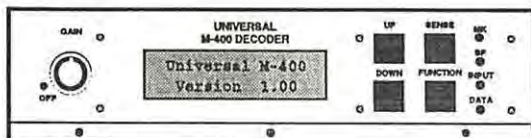

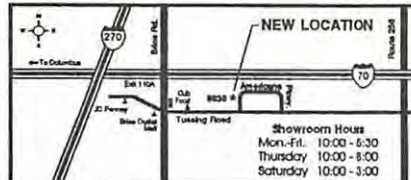

Musings

Hi Gang. Since Bob is looking for Musings, I thought I would share some thoughts about the recent East - West Pennsylvania and Central Maryland NASWA Chapter DXpedition to Gifford Pinchot State Park in mid December. Our Chapter is a small but enthusiast group that specializes in DXpeditions and partying (not necessarily in that order). We formed our little band of travelling radio listeners in October, 1991. Our goal is to organize at least three DXpeditions a season. Never shying away from difficult goals, we have managed to succeed despite some difficult circumstances. This muse will focus on the less publicized side of DXpeditions - the weather.

Listening at home is usually never a problem. Oh, a thunder storm during the summer may cause a set back or two but generally speaking how many problems can you have? Life out in the "field" is different. Especially if you have to travel to get to the "field". Our Chapter's fifth DXpedition to Gifford Pinchot State Park in December gave us a few memorable weather-related experiences to consider in future planning.

The first problem we encountered was the unmovable work schedule of Bob "Big Signal" Brown. Apparently his employer doesn't realize how important Big Signal is in the DX

community. A Saturday work schedule made his attendance at the DXpedition impossible. One down - five to go. The days leading up to our 11-13 December adventure were very strange, weatherwise. In Reading, we received about two inches of snow on Thursday (10 December). The park received about four inches of snow. However, mild temperatures and steady rain turned a winter paradise into mud. Although high winds were knocking down trees and power lines, travelling to the park didn't seem to be a problem. However, that was from Reading. On Friday morning I received a phone call from Dave Valko. It seems little old Dunlo had 29 inches of snow on the ground and more was landing as we spoke! Looks like the weather was going to make this a difficult DXpedition. Dave was stranded in Dunlo (an awful fate, hi!). Two down - four to go. However, if the plow would only come down his street, Dave had an escape route all mapped out. Unfortunately, the weather proved too much of an obstacle to Larry Yamron. FT's publisher was trying to get his kid's snowman to lick some envelopes for mailing that week. Apparently the excessive snow claimed another DXpedition victim. Three down - three to go.

All was not lost. Since the power was knocked out for many hours in Dunlo, Dave had an opportunity to DX from a battery powered rig without local electrical noise. Stuck in his home with no heat, hot water or electricity, Dave sat back and enjoyed listening to the steamy tropics on his shortwave radio. This hobby does provide an interesting escape from time to time.

Amazingly, I was the first to arrive at Gifford Pinchot. Shortly after I opened up the cabin, Hans Johnson arrived. I filled him in on the situation in western PA. After agreeing we would never move to that end of Pennsylvania, we began to unload our gear. It was now time to string some antennas. Normally, this is one of the fun aspects of a DXpedition. Due to the steady rain and high winds, the prospects of advanced antenna design just didn't seem to be too exciting. Nimble Hans quickly strung two antennas before I could offer assistance (not that I would have been any help). In keeping with tradition, the river now running behind our favorite cabin was named after its discoverer, Hans Johnson. The River Johnson (almost sounds biblical!) was brand new thanks to the heavy rains. Explorer Johnson crossed that raging body of water to string two antennas. What a guy!

Shortly thereafter, Fred Kolhbrenner arrived. It is not uncommon for DXers to slightly exaggerate when telling a story. Fred received an earful (or perhaps a bucket full) of news. It looked like our party of six would be only three on Friday night. After briefly mourning the situation, it was time to unpack Fred's gear. It's amazing that Fred can squeeze his radio into his car with all the groceries he brings to these affairs. No supermarket is left untouched as he approaches Gifford Pinchot!

Yes, we did tune the radios that night. Conditions were a little noisy due to the stormy conditions. We managed to hear some good stuff that night and the following morning. But we hoped for better on Saturday evening and Sunday morning.

Early Saturday afternoon Dave Valko arrived. When the snow finally stopped, he measured 36 inches of white stuff. After the plow cleared his street, Dave hit the road. What a trooper! Some people will go to any extreme to get out of town. It was good seeing Dave. We were now four.

After that, things were quite normal. The weather cleared up. The high winds diminished. Listening conditions improved. The log report contains most of the good stuff we heard. However, the most unusual log was that of an Italian station, Radio Europe. We heard a tip on Glenn Hauser's WORLD OF RADIO, that this private Italian station would be broadcasting between 1300-1800 UTC on 25,900 Khz. Here we were at this wonderful DX site with long wires strung in all directions waiting for the test broadcast. Nothing! Nothing on my set or Hans' set. However, Fred was using a Datong active antenna attached to a curtain rod.

You will not find a write up in PROCEEDINGS about this arrangement but it was good enough to pull in a reasonable signal from Radio Europe's test. So much for fancy antennas. I know John Bryant and Dave Clark could explain the reasons for this to happen but who would believe them, hi!

I had to leave on Sunday. While Fred crashed, Dave, Hans and I went out to Bob Evans for the traditional Sunday morning breakfast. Dave, Hans and Fred stayed one more night as I headed back to Wyoming. If I can believe their stories, conditions got even better after I left. Just like fisherman that talk about the one that got away, DXers have a tendency to "extend" the truth. You just can't trust DXers. They have a difficult time separating fact from fiction. Incidentally, Hans fell off the Oreo Wagon. After our first DXpedition in October 1991, Explorer Johnson swore off the tasty cookie treat after consuming many pounds. However temptation got the better of him. I suspect the difficulties we encountered that weekend was too much.

Naturally, we will continue to go on these little radio-related adventures. As a group, we always learn something from each DXpedition. Sometimes we even hear some DX!

In his musing in the 2/93 Journal, Andy Wallace mentioned an article on "Communal DXing" by Brian Cartwright from 1980. I was a member of that group and can remember those days quite well! Dave Valko and I are the only ones left actively DXing. Brian's article is part of NASWA Reprint #D-5, a collection of articles on DXpeditions and group DXing. It costs \$1, postage paid, from the NASWA Company Store. Include another dollar for a catalog of all the approximately 250 reprints available.

This coming Fall semester I'm going to teach a class in Shortwave Broadcast Listening at Teikyo Marycrest University, where I work. (My normal field is teaching English to international students.) The class is going to be a combination of hobby topics and a more academic look at both international and domestic shortwave broadcasting around the world. In planning the class, I'm using both hobby resources and academic communications studies materials. The class will meet for two two-hour sessions each week for fifteen weeks. One hour will be class lecture/discussion and the other a "lab" hour of listening to broadcasts off the air and via prerecorded tapes. The school is going to purchase some receivers and we will put up some rooftop antennas. I've already checked out the third (top) floor room the class is to be held in, and it is surprisingly quiet of electrical noise.

In preparing the class, I'm putting together a cassette library of shortwave stations and programming. The hardest is getting clean, listenable (to a non DXer) tapes of Third World domestic broadcasters. If anyone has studio or good quality recordings of Third World broadcasters and is willing to make some copies for the class, I would really appreciate it. Also, if anyone has tapes made of Eastern European stations during the fall of Communism there, Radio Moscow during the coup, Radio Kuwait during the initial hours of the Iraqi invasion, or other interesting events, I would also appreciate copies of those. I'm finding out now how limited my tape collection is! I can reimburse you for tapes and postage, but please write first.

Finally, I just bought a modem and got on INTERNET at the university (E-mail MOORE@TMU1.MCREST.EDU). However, finding out what SW information one can access via BBSs and INTERNET and other sources is like searching for the proverbial needle in a haystack. I'm sure it would be helpful to more people than just me if some members who are really familiar with what is out there online would write an article or series of articles describing what there is and how to access it. For one thing, I would like to know if there are any E-mail discussion groups and how to access them.

The Trip Of A Lifetime DXing From Dubai

My wife and I had the good fortune to visit my father in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, during the latter half of March. Our travels also took us to Muscat, Oman. So pull out a good map of the region and allow me to share with you my impressions of our first trip ever to the Middle East.

We arrived in Dubai early in on the morning of March 19th. Although the capital of the UAE is Abu Dhabi, Dubai is the commercial center of the country. While I speak some Arabic and studied the region in college, most of my preconceptions were mistaken. I expected a society where we would merely be tolerated and that we could easily fall afoul of if we were not prudent. My first surprise came shortly before our Emirates Airbus touched down. We were shown a short video welcoming us and extolling all the tourist attractions of Dubai. In contrast to some of the states of the region that discourage tourism, Dubai courts it. The leadership is showing quite an amount of foresight in creating economic alternatives for the Emirate even though the natural gas and oil (Dubai has mostly the former) won't run out for decades. Lovely, all-inclusive resorts have been built on the Gulf. The water is beautiful and the sun plentiful—a sure fire combination

for drawing in European tourists.

Another attraction that will bring tourists is the lack of crime in this society. My father never locks his house and simply leaves the car key in the ignition. While a Western woman will draw stares that would be considered impolite in the US, she is completely safe in any section of the city. Criminals are dealt with swiftly in Dubai. Within the UAE, criminal penalties tend to be harsher in the smaller and more conservative emirates. For instance, in Al Fujayrah, two pirates who were caught lost an arm and a leg each.

While the roads are modern, the drivers are not in UAE. In spite of the police patrolling in their Mercedes, people drive with a fatalism that scared me. For many of the younger men (women need the permission of their husband to drive) an automobile is just a toy. After a brief shower, the roundabout behind my father's house became a donut course until a wreck ensued. One foggy morning brought 130 wrecks, including one 40 car pile up.

To the Arab mind there is no such thing as private space in a public area. So the shuffle you see in the United States as people get on and off an elevator is an unknown concept to the Arab. Therefore, certain situations in the

UAE can be maddening to the Westerner. No one queues for anything, so the one buffet restaurant we went to was a madhouse. A trip to a zoo had people pouring in the exits and with hardly anyone buying tickets.

Everyone does better in the UAE than others of their same ethnic group who live elsewhere in the world. While not all Arabs are rich, they are certainly richer than their fellow Arabs in say, Syria. Quite a few Arabs in Dubai did not work but rather derived income from the various businesses they sponsor. For a foreigner to start a business in the UAE, he or she must have an Arab sponsor. All sorts of deals are arranged, but usually the local Arab has a controlling interest (51 %) in the enterprise. A labor shortage coupled with the fact that many Arabs loath physical labor has resulted in contract workers being brought into the country. There are many people from the Indian subcontinent in Dubai. They perform much of the manual labor, jobs held by teens in the United States and some managerial positions. Many lived in labor camps outside the city and while their work and labor condition are unappealing to a Westerner, they consider themselves blessed to be in the UAE. Since they are on a contract, however, they are at their employer's whim; a fact that some employers took advantage of. For a Westerner with the right skills (mostly high level management at this point.) working in the UAE brings company paid housing, car, children's education fees, home leave, and a large salary.

