*** Other speakers to be announced.

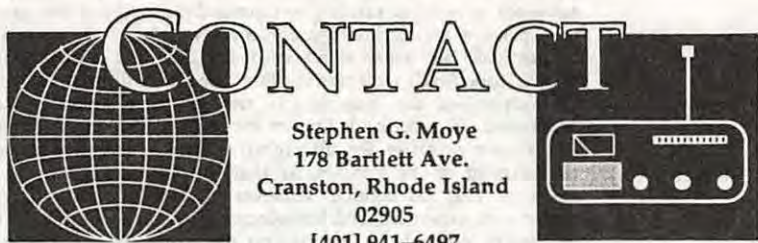

I hope you are having a good Spring. We in the Northeast are gratefully recovering from a messy and cold Winter. The listening conditions were good, but it was hard to hear the radio over the sounds of chattering teeth.

I begin this month with a letter from *Andy Sennitt* — an editor of the *World Radio TV Handbook*. Under normal circumstances I would not have printed this letter: it is my policy never to print materials that show an individual at a serious disadvantage. However, as this letter came to me on the letterhead of the WRTH, I feel that it is something in the nature of an official statement from that publication and must be dealt with accordingly. Herewith Mr. Sennitt's entire letter:

With reference to your remarks about the 1987 WRTH receiver section, it is hardly fair to state that there is "no indication" about who carried out the tests. At the bottom of page 560 the names of those involved are given. So to say that Jonathan Marks "revealed" his involvement on January 22nd is stretching the truth a bit! The credits were placed at the end at the request of those involved, but there was no intention of creating "a curiousness" as you put it.

The reason for the page reduction is that we wanted to keep the cover price the same for the third year in a row. It was calculated that we could achieve this by shredding 32 pages, which had the extra advantage of reducing the mailing costs of multiple copies by a substantial amount. This is purely a case of good housekeeping, and had nothing to do with other changes.

The cult of personality which is implied in your comments seems to be something particular to the American market. In Europe, people generally pay far more attention to the substance of a report than to the identity of the writer. As all of the people involved in preparing this year's receiver section are Europeans, you will notice a tendency to de-emphasise [sic] personalities. This phenomenon is not restricted to DXing. I recall how people were said to believe something that CBS reported purely because it was Walter Cronkite who delivered the words. Here in Denmark, the nightly news is presented in turn by a whole string of different announcers, and even on the radio there is virtually no personality cult. It's just a different way of looking at things.

So, Stephen, I think that you have mistaken traditional European behaviour for something else. I can assure you that the WRTH editors will take note of your comments, and if it seems that our American readers are not happy with the receiver section unless someone's name is displayed prominently at the beginning, we will re-consider our policy. The comments of other NASWA members are welcome.

I really hardly know where to begin, so let's start at the beginning of this odd missive and work our way relentlessly to the end:

1. By no stretch of the imagination, is a note of *Credits* — buried at the end of a listing entitled "Dealers List," and distinguished only by a 1-point rule — an adequate notice to the public of the identity of those who have assembled the reviews of equipment: indeed, "it is hardly fair." The public has a right to know — up front — who has undertaken the tests and who has made the recommendations. I would add that those who have made available their time, intelligence, and industry deserve better from a major publication: I can only say that they would have received it at my hands.
2. I do not believe that my remarks about the decreased page count of WRTH87 in any way called for justification from Mr Sennitt. Indeed, my opening words were: "The 1987 edition of the *World Radio TV Handbook* is out and, as usual, it is a treasure." Further, I applaud any effort to keep prices at a reasonable level.
3. I am astonished by Mr. Sennitt's references to a "cult of

personality." At issue is not merely a matter of 'personality' with reference to who is making recommendations about the purchase of expensive and technologically complex pieces of equipment. (I cannot make any sense whatever of Mr. Sennitt's analogy [as inept as it is superficial] with newscasters, and so will, mercifully, leave this aspect of his remarks to rest in peace.) Larry Magne's acknowledged expertise is known the world over. In the absence of that known expertise, we are (rightly, I think) entitled to know (and at the head of the reviews, at that) just who is giving us their opinions. This has nothing whatever to do with "personality," but rather with experience and knowledge — qualities valued, so far as I am aware, not only in Europe, but the world over. Furthermore, I cannot bring myself to believe that any reasonably sentient human being could ascribe a "cult of personality" only to Americans: the arts (both serious and popular) — among other pursuits — have demonstrated that if we Americans ever had a monopoly on that market, we no longer retain it.

4. Finally, Mr. Sennitt, I may say that I am reasonably familiar with the scholarly traditions of three cultures, specifically in music, mathematics, history, and the history of science. Traditional European — and, so far as I am aware, American and Chinese — behaviour is clearly to give credit where credit is clearly due, and to make known all the facts and their sources in the proper way. This is my only concern, and I take it for granted that it is the only concern of all those who have the interests of the advancement of knowledge (DX, SWL or otherwise) at heart.

It is, I think, Mr. Sennitt's reference to 'truth' in his first paragraph that I find most difficult to comprehend, and disturbing. I think that it is clear that I have told the truth as I have perceived it: 'stretching the truth' is merely a euphemism for lying, and I really do not believe that this has happened in this column. Nor did I imply that there was any "intention of creating" (Mr. Sennitt's words) a "curiousness:" I merely pointed out that the lack of clear attribution was curious — and so it is. I am further puzzled and distressed by Mr. Sennitt's attempt to make this a matter of Americans-versus-Europeans: for SWLs and DXers, this seems curiously parochial and narrow minded; and as such, I would go further and say that it seems unworthy of an editor of the WRTH.

In the last analysis, I do believe that I have given to the WRTH very much more praise than blame. I can only hope that this was justified. Indeed, what I find most seriously lacking in Mr. Sennitt's *official communication* is any expression of thanks for the long record of support received from this column, FRENDX and NASWA. Rather, I find only odd criticisms of largely imagined faults. I rejoice that I find myself at one with Mr. Sennitt in wishing for the comments of the NASWA membership and FRENDX readership.

Before we pass on to some more letters, I thought that I would explain a bit about my work on, and attitudes about CONTACT — prompted in part by Mr. Sennitt's letter. As I pointed out earlier, it is my policy not to publish letters that would either present an unflattering view of their authors, or would simply present me or the FRENDX readership with too big and easy a target of criticism. In fact, I have had only a handful of such letters, so the question does not come up very often.

