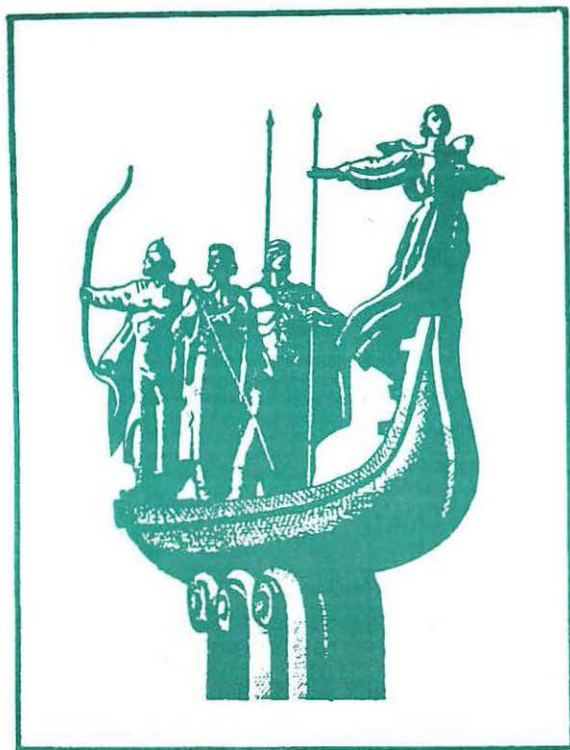

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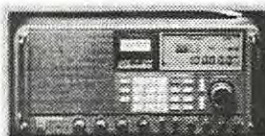

Our third and final DXpedition of the season, and sixth overall, to French Creek State Park is now history. This DXpedition was another traditional Thursday through Sunday affair. Fred Kohlbrenner, Bob "Mr. Coffee" Montgomery, Ed Mauger and George Zeller rounded out the group. We were treated to about two inches of fresh snow while we erected antennas and unloaded equipment on Thursday. Combined with over a foot of leftover snow, running long wire antennas was an adventure. Hiking up antenna ridge in knee high snow was a challenge. I returned to the cabin tired and wet from the new and the old snow. Later, George Zeller and Ed Mauger made similar snowy antenna treks up the hill.

The snow covered roads made entering and exiting the park interesting. After George strung his antenna, he adventured to the nearest grocery store. Unfortunately, while backing out

the long winding driveway, he got caught in a snow bank. Mr. Coffee was able to free him and George was able to go along his merry way. We thought Ed Mauger was a "goner" when he set out to unravel his 300-meter long wire up snow covered antenna ridge. A real game day player to the end, Ed returned snow crusted, perspiration drenched, and tired. This was probably the most difficult set-up day I can recall after all these many DXpeditions. We were treated to small amounts of additional snow on Friday but things began to warm up a little by Saturday.

We did get some time to DX. For a while it seemed all we would do on Thursday would be to set-up the cabin for the weekend. Slowly, we managed to get to the dials and do some listening. Conditions appeared pretty good with a monster signal from RRI Jambi around 2230 until it faded sharply just after the Song of the Coconut Islands at 2258. However, as time marched on it became clear we would be struggling with propagation conditions the entire weekend. Sometimes conditions would be good and sometimes conditions were far from good. A mixed bag but there were some nice European openings and I logged a new Indonesian so things were too bad.

The food department constantly improves. This trip Fred was busy serving shrimp cocktail prior to the traditional Friday evening pasta meal. The meal included meatballs and a nice French loaf courtesy of Ed Mauger. Things keep changing for the better although early Sunday morning Fred found a cheesecake buried in the freezer, which went uneaten.

From the interesting insights department are the adventures of Uncle Fred Kohlbrenner. It seems ol'uncle Fred had to go into work to do the payroll Thursday evening. Because of the weather, he departed almost as soon as he had his listening post set-up complete. It took over three hours for him to make it home as the snow made the roads and traffic conditions awful. After a long night shift, Fred returned late the following morning after another hazardous drive to the cabin. At this point he was functioning with little or no sleep for 48 hours. Last seen, Fred was resting comfortably. Unfortunately, I'm not sure he had an opportunity to DX at all on this DXpedition.