Dubai is very much a commercial city. Dubai is a major transshipment port for other points. The creek running through the city is lined with Dhows (a motorized, small wooden ship; an old, reliable design) carrying goods and people from places as close as Iran and as far away as Aden and Somalia. Different items are purchased in various souks (markets) in the city. To let your fingers do the walking is impossible in Dubai, as language barriers and lack of street addresses cannot be overcome. However, once you arrive in the gold souk, for instance, you can rest assured that most of the shops selling gold in Dubai will be located in that souk. There is even a market where counterfeit namebrand goods are sold. In fact, a great deal of the video movies and music available in Dubai is pirated.

Counterfeit cds have even started appearing.

The climate influences life greatly in the UAE. Most businesses close from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. This results in shops being open quite late at night and there were quite a few people on the streets even after midnight.

Of course, one cannot talk about an Islamic country without mentioning Islam and its effect on the society. I found the UAE to be quite tolerant of other beliefs. While there are no churches or temples, one can buy and consume alcohol and purchase pork products in the supermarket, both forbidden to Muslims. This in a country where there is no separation between church and state. Can you imagine finding horse meat or heaven forbid, dog meat, in an American supermarket ? While there was a call to prayer for Muslims 5 times every day, people who were not worshipping were free to go about their business. This contrasts with very conservative Islamic societies, where shops are shuttered and streets deserted during prayer time. One could even eat and drink and smoke outside during the Ramadan fast at some of the big resort hotels.

Toward the end of our visit, we travelled overland to the capital of Oman, Muscat. There was a modern four-lane highway running the entire distance. The coastal highway is lined with date plantations and goes through a few cities, including Sohar, where the pirate Sinbad had his base. The farmers living in these plantations were not rich people, but their farms were very neat. Muscat was everything a capital should be with spotless streets and parks that the people could enjoy at all hours. I have shared with you only my greatest impressions. In fact, the Middle East is so different that I was left speechless at times. I don't think that I will ever be able to understand it all, but I have come to accept it. Well, mates I was also overwhelmed on the radio. There is alot of potential here for some great Dxing and given some time I think one could write entire sections for the WRTH. I was not on a dxpedition though, so I was only able to hit the high spots.

There were many portables available in Dubai but they use a different power system so I

really was shopping for anything. I did not see any table top radios available. Most of the radios I saw people listening to were also large portables. They were usually playing tapes, but there was one fella listening to Radio Pakistan's Home Service in his shop in Muscat. Dubai only has English on FM, although it could easily afford to put its Arabic service there as well. I'm not sure why this is so, perhaps they gravitate towards TV as I saw many houses with 3 satellite dishes on top.

My location was about 200 yards from the Gulf and I used a Sangean AT-818 with about 20 feet of wire. I used battery power the entire time. My dxing in Oman was done with the radio in my father's car. Most of the construction in Dubai was only recently completed, so most neighborhoods have underground utilities. Reception from the Sub-Continent was good, but rather disappointing from Africa. No Amateur Radio Operators were heard on either 40 or 75 meters when I checked.

FM was interesting with stations as far as 400 miles away received. For the sake of brevity, I will only list changes I heard that are not reflected in any reference book. Loggings heard in Oman are marked with (O). Frequencies are in Megahertz.

Radio Galaxy

By Jerry Berg

Radio Galaxy aired its first broadcast on February 1, 1992. It went on shortwave in English on March 29, 1992, using 9880 kHz. during the winter months and 11880 kHz. during the summer. The transmitter has 700 kw. and is located near Moscow. The station believed this power would be sufficient to reach western Europe, but was happy to receive numerous letters from the Americas, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Africa and other places.

Radio Galaxy was one of the first independent stations to emerge in Russia. It was founded by a Moscow commercial firm, "Galaktika," which is engaged in trade and the entertainment industry. The firm makes regular use of Radio Galaxy to inform people of its services. The Galaktika firm offers a wide range of advertising services. A large advertising agency affiliated with the firm is prepared to place commercials in the most important newspapers, magazines, TV and radio programs (including Radio Galaxy) at rates which are in the \$250-500 per minute range. The firm's legal department welcomes entrepreneurs who have begun commercial

activity in the C.I.S. countries, and they provide legal assistance in various commercial efforts including contracts and launching new ventures. The Galaktika firm works in close cooperation with various companies and has numerous partners "on the show market."

Radio Galaxy is working to improve the quality and content of their programs, and they are preparing a program schedule. They have been planning a fortnightly program on Russian classical music, plus a jazz panorama program hosted by world famous performer Alexey Kozlov who heads the "Arsenal" group. "Radio Market," a one-hour program for businessmen, will go on the air once a week and will feature economic news and forecasts, commercial offers and other current business information. The station urges people to tune in in order to see if they hear something which meets their interest, and to make a contribution to the cause of economic development and general stabilization in Russia.

Pop and rock music lovers are also welcome to tune in for the Radio Galaxy hit parade,

which features Russian performers. State-owned Radio Yunost plans to broadcast the Galaxy programming.

The Galaktika firm and Russia State Television are holding talks about launching a TV program. Galaktika is also in touch with several foreign TV networks. A number of Russian periodicals popular with the younger generation have also agreed to publish the ratings of performers taking part in the Galaktika hit parade. Radio Galaxy is interested in establishing creative and mutually

beneficial commercial relations with people in show business, and can respond to requests in English, German, Spanish and Russian.

As of March 1993, Radio Galaxy was broadcasting in English daily at 2000-2300 UTC on 9880 kHz. (with co-channel QRM from Austria until 2130, but clear thereafter). They verify with an attractive blue and silver full-data QSL-card. The address is P.O. Box 7, Moscow, Russia 117418.

BBC World Service May Highlights

Several May features are dedicated to retrospectives on the Cold War. With the fall of the Berlin Wall now more than three years into history, the Cold War can be explored as something in the past - so it seems. The key special feature program is *The World That Came In From The Cold*, detailed below.

News and Feature Programs

Sundays beginning May 2nd, 0230 - *The Language Of Flowers* looks at how the symbolism of flowers has influenced ceremonial, festivals, decorative arts, religion, and medicine. In many instances, floral varieties in Europe and the Far East significantly pre-dated their establishment in the USA. Also repeated Sundays 1615 and Mondays 0730.

Mondays beginning May 3rd, 2215 - *The World That Came In From The Cold* is a new 10-part weekly series based on almost 200 original interviews, and featuring some of the key statesmen, spies, and soldiers of the period. Mikhail Gorbachev, Henry Kissinger, George Blake, and General Chervov are among those interviewed. The series attempts to portray the Cold War era from both sides. Repeated Fridays 0730, 1215, and 1930.

Sundays, May 9th and 16th, 1401 - *Cold Comfort* continues the Cold War emphasis. The shaping of cultural influences on both sides of the Iron Curtain is explored, with responses from artists, writers, and filmmakers. The first installment, *Propaganda And Satire*, looks at spies, counterspies, and double agents reflected in films, books, and plays. Perspectives ranging from *The Man Who Came In From The Cold* to James Bond are explored. *Under The Counter* is the series' second installment, and looks at how popular Western books and music were suppressed in the former Soviet Union, and how the underground literary and arts scenes developed. Repeated Mondays 0630 and 1001.

Mondays beginning May 10th, 2315 - *The Learning World* returns for a ten-week run. A more cosmopolitan, faster-moving program has been promised; a weekly education news update

is also contemplated. The BBC is soliciting queries and program subject suggestions from its listeners; address your letter to *The Learning World* at the usual Bush House address.

Monday, May 24th, 0101 - *China Misperceived* looks at how American and Chinese governments manipulated public perception of each other and were then trapped by the consequences. China's role in the Cold War is reviewed, with President Nixon's 1972 visit and the 1989 Tiananmen Square massacre among the events covered. The American government's tactful ignorance of Chinese human rights violations is also investigated. First airs Saturday 1901; repeated Monday 1515.

Science and Technology Programs

Sundays beginning May 23rd, 0415 - *Growing Points In Medicine* is an eight-part series profiling eight of the world's top doctors and medical researchers and the latest developments and advances in their particular areas of research. Human Infertility is one of the subjects, with an interview with Dr. Mary Martin of UC-San Francisco, medical director of the *in vitro* fertilization program at UCSF. Repeated Mondays 1930, Tuesdays 0915.

Sunday, May 23rd, 1401 - *Life On Mars* looks at recent scientific experiments suggesting that some viruses may be able to survive the harsh Martian environment. The program speculates on the possibility of life on Mars given a less harsh climate, and also looks at the possible activity that would take place in a manned exploration on Mars. Repeated Monday 0630 and 1001.

Drama

Sundays, 0101 - *The Play Of The Week* features the following: April 9th, *Cider With Rosie*, based on the autobiography of poet Laurie Lee. Lee's nostalgic and evocative narration links episodes in the family life, from the early school days the feuds between the neighbors, and the night of the great storm - through adolescence to maturity. A nine-person company handles a multitude of parts, from four-year-old Lee to a 90-year-old. April 16th, *The Ascent of Rum Doodle* dramatizes the memorable climb of the 40,000.5-foot peak in the Himalayas known as Rum Doodle. This is a tale of heroic endeavor in the face of avalanches, belching, and the most appalling cooking imaginable. This could change your whole perspective on

mountaineering. No, this isn't April. The Play Of The Week is also repeated at 1201 and 1901. Early June tip: The winning entry in the BBC World Service drama competition, *You May Leave, The Show is Over* by Andrew Verster of South Africa, will be aired June 6th.

Light Entertainment

Tuesdays beginning May 4th, 0030 - The theatrical quiz program *Break A Leg* returns for a six-week run with new programs taped before a live audience in London's West End theaterland. Two teams with showbusiness roots jockey for the championship. First airing Mondays 1715; also repeated Wednesdays 0830.

Tuesdays beginning May 18th, 0230 - *Brain Of Britain* returns for a new 17-week run. Questions of history, geography, literature, science, current affairs, music, and sports will challenge the field of 48 contestants, and will whittle the field to the eventual *Brain Of Britain* to be crowned in early September.

Music

Wednesdays, May 5th and 12th, 1615 - *The Godfather Of Soul* celebrates the musical career of James Brown as he approach his 60th birthday. The first program chronicles his '60s music, with an interview explaining some of his classics - such as *Out Of Sight, Papa's Got A Brand New Bag*, and *Sex Machine*. The second program looks at Brown's '70s progression into Funk and his personal problems of the time. First airing Tuesdays 0630; also repeated Fridays 1030.

Wednesdays, beginning May 19th, 1615 - *Rock Salad* returns for a set of eight new programs. Thrash Metal through the mainstream sound of Def Leppard are covered, with Tommy Vance hosting. Grunge rockers *Nirvana* of Seattle are among the groups featured. First airing Tuesdays 0630; also repeated Fridays 1030.