Further, I will not knowingly repeat in transcription any errors, inadvertent or otherwise, in the letter of a correspondent. To do so, would require continual recourse to the use of the condescending *sic*: all too often this is just an obvious way of letting the readership know that the editor knows how to spell. (Well yes, I did make one small exception above: I just couldn't seem to help myself for some reason.)

Finally, I take your letters at face value: you have put work and thought into them, and I respect that. I will endeavour to bring the same qualities to the presentation of your letters here.

Oh yes, the masthead of this column: I promise (really) not to tinker with it for at least a year. (I *do* like my new toys, and I tend to get carried away.) Your comments and criticisms are — as always — most welcome.

Now for a letter that comes from Tim Davisson (Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio) – who, I note from his enclosed card, is an Account Executive for WSLR [interesting call letters] 1350kHz in Akron – and it touches on several topics:

In the past few months thoughts re: shortwave broadcasting trends and my 28 years of listening (I started at age 11) has crossed my mind. Below are some comments I hope will be of interest and stimulate others to comment.

All in all, the programming of many shortwave stations has improved. Oh, the BBC, R. Nederland, R. Australia, etc. have been excellent for years. But, personally, many other broadcasters have had vast improvements in the past few years: SBC/Switzerland, Portugal, Spain... to name a few.

Perhaps those in charge of developing and analyzing programming have read more letters, conducted listener surveys, etc. It's a refreshing trend: more programs about the PEOPLE and social and business happenings in countries... instead of hard-core political opinion.

On the downside, as a QSL collector, I am disturbed at the apparent trend toward useless, "no data" QSLs. Recently I got one from Radio Japan (Gabon relay I needed QSLed). Deutsche Welle has done so for a few years. For what tiny bit of good it might have done... I wrote DW two very polite letters asking if a specific QSL was possible on a one-time-only basis so as to verify a DW relay country. No reply. And there are other major broadcasters that have a long-running "no data" QSL policy. It's sad.

I am, as an American taxpayer, angry with the U.S. Information Agency. Once a year I write the VOA asking for a complete set of English-language program schedules. This last Fall I wrote (in September, I believe) and by November had no reply. I called VOA and the information office promised they would reply. As of 12 February 1987, no reply. First, no QSLing of VOA stations for Americans, and now they won't even send schedules??? As Americans, our tax dollars are supporting the USIA/VOA. I hate to sound like an old #\$\$%&... but what next?

Finally, with the great number of hobbies available to persons of all ages, shortwave listening needs a P.R. campaign to further its cause. Suggestion: develop written or taped (on cassette) PSAs [public service announcements] to be sent to commercial and college radio stations in selected "large" markets. PSAs are run at no charge. Just a thought.

I really like that idea about the PSAs for SWLing. I think that, given a good selection of off-the-air recordings and access to a good studio to prepare the tape, it ought to be a fairly straightforward matter to prepare a really fine product. Hmmm... let's see what we can do.

I have heard before now of the problem that you are having with VOA/USIA: other people have occasionally run into the same problem. I remember reading somewhere that, when pressed for an answer, the VOA/USIA authorities asserted that, as VOA is not intended for a domestic audience, they are not set-up to hand out program materials to domestic listeners [re-reading that, it looks a little strange – but you know what I mean]. That, I need hardly point out, is a non-answer: somebody just doesn't give a damn, and lacks the nerve (I don't wonder) to say so. I suppose you might apply to your Senators or Representatives for a display of power at a somewhat higher level. Still, I don't hold out much hope.

The problem of 'no data' QSLs has appeared in this column before. I am beginning to think that only a torrent of letters let loose on the offending stations will do any good – if anything will. Has anyone else had this problem, and, more importantly, have any shortwave stations written to you about it?

We move now to a letter from Jerry Bishop (Clark Air Force Base, Phillipines). He courteously introduces his own letter:

Greetings once again from the Far East. Just how far, nobody's saying.

Two topics this letter, QSLing and club support.

The mailbox has been an interesting place lately for yours truly. First there was the week with three Indo veries, then HLA and Azad Kashmir, and finally two Indians two days apart. While I'm not sure what I'm doing now that's working as far as getting the stations to answer, I have something of an idea.

Since Jan. 86 I've been including some collector's stamps with each report. I tested this during 1985 and found the percentage of replies was somewhat higher on those reports with the stamps. There was a lot of room for statistical error on this however, and I decided to continue with the stamps on a broad scale with every report.

My return rate is now up over 8% with the inclusion of stamps vs. not including them. I should add that I did not generally enclose return postage with the reports.

I send mostly US stamps, but have gotten some Thai, Hong Kong and Japanese stamps and will add these to the assortment. This technique seems to be working. In fact, some stations have sent back some stamps of their country, and these generally wind up in my wife's collection.

On contributing, I think that Kap's hit it on the head with his comments in the Feb. FRENEX. If I may, some background for those who weren't members of the club in the late 70's, when the great "elitist" war tore the shortwave community, and NASWA apart. Since that time, it has been a rare occasion to see some names in the pages of FRENEX /these names are ones normally thought of as the "greats" of this hobby. Nowadays their names only seem to appear publicly in the commercial magazines, and privately in the various closed DX sheets.

A logical deduction from all that — these folks have turned their attention to something else, and have no further use for FRENEX. Indeed, I know of one name which has not appeared in FRENEX, except on the cover, since as far back as I can remember. This now leaves the field wide open for anyone with the interest to become the best of the new age. Since the old heads are gone all but for good, this is the opportunity for anybody to get in and become the club's resident expert in something, anything. (Except computers. We have enough about BBS and baud rates now.)

The bottom line, fellow members: CONTRIBUTE. Nothing will come of your \$16 per year without your interest. I still send my DX news to Glenn and my QSL news to Sam. I hope that my contributions will be worthy of your perusal, and I'd dearly love to read of what you've heard, received, thought of, designed, or whatever. If it's got to do with SWBC, let the world know, please!

And finally, to our friends from Oz. Thanks for your news and info via Talkback. It's the only regular DX show I hear that has a lot of useful info. Keep it up.

QSLers, take note! Gerry seems to have developed a good technique. Has anyone else had a similar experience? The issue of contributions concerns us all. Organizations like NASWA exist because people like you and me take the time to contribute their time, the fruits of their labors, and their talents — all for the common good.

I must take one very strenuous exception to Gerry's letter: I do not, in fact, believe that we have had enough of the subject of computers. Used intelligently the computer is able to lighten the burden of many formerly unpleasant tasks. Logs, in particular, are an ideal target for the computer's talents. Furthermore, I only wish that I had a modem so that I could have access to any of the communications BBS [bulletin boards] — of which there are several.