The final highlight belongs to a confused, bewildered George Zeller. Because of his long drive back to Ohio, George decided to get a jump on the trip home by being the first to tackle dismantling his antenna. Keep in mind that George slept for about 10 hours prior to his adventure. He waltzed out of the cabin to return about 20-25 minutes later with a huge pile of yellow wire rolled into a ball. George couldn't believe someone stole his reel for the antenna, which he left at the end of his 500-foot installation. As he shared his adventure, he began to realize that he might have torn down the wrong antenna. Sure enough, our buddy George dragged in Ed Mauger's 984-foot monster antenna, which also happen to be yellow. As George was heard saying, all yellow antennas and trees look alike to me. Incidentally, Ed managed a nice log of Nepal while George was doing the damage. Last seen, a confused and bewildered George was driving down the highway on his way back to Ohio quite proud that he was the first DXer to tear down the wrong antenna.

One week to the 'Fest!

BBC World Service Schedule: Here we go again!

I figured I should put this in the March *Journal* so I can't be accused of pulling an April Fools' prank on you. As of April 2nd, the BBC will be switching from 3½ regional program streams to 8 streams based on a listener's time zone. This is to eliminate the twice-annual shuffling of program times, and to keep all programs of a given type at the same time day-to-day. This consistent timing is done already to some degree—0030 UTC is normally a science program; 0530 is a music program. The promise to keep from shuffling program times will be interesting to watch; that hasn't happened yet, and I know John Figliozzi rues the amount of work that's been needed every six months to update his database of programs.

In the *swprograms* mailing list, it was observed that the Americas stream has been shuffled much more often the past few years than has the African service; there, program times have stayed consistent. Perhaps that's the reason the African service has a more stable and loyal listenership.

The reasons for this switch to 8 streams? The BBC claims that most listeners want to listen to specific types of programs at a specific time of day. For example, most people want news magazines in the morning, as they're sipping coffee or tea.

The current editions of *The World Today* are timed, with the exception of North America, at the breakfast hour in Europe, South Asia, and East Asia. Here in North America, we have *World Update*, which airs only for one hour at 0900 or 1000 UTC, depending on the status of daylight time. All this is fine, but I'm concerned that listening patterns in North America might be different than, say, Nairobi, London, or Singapore. Only time will tell; full details are promised for release in the April issue of *BBC On Air*; I might be able to obtain an early indication with the advance press information, typically available about 10 days before *BBC On Air* arrives.

Other changes will be the amalgamation of programs with common themes into more of a magazine style program. For example, *The Farming World* will disappear as a separate program, with farming issues to be incorporated into the science program *One Planet*. The stated intention is to widen program appeal; perhaps that's a euphemism for seeking a younger audience.

Meanwhile, the BBC has generally been talking about providing two World Service streams via satellite and the Internet;

I will believe all this when I see it. Frankly, my personal needs would be better met if the BBC put all of its non-news programs on the Internet for on-demand download, the same way *Deutsche Welle* organizes their website.

More on the BBC World Service highlights for March later in the column.

Radio Netherlands Changes

Jonathan Marks briefly mentioned in the March 17th *Media Network* that **Radio**

Netherlands would be making some significant changes effective with the spring schedule, specifically that *Newsline* was becoming a half-hour program, doubling in length. As Andy Sennitt later detailed in *swprograms*, here's how the new schedule will look, with all times relative to the start of a particular transmission (e.g. 2330 UTC):

:00-:30 *Newsline* including *Press Review*
:30-:60 Feature Program #1
:60-:85 *Newsline*
:85-1:25 Feature Program #2

I'd guess that *Newsline* will probably begin with a short live newscast, as does Deutsche Welle's *Newslink*.

Upcoming Radio Netherlands documentaries include:

March 9/10: *Invisible Scars* takes a look at the psychological scars of the 9-year Sierra Leone civil war. According to Sierra Leone's only psychiatrist, "anybody who was in the country over the past decade has suffered some form of trauma". A recent survey carried out by the Dutch branch of Doctors without Borders shows very high levels of trauma among the general population. There is mounting evidence that trauma must be addressed to ensure lasting peace.

