125 unconfirmed but 60m traced on 4775 (WBI 16/1) 4775 being a well-known Afghan fq

R Iran Toilers (Radio-ye Zahmatkeshan-e Iran) first monitored by BECMS on 7/7/84. But hrd by a Japanese listener as early as 23/5/84; ops from xmtrs in Afgh, some of which also carry RAfgh svcs. Ancs postal addr: PO Box 49034, 10028 Stockholm 49, Sweden--the same addr as that used by "R Iran Courier" (Persian: Radyo-ye Peyk-e Iran) which closed down on 30/11/75. RIT sked in Persian to ME on 10870 6125 4775: 1530-1630, repeated at 1630-1730 & 0230-0330 (WBI 23/1)

V of the Liberation of Iran Monitoring 1-3 Jan: ancd 1/1 that from 3/1 the 1630-1830 bc'd be xmtd on 7300 instead of 7080, // 9027. Confirmed 3/1. 0330-0530'd continue on 15555 & 9027 per anmt (WBI 9/1) See also bottom previous p

V of the Oppressed In Iraq JANA nx agcy, Tripoli, reported 1/1 from Tehran: This stn started pgms from northern Iraqi terrs 30/12; the anti-fascist Ba'athist regime in Iraq being radio ancd that it was built to promote the popular struggle against this regime. Asserted it'll work towards instigation of people of Iraq to revolt against regime of tyrant criminal Saddam [and] to liberate Iraq from the filth of his fascist Ba'athist regime (WBI 9/1)

'Keyhan,' Tehran, reported 31/12 in Persian: V of the Oppressed in Iraq has been hrd in western Iranian provs and N Iraq since 30/12, on MW. In addn, the radio teaches people necessary training for opns aimed at toppling the Zionist regime in Iraq [as published]. Establishment of stn follows conclusion of conference of solidarity w/Iraqi people recently held in Tehran and could have decisive consequences for morale of Iraqis. Some time ago, a publication of same name was distributed in N Iraq and Iraqi Kurdistan w/same goals. [BBCMS ed note: efforts to locate this stn so far unsuccessful. But AR ES of VIRI hrd beginning daily pgm V of the Islamic Revolution in Iraq at 1330 12/1 w/slogan V of the Oppressed (Arabic: Sawt al-Mustad'afin). Subsequent amnts referred only to V of the Islamic Rev in Iraq; hrd on 0685 [sic--9685?] and 9770] (WBI 16/1)

R Bardai giving G reception on regular fq [sic] 6008, at 2019, past listed s/off 2010; comment and speeches, occl tribal mx; opposes current Chad govt, and operates from northern Chad or in nearby southern Libya (Craig Seager, RA JP DX Time 18/1) Monitoring 7-16 Dec: R Bardai xmtr on 6009, normally carrying that stn hostile to Chad govt in Ndjamena under Hissein Habré, obs to behave as follows: 7/12 sked R Bardai bcs. 8/12 R Bardai mixed w/V of the Greater Arab Homeland [Libya]. 9/12 unmod xmtr on air, no pgm. 10/12, xmtr believed off air. 11/12, only VOTGAH hrd. 12/12, R Bardai mixed w/VOTGAH. 13/12, believed

off air. 14/12, R Bardai mixed w/VOTGAH, 15/12 & 16/12 xmtr believed off air (WBI 19/12) Monitoring 22-30 Dec: R Bardai hrd again on 6009 22/12 and subsequent days, except 30/12, when unhrd. R Halgan Monitoring 8/1: Stn hostile to Siyad Barreh and govt of Somalia from xmtr in Ethiopia, hrd at 17-18 on 9590 ex-9595 (WBI 16/1)

R Freedom On the back inside cover of the Dec 86 issue of Sechaba [sp?], offl organ of the African Natl Congress is some SW info: R Freedom, V of the ANC and Umkhonto We Sizwe, the People's Army, relayed via these stns. (Times are local, probably Zambian [UTC +2]) R Luanda, 30 & 40mb (no fqs given) 7:30 pm daily. R Madagascar, 6135, 9:30-10 pm daily. R Ethiopia, 9545, 9:30-10 pm daily. R Tanzania, 15435, 8:15 pm M/W/F/Sun; on 31m (no fq given) 6:15 am Tu/Th /Sat. R Lusaka, 9580, 7:15-8:00 pm M-F, 10:05-10:35 pm Wed; 10:30-11 pm Fri, 7-8 pm Sat; on 17895 8-8:45 pm Sun. National R of the SADR (Saharan Arab Democratic Republic) which has been bcng since summer of 1979, continues on 1355 kHz; but now starts at 1800 instead of 1900. In AR until apx 2100 then SP to 2155 (WBI 2/1, per monitoring 27-28/12)