Those with computers can leave me notes on UBIX (ID = KA3JJZ) or the ODDX board (ID = Mike Agner).

By the time this reaches print, it will already have started — I will start it on 15 February.

That sounds like fun. Are there other such SWL/DX nets available? If so, let me know and I will gladly tell the NASWA membership about them. Specifically, is there one in the Providence area?

I have a few tips that I thought you might find interesting.

□ First, I have developed a real interest in the 40 meter band, and you might want to try it, too. Why? you ask incredulously. Well, yes, I know that there is a lot of 'interference' (from the SWLer's point of view, that is) from Amateur Radio operators (it is an Amateur band in the western hemisphere), but there is a lot of very good SWL there as well. Frequently, the 40 meter band sits comfortably between the maximum- and lowest-usable frequency. I have had some very good luck particularly with Eastern Europe; even the BBC is to be found there. Don't let the problems with this band put you off.

□ Do you start your day at 5:00AM? I do, and I find that a cup of coffee doesn't always do the trick. If you want to get your blood moving in the morning, I suggest that you try one or another of the more powerful 60 meter band stations of Central and South America. The music has a really infectious charm to it. My own favorite is Ecos de Torbes in San Cristóbal, Venezuela — 4980kHz. Reception is pretty good until sunrise. Some of the Peruvian stations can provide some really lovely music — I've

heard some extraordinarily nice things on Radio Ancash (4991kHz) and Radio Andina (4995 kHz).

Are there any other early risers? How do you start your day? What stations do you listen to whilst the coffee is brewing?

✓ *Future Topics* ✓

I thought that it might be useful to examine some of the options for topics of conversation for the next few months or so. In any event, your suggestions are always welcome, and those that follow are meant to start you thinking. So as to keep the topics as relevant as possible, the only requirement is that they must be for use in CONTACT; if there are things that you would like to see in other columns, write to the appropriate editor - he/she would love to hear from you. Here are a couple of topic areas to get us started; more next month.

— The state of shortwave broadcasting —

No, I don't mean the state of the ionosphere - that is getting to be something of a dead horse, so let's not beat it any more: we all know that things are not as good as they might be. Rather, I refer to content: do you agree with Mike Nikolich's letter (above) that broadcasters seem to be upgrading the quality of their programming? Or what about specific broadcasters? Radio Moscow, in particular, never ceases to amaze me: I have frequently been moved to wonder if they and I are living on the same planet in the same solar system in the same galaxy. This, however, is generally true only of RM's news programs: programs having to do with other topics, such as science, are less prone to this problem. But there are other examples worthy of discussion - the question is: what is it that you find particularly interesting in the way a culture 'puts itself across' on shortwave? This brings us to -

— News on shortwave —

Do you rely, in whole or in part, on shortwave as your source of news? If not, why not? If so, which broadcasters do you listen to for their news programs? Why? How do you deal with cultural/political/economic bias that these broadcasters may evidence? Does this bias necessarily negate the value of the news they broadcast? Of most particular interest is the following question: How do you think U.S. news programs compare to those of other broadcasters? I ask this question because it has been fashionable in the past to assert that the American press is just as biased as any other, but that as it is our bias as well, we just don't notice it. I have my own thoughts about this - write to me and we'll compare notes in CONTACT.

SUNDAY

1205-1230: "Austrian Coffe Table" (O.R.F.). This is a program of music and light conversation. Each week features a different type of music: pop, classical, jazz, and pop songs from the 1920's, 30's, and 40's in Austria. (15.320. Repeated at 0300 on 6.155)

0210-0230: "The Grapevine" (Swiss Radio International). A mailbag program, but the men who host this show are slightly whacky. If there can be a slapstick on radio, this is it. Of course they also answer listeners' questions and read listeners' comments, but the strength of the program is the sense of humor of the two announcers. Also they feature listeners' poetry (humorous) about the program. If you feel like indulging the comic muse, listen to the program a few times and then give them your best humorous verse. (9.885/6.135/9.725. Repeated at 0400 on the same frequencies). Every other week.

MONDAY

2305-2330: "Scanning the Pages" (Radio Sofia). This is a monthly program, but it's hard to predict whether it will come on the last Monday of the month or the first Monday of the month. That varies. The program usually concentrates on literature, Bulgarian and international works in translation in Bulgaria, but there are also some more political shows, one of which featured the reports at a symposium on nuclear disarmament, another of which featured the book, The Rise and Fall of the Bulgarian Connection about the supposed Bulgarian involvement in the assassination attempt on Pope John Paul II. (6.070/11.720. Repeated at 0135 on 6.070 and at 0435 on 7.115). Once a month.

0230-0235: "A Letter from Egypt" (Radio Cairo). Each week focuses on a single topic of interest rather than the usual "letter from--" format. Past programs have featured a population study conducted in Egypt, Kuwaiti investment in the country, and improved economic and cultural relations between Egypt and the Sudan (9.475/ 9.675)

TUESDAY

0140-0150: "Folk Music" (Radio Prague). A program of Czechoslovakian folk music, pretty much as the title suggests. Each week has a specific theme or featured group, one week featuring songs played at a Prague exposition in the 1890's, another week featuring a Czechoslovakian brass band. By the way, what do you call a Czechoslovakian who steals from his friends? Give up? A bad Czech, of course. (5.930/7.345/9.740/11.990). Every other week.

0305-0400: "Skyline" (Radio Earth via WHRI). Program on Astronomy hosted by Dave Rosenthal covering the latest happenings in astronomy. Lots of news on when and where to look for special sky events including meteor showers, eclipses, planetary groupings, and other major events. Relative well prepared and presented although the host does tend to speak too fast. (7.355). Tom Laskowski, West Lafayette, Indiana.

WEDNESDAY

- 1235-1240: "Austria and the UN." (O.R.F.). A brief program featuring Austria's national relations with all the UN agencies based in Vienna, like the Palestinian Refugee Organization. Interviews with UN officials and general information about the doings of the United Nations agencies in Vienna. (15.320. Broadcast earlier on Tuesdays at 0135 on 6.155 and 0335 on the same frequency).
- 1425-1430: "Korean Folktales and Literature" (Radio Korea). This program shows up sporadically on Wednesdays as part of the magazine show "Seoul Calling". Reads Korean poetry or a Korean folktale. This show may have been discontinued or moved to another time, since I haven't heard it in the last few weeks.