March 16/17: *The Jews in Poland* (no additional information available)

March 23/24: *The Jews in Berlin* (again, no additional information available)

March 30/31: in Part One of *Afrikaners*, Marijke van der Meer and Helene Michaud look at the Afrikaners Today, their culture and identity in post-apartheid South Africa.

Documentaries air, for now, at 0052 and 0452 Thursdays, and 2352 Fridays.

Swiss Radio International—No More Rendezvous

Without much warning, **Swiss Radio International** has eliminated *Rendezvous With Switzerland*, the half-hour features program that aired at 0430 following the current affairs program *World Radio Switzerland*. Instead, the 0430 program is now just a repeat of the 0400 program. While I found the number of musical breaks within *Rendezvous* to be excessive to my personal taste, the program put a more human face on Swiss culture and life than the more sterile *World Radio Switzerland* program afforded.

The reason offered for this cutback: More resources needed for Internet development. Interestingly, a couple months back, SRI had mentioned in their web site that a review of SRI broadcast resources would be conducted in 2002, with the likely outcome that Internet resources would require additional funds, perhaps at the expense of shortwave. This seemed to suggest that no cuts would be needed before 2002, but reality appears to have dictated otherwise. John Figliozzi contacted SRI staff to register his disappointment, but it appears a higher level management decision was responsible.

Program Reviews

First, Peter Bowen posted this review of **Radio Sweden's** *Money Matters* in the *swprograms* list:

"For a small station, Radio Sweden puts out some very good programming. This show is a good example of that quality programming.

"*Money Matters* is a ten-minute program broadcast each Wednesday, as part of the larger general magazine feature *Sixty Degrees North*. The program is devoted to economic and business affairs, especially as they relate to Sweden, and is hosted by Nidia Hagstrom.

"The stories featured on the program seem to focus on new business ventures. No time is devoted to news of the capital markets, however. This is a wise decision on the part of the show's producer, as not only is the program too short for this, but there are other shows that provide this type of information (primarily *World Business Report* on the BBC World Service).

"Two to three stories are featured in each edition. It seems that almost all of the stories are phone-out interviews on the topic under discussion, frequently to those who are actually involved in the story. Although this is a good format, I would like to see more "out-and-about" features on the program, always adhering of course to the show's theme. The station's reporters do a good job of these on-location reports in other segments of *Sixty Degrees North*.

"Although both the presenter and the interviewees have slight accents, none that I have heard are in any way troubling, and in fact sound rather pleasant to my ears. In addition, Nidia Hagstrom comes across as being both quite professional and competent, though perhaps a tad wooden at times.

"*Money Matters* is a good example of a program that, although focusing on one topic, presents stories in such a way that they frequently have much wider appeal.

"And therein lies the key to success for the small, 'nationalistic' stations: Present stories related to the host country in such a way that they appeal to those listeners who may not have a strong interest in the host country."

Along the same lines, Joe Buch added his thoughts about a business program on CFRX:

"The best source of Canadian business news that I have found on shortwave is *Morning Business Hour* airing at 0900 UTC on CFRX 6170 kHz. I stumbled across it one morning in a moment of insomnia. The

program consists of stock market reports for the various Canadian exchanges plus in depth stories on various Canadian companies. So if you are into such things as penny mining stocks you may want to give a listen."

BBC World Service—March Highlights

Here are some of the highlights for the World Service in March.

Drama and the Arts

Mondays from March 13th, 0130 and 1430:
Songs of the Earth—Songs of love and loss, of longing for ancestral land, and birth and death are interwoven with the stories of ordinary people whose lives are mirrored in the lyrics of their music, in this new three-part series of ballads from around the world.

Tuesdays—Saturdays, March 7th-25th, 0445:
Off the Shelf features Salman Rushdie's *The Ground Beneath Her Feet*, read by Art Malik.

Saturdays, 2230: *Play of the Week* features include:

March 11—*What Now, Now That We Are Dead?* satirises the state of a nation and political corruption, and is adapted from the successful stage play by Pakistani writer and journalist, Mohammed Hanif.