To Everything There Is A Season

Here are some program changes effective with the March 30th seasonal adjustments.

First, from Jim Frimmel via GENIE:
"R. MOSCOW. "Africa As We See It" is gone. A possible substitution is a weekly program on Saturday called "Africa Panorama of Events." I heard it at 1532 and 1832. Another new one is

"Great Women of Russia" heard on Mon at 0311. I also heard "Time Line" on Sat at 0332.

"CANADA. A new weekly program on Sat at 2210 is a musical called "Roots and Leaves." That's the way I heard it, anyway. Maybe the name is "Roots and Names" or something else.

"Also, another new Canadian program in the broadcast to the troops overseas at 0500 is "The G's Report" at 0515.

Also speaking of Canada - RCI now broadcasts English beamed to the USA three hours per day during prime time evenings: 2200-2300 (5960 and 9755 kHz), and 0100-0300 (6120 and 9755 kHz). RCI programming is shown in the 0100-0200 hour weekdays, with CBC domestic programming the other two hours. The weekend schedule has CBC domestic programming at 0200, with RCI programming the other two hours.

Don't Forget To Write

Just a reminder...

We Easy Listeners are the target audience for most of the international broadcast programming in the shortwave spectrum. An increasing number of governments view international broadcasting as a convenient candidate for the budget-cutting ax, as the domestic constituency isn't likely to complain as vehemently as it might for a program with an easily identifiable domestic impact. As overseas audience research is prohibitively expensive for many of these broadcasters, our letters are quite often the only source of feedback they have.

My suggestion is to develop a regular discipline of letter-writing to your favorite international broadcasters - perhaps one or two letters per month, every month. In these letters, provide specific comments items like the features you enjoy, those you dislike, the times you listen to the broadcast, and future program suggestions. You can pack quite a bit of information on a post card if you work at it, and the airmail postage is only 40 cents here in the USA. Aerogrammes are another option. If your budget permits, most of the larger broadcasters welcome telefaxes.

There are several reference sources for addresses. Both the World Radio/TV Handbook and Passport to World Band Radio have extensive address listings. I'm certain GENIE or other on-line service members would get prompt responses to messages requesting addresses.

SEND A POSTCARD!

One of the things I try to keep track of is Latin American station anniversaries. Five years ago I saw that Colombian Radio Guatapuri's 25th anniversary was coming up (August 30, 1963). They had been inactive for several years, but a few months before the anniversary I dropped them a nice letter asking if they would consider broadcasting any special anniversary programs via their shortwave transmitter for their old international listeners, like me, to enjoy. I didn't receive a reply and forgot about the matter.

On the evening of August 29, I received a call from Dave Valko, who told me he had a reactivated Radio Guatapuri in with what sounded like a live party on their old frequency of 4818v. I checked it out, and sure enough there they were with a big live celebration and lots of announcements about the 25th birthday. It was a fun program. In fact, I've still got a 45 minute tape of it. I listened until well past midnight, and they were still going strong. I checked the next night, but there was no sign of the station, nor on subsequent nights. I wondered if they had received my letter and that had prompted them to turn on the old shortwave transmitter one more time. I also wondered why they were on a night early. I knew I had the correct anniversary date right, as it's on the 10th anniversary pennant that I have. A few months later I received a form letter thanking me for my reception report of the broadcast. Actually, I had sent no report. But, a few others who heard the broadcast had and I got the same form letter, obviously in answer to my earlier letter. Since then, I've always assumed that it was my request that caused them to be on shortwave that one night.

Well, Radio Guatapuri's 30th anniversary is coming up. A 30th anniversary is not as big a deal

as a 25th, but one never knows. They might do it again if we ask. I'm sending them a nice Spanish letter asking for another special anniversary broadcast. I'm sure there are a lot of readers who have never logged this one, so, whether you've heard them before or not, I'm asking for your help. Send them a postcard telling them how much you would like to hear them reactivate for their 30th anniversary. If you can do it in Spanish, do it. If not, go ahead and use English. I usually don't advise writing to Latin American stations in English, but I think for something like this, they'll get the idea. Their address is Radio Guatapuri; Apartado Aereo 51; Valledupar, Cesar, Colombia. Let's see if we can flood Valledupar with postcards!

MORE ANNIVERSARIES

Here are some more Latin American SW station anniversaries coming up. With luck, there may be some special programming. It might also be a good time to send a reception report, along with a birthday card for the station. The big one is Bolivia's Radio Illimani whose 60th anniversary is on July 15 (1933). Brazil's Radio Guaraja will be celebrating its 50th anniversary on May 14 (1943). Also, Radio Atlantida, Peru will mark 25 years of broadcasting on SW on June 27 (1968), although they started on AM on June 16, 1957. Radio Atlantida is still active, and I believe has been for all of those 25 years. If you've verified them like I have, it might be nice to send a card to them to congratulate them for 25 years on SW. It might help encourage them to keep it up!

Some other anniversaries of interest include R Reloj, Costa Rica (July 2/45); R Panamericana (July 17/72), Bolivia; R Paz y Bien (June 12/52), time station HD2IOA (July 25/77), and LV Galapagos (July 20/69) in Ecuador; R San Martin (July 26/80) and R Concordia (July 19/73) in Peru; R Ed Rural, Coari (July 26/77), R Clube Paranaense (July 27/24), and R Nacional Brasilia (May 30/58) in Brazil; R Nacional Caracas (May 30/58) and R Frontera (June 12/65), Venezuela; and LV del Llano, Colombia (May 30/61).

ENGLISH REPORTS

As I alluded to above, it's not a good idea to write English reception reports to Latin American stations. First, more stations than you might

imagine really can't understand them. Secondly, especially for those of us from the U.S., it may be seen and resented as part of the "ugly American" syndrome where we assume foreigners must study our language, but we don't bother to study theirs. However, there are a few small religious stations that you can send English reports to: Radio Cultural, Guatemala; HRVC and Radio Luz y Vida, Honduras; Faro del Caribe, Costa Rica; Radio Esperanza, Chile; and 4VEH, Haiti (if they come back on). If anyone knows of any others, please let me know - although be sure your information is recent. There are some stations that used to be run by American missionaries and were able to accept English reports, but eventually were turned over to local converts who don't speak English (Radio Maya, Guatemala, is an example).

SUMMER DXING

Summer's coming quick, and with it, poorer conditions in the tropical bands. However, that doesn't mean you can't still DX Latin American stations. Summer evenings are a good time to look for Latins, especially Brazilians in 25, 19, and even 16 meters. For example, the past several years Radio Cultura de Sao Paulo has put in a good QRM-free signal from around 2300-0200+ on 17815 kHz - and it may be the only 1 kW station you'll ever hear on 16 meters! I also think that early summer mornings, an hour or so after your sunrise, is the best time to DX Latin stations on 31 meters. But, don't totally write off the lower frequencies. As the days get longer here in the north, they get shorter south of the equator. There are some interesting early evening grayline paths to Bolivia and nearby areas of southern Brazil during the summer. Also, around 0900 or before in the summer can be a good time to hear tropical band and 49MB stations from deep South America. During our summer their sunrise is a lot later than it is during our winter. For example, I've had some great receptions from Radio Nacional in Argentina on 6060 during the summer. So . . . enjoy the summer, but don't forget to try for a little Latin American DX, too!

IT'S BIGGER THAN YOU THOUGHT!

Colombia's CARACOL network is obviously very large and important; just a look at its listed affiliates in the WRTH will tell you how big it is in Colombia. On presidential election night here in the U.S., I listened to some of CARACOL's live coverage and at one point they listed stations in about a dozen LAm countries who were relaying the broadcast. They weren't small stations, either, but primary stations in each of their respective countries. Clearly CARACOL is a significant force in LAm news coverage. (Although I should note they were the only broadcast entity that I know of

that carried Dan Quayle's concession speech live and in its entirety, which may have been a misjudgement in importance!) CARACOL has an excellent satellite hookup which allows it to function as a news hub for the rest of Latin America.

Well, in early February I was in Pennsylvania to visit my parents, and as usual found the time to visit the Penn State library and browse through the past year's issues of the Latin American communications journal CHASQUI. Among the interesting stuff I found was a short article on CARACOL. It turns out that as large as CARACOL is, it is only one part of the Grupo Santodomingo, one of three economic conglomerates that control much of Colombia's economic output. The Grupo Santodomingo also owns several banks and insurance companies, petrochemical plants, one of Colombia's four largest TV stations, AVIANCA (Colombia's main airline), and all Colombia beer producers (including Cerveza Bavaria, which is often advertised on Colombian radio), plus investments in Ecuadorian and Portuguese beer companies. Finally, the group owns 50% of Cromos, Colombia's most popular newsweekly, and 50% of the Spanish American edition of Cambio 16, a major Spanish language newsweekly.

The bottom line, however, is that there is a lot of concern in Colombia that too much of the economy is controlled by these three big conglomerates, which are in turn controlled by the traditional elite families. The Grupo Santodomingo, however, is seen as a special problem because of its domineering control over news media, and by extension, advertising, in all its forms. As the political left continues to gain support in Colombian politics, we may hear more about this problem in the next few years, although I'm sure the ongoing war with the drug cartels will continue to be top priority.

In the meantime, if you want to hear CARACOL, try 5075 kHz any evening or morning. It's often the strongest signal in 60 meters. In the morning also try 6075 and 6150 kHz, although these frequencies are more likely to suffer from interference. The first two frequencies are from near Bogota, but 6150 is from Huila in southern Colombia, so can be counted as a separate station. Several other Colombian shortwave stations are affiliated with CARACOL and carry CARACOL news and programming at various times. For example, lately I've heard La Voz de la Selva from Florencia on 6170 kHz with nothing but CARACOL programming in the morning around 1100 UTC.