THURSDAY

- 0130-0135: "Headliners" (Radio Havana Cuba). A brief interview with people making the news, especially Latin American news. Several shows have featured interviews with leaders of the El Salvadorian revolutionary movement. (6.090/6.140/9.740. Repeated at 0330 and 0530 on the same frequencies).
- 0220-0230: "Daily Life in Brazil" (Radiobras). A brief look at the things that make up daily life in Brazil. One program featured a tradition house warming ceremony, another a famous artists' quarter of Rio de Janeiro, and the most recent featured the recent flooding problems in the city and the government's failure to take effective flood control measures. (11.745). Every other week.

FRIDAY

- 0035-0100: "Home in the U.S.S.R." (Radio Moscow). An attempt to give a picture of issues important to Russians and what daily life is like in the USSR. Some programs have featured biographies of the early revolutionaries, and others have featured things such as workers' tribunals, the subway system, and an interview with a Russian couple who had emigrated to the United States and then returned to Russia after eight years. (5.915/7.115/7.310. Repeated at 0235 on the same frequencies).
- 0120-0130: "Cuban Music" (Radio Havana Cuba). Features two songs by Cuban artists and some commentary about the group or the singer. It is continued at 0135 after a brief interruption for a special feature. Good Cuban music. (6.090/6.140/9.740. Repeated at 0320 and 0520 on the same frequencies).

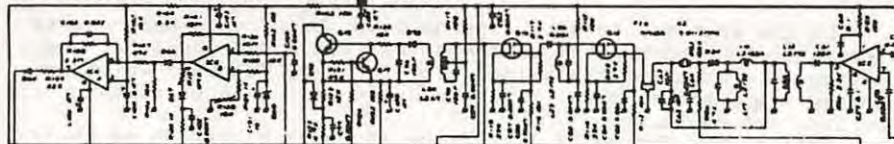
SATURDAY

- 2115-2130: "The Pleasure's Yours" (BBC). A listeners' classical request show with dedications and greetings to listeners all over the world. (15.260/15.070). Tom Laskowski, West Lafayette, IN.
- 0107-0130: "Spotlight on Science" (Radio Canada International) A very good program devoted to current topics in Canadian scientific research. Usually limited to three topics per week. (5.960/9.755). Tom Laskowski, West Lafayette, IN.

FUN WITH WWU OR TIME MARCHES ON

It usually happens to me about once or twice a month. I come home from the salt mines and, as I enter my living room, I am greeted by a blinking time display on my UCR. Yep. The power fritzed out sometime during the day and the clocks need to be reset. Ain't no big thing, my trusty Casio is lithium powered and relatively accurate. But just in case it is off too many seconds I flip on the good old electric radio and tune to 10000 khz.

Bing...bing...bing...bing...!

Click...click...click...click...click...click...!

"At the tone, twenty three hours, fourteen minutes Coordinated Universal Time."

With that I zero in the old Casio and proceed to set the other clocks that have gone down in the brown out.

I must confess that I am a bit of a time freak. Having a watch set to the tones of Fort Collins, Colorado when everyone else in the office is glancing up at the questionable Honeywell on the wall (It is four minutes, thirtyseven seconds off) is a joy known only to compulsive people and those born under the sign of Virgo. You have the joy of smirking and shaking your head when the bus is twentyone seconds late, or your "three minute" egg looks properly cooked in two minutes, fiftytwo seconds. Time nuts are just so darn sure of themselves.

But there are other uses for WWU, WWUH besides driving your normal friends bonkers with your self righteousness.

WWU, and WWUH, broadcasting 24 hours a day on 2.5, 5, 10, 15, and 20 Mhz gets its time signal from a super accurate atomic clock. This clock establishes its time scale from the zero-field atomic resonance of the element cesium. This clock is in fact too accurate when measured against the true rotation of the earth. This means that every few years the engineers at Fort Collins have to add a "Leap" second to compensate. Of all the QSL cards in my collection the one that draws the most attention from uninitiated observers is my 31 December, 1979 2359:50 UTC "Leap Second" card.

Correct "Zulu" time is important to the DXer who wants to give accurate reception reports. Quite a few of my radio buddies have started to take advantage of the stereo "Boom Box" cassette players for taping these listening sessions. It is easy to wire one of these K-Mart specials up so that one channel is copying your incoming signal and the other is sucking up a time signal station from another receiver. This provides you with a record that can make your signal reports "down to the second" perfect.

WWU and WWUH also provide a plethora of data in amongst their super fine time piece.

At 8,9, and 10 minutes after the hour on WWU and at 48, 49, and 50 minutes after the hour on WWUH, marine storm warning reports are broadcast. Now if I were a serious utility DXer I would think that a storm warning might point me in the direction to seek out maritime signals that might prove especially interesting. These announcements are fortyfive seconds in duration and are provided by the National Weather Service.

On the 18th minute after the hour WWV broadcasts Geophysical Alerts. These reports include the solar flux and A index for the previous UTC day also the K index for Boulder, Colorado which is updated every three hours.. This bulletin will also predict conditions for the next 24 hours.

What's that Bunkay??? All of the above is gibberish to you??? Ain't no big thing. Scientists are still arguing over what it means too. Why should you be any different? Radio types have a good practical understanding of this data's meaning so listen up and you too can start your own personal A index chart to aid a abet your Dx talent.

The solar flux is expressed as a numerical figure. A figure of 65 or lower would be listed in years of minimum solar activity. An intermediate figure would range from 100 to 200. High solar numbers tend to mean bad news for HF and good news for VHF.

The A index is usually the most widely discussed figure among DX folk. The A index is a 24 hour figure expressing the geomagnetic field of Mother Earth. The scale runs from 0 to 400+. The lower the value the better the overall propagation conditions.

The K index is just the A index but given on a more current basis on a slightly different mathematical scale in order to account for more subtle changes. The K index can be deceptive in that it represents conditions only at Boulder, Colorado.

Many other factors figure into propagation monitoring such as latitude and direction but a brief listen at 18 past the hour each day as compared to what you are logging will make you a basic MUF maven in no time at all. A more technical explanation of the WWV Geoalearnts can be had by writing NOAA, Space Environment Services Center R43, Boulder, Co 80303.

If you are a true time junkie you will feel the need to purchase Heathkit's GC-1000 clock. This \$249.95 box contains a series of microprocessor controlled receivers that track WWV and its BCD 100 Kz subcarrier to give you a permanently accurate clock good to within 10 milliseconds.