March 18—*What You Get and What You Expect* is a drama involving the European Union bureaucracy, a French love triangle, and outer space. Originally a stage play by one of France's major new young writers, Jean Marie Besset.

March 25—*Taking Sides* is a play based on John Graham Davies' volunteer work delivering aid to Tuzla in Bosnia in 1993. Listeners, like Davies' convoy, meet peacekeepers, dissidents, and townspeople of every ethnicity, and are confronted by their complex, disturbing, and sometimes absurd stories.

April 1—*The Diving Bell and the Butterfly* tells the story of Jean Dominique Bauby, the 42 year-old editor-in-chief of *Elle* magazine in Paris, who slipped into a coma and emerged three weeks later, discovering he was suffering from locked-in syndrome—a condition whereby the sufferer is paralyzed and unable to speak, but retains all his intellectual faculties. The one movement Bauby could make was to blink his left eyelid. By doing this he devised a code for each letter of the alphabet and began to “dictate” a book—a book that has become a worldwide best seller. It is an immensely moving personal story, written with great poignancy and surprising flashes of humor. The author died four days after the book’s publication.

Classical Music

Sundays, March 19th and 26th, 1601: The rich tradition of Russian music is celebrated in this month’s *Millennium Concert*, which comes from the historic Great Hall of the Moscow Conservatory, opened by Tchaikovsky in 1866. Yuri Bashmet leads The Moscow Soloists, Russia’s leading chamber orchestra.

General Features

Sundays, beginning March 12th, 0530, and Tuesdays, 0230: *Oiling The Wheels* is a three-part, 30-minute series looking at the culture of corruption and shady dealing. Annette MacKensie examines the effects of such secretive practices on the world of politics, business and everyday life.

Sundays, beginning March 5th, 0030; Tuesdays, 0645: *Talking Peace* is a four-part 15-minute series exploring the role of language in peacekeeping activities.

Current Affairs

Monday, March 13th, 1030: Queen Elizabeth will deliver her annual *Commonwealth Day* message; at 1515, the BBC will air the *Commonwealth Day Observance* from Westminster Abbey.

Thursdays, 1130: *Assignment* will mark the one-year anniversary of NATO’s Kosovo air strikes (March 23rd) and new water projects in the Nile Valley in Egypt (March 30th).

Saturdays, 0230: If you’d like to take a break from the political campaigns in the US, and find out what’s happening in the British political scene, tune in to *People and Politics*. It’s one of the few World Service programs that focus on news from the UK, now that *Network UK* is long gone from the schedule.

Religion

Wednesday, March 22nd, 0430; Friday, 1515: Icons, sacred pictures normally painted using egg tempura, and their importance in the Orthodox Christian tradition of spirituality and worship is explored by Tabitha Morgan in *Windows to God*.

Help!!

Your editor needs contributions for SWC from You!

Material for Shortwave Center is getting a little thin and dated. I need more contributions from you. Original articles are especially needed, long or short, on any acceptable subject of interest to readers of the *Journal*. So indulge yourself by becoming an author.

I hope the shortwave bands have not been as bad for you as they have been here this winter. On February 14 and 15, geomagnetic activity was exceptionally high and most P/NG, Indonesian, and Indian stations could not be heard on 60 to 120 meters. Prior to that, the P/NG stations had reappeared weakly from their absence around the winter solstice; I had even heard 2410 near fair levels in early February when conditions were quiet. They have been largely unheard this week (through February 20).

Reception to Indonesia has been up and down, but my general impression is that conditions are less favorable than last year from the same location. Likewise, the Indian stations are often heard at low levels, peaking about 1300. But on no day that I have been listening this entire winter, have I heard what I would consider an exceptionally good, or even fairly good, opening to SE Asia. Signal strengths tend to drop sharply shortly after local sunrise, eventhough some stations, like Pt. Moresby and Ujung Pandang continue to hold in past 1400 to nearly 1500.

Amateur Radio Operators have also reported generally poor conditions for DX, eventhough the solar flux has risen to near 200 at some times. The general opinion is that the current solar cycle has not lived up to the pre-cycle hype (Does Anything?). Also, the cycle may peak at a lower than expected level. Chaos rules!