AFGHANISTAN - *Radio Afghanistan* has announced operations at 1430-1730 on 7200 & 655 kHz. BBCM hears them on 7200 in English at 1430-1500, Urdu at 1500-1530, and notes that they at times announce 9635 kHz. The main domestic service is heard on 7200 at 1530-1730. (WBI 4/9)

ARGENTINA - *Radio Malargue* 6160 has recently reactivated. (Camporini, DX'ers Calling via HJ) That explains the lack of logs for this one in years past until the last few months. (HJ)

AUSTRALIA - The Australian government has opened parts of the 148-174 MHz utility band for low-power FM mono broadcasting. The stations are intended to serve ethnic communities and markets too small for Australia's frequency-bidding commercial radio. The first such station, GB Radio on 152 MHz, began testing 4/7. Regular service begins May 1. It is targeted at British expatriates in the Melbourne area. GB Radio sells annual memberships and a converter which translates the 152-MHz signal to normal FM frequencies. Programs from stations like BCR Radio in Belfast, Heartland FM in Scotland, Phoenix in Wales, Radio Thames Mead in London, and British hospital radio stations are flown to Australia. When GB Radio goes nationwide later this year, a satellite link will be used. It is commercially viable and might become an alternative to shortwave in other countries. (Peter Marchardt, GB Radio, and JM on RNMN 4/15) [And 152 MHz might just make it to New Zealand on sporadic-E or tropospheric skip.--mf]

BOLIVIA - *Radio San Jose* 5580 kHz has reactivated. Heard at 2232 UTC. (JHU Dclusive via Play-Dx via HJ)

R. Metropolitana, 6195 kHz, [see April LN] heard in Japan at *0858-1005 fade, with

Bolivian folk music; good signals. (Mikio Yamada, Japan)

BOSNIA - At least one party to the three-cornered Bosnian conflict has worked out a new twist on clandestine operations. Bonafide radio amateurs and other persons using amateur equipment, mainly in the 80 and 40 meter bands, have been the only contact with some isolated towns in the Moslem areas. One faction is believed to be operating phony amateur stations for the benefit of credulous media reporters; both the third party "amateur" receiving station and the transmitting stations and their traffic are under the control of the victim government, whichever it is. (John Campbell and JM on RNMN 4/1)

BOUGAINVILLE - *Radio Free Bougainville* is definitely inactive (ex 3870 kHz) despite info from IARN to the contrary. It is very unlikely to reappear and certainly not from Arawa. If a government station eventuates from Bougainville, it will be on previously allocated 6020 kHz daytime channel and probably 3975 nighttime. RFB was a Yaesu ham band transceiver screwed down to 7 watts (full AM); the power amp was capable of 600 watts continuous AM but was deliberately under-run at only 50 watts. If you got a QSL from this one, you've got a good one! (Gordon Darling via FAX to Dave Clark, via ODXA)

BRAZIL - *Radio Oito de Setembro*, 2490 kHz, has only 2 announcers and 7 employees. They have 2 studios and a home-made mixer. There are no slogans, no new albums and the station is "a little abandoned" with the owner spending much of his time in Sao Paulo. (Richard D'Angelo in NU, via HJ)

[see March LN] *R.Globo* never had a 250 kw SW service; they are still on shortwave. *Radio Bandierantes* recently began operating all its shortwave transmitters on a 24 hour schedule. (Tony Jones, Paraguay)

CAMBODIA - The *Voice of the Khmer* on 6325 kHz is being heard in Europe from *2300-2400*. (JC on RNMN 4/11)

(Clandestine) - *The Voice of the Grand National Union Front of Cambodia*, operated by the Khmer Rouge on 5408 kHz, is the successor to two earlier stations which merged in 1991. Now that the Khmer Rouge has not only broken with the United Nations command but has walked out of Phnom Penh en masse, this station has become more important. It broadcasts at 2330-0200, 0800-1000, and 1200-1500 in Khmer and Vietnamese only. In Sri Lanka it is stronger than the government station, *The Voice of the People of Cambodia*, heard on 4910 kHz at *1200-1500. Phnom Penh's External Service is still heard on 11938 kHz with EE at 0000 and 1200. (VG on RNMN 4/11)

CHINA - CPBS 1st Program signs on at 1958 on 3220, 4460, 5320, 5880, 5915, 6125, 6180, 6750 6840. 2nd Program signs on at 2058 on 5163, 5716, 6890, 7770. (Kito in OZDX, via Contact, via HJ)

COLOMBIA - *Ondas del Puerto*, 4627 kHz, harmonic of 1165, heard shortly after 2300 and located in La Virginia (Risaralda). (Klemetz in DXSF via HJ)

LV de la Selva, 6170 kHz, heard at *0957 w/Latin music on "Buenos dias Colombia" program; fair signals. (Mikio Yamada, Japan)

COOK ISLANDS - Guy Atkins recently visited *Radio Cook Islands* while vacationing there, and found that the shortwave transmitter formerly on 11760 kHz was destroyed in a fire in May, 1992. There appear to be no immediate plans for a return to shortwave. (Guy Atkins)

COSTA RICA - *Faro del Caribe* is completing a new transmitter base in Heredia that is expected to be commissioned in May. (Adrian Peterson, DXLD via HJ)

Radio Reloj, 6006 kHz, is off the air on this frequency. *Radio Cartago*, 6075 kHz, is off the air. *Radio Universidad de Costa Rica*, 6105 kHz, is off the air, although this may be only temporarily during the year end vacation. (Adrian Peterson, DXLD via HJ)

Radio Neg Mawon via RFPI, 15030 kHz, has verified and given the following address: P.O. Box 557, Warwick, NY 10990. v/s was Molly Graver. (Berg NU via HJ)

From April, *Radio Exterior de Espana* was to begin the Ibero-American service, 12 hours daily of programs for much of the United States, Central America, the Caribbean and northern South America. The service is to be transmitted from RNE's Cariari de

Pococi site in Costa Rica. The service will have a news structure based on correspondent's dispatches, reports, press summaries, commentaries and topical programs. Preference will be given to news about the American continent and relations between Spain and South America. (RNE via 'El Pais' via WBI 4/9)

DENMARK - *Radio Denmark* transmits 25 minute programs in Danish, via Radio Norway International facilities, at 0030 to Asia, ANZ & America on 9675, 11930, 15165 kHz; 0130 to America on 9560 & 11930; 0230 to ME/As/ANZ/Am on 9560, 11870, 11925; 0330 to ME/As/ANZ/Am on 9560, 11730, 11865; 0430 to Eu/ME/As/Am on 9740, 11730, 11865, 15175; 0530 to Eu/As/Am on 7215, 9590, 15170, 17815; 0630 to Eu/As/ANZ on 9590, 15165, 17815; 0730 to Eu/As/ANZ on 9590, 11735, 17815; 0830 to As/ANZ on 15165, 17740; 0930 to Eu/ME/As/ANZ on 21595, 21705; 1030 to Eu/As/Am on 15165, 17795; 1130 to Am on 15165, 21705; 1230 to As/ANZ/Am on 15335, 17740, 17780, 17860; 1330 to Eu/As/ANZ/Am on 9590, 15230, 15335, 17865; 1430 to As/ANZ/Am on 15195, 15335, 17795; 1530 to Eu/ME/As/Am on 15335, 17860; 1630 to Eu/ME/As/Am on 15230, 15335, 17825; 1730 to Eu/As/Am on 9655, 15220; 1830 to Eu/ME/As/Am on 9590, 15220, 21705; 1930 to Eu/As/ANZ/Am on 9590, 15220, 15335, 15365; 2030 to Eu/As/Am on 9590, 17730; 2130 to ANZ/Am on 15165, 15175; 2230 to Am on 15165, 17845; 2330 to Am on 9655, 11795. DOMINICAN REPUBLIC - *Radio Estrella*, *Radio Quisqueya*, 6205 kHz, corted and clear Radio Estrella ids at :15 and :45 minutes past the hour. Perhaps Radio Quisqueya is a slogan or sister station name. (Krueger, DXSF via HJ)

ECUADOR - *Radio Runacunapac Tachana*, 2967 kHz. The Spanish ID for this station is *Radio El Saber del Hombre*, that is, Radio Human Knowledge. (Klemetz, DXSF via HJ)

Radio Popular heard on 4945 kHz, ex 4800 kHz. (Gaviria, Play-Dx via HJ)

FRANCE - *Radio Neighe* [Snow], 25710, 25900 & 26070 kHz. Heard since early December around 1430-1700 UTC. These frequencies are safety communications and are installed in about 20 ski resorts in France and are used for emergency radio to the cable-lift cars on the ski slope. Broadcasts with ads, jingles, entertainment, PSAs (one of Securit Cable) and id as Securit Cable Nostalgie. Transmits in narrow-band FM. (Robert Allen, FT via HJ)

Transmitters servicing twenty different ski resorts are scattered throughout the French Alps and there are several transmitters at each site. Tapes are played independently at each site so the transmitters are randomly unsynchronized. While there was no indication of transmitter power, signals were still be heard almost daily between 1300 and 1700 around the end of March. (WOR)...surely it would be interesting to try for a verification from this "network", although I suppose it would be impossible to determine which transmitter was being heard at any one time. I would bet the transmitters are 100 watts or less. (Dave Clark in ODXA)

The new conservative government in France is expected to make many changes in broadcasting, including public-service broadcasting. Even before the election there were reports that a Gaullist regime would dismantle RFO, *Radio France d'Outre-mer*, which is responsible for domestic broadcasting in France's overseas departments and territories. (RNMN 3/25)

GEORGIA - A new station, *The Voice of Abkhazia* [Russian: Golos Abkhazii] began broadcasting 4/4 in the 41 meter band. (WBI 4/9) Observed 4/10 & 13 at 1730-1800 on 7305 kHz. Announces as *Apsua Radio* [Abkhaz Radio]. In Abkhazian except for a Turkish news summary about 1750. AT 1800 switches abruptly to *R.Moscow* Arabic service. (WBI 4/16)

GERMANY - AFN Bremerhaven on 1143 kHz closed at the end of March. Most of the troops based in the Bremerhaven area have gone elsewhere; a 250-man support group for harbor tugs is the only U.S. contingent remaining. It is being served by a low-power FM outlet. AFN Stuttgart, also on 1143 kHz, has both moved (to Mannheim-Zeckenheim) and changed its name (to ARN Heidelberg). (JM on RNMN 4/1)

Deutsche Welle is observing its 40th birthday this year. Overseas broadcasts in German by DW began on May 3, 1953. English was added on Oct. 3, 1954. Germany began shortwave broadcasting in 1929, six years after ordinary broadcasting started, with one 7-kw transmitter, in German only. The reunification of Germany in 1989 has had tremendous impact on Germany's 'broadcasting landscape.' West Germany has had two international broadcasting organizations, *Deutsche Welle*, which broadcasts overseas, and *Deutschlandfunk*, which broadcasts mainly within Europe. In the course of 1993, we will see all the foreign language services getting together under the roof of DW, making 45 foreign languages in

all by midsummer. Whether all 45 will be kept remains to be seen. There is increasing awareness that Germany cannot appeal to the rest of the world in GG, which is why the English service has gained importance over the last few years. This importance is also reflected in listeners' feedback. Mail to the EE service has reached the volume of mail for the GG service, which is remarkable. DW's management has shown increasing interest in rebroadcast operations. This was not possible in legal terms to any great extent before, but DW's new director general is determined to get into radio rebroadcasting in a great way. DW has also set up a worldwide TV information service which is operating in Europe, in North America by satellite, and in parts of Asia by satellite. It runs 14 hours a day, mostly in GG. We are in the process of dubbing everything into EE and possibly into SS. The target areas are limited because you and I know that SW will remain the primary source of information for many parts of the world. That is why I am sure that the EE service will be needed for decades to come. I haven't heard anything about new SW relay sites. We also will use the TV satellite channels for audio transmissions; The EE and GG sw services are now on satellite to North America. It is too early to say whether they are being used to any great extent. Even in these areas SW will continue to play a modest role. (Summary of interview of Dieter Wernig, head of current affairs at Deutsche Welle, by Ian Macdonald on RJMR 4/11)

GUATEMALA - *Radio Cultural* is installing a new AM transmitter. The old transmitter will then be modified for use on SW, using a reactivated channel, perhaps in the 31 meter band. (Adrian Peterson, DXLD via HJ)

GUYANA - *GBC* 5950 kHz has reactivated. Heard at 1000 UTC. (HJ)

HAITI - (Clandestine) - *Radio 16 Desamm*, 17830 kHz. I received an unsolicited (QSL?) for this station via the Chancery of Haiti. I had previously verified them via Radio Miami International. The station also enclosed a letter: Radio 16 Desamm is the radio station of the legitimate government of the Republic of Haiti which has been forced to broadcast outside of Haitian territory since a bloody military dictatorship was installed in Haiti in September of 1991.