The most unique use I have ever found for WWV time signals is to be found in The Book of Worship for the United States Forces. This book explains in detail how you can have your unit radioman tune in WWV to allow you to tune your guitar. You see every third minute after the hour the tones are set at 440 Kz concert pitch. Uncle Sam thinks of everything.

Now if your new to the time signal game you might ask yourself, "Self... How can I tell if I'm hearing WWV or WWUH since they are broadcasting on the same frequencies?" No sweat Sherlock! WWV makes its time announcement at 7.5 seconds before the minute. WWUH, broadcasting from Kekaha Kauai, Hawaii makes its time announcement at fifteen seconds before the minute. The time announcement on WWUH is also done in a female voice. Whenever the bands are open and I hear that woman's voice coming across the airwaves, my mind wanders to sandy beaches and Mu Mu clad island women doing the Hula and chanting

"At the tone, twentythree hours, fortyseven minutes Coordinated Universal Time."

I'm an incurable romantic at times.

Keep those cards and letters coming folks!

The DX Season marches on! I hope everyone took advantage of the prime winter months to log some of the great DX that was showing up. In our area, the great Papua New Guinea chase is still on although definitely on the down-turn as the nights get shorter and the sunrise profile changes.

Since I renewed my membership to FRENEX, scarcely a single issue has gone by that doesn't make reference to the lack of DX activity being caused by our current position in the solar cycle. Yes, depending on who you talk to, we are in a sunspot minima but no, it doesn't have to dampen DX. How sunspot activity affects the DX'er is a point of perspective. I would like to remind those who would blame Old Sol for their DX "woes" that high sunspot numbers only increase the Maximum Usable Frequency (MUF) and tend to enhance reception on frequencies above 7 MHz. Also, increased ionization resulting from higher sunspot numbers tends to increase absorption of frequencies below 7 MHz by the "D" layer of the ionosphere. The winters of 1985, 86, 87 and possibly 88 will provide the best opportunity for DX'ers to try and log the difficult catches in the 120, 90, 75, 60 and 49 meter bands. More directly, go hear the hard ones now and let others wring their hands about sunspots!

Organization is one of the first steps in becoming a DX'er who gets maximum enjoyment from each hour invested in listening. Last month I made note that a point is reached, which seems to be around 100 countries heard, where random dial spinning becomes counter productive (no pun intended). A level of planning then becomes necessary to be able to effectively increase your country totals. The level of planning can be as simple or extensive as you wish. The important thing is to settle on a plan or system that works for you and use it.

There are important factors that enter into formulating a plan which will help make the most of the time you have available for DX'ing. A worthwhile project for an evening might be to sit down and evaluate your hobby goals. For many, initial hobby goals are to hear, log and OSL as many countries on the air as possible. Along the way, other interests such as awards, specialization in DX'ing a certain Continent or Country and DX'ing a particular group of frequencies such as the Tropical Bands will no doubt perk your interest.

To know where you are going, you need to know where you have been. The best framework for a SWBC plan, the one I personally use, is the NASWA country list. Like the ARRL country list for Amateur Radio, the NASWA countries list has been long accepted in the SWBC hobby world as the "standard." These are available from the Awards Manager or Headquarters for \$2.00. After obtaining one of these, compile a list of countries heard and countries verified. This will provide an overall picture of which countries you need to log and which have been logged and verified.

Now that you know where you have been in the way of which countries already heard and verified, the DX'er can see which countries are needed and begin to formulate the basis of a plan which will show where listening efforts need to be concentrated.

ODDX, in keeping with Ed Shaw's wish to assist the hobby, offers a 20+ page country list modeled after the NASWA list. While this tool is designed to work in conjunction with the current NASWA country list, it additionally provides up to two representative SWBC outlets for each NASWA country along with frequencies and times each outlet is available. All information is compiled from current loggings appearing in recent major hobby publications and where possible, verified by ODDX members. This list can be obtained by sending \$3.00 to:

This month, I am happy to feature how one very successful DX'er, Dr. Harold Cones (DR. DX) organizes his DX activities. Why is Harold called "Dr. DX?" Because his license plates say "Dr. DX." What more do you want?

Planning a DX Accident

What makes a DXer different from a SWL? Over the years, I have watched various folks staunchly defend their territory as if the final outcome of the nuclear winter depended on it--in fact I have seen almost whole issues of hobby magazines dissolve into arguments between SWLs and DXers. My feeling is that the hobby is a big one and everyone is doing the right thing for themselves, fulfilling their particular needs in the hobby; no one activity, nor any one person more right than any other activity or person. So why the soapbox oratory? Well, if I am going to discuss the organization of DXing, I may somehow hurt the feelings of some SWLs, and I just want you to know my viewpoint (and besides, it is a statement I have wanted to see printed in the hobby press for some time!). I am more of a DXer than a SWL. I SWL while doing my bills or writing letters, using the BBC much the same as some folks use Muzak. It helps me keep up with things and I SWL on a regular basis (I guess I have a lot of bills to pay.) But, for me, there is no thrill there; the thrill comes late at night or early in the morning when Mom Nature throws a quirk in the propagation conditions my way and suddenly I am listening to a 1 KW local service from a remote Pacific island and hearing it well enough to respond with a valid reception report. Those accidents, although at times just occurring, are usually planned. Yes, I am up at that hour with my radio tuned to the correct frequency, but I usually don't just get up in the middle of the night and flip on the switch. I have organized this accident and caused it to happen. In my opinion, organization is THE key to successful DXing (and, I might add, the fact that I successfully set up this accident is a nice ego trip!). But none of it would have been possible without organization and a great deal of homework, and it is these two things that separate the casual SWL from the dedicated DXer.

So how does one organize? I would guess that there are as many ideas about this as there are organizers. The key, of course, is what works for you. Since I have been at the hobby with a fair degree of success for some time, Chuck asked me to share my methodology with you. I am sure he would like to hear from you with your ideas since we can all profit from more streamlined organization.