R Caimán / CID R Caimán is definitely an anti-Castro stn; hrd from 0000 on 7470; its object is to undermine both the government and policies of Fidel Castro. R Caimán came on the air relatively recently. There had already been a SW net w/pgms very similar, La Voz del CID, whose most popular outlet is R Camilo Cienfuegos. CID's postal addr is well known, Apartado 8130, 1000 San José, Costa Rica, but no addr is known for Caimán. Since the two can be considered 'sister' stns by their content, it occured to me to send a reception report for Caimán to the CID address, explaining the situation. The result: LV del CID sent me a QSL for 7470, the fq of Caimán. But this doesn't solve the problem, as in the blank for "emisora" they inserted LV del CID instead of Caimán. Either the person in charge of QSLing is not well informed about CID's fqs-- it does not use 7470!--and paying little attn to my letter automatically filled in the QSL. Or, Radio Caimán, as it would not be very surprising to suspect, is a station or program independent of LV del CID, but part of its network. Thus as sister stations one could confirm pgms of the other or vice versa. Personally, I am inclined toward the former explanation, but each of you can decide for yourself (Adolfo Arto, Oct DIAL of Asociación Dixista Aragonesa via Jerry Berg)

R Farabundo Martí Monitoring 21/12: stn claiming to bc from Chalatenango prov in El Salvador, hrd at 1830 21/12 on 6735; had not been obs since 11/11. One-hour pgm was spl one of mx, greetings, slogans but no reason given for absence. BC at 2300 also on 6735, followed the RFM previous pgm format. Stn anmts ment only two xmsns daily, 1830 & 2300 from "undefeatable Chalatenango" on fq near 7 MHz (WBI 2/1) Stn was first hrd in Jan 82; on spl occasions linx up w/ R Venceremos (WBI 23/1)

R Venceremos monitoring 7-11 Dec: 7/12, RV, the FMIN stn claiming to be from Morazan dept, El Salvador, hrd starting 1400 Sunday-only xmsn on 3725; fq then changed every few mins eventually reaching 3779. 2000 xmsn 7/12 and 1830 8/12 hrd on varying fqs betw 6564 and 6670. RV on these fqs was chased by a poorly mod xmtr carrying mx, which tried to cause interference to RV. 7/12, RV hrd ancg test bcs from San Salvador on VHF/FM at 02-03. 10/12 and 11/12, RV's 12 & 00 xmsns hrd on fqs again varying 3725-3779. Some form of 'electronic' QRM seemed to cause RV to change fq continuously. Fq of 1830 xmsn again varied betw 6557 and 6650 accompanied by electronic and mx QRM. 7/12, the French AFP nx agcy had reported that FMIN had 'suspended its RV bcs because of the strong counter-insurgency offensive launched by the Salv army since 2/12 in Morazan' (WBI 19/12) RV ancd 29/12 0000: Very soon, RV, voice of the workers and guerrillas will be from Guazapa for San Salvador on 105 MHz FM. Soon, on FM for the country's central region, RV will be from left to right, the first stn on your dial [if your dial is backwards -gh]. Attn, CAM, RV is already being on its two fqs, near 7 MHz on the 40m band and on 3.5 MHz on the 80m band. Also, for the country's east'n region, RV is already on 96 MHz FM. To hear us better use a radio w/antenna. BC times on FM for the east are 00 & 02 gmt (WBI 9/1)

R Liberación El Salvador: TV Cubana reported 26/12: this stn to go on the air in Jan as part of psywar against Nic sponsored by Pentagon and CIA. Studios will be in El Sal and'll carry soap operas, mx, editorials, commentaries against Nic revolution, 20-08. Opening of stn is another step by Reagan in prolonged war he is waging against the people of Sandino. However, despite enormous human and economic losses it is causing, the White House has been incapable of changing the popular course of the revolution in Nic (WBI 2/1)