The coup d'etat against President Jean-Bertrand Aristide who was democratically elected by 67.7 % of the electorate on December 16, 1990 has completely blocked the transition to and consolidation of democracy in Haiti.

Our radio station is one of the ways in which the Haitian people and President Aristide are fighting for the return to constitutional legitimacy and the restoration of democracy in our country.

The letter was signed by Louki Yves CAL via Chancery of Haiti, 2311 Massachusetts Ave, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20008. Telephone (202) 986-4933. The station's slogan is Radyo Rezistans ak Mobilizasyon jouk mayi mi.

The schedule is: 1200-1300 Mo-Fr on 7315 kHz; 2200-2300 Mo-Fr on 17835 kHz; 2300-0000 Sa on 7355 kHz; 1100-1300 Su on 9850 kHz. (HJ)

HAWAII - *KWHR*, Naalehu, Hawaii, is expected to begin broadcasting to Asia and Australia this fall. *KWHR* is owned by LeSea Broadcasting Corp. [LeSea for Lester Sumrall Evangelistic Assn.] The xmtr site is eight miles from South Point, the southernmost tip of the U.S. The manufacturer will ship the xmtr on June 15. The building will be erected in June and July. Installation and testing will take place in July and August. The xmtr and antennas are expected to be ready near the end of September. Programs will be prepared in South Bend, IN, at LeSea's headquarters. LeSea operates WHRI in Noblesville, IN, and has its own TV satellite network. The audio feed to Hawaii will be a subcarrier of the TV channel. The staff wants to have the station working in time to celebrate Dr. Lester Sumrall's 80th birthday and his 60th anniversary as an evangelist. (Douglas Garlinger, chief engineer, WHRI, on RNMN 4/15)

INDIA - Two of the new AIR domestic stations were noted on the air in March, although it is not clear if these were tests or regular programs. Jorma Mantyla in Finland reports a Mar 14th logging of AIR Itanagar on 3245 at 1400; also AIR Jaipur on Mar 28th at 1514 on 4910. In both cases, local ID's were heard. The 3245 signal was also heard at 1530 on Mar 12th in Australia, with a Delhi news relay parallel other known AIR outlets. (Internet via Jean Burnell / David Foster in OZDX, via ODXA)

From 4/14 *All India Radio* was to carry a national news bulletin in English at 1530 in external services toward SAARC [South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation], West Asian, Southeast Asian and Gulf countries for the benefit of nonresident Indians. An AIR broadcast at 2110 gave the frequencies for this 1530-1545 transmission as 11670, 10330, 9910, 7412 and 7140 kHz. (WBI 4/16)

INDONESIA - *RRI Ujung Pandang*, 4753 kHz, is easily heard in North America in both our mornings and evenings depending on the

time of the year. Perhaps the various program titles listed below will help you with your reception report. This is a partial listing:

Sunday: 2205 Santapan Rohani Kristen; 1130 Pojok Radio, Coto Mangkasara; 1210 Kilasan Berita Sepekan; 1330 Kebaktian Menyanyi.

Monday: 2205 Dialog Pak Kiyai; 1130 Forum Pemuda Mg. I; 1210 Ulasan Pers Daerah; 1330 Istirahat Malam.

Tuesday: 2205 Ceramah Subuh; 1330 Persona Budaya Nusantara.

Wednesday: 2205 Ceramah Subuh; 1130 Pembinaan Bahasa Daerah; 1330 Sandiwara Radio MG. I, III.

Thursday: 2205 Ceramah Subuh; 1130 Mimbar Agama Islam; 1330 Persona Musik.

Friday: 2205 Pengajian dan Tafsir; 1210 Rusan Ekonomis; 1330 Imbauan Malam.

Saturday: 2205 Ceramah Subuh; 1130 Gelanggang Universitaria; 1230 Persona Budaya Nusantara; 1310 Keseman Tradisional. (Dave Valko via HJ)

RRI Jayapura, 6070 kHz, suffers random power shortages which would account for intermittent operation on this frequency. (Darling NU via HJ)

RRI Samarinda (Kalimantan) continues to operate on an extended schedule, reportedly closing around 1430, the frequency being 9614.38 - slightly variable. Since March 28th, however, KNLS-Alaska has been occupying 9615 from 1300 s/on in English with a strong signal, effectively blocking Samarinda. (Dave Clark via ODXA)

RRI Medan (Sumatera) was tentatively heard on 3378.4 at 1145 with evening Call to Prayer and Jakarta news relay at 1200 on Mar 21st. The signal was undermodulated and poor, even in Australia. (David Martin in OZDX)...that would be a shift up from 3375.55 where it was stable when I heard it at weak levels a few times this past Dec/Jan circa 2250-2310 (Dave Clark in ODXA)

INTERNATIONAL WATERS - A radio station carrying independent news to the remnants of Yugoslavia, and financed by the European Community, began broadcasting from a ship near Bari, Italy, on April 7. *R. Brod [Radio Boat]* operates on 720 kHz AM with 50 kw and on 90 MHz FM. It can be heard in Northern Europe around 0300 when some co-channel stations are silent. The staff of seven include a Slovene, two Croats, two Montenegrins, a Serb and a Bosnian Muslim. Its director, Agitsa Panorats, say they hope to make a dent in the propaganda war that has accompanied the ground fighting.

AP: One factor which had weight in the war was the monopoly of information with just one side of the problem given the public. This is why there is so much prejudice. In Croatia, people think "Whatever the Croat

government does, it's OK. In Serbia it's "Whatever the Serbian government does, it's OK." Public opinion is made by the government, and by the government's radio, TV and the press.

EB: The station is located on a former oceanographic vessel named "Droit de Parole" which means "The right of speech." The 65-meter-long ship flies the flag of St. Vincent and the Grenadines, in the Caribbean, and depends on the port of Bari for supplies. The MW xmtr went on the air a week ago, but the station is not at full strength, according to another journalist, (Sujen Itsavtse).

SI: We started the evening of April 7, using music to set up the equipment. The signal from the transmitter gets into telephones, faxes and satellite links on board. We'll fix that in the next two days.

EB: The goal is to have a short news bulletin every hour on the hour, and three major news bulletins daily, in the morning, afternoon and evening.

SI: We have AP, Reuter, the Serbian agency Tanjug, and the Croatian and Bosnian agencies.

EB: The station has set up its own network of correspondents throughout the Balkan region. R. Brod plans to open a telephone number in Paris, to help people inside and outside the war zone to pass on messages to relatives or friends. The station has received a subsidy from the European Community of one million ECUs or US\$1.2 million, enough to keep it on the air for a month. The organizers hope private donations will keep the station going after that. But why did they choose a boat rather than an existing radio station?

AP: Broadcasting on the ship means, in a physical sense, to be independent. If you put a transmitter anywhere in the ex-Yugoslavia you are exposed to the risk to lose it immediately, I mean to be captured by the state of any of these republics. The fact of being in international waters means, literally, being independent. If you put the station in any neighbor country [of Yugoslavia] you risk to make a conflict between the Yugoslavian republics and the host country.

EB: The station claims to cover most of the former Yugoslavia, including Serbia, parts of Croatia, and Sarajevo. The station has another advantage over traditional international broadcasters.

AP: There is such xenophobia about whatever comes from abroad; people immediately refuse it.

EB: This is the second time that the French-based Droit de Parole Association has provided backing to an independent medium in the former Yugoslavia. Last summer the association approached the UN sanctions committee for permission to ship several

hundred tons of newsprint to independent newspapers in the Balkans. It got a green light to provide the paper, as well as equipment for a radio station in the former Yugoslavia. The operation was a success, but the organizers expect the new project will face considerable resistance from the Serb and Croat governments.

AP: We definitely have plenty of problems with the old republics of Yugoslavia, because we are independent in the sense that we are fighting for pluralism of information, and are trying to give objective information, which is disliked by all governments in all states. The problem of disinformation is the biggest problem and it's common to Zagreb and Belgrade.

EB: R. Brod is clearly violating international telecommunications law, which prohibits broadcasts from ships, even if they are in international waters. Agitsa Panorats is aware of that, but she says there are higher moral objectives at stake here.

AB: We are not fighting for commercial reasons. We are not like Radio Caroline, fighting to have a few hours of pop music and working on commercial programs. We are fighting, first for the dignity of professional journalists. We are fighting to stop the war and re-establish the dialog. We are fighting to try to make communication among those parts of Yugoslavia which do not communicate any more, especially members of the families all over ex-Yugoslavia which at the moment are not able to give a message or to talk to each other. This is all what gives moral legitimacy to the project. (Eric Beauchemin and friends on RNMN 4/15)

IRAN - (Clandestine) - The *Voice of Mojahed* (Sedayi Mojahed) has many freqs and the pattern is not easy to follow. They do pop up on frequencies between *6970-7025* kHz, best in Western Europe from 1800-1930. They are believed to be on the air consistently from *1500-0100*. (JC on RNMN 3/25)

ITALY - *Idea Radio*, near Genoa, uses 450 watts on 7380 kHz. It was heard 3/24 from 1300-1400 with IDs in II and SS, and from 1445-1500 with an ID in truly awful EE. The mail address is: Idea Radio, Box 38, I-16030 Gattorna, Genova, Italy. (Dr. Salvatore Placanic and Andy Sennitt on RNMN 4/1) *Idea Radio* 7379.82 is a new station that seems to be on 24 hours. Multi-language ids heard. (Flora, Pavaello Play-DX via HJ)

WRTH 1993 page 97 has wrong address reference numbers for some shortwave stations; amend to: 6012 is 2), 6220 is 7), 7140 is 8), 7297 is 9), 11390 is 10), 13667 is 11). (Communication via DXLD via HJ)

JAPAN - *Radio Japan* made wholesale, last minute changes in the summer schedule for 'Media Roundup' - the good news being that several of the broadcasts will be carried on the Sackville relay after all. On Sunday, the RCI relay has it at 0530 at 9725 and again at 1430 on 11715 (11865 direct is also a good bet at 1430). The Gabon relay continues at 2130 on 11925. There is also an RCI relay at 0130 Monday on 5960. (WOR, via ODXA)