The first step is a pack of 5x8 lined notecards, which are used to keep collected information in a standard noncumbersome format. Scrapes of paper and matchbook covers containing important DX information always seem to walk off just when you need them. A made-to-order slot in your desk for the cards keeps everything tidy and available. Now that you have the format, you need to know what you want to hear. I keep and maintain a "hit list" of my top ten or so targets. This list not only contains the information about frequencies and such from the WRTM but also information on alternate frequencies, best time of day for reception, QSL data (such as verification signers, which could be of some help later), and grayline information. This material is obtained from many sources, but one of the best is the careful combing of several years of back issues of all your hobby magazines. In addition, propagation predictions should be noted on the cards. These are available from several sources (but remember, propagation predictions are just that, often with about the same reliability as weather predictions). Each station on your hit list should have its own card with as much of this type of information as you can muster up. Grayline information (a future column will no doubt cover this important aspect of good DX catches) can be determined from several computer programs available or with the DX Edge, available from Gilfer (just an off the wall note--using Grayline information, members of the Old Dominion DX Association were able to determine that we would have a six-week grayline opening for Papua New Guinea from early January to mid-February. Papuas are very rare in Virginia, but by using this

information, the excellent ODDX organization, and my cards. I received and sent reception reports to twelve PNG regionals). In addition to the cards on my hit list, I also set up six cards, each representing four hours GMT. The results from your review of the loggings sections of the various hobby magazines are then placed in "time-heard" order on these cards, followed by the frequency (pay close attention to the state from which the logging came--for us east coast DXers, California logs of the exotic Far East are generally useless, but do not rule them out. Try converting them to your local sunrise and placing a mark after their entry to remind you it is a dubious one). These cards are then used for routine listening for stations you need--if you are listening at 0500, you only need the 0400-0800 card in front of you rather than a whole pile of notes and aids. A special card can also be constructed for a special purpose, such as the Papua card, listing all stations, notes on loggings, and so on. I find the 5x8 cards to be big enough to hold all my data yet small enough to be easily stored and tucked away for the many ODDX allnighters (they fit very nicely in a pocket in the front cover of the WRTM or RDI.)

I also keep a number of well organized notebooks with many color keyed dividers. These are used to hold any special items collected, such as the list of British Commonwealth countries Kap provided in the March FRENDX. Or special columns from the hobby press, such as the article on DXing Papua New Guinea in a recent Monitoring Times. There are also sections on awards, foreign language reports, countries verified, countries needed to fulfill FRENDX awards, and an endless variety of other things. The important thing about these notebooks is that they are so well organized I can lay my hands on anything in just a few seconds.

Needless to say, your shack must be organized as well. You should lay it out so that everything is in a logical place, and once used, returns to that place. Ever get up in the middle of the night to catch a really good one and reach for a pencil only to find that your daughter carried it off to do her math assignment and it resides no-you-know-not-where and the voice in th headphones is saying, "This is the voice of Nibi Nibi" and you feel like crying and.....? Avoid this problem by keeping extra pens, pencils, and pads. It may sound ho-hum now, but wait until it happens to you the first time.

The word processor has also been a valuable aid in my organization. In addition to keeping records, I use it for reception reports. I spend a great deal of time constructing a master report, in whatever language, which, when needed, is brought up and the blanks filled in. This also enables special reports to be written, such as for the Venezuelans or the Ecuadorians, that are personalized but do not require long hours of typing and the use of a foreign language dictionary each time they are used. When a follow up is needed (and you know when because of your excellent record keeping) you have an original in a matter of seconds.

These are a few of my ideas. Organization is a matter of personal preference but is something that is absolutely necessary to capture the tough DX countries. Unlike the SWL, who can get hold of a good monthly list of 500 KW stations and their broadcast schedules from a number of sources, the DXer must be able to "Sherlock Holmes" the information from many sources, then organize it so that a rare DX "accident" happens. If not organized in a logical, easily used system, finding Nepal on the dial would be like trying to find Chuck Rippl in a generic, nonalphabetized telephone directory.

If you think about it, effective DX'ing needs to have some pre-planning. As your countries needed list becomes smaller, the level of planning and the sophistication of those plans will increase. Good planning is also an effective hedge against hobby burn out. Getting up at 3 AM every morning for a week to hear an elusive station which doesn't show can try every fiber in your body. Doing this and then finding out the station you have been searching for has changed from a summer to a winter schedule or vice versa is as exasperating as it is unnecessary.

There is another important point that can be made here. With all the SWBC outlets that have left the air combined with those thinking of leaving, it is good news indeed to see one coming on the air. It was rumored that one SWBC hobby group was aware of this information at least 1 week before it became known to the SWBC "general public" but chose not to release it. This selfish line of thinking detracts from our hobby and is certainly counter to NASWA's Unity and Friendship slogan. It is the policy of DX'ers Forum to make available DX related topics in a manner supportive of both the hobby and NASWA's Unity and Friendship slogan.

The NASWA Country List and Awards Booklet is available from me for \$2.00 postpaid in North America, \$3.00 via airmail elsewhere.


The NASWA Country List Committee will soon meet to add the Marshall Islands to the list. Approval will be retroactive to the first day of operation of WSZO.

Computer Corner

Here we are AGAIN! Hope that all the nasty weather is over with, and that we can get back to something enjoyable... I hate having it 70 one day and snowing the next! Anyway, so much for my complaining. Bill Krause of the ANARC Computer Information Committee, recently published an article discussing interference from our friend the computer...

RF INTERFERENCE & THE HOME COMPUTER

The home computer is one of the best friends the radio hobbyist has. But like alot of our best friends, it has one very annoying bad habit. The home computer's bad habit is that it is a source of RF interference. All home computers, from the most expensive to the least expensive, are guilty to some extent. How much interference the computer generates, generally speaking, is not so much a reflection of the cost of the computer, so much as its date of purchase. While, for reasons to be explained shortly, the more expensive units do have some tendency to be less of a problem, the tightening of regulations governing RF emissions of newer computers is a more significant factor. Lets have a look at what in the computers causes the interference, and some possible ways of managing the problem.

The most significant source of RF interference related to the use of home computers comes from the TV set that they are usually hooked up to and the RF modulator which transmits the computers video and audio signals to the TV. Monitors, commonly used with more expensive setups and sometimes with less expensive ones, do not generate as much RF interference because they do not make use of the RF modulator, which is a miniature TV transmitter, and because they do not have a tuner stage. However, while monitors create significantly less interference than do conventional TVs, they still must be considered a serious cause of RF interference. A second very significant source of RF is the electrical line noise generated by the power supply of the computer and any peripherals such as printers that might also be hooked up. Finally, there is the computer itself. There are usually crystal oscillating circuits and other electronic components within the computer itself that generate considerable RF interference.

So, how do we minimize the impact of all this RF on our ability to enjoy the radio hobby? Well, let's briefly look at each source of RF and deal with them in turn. First, let's look at the TV and the RF modulator associated with it. the cost of monochrome monitors now begin at \$50 and color monitors begin around \$130. If the computer is viewed more as a serious tool rather than primarily as a game machine with only minor side benefits, then even the user of less expensive computers such as the VIC-20 or Timex-Sinclair would be well advised to seriously consider a monitor. Besides making less trouble for your radio, the monitor will provide considerable better readability for the computer. Another thing that can be done in this area is to use the best possible connecting cables, the ones with the most shielding. Also keep the length of the cables as

short as possible for your particular setup. These suggestions will help you deal with the most significant source of RF from the home computer.