Speaking of Amateur Radio, and many of our faithful shortwave DXers are also hams, including ye editor, the FCC announced a restructuring of the amateur licensing system to simplify it to three license classes, Technician, General, and Extra. The code requirement has been reduced to one speed, 5 words a minute, for all classes. Many Technician hams who qualified for 5 WPM never upgraded because of the former higher speed code requirements. Now they can move up to General and Extra licenses by passing an examination on rules, regulations, and radio electronics. Likewise, hams who were general or advanced licensees, but could not raise their code speed to 20 WPM, can now advance to Extra by passing the examination. Hopefully, this restructuring will increase interest in Amateur Radio by younger persons. There was the expected outcry from the WWII generation of ham operators who loved the code and could copy code in their head at unbelievable speeds. However, they are quickly passing into history and the FCC came to see that the former code requirements were archaic and inhibiting the progress of amateur radio.

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Therefore, I invite all who are interested in yacking on the radio as well as listening to contact your local Amateur Radio Club for information on test sessions and availability of study materials. The new question pools are on the Internet at <<http://www.arrl.org>> and become effective on April 15, 2000.

I read with interest the comments of Bob Padula in the February 2000 *Journal*. Bob is a person whose strong opinions in regard to the radio listening and DXing hobby have made him an international legend in his own time. In any case, his comments apply equally well to the Amateur Radio community. Radio is a hobby for those of us whose entertainment as children was to listen to the radio. Radio has less attraction to those who grew up in front of the TV or now, in front of the computer. Nevertheless, "wireless communications" (the old term resurfaces dressed in new garb for the New Age of Man) are becoming ever more important in the life of every earthling. Hey, your cell-phone is a

two-way radio after all and your satellite dish is receiving weak radio signals from outer space.

NASWA is exceedingly lucky in having a significant number of long-time radio hobbyist who work together to keep the *Journal* going and interest in the hobby alive in North America. Many of these people are actually younger than I am. Nevertheless, most are in their 50s now and a few in their 40s. Where have all the eager 20 somethings gone? Off to cyber space, I guess. But I appreciate Bob's perseverance. We will keep it going as long as we have breath, mate.

A Central Asian DX Trip

One thing usually leads to another... In 1993, a trip through the 3 Baltic states was much enjoyed, not in the least for the DX aspects of it: several radio stations were visited and some QSLs were obtained on the spot. Last year we enjoyed visiting Turkmenistan, another former Soviet state, and popping in at Turkmen Radio not only resulted in a much wanted QSL, but our visit was even featured in an Ashgabat newspaper.

I have always been a keen fan of combining holiday trips with visits to radio stations. Over the past 37 years I have visited over 200 stations in some 85 countries around the world. This year my girl-friend and I decided to explore some more former Soviet states and chose to go to Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan and Kazakstan. I could fill many pages about our experiences on this journey, but I will confine myself to the DX part of it. Let me just say that it was a rough trip, often under rather primitive conditions: it is not for everyone...

In Uzbekistan, we were quite impressed seeing the ancient cities of Khiva, Buchara, and Samarkand with their numerous samples

of Islamic art and architecture. Samarkand Airport was on my list as a target for a DX visit. I had heard them early in 1998 on 3467 kHz in contact with Lahore Airport, but a reception report had remained unanswered. Our visit was short and sweet: the female air navigation officer understood my hobby, as her husband used to be a radio amateur. So the first 5 years of her marriage had been a bit of hell: they had to live in only one room with him highly radio active! We chatted a little more over some green tea and then I got my QSL.

In 1962, I got my first letter and QSL-card from Radio Tashkent and during our visit to the English Section, I showed photo-copies of what I had received back then. The verisigner is still alive and well, now working in the hotel business... Very close to Radio Tashkent is the chimes tower, featured in the sixties on their common blue QSL card. It was quite fascinating to see (and hear!) this tower after all these years. We were interviewed for the English language programs, and after a nice lunch in the canteen, it was time to say goodbye to these friendly people.