LITHUANIA - R. *Vilnius* moved to 11750 kHz with EE at 2300-2330 3/28 because of European summer time. (Derek Cooper, UK, on RNMN 3/25) From 4/15 *Radio Vilnius* was to cut English and Lithuanian external service broadcasts by 50% to one half hour a day. The further fate of the broadcasts is uncertain, in view of Russia's request for 30 million talonas for rent of the transmitters. An appeal for financial assistance has been made to Lithuanians abroad and the Lithuanian national fund. (R. Vilnius via WBI 4/16)

MALAYSIA - R. *Malaysia International* plans to add broadcasts in Japanese, Cambodian and Vietnamese. The JJ broadcasts will begin this year, the other two languages later. (Atsushi Konno, Japanese BCL Federation, on RJMR 4/11)

MALTA - The *Voice of the Mediterranean* can be heard in English at 0600-0700 on 9765 and at 1400-1500 on 11925. ('EuroNews' on Internet via Jean Burnell, via ODXA)

MEXICO - *XEQM*, Merida, 5635 kHz, heard tentatively here at 0250 UTC as a massive FM blob with nothing heard on 6105 kHz. (Krueger, DXSF via HJ)

MOROCCO - Initial transmissions from the still under construction new *VOA* Relay Station in Morocco are expected as early as late June. The *VOA* Frequency Division BBS will have details when known. [df]

NETHERLANDS - On the April 1st edition of *Media Network*, the Battle of the Budgets was announced with great ceremony. The staff of Radio Netherlands and Deutsche Welle were to hook up in the European football final with the winning team inheriting their opposite's broadcasting budget for 1993. A colleague at the BBC was to serve as referee in this high stakes match. There was even talk that the match would be carried live on Radio Netherlands' CIS relay transmitters and that special QSL's would be available for confirmed reception reports. The match was to have occurred that same Thursday afternoon but at the conclusion of the broadcast it was announced that word of the results had not yet

been received due to "technical difficulties"...a tip of the hat to Jonathan and the Media Network crew for a rather creative April Fools ploy (dmc) (via ODXA)

The Dutch PTT has issued two 80-cent stamps to honor *Radio Oranje*, the clandestine station operated by the Dutch government in exile from 1940-45. Professor (?Leo Dillon?) who worked for R. Oranje in London, recalls what they used to do.

LD: We had two programs, one at 1 p.m. and one at 8:15. It was only a quarter of an hour, but every word counted. We had to read the papers, we got all sorts of information from the BBC Monitoring Service, all sorts of papers from the Political Warfare Executive. We had to be in touch with Dutch government agencies, particularly the Secret Service, which had to give us part of the secret news that had come in from Holland. And then you had to go and sit behind your typewriter and try to put into words what you wanted to say to the people of Holland.

It was a program of 14m 40s. We had a signature tune at the beginning and a closing tune at the end, which took away 40 seconds. We had to do our best to make it worthwhile for the people in Holland to listen, because many who were caught listening by the German police were arrested and punished, perhaps sent to a concentration camp in Holland for a couple of months. So people really did take great risks in listening to the program. It had to be worthwhile. It only became, well, a fairly good program in my opinion, after the end of 1942.

The signature tune, chosen after the station had been on the air for some time, was "Open the Gates," a tune from the Eighty Years' War against the Spaniards in the 16th and 17th centuries. Every Dutchman knew that tune, and it lasted about half a minute. In 1943 we dropped it after consultation with the BBC because it proved to be fairly dangerous for the people of Holland. It could be heard through the walls.

JM: Eight and a half million copies of each stamp are being issued. Because many people who worked with R. Oranje joined R. Netherlands in 1947, RNI is arranging with the Dutch PTT for an exclusive set of R. Oranje first-day covers. The winners of a contest on *Media Network* 4/29 will qualify for some of these distinctive covers. (RNMN 4/15)

NETHERLANDS ANTILLES - Many staff at *TWR Bonaire* may be reassigned to other TWR stations when TWR Bonaire closes its SW xmtrs 6/30. Others are being retrained for the satellite network which will start 7/1. The satellite net is expected to

reach a new audience in the cities, young urban unchurched people who have never heard of shortwave. TWR's SW audience has been historically small-town or rural or active SWLs. TWR has seen an increase in requests for QSLs, which Chuck Roswell is supervising. There will be no 'phasing out' of the SW operation because the technical staff will be busy with SW until the very last day and then must start on the satellite network. (Tom Cochran, manager, TWR Bonaire, interviewed by Glenn Volkhardt on DXPL 4/10)

NEW ZEALAND - *Radio New Zealand International* released its new sked for 5/2 thru 10/3. The single 100 kw xmtir is scheduled as follows: 1650-1849 Mon-Fri on 6035 kHz; 1850-2136 Sun-Fri on 11735 kHz; 2137-0658 daily on 15120 kHz; 0659-1206 daily on 9700 kHz; international sporting fixtures as needed from 1207-1648 on 9510 kHz. Special test transmissions were made on 6035 kHz on 4/10, 4/17 and 4/24 only between 1650 and 2130. Prompt replies to reception reports require three IRCs to: 49 Meter Band Test, RNZI, Broadcasting House, Box 2092, Wellington. (AC and JM on RNMN 4/8)

NIGERIA - *Radio Nigeria*, 3970 kHz, heard on this new frequency at 0600 in English // 4770. Maybe the listed Enugu site. (Berg, DXSF via HJ) If it is Enugu then it counts as Biafra per NASWA list. Don't confuse with co-channel *Radio Buea* which has been logged here in the past. (HJ)

PAPUA NEW GUINEA - *Radio West Sepik*, 3205 kHz, is only running 6 kw and is severely overmodulated at times. I hope to get the modulation sorted out and a full 10 kw up the spout. (Darling, NU via HJ)

PERU - *Radio Adventista Mundial*, 3870 kHz, address is Jr. 2 de Mayo 218, Celendin, Cajamarca. (Klemetz, DXSF via HJ)

Radio Internacional del Peru, 3402 kHz, address is Ave. Bolognesi 532, San Pablo, Region Nororiental del Maranon, Cajamarca. (Klemetz DXSF via HJ)

Radio Oyon, 3800 kHz, has reactivated and has been heard around 1030 since the end of March. (Dave Valko via HJ)

Radio Vision Dos Mil, 5131 kHz, heard here around 0100 UTC, but now transmitting from Bambamarca. It's not clear if this is a new station or has simply moved to Bambamarca from its former location in Juanjui. (HJ) This station use to operate in the 90 meter band some years back. (Krueger, DXSF) Must have been a while ago as its not listed in my WRTH's that go back to 1978. (HJ)

Radio Reina de la Selva, 5486.5 kHz. The ID for this one was thought to be Radio Popular, but perhaps that is just a slogan. Slogan is "Estereo 100, la radio mas joven. Address is Jr. Ayacucho 761, Chachapoyas. (Klemetz, DXSF via HJ)

Radio Ritmo, 5602 kHz, is the ID of this station located in Puerto Maldonado. (Klemetz Play-Dx via HJ)

Radio Santa Rosa, 6045 kHz, has reactivated since the end of February. Heard with a fair signal around 1030 UTC. (HJ) This station is very irregular on shortwave. Radio Santa Rosa was inaugurated on October 15, 1958 and pertains to the Order "Padres Dominicos". The studios are installed in the "Covento de Santo Domingo" and the transmitter has a power of 3 kW. (Camporini DX'ers Calling via HJ)

Radio Cuzco moved from 6191.7 to 6203.5 kHz; heard 1030 with Peruvian music & good signals, since 3/15. (Mikio Yamada, Japan)

PHILIPPINES - Staff at *Far Eastern Broadcasting Corp.*'s MW outlet in Zamboanga have been given police protection because of attacks by Moslem extremists. (Herbert Visser and Andy Sennitt on RNMN 4/1) [An FEBC house organ reported some time ago that one employee had been fatally shot.--mf]

R. Veritas Asia has popped up on the out-of-band freq of 15570 kHz [as heard] at 1530-1600 in Urdu; this one is making it to NA on a daily basis. (Mike Porter, MA, and Andy Sennitt on RNMN 4/1)

POLAND - Poland has declared war on pirate radio and TV broadcasters. An investigation has been launched into 47 radio and TV stations operating without licenses. Many firms apparently set up stations before Parliament passed the new broadcasting law. Last week the State Radio Communications agency shut down "Teletop," an illegal station in Gdynia, and cut off the power to Kopernikus TV which had been operating illegally in (Okecie?). Twenty-nine radio and 11 TV stations are operating in accordance with the law. (PAP news agency on DXPL 4/10)

PORTUGAL - *Radio Portugal* has a new address: RDP International /Radio Portugal, English Service, Box 1011, Lisbon 1001. (Thomas DXLD via HJ)

RUSSIA - Just before the Congress of Deputies session in Moscow at the end of March, the Yeltsin regime assigned police to b/c stations in the Russian Republic "to protect them from interference." (BBC WS) [Oh, if we could solve our QRM problems as

Notes

Unless you were traveling for a month, your radio was broken or you've been on another planet, you know that WWCR burned to the ground early Sunday morning April 4. The building, studios, offices, and transmitters were a total loss. Fortunately no one was hurt. It was probably arson, but the culprits are unknown. The AM transmitter was back on the air in a few days (at low power) with borrowed equipment. The first transmitter placed in service, expected early May, will probably carry Dr. Gene Scott programming due to contracts. The second transmitter, expected a few weeks later, will carry the variety of other shows as in the past. Some of the other shows have found temporary homes on WRNO and WHRI and, I think, WINB.

From April 24 Glenn Hauser's *World of Radio* began new airings on WHRI on 7315: UT Sa 0030 and UT Mo 0300. *DX Daily* continues on WHRI UT Tu-Sa 0130, repeated 0600 except Sa 1400.

WEWN was running parts of Program A and D during April, so we've included the English segments for three transmitters although only two are running at the moment. The pirates on 7415 are now getting squeezed rather badly with the VOA on 7405 and WEWN on 7425 during the evening hours.

Jon Klinedinst tells us that WINB was sold, and we can probably expect some new programming, target areas and frequencies.

Ed Evans: "Effective this Monday (April 26-ed), the three SW stations of the Christian Science Monitor will begin

programming with station ID's at 10 seconds BEFCRE the top of the hour. This change is being made to allow for some expected programming changes in schedules to occur later in the month or early next month." More information to follow...

Radio Vlaanderen Int'l made a mid-season move from 15530 to 15540 for the morning (in USA) releases to NAM. Also at 18 UT Sundays 15540 to Africa was dropped, and the frequency is used for a broadcast to the Belgian troops in Somalia. On following up a Eugene Gebruers' tip from the April 25 edition of *Radio World*, I found R Baku had a decent signal on new 15240 at 17-18 to Europe.