Another big source of RF interference is the power supply of the computer itself and some of its associated peripherals such as a printer. There is really only one thing you can do about this and that is to keep your computer and its attachment as far away from your radio as possible. But of course if you are going to use the two together in any sort of meaningful way, there will be real limitations as to just how far you can go. However, it should be possible to plug the radio and the computer in on different outlets, at opposite ends of the room if possible. I have found that this can make an appreciable difference.

Finally, there is the computer itself and its own electronic circuitry. This is a tougher problem, but a problem you can deal with to some extent. First, as I mentioned earlier, newer versions of computers, even of the same make and model, have been forced by the FCC to reduce their RF emissions. Generally speaking, they have accomplished this by adding more internal shielding, but sometimes simply by using newer and higher grade electronic components. One manufacturer was able to reduce the number of components by two-thirds while producing a machine that worked just as well as the original! This undoubtedly reduced RF emissions in their computers. But how can you approach the problem? Again, keeping the computer and radio as far apart as possible will help. Another approach is to provide your own shielding. Wrapping as much of your computer as possible in a couple of layers of aluminum foil will make quite a difference. It won't do anything for esthetics, but it will make your radio alot happier! WARNING! MAKE SURE YOU KNOW EXACTLY WHAT YOU ARE DOING AND WHERE TO PUT THE FOIL IN YOUR COMPUTER BEFORE TURNING ON THE POWER SWITCH!!!

It is an unavoidable fact that your home computer is going to cause RF interference that will affect your radio, and probably the family TV as well. It is, though, a problem which can be managed in a manner so as to reduce the impact of the RF interference to a minimum. A home computer and radio CAN co-exist in the same home, indeed in the same room, and they can even work together for the enjoyment of their user.

ANARC BBS UPDATE:

Some INTERESTING news from Bill Cole:

We have been operating at 1200 as well as 300 baud since February 25 and have been testing our new Xmodem file transfer since March 1. There were some initial bugs, but they seem to have been worked out. Callers are now welcome to use the Xmodem feature to up and download.

There is another change to the board worth noting; we no longer carry Radio Canada International's Program Previews as part of the International Forum. RCI has not provided us with any information since July 1986. Numerous requests by Bill Krause and I to Ian McFarland did not produce results so it was dropped effective 3/6/87. However, we have a replacement waiting in the wings. Al Quaglieri, who does the African DX column in SPEEDX, is now uploading his material to us. We intend to have the African DX column online in the International Forum by 3/11/87.

It was previously announced that Dan Ferguson of THE GUIDE TO ENGLISH SHORTWAVE BROADCASTS would be supporting the BBS with updates for the North American Database. Dan proposed that we give him free advertising on the board in return for his providing schedule updates. We carried Dan's ad for three months in the BBS Information section and received nothing in return. In fact, Dan is behind in providing our paid subscription; we have not had an issue since October 1986. Dan has not responded to inquires about the status of the GUIDE.

The ANARC BBS maintains files on usage. We have an individual's total calls on a monthly and yearly basis. We also tally on-line time on a per-call basis. Some interesting statistics are available from this information. During the period January 1 - February 28, 1987, the ANARC BBS had 266 users on-line. There were 131 callers in January and 135 in February. During February the BBS was in use 1484 minutes (24.7 hours). The average length of a call was 10.9 minutes and our users call on an average of 1.7 times per month. During February the calls ranged from one call per user to 10 by user Stan Gammons. Stan is the undisputed champ in 1987 with a grand total of 15 calls! (ed note: guess AT&T loves Stan, hihi!)

We also have information on uncompleted calls. So far in 1987, there have been 18 callers who disconnected when asked to provide their name during log-on. Finally, there were 78 calls that came in at an incompatible baud rate. Prior to our adding 1200 baud capability, we were averaging 10 disconnects per week due to baud incompatibility. Since February 25, we are averaging less than 2 calls per week disconnected. Obviously there are a few people out there with 2400 baud or higher capability. The BBS also logs a caller's baud rate. Currently 60% of the calls being taken come in at 300 baud, 40% at 1200 baud.

COMING NEXT MONTH!

I received a very nice letter this month from Doug McClure, my counterpart at ASWLC. Seems Doug is also a member of NASWA, and has offered to join in a swap of information for our respective columns! Great idea, so next month, we will have his article on DATABASES...don't know what those are? Stay tuned!

A Z O R E S RDP Intl, Lisbon, reported 13/3: Portuguese TV (RTP) Azores will soon start xmtg weekly nx & current affairs pgm for US- and Canada-based Azoreans by a DBS system, Dir of Azores Emigration Dept, Duarte Mendes, has said in Angra do Heroismo that the obstacles placed by RTP admn in the way of the project's materialisation had now been removed. Weekly summary of political, economic and cultural events in the archipelago will be available to anyone equipped to receive the DBS system or for re-xmsn, or otherwise, by TV stns serving areas where the viewership is made up mainly of Azorean immigrants (WBI 20/3) Like New Bedford MA? Hardly a majority there, are they? Unfortunately there are no DBS services operating to North America, so what do they think they are doing? Ordinary TVRO interception is not DBS, which implies intent to broadcast--higher fqs & power, smaller dishes (gh)

B O L I V I A Panamericana net reported 7/3: R&TV Directorate of the Transport & Comms Ministry has fined the La Paz TV stns 500 bolivianos, because they failed to comply with articles 32 & 38 of the comms rules & regs, that before any pgm is bc it must be presented to the R&TVD for review... (WBI 13/3)

C A N A D A Japan has introduced legislation designed to allow RCI to use facilities of NHK to beam pgms to China and other parts of Asia; the bcs are expected to begin in Apr 1988 (CP, Tokyo, Montréal Gazette, 6/3 via Andy Rugg FQ)
RCI reported 5/3: the govt has ancd that CBC would receive 880 megabux for fiscal year beginning 1/4, an increase of 1.3%. With inflation of 4-5%, new budget represents net loss in funding for CBC. As a result, net has ancd plans to eliminate 325 jobs and reduce pgming (WBI 13/3)