While most of Uzbekistan is a desert country (except for the Ferguana Valley in the east), Kyrgyzstan is a mountainous country of incredible beauty. Because of its proximity to China and the fact that the Soviet Navy used some huge lakes there for testing weapons, Kyrgyzstan was formerly always

closed to foreigners who traveled in the USSR on Intourist tours. But also non-resident Soviet citizens needed special permission to go there. And now you can just go there and enjoy its fabulous scenic beauty and the great hospitality of the people who are mostly nomads. After trekking in the Pamir Mountain Range, we started heading towards Bishkek. It is a much more modern and developed city than we had expected. It is very green too, and in fact has more trees per inhabitant than any other Asian capital. We found the people friendly and helpful, usually with a ready smile.

Of course, Kyrgyz Radio was a target for a visit, as not many QSLs are received from them... For me, Kyrgyzstan would be EDXC country 255 confirmed, so off we went... I spoke to the very first person we saw at the main entrance. He proved to be the right man indeed; the technical director of radio & TV. A minute later we were in his spacious office, after going through what seemed to be a dark labyrinth.

I brought a recording I had sent with a report 4 years ago. He pressed a button on his desk and in came a secretary whom he ordered to bring a cassette recorder. He listened intently and recognized a program about politics and economy. He mentioned the presenter's name and said: "I can confirm your reception of Kyrgyz Radio!" I asked him to sign and stamp the QSL I had prepared. After doing so, he again pressed the button to call his secretary from an adjacent room. He asked her to stamp my QSL and she soon returned with my precious little document. I then inquired about their news bulletins in English and German. He again pressed the little button and his secretary instantly reappeared with a radio & TV guide showing the times of these news bulletins. Leaving the building only 30 minutes after entering it, I told my girl-friend: "Mission completed!"

It is only 4.5 hours by bus from Bishkek to Almaty: another DX target. Although I already had a Radio Nederland QSL for their Kazakstan relay, I surely wanted to see that rarely verifying Radio Almaty. But there was

also Almaty Airport which had not QSLed my report regarding a radio contact with Ashgabat Airport on 4669. (By the way, Almaty—formerly Alma Ata—is no longer the Kazak capital city. The capital is now more centrally located Astana, which was for a while known as Aqmola.)

I first reported Radio Alma Ata's German-language Home Service Program 35 years ago. They were then easily heard on the out-of-band frequency of 10530 kHz. These programs were intended for descendants of the so-called Volga Germans, early settlers of the Volga region who were deported further east by Stalin who feared that they would collaborate with the invading Nazis.

I had another go at Radio Alma Ata 13 years ago, but again without any result to my report. After Kazakstan's independence, Radio Almaty International was formed and 4 years ago I reported a program in English on 5260 kHz, but again no QSL. It seems, however that their present German Section sometimes does QSL with a nice kind of certificate...

We first visited Radio Almaty on a Saturday afternoon. Nobody of the English and German Section was in, but nice team members of "FM 101" (the commercial home service) received us very friendly in the aging building. We were given a nice calendar and a CD and cassette with traditional Kazak music.

We decided to return to the station Monday afternoon and found some members of the English Section in a small room, decorated with post cards from many countries... On a desk was an envelope containing more post cards still, as well as several IRCs... On the desk I also spotted a letter from Lars Ryden, a former co-editor of "Sweden Calling DXers." I met him in Stockholm 31 years ago and was pleased to see that he is obviously still active.

I produced a copy of the letter I had sent in 1994 and said that I regretted never to have received a confirmation of my reported reception. They said literally: "Why do people

from around the world actually write to us? What do they want? Some also enclose dollar notes..." Well, they are clearly beginners in the field of international broadcasting and I explained our hobby as well as I could. They told me that I was the first foreign listener ever to visit them and was interviewed as such. Maybe my visit has clarified a few things and will motivate them to deal with listeners' mail properly.

Almaty Airport was my last challenge, but it soon appeared to be the toughest! Along with us came a young, female Kazak dentist who had done post-graduate work in Holland. I first explained this strange DX hobby to her and then stressing on what I call "The Four P's," i.e. Patience, Persistence & Powerful Persuasion. She appeared to be willing to fight like a lioness and indeed she did!