The *Radio Netherlands* relays in the Far East on 12065 and 15470 kHz are putting excellent signals into New Zealand on the spring sked. 12065 is slightly better than 15470. (AC on RNMN 4/8)

A few words about the problem of Radio Moscow QSLs. So far there has been no change in the old procedure; i.e., the sites mentioned in ITU lists and on QSLs do not have too much in common with the ones actually used. Many of the listed sites never existed at all. One of the stations that is renting transmitters in the CIS area said that they got a lot of confusing information before they were able to get firm site details. To mention one example, a large site is located just south of St. Petersburg. In official lists it appears as St. Petersburg, Kingisepp, Konevo, Petrozavodsk (all in Russia) and Orsha (in Belarus). These cities are all in the same general area but except for St. Petersburg site and a couple of ex-jammers used for home services in Petrozavodsk there are no SW transmitters. Kingisepp and Konevo are small towns, the first one located west of St. Petersburg, not far from the Estonian border, and the second one in the Vologda province east of St. Petersburg. As regards Central Asia, it is not (now? [df]) clear that NO foreign service transmitters are located in Kyrgyzstan, i.e. all assignments for Bishkek are false. Instead transmitters at Alma Ata, a site east of Alma Ata, Tashkent and Orzu (Tadzhikistan) are used. (Alm, Dx'ers Calling via HJ)

Radio (Centra?), an independent station, began using Radio Moscow SW facilities late in March. The announced sked is: 0530-0600 on 12010 kHz and from 1530-1600 on 9880 kHz. It can also be heard from 1200-1500 on 1440 kHz MW. The 1530 broadcast on 9880 kHz, on gospel topics, was heard quite well in Japan in April. R. Centra started operation on MW on June 3, 1992. SW broadcasts began in January, and the RM transmitters probably at the end of March. The mailing address is: Andrei Nekrasov, Radio Station Center, Nikolskaya St. 7, Moscow 103012. (Shigenori Aoki and Yoshinori Kato, RJMR 4/11)

R. Vedo, Volgograd, now broadcasts 1400-1830 seven nights a week on new 1467, 7185, 9655, 11760 and 13710 kHz. The morning sked is 0500-0800 on 1161, new 1467, 5915 and 7125 kHz. (Yoshinori Kato on RJMR 4/11)

Radio Galaxy, Moscow, is going to begin DX programs in EE and SS in the near future. It will also publish a monthly DX bulletin in EE. It is currently scheduled at 1900-2000 on 9880 kHz. (Francisco Rodriguez, DX Editor, Radio Moscow, via SS on DXPL 4/10)

Z93 VOA relays via Russia: 1400-1500 Mandarin on 7140, 1000 kw from Irkutsk; 1400-1600 Mandarin on 9550, 200 kw from Novosibirsk; 2200-2300 Mandarin on 7400 from Irkutsk; 1300-1400 Korean on 648 MW, 1000 kw from Ussuriysk. (VOA BBS)

RWANDA - (Clandestine) - *Radio Muhabura*, 6340 kHz. There is much speculation as the station's actual transmitting site. Some believe that it is in Burundi, which plays host to 250,000 Rwandan refugees. Another likely source is Uganda, the country from which the group running the station, the Rwanda Patriotic Front, launched its invasion in 1990. RFP members have free movement in that country, using it for sanctuary and controlling areas close to that country's southern border with Rwanda. (Echevarria, DXLD via HJ)

SINGAPORE - As anticipated, *Radio Japan* has commenced transmissions via one of the BBC relay transmitters here to gain improved coverage of SE Asia - and perhaps specifically to reach an audience of Japanese troops serving with the U.N. in Cambodia. As of April 5th, the General Overseas Service in English and Japanese is aired as follows: on 11860 at 0100-0300, on 11740 at 0500-1000 and on 6035 at 2100-2200. (RNMN / via Bill Westenhover on WOR, via ODXA)

SLOVAKIA - R. *Slovakia International*, Bratislava, appeared on sked in April but the sked is quite different. The English sked is: 1830-1900 on 5915, 7345, and 9605 kHz; 0100-0130 to North America on 5930, 7310, and 9810 kHz. R. Prague is on in EE for NA at 0100-0130 on 7345 and 11990 kHz. Slovakia broadcasts to the Pacific at 0830-0900 on 11990, 15605, 17535 and 21705 kHz. 11990 gives good reception in Europe at 0830. (Tony Barrett, UK, on RNMN 4/8)

SRI LANKA - *Colombo International Radio* on 882 kHz, a project of the Sri Lanka B/c Corp., has made major changes recently. It began with programs in English, Sinhala and Tamil. Then SLBC advertised for announcers for Telugu and Hindi. Now the station is 100% Tamil, beamed to northern Sri Lanka which is controlled by the radical nationalist Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE). The LTTE is now alone; all other

Tamil rebel groups have changed sides and fight alongside the Colombo regime against the LTTE. To counter the LTTE's own propaganda in northern Sri Lanka, the Colombo government has set aside one hour daily, 1130-1230, on 882 kHz for the pro-Colombo Tamils. They identify as "Mak'kul koral," which means "The Voice of the People." The 400 kw xmtr at Puttalam is also used by Trans-World Radio from 2230-0130 and 1330-1700 in Indian languages. (VG on RNMN 4/15)

SWEDEN - *Radio Sweden* announced 4/7 that the Swedish Parliament's foreign affairs committee seems to have decided to accept the government's proposal to cut the operating budget of Sweden's external radio service by one-third. Parliament was scheduled to vote 4/28. (RNMN 4/8)

TAHITI - *RFO Tahiti*, the government station with four SW xmtrs, has the biggest slice of Tahiti's radio audience despite the presence of 30 or 40 FM stations in an area with 210,000 people. Its news director, Jean Remeau Bodin, says RFO's lead is due to its better news coverage, much of it originating in France. When General DeGaulle visited French Polynesia in 1956 he promised its people would never have to pay a radio license fee. 36 years later, they still don't. The most popular local programs are the weather forecasts (which affect local fishing and inter-island boat travel) and the Polynesian equivalent of 'comunicados' or personal messages between family members. In a small community like Tahiti, everyone knows everyone else. RFO Tahiti's SW xmtrs date from World War II or earlier, and are in poor shape; output power is kept to half of actual rated output. RFO Tahiti is also on satellite 24H; the footprint covers almost the entire Pacific ocean. French diplomatic missions thousands of miles away depend on it. Only three SW xmtrs are operating, on 6135, 11827 kHz NF and 15175 kHz NF. RFO hopes for new xmtrs to accompany the construction of new studios in 1995. Bodin supports plans to split RFO Radio and RFO TV, for his own reasons. "Having the same people do radio one day and TV the next is not very good, and besides, the radio is looked upon as the poor guy of the family." He hopes the new regime which came to power in France last month, and wants to merge RFO into Radio France, will allow Radio Tahiti to remain bilingual and independent. (Eric Beauchemin and Andy Sennitt on RNMN 3/25)

THAILAND - Jamming has come to the Far East and is pretty severe on a lot of channels. The VOA xmtr in Thailand on

11785 kHz, testing in Chinese, has been wiped out by tremendous jamming. The 1000 kw MW xmtr on 1575 kHz was clear in mid February but in late March jamming began at 1330-1700, including Khmer as well as Mandarin and Cantonese. (AC on RNMN 4/8) [The jamming sounds like ball bearings falling on a carpeted floor.--mf].

Initial Z93 schedule for the test broadcasts from VOA's Udorn Relay Station was 1100-1300 on 11820, 1300-1400 on 11785, 1400-1600 on 9590, 1600-1700 on 9615, 2100-2300 on 6045 kHz, all in Mandarin, all beamed 30 degrees. (VOA Frequency Division BBS) A second transmitter is expected to begin testing sometime in May. Check the BBS or computer networks for details. [df]

TONGA - *R. Tonga*, Nuku'alofa, 5030 kHz, returned to the air at the end of March and left shortly afterwards. Chris Rogers in Melbourne talked to the chief engineer, who said the transmitter is fine. However, there is a hum on the studio-xmtr phone line which must be fixed. They had been waiting for a new final amplifier tube, which arrived in March. (AC on RNMN 4/8)

Tonga Broadcasting Corp. got its 1 kW transmitter back on the air for a time in February after receiving a replacement final tube. It was first noted reactivated on Feb 13th at 0648 with a church service in English, followed by Radio Australia news at 0700. The signal was good but of course this was logged in New Zealand. Just a few days later, on Feb 16th, it seems Radio Tonga's antenna was brought down by a storm and some airtime was being provided by Radio New Zealand International. Radio Tonga was heard (via RNZI) on 15120 at 0540. The broadcast reverted to RNZI local news at 0600. (Paul Ormandy in New Zealand DX Times / Bill Funk on ODXA Listening Post BBS via Harold Sellers in ODXA)

TURKEY - The Turkish government has shut down private FM and TV stations on the grounds that they interfere with the military services and aircraft freqs. Twelve stations in Ankara were raided by the police and their gear was confiscated. The Association of Turkish Broadcasters met 4/3 to decide on a common position. (DXPL 4/10)

UNITED KINGDOM - *BBC World Service* has begun broadcasting on the Astra satellite because it's easier for listeners to access; the required equipment is cheaper. It is piggybacking on the "UK Gold" TV channel and is not scrambled. It is expected to take the place of BBC Radio 4 on 198 kHz medium wave, which will disappear in 1994. It should also improve BBC WS reception in

many parts of the UK where skip keeps SW signals out. "Shortwave reception in Scotland is diabolical," the BBC's own spokeswoman said. (RNMN 3/25)

URUGUAY - *Radio Monte Carlo*, Montevideo, noted on 11735 at 2000-2200 with local news & pop music; good signals. (Mikio Yamada, Japan)

U.S.A. - University Network xmsns via Lebanon and U.S. SW stations can be as much as a minute out of sync. Wings of Hope, Lebanon, is 40 to 60 seconds *ahead* of WWCR or KVOH at times. One reason is that promotion must be added for North American SW and TV outlets which are meaningless in Europe or the Near East. (Mike Fern--CA)

The studios and transmitters of WWCR, Nashville, and its sister MW station WNQM, were destroyed by fire early Sunday morning 4/4. One new SW xmtr was expected on the air about 4/25, carrying the University Network [which means a full 24H of revenue, which puts a lot of the staff back to work if they were ever off.]

Listeners in the East and Midwest got their first word from Gary Bourgeois on the ANARC SWL net. [Wonder how they got word to listeners in the target area? df] At least two SWLs found out by checking Dr. Gene Scott's Sunday morning service at 1830 on KCBI, Dallas, after finding WWCR silent. Dr. Scott said the studios and three SW xmtrs burned to the ground. The antennas were undamaged. General manager George McClintock told Dr. Scott Sunday that it might take until mid July to get back on the air. Dr. Scott offered his church's help with the rebuilding.

JM was able to reach WWCR program director Adam Locke on Wednesday after WWCR set up temporary offices.