Costa Rica: Prensa Latina mx agcy, Havana, reported in EG 13/1: The possibility that an anti-Nic contra-operated stn will be based in CR is now a fact as Interior Ministry confirmed that the fq it will use belongs to a CR stn. R Liberty [sic] of the Nic Opposition Union (UNO) will be supposedly from Nic terr, from Fri [16/1]. UNO leader Alfonso Robelo told press conf stn'll be on 1500 [sic] kHz for interior of Nic and'll join the chain of US-financed stns the anti-Sandinists operate. However the CR Radio Control Dept, attached to the Interior Ministry, said fq belongs to R San Carlos, located in the north, near the Nic border. R S Carlos offls Prensa Latina consulted said stn belongs to a society and is currently being on 1400 kHz and that its power is likely to increase in the next few years. Under CR law, forners are not allowed to control mass media; that is why investors prefer to form societies and set up alliances w/local businessmen to operate radio and TV stns. Acc to influential weekly 'Universal' another stn, R Impacto, is operating as a limited company in CR. R Impacto has joined the Sept 15 str's daily anti-Sand bcs from Honduras. The Contrás also have two periodicals which are inserted weekly in CR's "La Nación" and "La República" dailies while a US VOA repeater in San Carlos frequently re-features [sic] the anti-Nicaraguan propaganda (WBI 23/1)

All the above appears rather off the mark, since AP and other sources report R Liberación actually using 1520 kHz, supposedly night hours only 6 pm to 6 am local; some sources say El Salvador, others Honduras. High frequency and night only suggests that it depends only on skywave not groundwave, so could be a considerable distance from Nicaraguan border. Tim Hendel, Miami, confirmed hearing it on 1520, but w/heavy QRM, Su 25/1 1000 past 1200 UTC. I wonder if both the VOA Belize outlets on 1530 & 1580 are still on the air when this is on! It is also interesting to note that besides Belize, the only CAM countries previously lacking any stns on 1520 in the WRTH 87 are El Salvador and Nicaragua. As for CR, WRTH 87 (including my research a sesquiyear ago), shows several San Carlos stns above 1400 but none on 1400 itself, while R Cima TIASF is listed in San Carlos on 1500; the 1520 is a R Columbia repeater in Turrubalba, not in the north. Unfortunately I have locals on 1520 & 1580 (gh)

'Última Hora', Asunción, excerpt from editorial 17/1, 'Unjust Silence': RN has been forced to suspend bcng for 90 days. Continuous jamming, an unfair type of censorship unprecedented in history of Pgy, has forced radio to take this extreme measure. Deplorable situation, because another comm medium has thus been silenced. Our constitution consecrates and guarantees press freedom, which is a fundamental right in today's world. Nevertheless, this right has once again been violated in the case of RN. Continuous jamming has been making it impossible for this stn to bc normally. Despite repeated complaints and the public knowledge of such an attack on freedom of expression, nothing has been done by the authorities to put an end to such censorship. That nothing has been done in this regard is the saddest aspect of this situation, which not only legitimizes impunity for a devious attack but reveals the fact that the lack of offl support or sympathy for a medium leaves it defenceless. This is unjust for the country, and does not help its image. Obviously, the law is not being applied equally to every one in this case. Freedom of expression has indeed been violated by the continuous jamming of RN, and yet the appropriate authorities have not taken any measure to put an end to such a violation... (WBI 23/1)

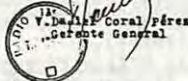

Radio-Finland

Probably for the first time ever, unless I heard them in the 1950s, I logged Radio Yugoslavia in English. Noted on Jan 23 at 2213 on 9620, the IS ran until 2215 followed by about 2 minutes of the full English language schedule. The schedule was repeated again at 2225 at signoff, and the IS commenced at 2227. Radio Berlin Int'l took over 9620 promptly at 2230. Yugoslavia's parallel outlets on 7240 and 6100 both heard but not readable -- watching up audio on two receivers confirmed the presence of the signals. 9620 at best was an SIO 222, with adjacent channel QRM from Vatican on 9615 and someone 20 db/9 on 9625.

Radio Pakistan sent along a DB6 schedule which was interesting. Marked up with highlighter markers, whiteout and handwritten frequencies, it reflects midseason adjustments. There are a couple of oddball frequencies penciled in, such as 15606 and 15122 kHz.

I raise the question again: what has happened to the European services of Iraq and Nigeria that were on 15120 kHz in the late afternoon my time? Now all I hear is Vatican Radio prior to the VOA signon. If you know, how about letting me know?

On a followup to last month, Jeanne Ferrell of Gilfer Associates told me of another variation to the JRC NRD-525's modification of the tuning rate. Some units required pushing the MEMO key, then the RUN key, to toggle the tuning rate of the main knob between 2 and 20 kHz per revolution.