Much to my surprise we were—within minutes and without any security checks—in the very nerve centre of the airport. About 10 Russian women, all wearing white blouses and big old spectacles, were in a large room behind computers and communications equipment. Our Kazak friend told them: "This is a radio hobbyist from Holland and he badly wants a confirmation from this airport. Please help him!" One of them replied: "Yes, we will help!" Friendly, but somewhat puzzled, the lady pointed to a microphone and asked: "Does he want to speak on the radio here?" Our local friend turned down this kind offer and asked them to check my reception, the details of which I showed them. They were indeed friendly and helpful and started to look into their computers and printed logs. But putting something on paper? No, only

the Director of Civil Aviation was authorized to do so!

We were given his name and directions as to where to find him: in a building at some distance from the actual terminal. Our friend first went in and left us waiting in the hall for 20 minutes. What was going on? This didn't seem right. Then finally she reappeared and said: "This man is very straight, but you may come in now." We found two gentlemen in the office, the (Russian) director and the (Kazak) assistant director. The assistant director translated my prepared

QSL in Russian for the director. He then picked up the phone to check my reception, after which he signed the QSL and ordered a secretary to put two nice stamps on it.

When we were outside again, our friend told us what had happened while she was inside the office of this old "Sovietski burocratski." She had been rather insistent as to my QSL request. But the director had replied that he was not going to sign anything. After all, I surely was a spy! He asked her who had given her his name and had told her where to find him. After she repeated my request, he ordered her to leave his office. He was not going to have any of this and he had to continue with his duties. But she stayed... After receiving a phone call, he told her again to leave. Then the assistant director came in and asked what was going on. She explained her presence and repeated my request. The assistant director understood radio as a hobby and convinced the director that there was really no harm in giving me what I wanted. And so I got my QSL. After thanking and complimenting our lioness, I sighed happily: "MISSION COMPLETED!"

Voice of the Mediterranean (Valletta, Malta)

(Extracted from official information from the station by Volker Willschrey and first published in the World Wide DX Club's DX Magazine in February 1999)

The original agreement in 1984 setting up the Voice of the Mediterranean provided for transmission of programs dealing with classical Mediterranean issues. Still, the station only became operational in September 1988.

With the changes that transformed the political scene in Europe and the Mediterranean, new programs were introduced in the early 1990s. It was felt that the station had to become relevant with the times and, in this respect, advantage was taken of the facilities available, in order to promote Malta in a general manner. We also looked around for something original for the station to be identified with. 1995 heralded a new approach giving prominence to Euro-Mediterranean cooperation. The concept was based on a new form of partnership that was inspired by the historic Euro-Med Ministerial Conference.

Voice of the Mediterranean is a non-profit organisation. It endeavours to present light, creative, and informative programs in keeping with the wishes of its vast listenership. The station has its own vocation and its mission statement covers three particular tasks of relevance to Malta, its nationals, and the geographic and political environment in which they live.

Therefore VOM aims to:

- Report and promote activities within the Euro-Med area as well as Malta's related regional and international policies.
- Present the listenership with information on current affairs through features covering the many opportunities that the island offers through its development in

commerce and industry, financial services, the maritime sector, tourism, blended with the rich cultural heritage and the unique history of the country and its people.

- Establishing and maintaining on a continuous basis, contacts with Maltese communities abroad through programs designed to bring to the successive generations of Maltese the characteristics and values of their country of origin.

In the end, the whole concept is based on the awareness that whatever we produce reflects Malta's image abroad. Listenership was widened through the introduction of original programs in French and German. Letters reached VOM from all over the world, with the majority coming from Europe and the Mediterranean region.

On September 1, 1988, the Voice of the Mediterranean took to the air. The programs were transmitted on the Deutsche Welle facilities to the south of Malta. Two hours of English and Arabic were broadcast using short and medium wave frequencies simultaneously. The program was repeated on shortwave in the evening. We were pleased with listeners response to the signal and programs.

In 1995, two additional hours were added for a special program called "Valletta Calling" a magazine type program in English followed by a French half hour. A German language program was added later. Our newsletter was restructured and thousands of copies were mailed every month to listeners.