C H A D Monitoring 11-17 Feb: The official Chadian Natl Radio in Ndjamena continues to QSY to avoid QRM. The 60mb channel, 05-07 & 16-22 has been obs since 11/2 on 4960, ex-4898; but 4904.5 is still ancd. Daytime 1025-16 xmsns still on 7100 instead of ancd 7120 (WBI 20/2)

C O L O M B I A AFP reported 11/2: Col police report that 2 employees of the private RCN net's key stn were injured when a bomb exploded early this morn. The explosive device destroyed front part of RCN's xmtg mast in heart of Medellín. Damage was considerable. Police said that per a report by a child, 2 young men placed the bomb at the door of the bldg, while a 3rd person waited for them on a motorcycle. Several hours later, anon call from the Pedro León Arboleda guerrilla front of the Marxist-Leninist PIA (EPL) claimed responsibility. There have been no arrests (WBI 27/2)

El Tiempo, Bogotá, reported 12/3: Comms Minister Edmundo López Gómez ancd the replacement of obsolete eqp used by radio monitoring stns. Plans to replace eqp incl purchase of machines to repro high-speed magnetic tape cassettes (15 MP); mobile units to control stn programing, particularly for those stns in remote municipalities (40 MP); construxion and eqp of new Hq of monitoring stn and pgming control group on Cali (20 MP), and mobile radio-monitoring units (50 MP)... (WBI 20/3) Whew; will be interesting to see if all this results in less fq variation, more harmonic suppression, redution in cland bcs, already minimal. Let us hope that 'control stn programing' is an inadequate translation--in Spanish, 'control' is more likely to mean 'monitor' (gh)

I presume they have now tuned up the xmtr on the harmonic, as the signal is very strong. Check out this novelty before they realise it, as this one was not normally hrd. The reports also recommended a bcng tribunal be established, ads be limited to 10 mins an hour w/none on Suns, and limiting comml bcs to about 5hpd. Other recommendations incl consideration being given to introing comml radio, licensing video tape distributors, and strengthening censorship powers and provision being made for low-powered community radio stns (WBI 20/2)

P A R A G U A Y La Tarde, Asunción, reported 5/3: after a 90-day suspension ordered by its dir Humberto Rubín, R Ñandutí will be back on air 14/4. RÑ suspended bcs because of jamming of its ads and other pgms. This jamming caused stn's economic collapse and put 50 employees, who are now collecting virtually no pay, out of work... Rubín has ancd that 'we are in a state of complete uncertainty, but we intend to be back on the air on 14/4 and we expect that there will be no heavy jamming'. V of Unity, V of Muslim Mujaheds of Afghanistan, in Pashto hostile to the Russian presence on Afghan soil, is on 11490 9905 9215 0130-0230 & 1530-1630. 9215 in the morning and 9905 in the evening are jammed by Soviets (Supratik Sanatani, Calcutta, Feb IDXCI ADXR) Tent. on 9905 0156-0213 15/1 in Dari?, Isl mx, 0203-0208 nx, and at 1557-1625 same day, Dari? nx, native mx, 1625 IS before s/off, both 34333 (Kenji Hashimoto, Japan, DSWCI SWN)

V of Tamil Eelam, of the Tamil Eelam Communist Party, is a Tamil separatist stn hostile to the SL govt in Colombo. First monitored 6/11/86 tho stns with this name have been known to exist since latter half of 1983. Evidence of other stns IDing as VOTE, one of which appears to be hostile to the genuine stn. Both operate similar skeds. 0430-0520 Tamil, 0520-0530 EG on 9705; 1330-1420 Tamil, 1420-1430 EG on 7010 (WBI 6/3)

Patriot, Delhi, reported 6/3: A powerful SW xmsn emanating from Sri Lankan territory has started increasingly vociferous 'pro-Khalistan' bcs. Meant for "North Indian listeners," pgm of about 2h duration daily is in Punjabi & EG. Over last few weeks, bcs concentrate on 'historic importance of Gen A.S. Vaidya's assassination...contributed handsomely to the cause' [as published]. Xmsn on 7010, 9705, 9675, 9560 are in morn and late eve hours. Cland bc on 7010 is a clear intrusion into the radio hams' bands, where no other [sic] being activity is allowed. Xmsn calls itself V of Tamil Eelam. Already exists a stn of same name, considered v popular and of older version. However, there is no similarity whatsoever betw the contents of the two bcs. While the pro-Khalistan bcs primarily engage in spreading anti-India sentiments, the older clandestine activity is more in tune to its name, and has been being items concentrating on the ethnic issues in the island. What has given credence to the fact that the 'pseudo' voice is operating from SL terr is that this radio activity overcomes jamming from Eelam militants. Comms experts and experienced 'hams' believe that this pirate stn is using SLBC's xmtg facility at Ekala near Colombo which is eqpd w/ two 100 kW and three 35 kW xmtrs, adequate enough to reach North India [see published sked a few pages back]. The first indication of the hostile radio pgming targeted to N India was confirmed when in Jan last, listeners monitored the anti-India bcs in Mhow in Madhya Pradesh (WBI 20/3)

VOTE, 7010, w/nx in EG hostile to India, almost daily on this outlet; at 1420, SIO 333; sometimes using 9705, last hrd 14/1 (Kanwarjit Sandhu, Ludhiana, India, Feb IDXCI ADXR)

V of Burmese People per recent press reports, Burmese govt troops are mapping [sic] up remnants of a communist guerilla force after a fierce two months' fight to retake control of a town near the border w/China. Reuter datelined Rangoon 13/1 that two light infantry divisions have consolidated control of Kyuhkok town and two nearby mtn outposts which were retaken from a 1500-strong Burma Communist Party (BCP) force. The northeastern town which had been in hands of the BCP since 1970 and the mtn camps at Hsi Hsi Wan and Ta Pang have been captured by govt forces. BCP with three other ethnic rebel groups had broken a tacit 16-yr truce and launched a surprise attack to drive govt troops off Hsi Hsi Wan and Ta Pang in mid-Nov. Rangoon's counterattack killed 591 BCP-fighters at the cost of 175 of its own men in two months' arduous fighting across rugged mtns over 1200m high and covered by almost impenetrable jungle. Vietnamese Resistance Radio, first obs 22/2/84; ancs that it bcs from Base Camp No 15 of the Natl Unified Front for the Libn of Vietnam. 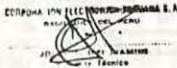


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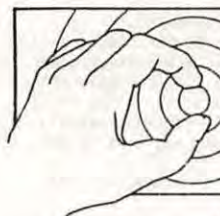