The BBS had a number of calls from NASWA members last month... hello to Dave Alpert, from the MWDXC days... other names I recognized included Bill Cole and Harold Sellers. The board now carries SCDX bulletins uploaded by new NASWA member Bob Brown, KWSF. Back issues of SCDX and the monthly amateur radio DX newsletters from the Frankford Radio Club are available. First-time callers may now join conferences (type j;swl for the SWL conference; type j; to rejoin the main section of the BBS) and download files (type l;radio from the files menu prompt to see a list of radio-related files); no longer do you have to wait for me to bump your status level, as described last month. Another conference that could stand some activity from NASWA members is the buy-and-sell (type j;barter) to list your equipment for sale or wanted.



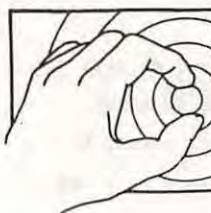

New Zealand Shortwave Antenna

Pictured here is a sketch of the Tricity House Supreme Listener, a Wide Band Shortwave Listening Antenna. Tricity House, a New Zealand-based manufacturer, says that the design is based upon Amateur mobile transmitting antennas, with each of five elements being resonant on a shortwave band. Each element is helically wound on a tapered fibreglass rod. The antenna may be mounted on any out-of-doors support and connected to the receiver via coaxial cable.

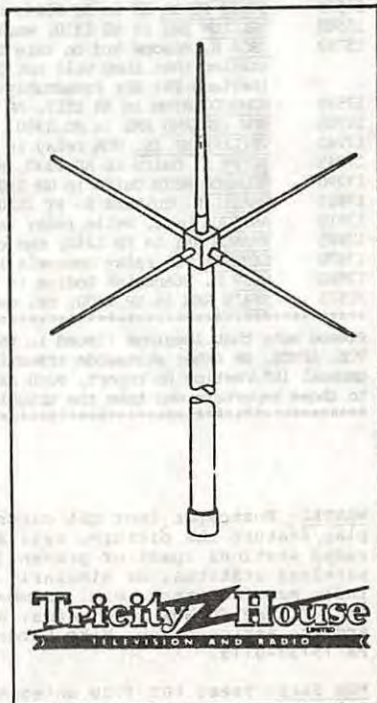

Various Notes

Japan Radio NRD-525 : A modified version of this new receiver has been issued by J.R.C. The NRD-525U allows the choice of faster tuning speeds. By depressing the "Run" switch the pushbutton tuning increases to steps of 10 kHz vs 1 kHz otherwise, while the tuning dial changes to 20 kHz per revolution vs 2 kHz. There may have also been a change made to the SSB frequency offset, but this is not yet confirmed by us. (Thanks to Media Network, Gilfer Shortwave, Fred Osterman of Universal shortwave.)

The Kenwood R-5000 is now available at United States dealers for a list price of US\$899.95. Universal shortwave is selling it for US\$789.95. Options are extra.

Philips D-2935 Receiver : Since September, all European production of this receiver has had the initial 6 kHz filter replaced by a narrower 3 kHz bandwidth filter. Buyers should check which version they are getting, by consulting the manual. (Radio Netherlands Media Network)

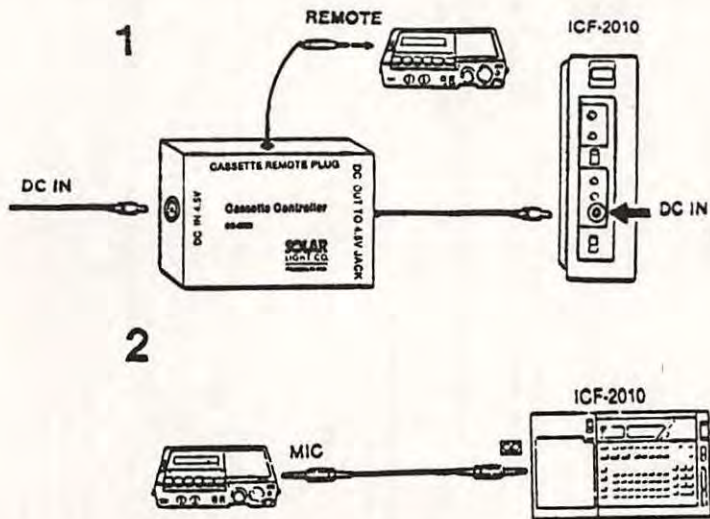