AL: Saturday evening George McClintock, an engineer from the xmtr maker Allied-Harris, and I were all working on the third brand-new xmtr. We actually got it up on the air in a test mode. I left an hour before they did. They shut everything down. They even hit the breakers so there was no power to the xmtr. They left for the evening. We were all going to come back Sunday morning to continue work on the new xmtr.

About 1:30 Sunday morning I got a call from George, who said "The place is ablaze, come a-running." I got out there about half an hour later. I actually beat a couple of the fire trucks out there, which was surprising. The place was completely in flames. It's a total loss. There really is very, very little salvageable. Maybe a couple of final tubes. I don't know.

JM: Fire officials and insurance investigators have been out at the site in northwestern Nashville to inspect the damage and try and work out why the sprinkler system didn't work. The fire originated between the second and third SW xmtrs at the ground level of the building. The owners of WWCR have already decided to rebuild.

AL: It appears that we will have the first SW xmtr on in about two weeks.

JM: How are you managing to do that?

AL: A SW manufacturer here in the states had a xmtr ready to ship. We are 99% certain we will get that xmtr in the next few days. We will put it down the field on a gravel and cement base with a temporary building, hook it straight up to the rhombic antennas. Our people will just have to go down to the small hill where the building used to be, to do all the adjustments every hour.

JM: Will that be on the European beam?

AL: I believe that will be the one carrying Dr. Scott [beamed to Japan]. The next SW which carries the bulk of our programming should be on the air, we are estimating, in about six weeks. WNQM on 1300 kHz is for all practical purposes on the air. [AM xmtrs can be leased on short notice. "For all practical purposes" means the new xmtr is still in the construction-permit measurement stage which precedes full licensing.--mf]

JM: Locke also reports that the station lost its mailing list in the fire. If you want to re-register, write 1300 WWCR Ave., Nashville, TN 37218.

AL: We probably average ten or more letters per day from the audience around the world. A lot of it, for us, is just the response, the QSL cards, program guides and any other information we'd be glad to send. (RNMN 4/8)

WWCR, Nashville, has a temporary address while awaiting reconstruction of its plant: P.O. Box 1963, Madison, TN 37116. (DXPL 4/11)

Dr. Gene Scott announced an emergency fund drive 4/4 to raise \$1 million to offset the loss of WWCR. The drive to build the SW facility on Anguilla, called Secret Six, was wound up at the end of March. A new fund drive called Secret Seven, to raise \$7 million, whose purpose had not been revealed to church members before Easter, began 3/29. The emergency fund drive was bootstrapped onto the first phase of Secret Seven.--mf

The on-again/off-again *KJES* was expecting to be back on the air from mid March with an intended schedule of 1300-1600 and 1800-1900 on 11715 and

2000-2100 on 9510. (WOR via Harry Riddell via ODXA)

Further to the proposed windup of Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty there has been considerable editorial support in the American media to retain these services, in part because the VOA is controlled directly by the government, whereas RFE/RL is accountable to an independent citizens board.

However, an opposite view is presented by Dr. Kim Andrew Elliott, the VOA's Audience Research Officer, in an article entitled *International Broadcasting on a Budget*. He supports a merger of RFE/RL into the VOA, pointing out that they share 17 languages in common. He adds that the United States spends more than twice as much as the BBC for international broadcasting while employing only half as many journalists and attracting just half the audience of the BBC. The paper also argues for the creation of a new, autonomous American international broadcaster and argues against the proposed new Radio Free China which, like the VOA, would be under the direct authority of the government. (SCDX Electronic Edition on CompuServe BBS, via ODXA)

WRMI, Radio Miami International, Miami, 9955 kHz, expects to be on the air in early May. Work on the station was delayed somewhat by Hurricane Andrew last year. Construction began about April 10, levelling the ground and placing rock fill to support the transmitter building and the antenna tower bases. The 50 kw Wilkinson xmtr from Radio Clarin in Santo Domingo has been in storage; it will be reassembled when the building is up. The deadline on the FCC construction permit is 5/18. Tests could begin around May 1. WRMI is authorized to broadcast between 2200 and 1300 UTC. Test programs will be mainly in Spanish. English programming will be added later. WRMI has already received reception reports despite having no equipment in place. (Jeff White and JM on RNMN 4/15)

VENEZUELA - Radio Yaracuy, 4940 kHz, explained that their concession was suspended several years ago due to lack of use and given to Radio Continental. They have no plans to return to shortwave. (Wilkins, NU via HJ)

VIETNAM - Hanoi's operation on 5031.7 is the domestic service rather than a regional station. Noted carrying the Hmong service at 1200 // 6161. (Clark in NU via HJ)

Ha Giang (regional) Broadcasting Station (formerly Ha Tuyen B/S) was audible in North America during the 1991-92 winter season when it was operating on the split

frequency of 4817v. This past winter, however, it had shifted up to 4820 which made reception pretty much impossible, given co-channel QRM from a CIS station. Now it seems, the frequency is drifting as is invariably the case, sooner or later, with these Vietnamese regional outlets. It was tentatively noted [in Australia] on April 4th at 1156 - before listed 1200 s/on, with instrumental music. (David Foster in OZDX / Dave Clark, via ODXA)

In accordance with its usual summer pattern, *Voice of Vietnam* (external service) has dropped 12020 and now uses 15010 [actually on 15009v] //9840 with half-hour English broadcasts scheduled at 1330, 1600, 1800, 1900, and 2030. (RVI Radio World via Harry Riddell) (via ODXA)

WESTERN SAHARA - (Clandestine) - National Radio for the Democratic Arab-Saharan Republic [Itha' al-wataniyah lil-jumhuriyah al-'arabiyah al-sahrawiyah al-dimokratiyah], 11520 kHz, was first heard by Bob Hill. Jerry Berg mailed me a tape of one of their transmissions which I listened to. The Polisario is an Algerian-backed group fighting Morocco for control of the Western Sahara, this former colony was known as Spanish Sahara until 1976 when they gave it up. The Polisario operates on AM on 1544 kHz. I believe that the station I heard on Jerry's tape is this same station with a "new" shortwave outlet. This contrasts with the program *Voice of Free Sahara*, which is currently using 15215 and 9640 at 2200, via Algiers. The station announces that it is on from 0700-2400. It has been heard in Eastern North America from around 2100 until sign off with programs in Arabic. (HJ) 1544 kHz is now in the disputed territory i.e., Western Sahara, per people travelling there; has been via Algeria. (Corbiere DSWCI, SWN via DXLD) It's currently observed in Arabic at 1700-2400. It announces a morning broadcast starting at '0800' (possibly 0700 GMT), but that's not yet confirmed. The radio probably operates from the Tindouf area of Algeria, near the border with Western Sahara, or possibly within the Polisario controlled area of the Sahara. 1544 is believed to replace the former 1355 kHz, which is no longer heard. *National Radio of the SADR* [Arabic: Al-Idha'at al-Wataniyah li al-Jumhuriyah al-Arabiya as-Sahrawiyah], which opposes Moroccan policy on Western Sahara, was first observed by BBCM on MW in December, 1989. (WBI 4/16)

Conferences - Many Asian, etc., listeners to European broadcasters received new spring skeds which were already out of date. The skeds were printed before the semi-annual SW

frequency coordination conference, held in Cologne in February. Jan-Willem Drexhage represented Radio Netherlands.

JM: Can too many stations [at the conference] create more problems than they can solve in a meeting lasting four days?

JD: We think it is, of course, difficult, but the coordination conference is getting more and more successful, and that helps a bit. We were together with 22 different participating organizations. So we thought beforehand it would become quite difficult. But the total number of incompatibilities was even not much bigger than last time.

JM: Still, 270 frequencies were being used by two stations at once, resulting in mutual interference. There were 1300 cases where stations were 5 kHz away from each other, causing interference problems on cheap radios. Some of those problems were sorted out during the conference, so many stations made last minute schedule changes. Some horrendous clashes remain [as of 4/7] like three different stations on 15355 kHz at 1555 UTC. It's hoped that more advanced planning can take place. Listeners, after all, need advance schedule information.

JD: This time the Voice of America joined as a full member. Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty was present as an observer. Next time they will attend as a full member. Other countries like Canada, Italy, Slovak Radio, Norway, Denmark, attended for the first time as observers.

JM: The next time is going to be in Holland.

JD: Yes. This coming August we'll be hosting the meeting over here. (RNMN 4/8)

PIRATES - Dutch "lausteramateurs" who specialize in traditional Netherlands country music at weekends hang out around 1610-1640 kHz between 0000-0300 Sat and Sun. A few of them had ventured down into the regular MW band but found the QRM too much. The Dutch pirates began around 1610 kHz but are now mostly between 1622-1640 kHz. A few of them have made it across the pond to Newfoundland and Canada. They operate amateur fashion, which means that they talk to and play music for each other. Stations which announce their addresses are rare, although the Dutch PTT does not raid them because it has more important work to do. Some Dutch pirates have discovered the 75m band, 3900-3945 kHz between 2300-0200 Sundays. Ordinary Europirates are popping up in the 75m band also. The Dutch country-music pirates tend to cluster at the high end. R. Pluto was heard on 3932.2 kHz at 0100 on a recent Sunday. Most Dutch stations use converted military or marine phone xmtrs. (John Campbell and JM on RNMN 4/1)

Radio Stella International has regular transmissions on 7446 kHz. (Dean Contact via HJ)

Radio Delta heard at 1130 on 11403.8 kHz. (Campbell NU via HJ)

Riverside 101, Londonderry, Northern Ireland, 100.1 MHz, a unofficial outlet, is being relayed on SW by 'A Friend' on 6240v kHz on Saturdays and Sundays. The program includes commercials, pop music, and the occasional political twig. The FM station is in a Derry neighborhood where an attempt to shut it down would start a riot. (John Campbell on RNMN 4/8)

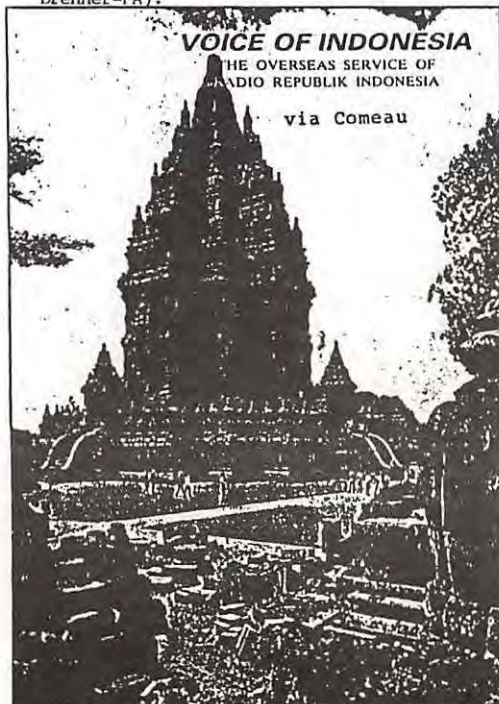

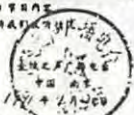