All too suddenly, however, as the station was moving steadily forward, strong signals came of the probable closure of the transmitting station. Deutsche Welle operations in Malta ceased in January 1996. VOM went silent.

As council members struggled with closure, listeners from all over the world wrote or called to find out what had happened. Closure of the DW facility brought home the message that, in a few short years, VOM had established a network of listeners covering a large number of countries. It was a very critical moment and the Maltese Councilors of the station felt that they should seek, and eventually succeeded in obtaining, the necessary authorization to keep the station going. As months passed, the fear of definite closure loomed heavily on all the people connected with the station. After a lot of hard work, the location of new transmitting facilities was welcomed with a sigh of relief. In June 1996, VOM programs were back on the airwaves. The restart was a modest two-hour program, from eight to ten in the evening, in English and Arabic. A few weeks following start-up, "Valletta Calling" found its place in the Sunday program as well.

Other possibilities that could carry VOM programs to Maltese communities in foreign lands were also examined. The island history is replete with instances of Maltese nationals traveling to distant lands. Given the strategic location of Malta in the centre of the Mediterranean, the sea had a particular appeal to its people. They fished and traveled to look for jobs, learning, and adventure. Some settled in countries far away. With this background, it is no surprise that, for a long time, the station was eager to reach Maltese communities abroad. Maltese nationals or people of Maltese origin are found in sizable numbers in such places as Australia, Canada, the USA, UK, New Zealand and South Africa. Older communities were formed in countries along the Mediterranean littoral while others settled in former British colonies. The station had started programs to Australia and New Zealand in English and Maltese in 1995. Radio Melita programs were restarted to Australia in Maltese and English in July 1996.

Besides direct transmissions, VOM started to produce special programs for Maltese ethnic radio stations in Australia. In 1997, daily programs were resumed on the MW frequency

of 711 kHz. This was intended to reach listeners in North Africa and the Mediterranean. Later, a daily program for central Europe was added to the schedule. This enabled the station to introduce "Qui Malta!", a daily program in Italian. In a short while the program had a positive response with listenership regularly on the increase.

As transmissions to Australia were being received very strongly in Japan, a half-hour program designed specifically for Japanese listeners was added to the Asian transmissions. The response was so strong that it was decided to have the program in Japanese and increased to one hour. On December 1, 1997, a daily mid-day program consisting of three segments of one half hour each in Italian, English, and Arabic was added. It is beamed to Europe and the Mediterranean region. Since March 29, 1998, this program has been transmitted in the morning.

The current shortwave schedule for VOM shows English to North America 0100-0200 Sundays on 13605; 0200-0330 Saturdays to Asia/Pacific of 15550 and 17570; and 1900-2000 daily except Thursday, to Eu/Med/Af on 9765 and 12060.

French to North America is 0300-0330 on Sunday on 13605 and 2100-2130 on Saturday on 9810; German to North America at 0330-0400 Sunday on 13605 and 2130-2200 on Saturday on 9810; Japanese to North America 0400-0430 Sunday on 13605 and Saturday 2200-2230 on 9810; and Maltese to North America at 0200-0300 on Sunday on 13605 and 2000-2100 Saturdays on 9810.

Those of us that have been working on this project are convinced that the overall performance of the station will serve Malta's interests through programs conceived to create an awareness of Malta's characteristics, potential, and interest. Listener's Library

As most of you have figured out by now, many of the new high performance receivers have computer interface capabilities. The key to a successful interface between these two types of technology is the software. Since much of this software is written to the needs of specific receivers, the best way to get a good review is to hear from somebody that has pushed the software's limits with the right rig. This month fellow NASWAITE Robert Montgomery has stepped forward with just such a review. In this case, of a piece of software from another fellow NASWAITE Mark Fine.

Smart NRD Control 32

Review by Robert E. Montgomery

In many radio shacks, the computer has found a place for many purposes. Some think that it causes many noise problems and have delayed in using one. But I have found using a laptop to be very handy, and it produces noise only from the charging unit and not the computer. By keeping the laptop fully charged, and with proper placement of the charging unit, good ground connections prevent most of the noise from entering good table top receivers.

After sending my NRD535db receiver to Kiwa for some modification and upgrade work for improvements, I was very much impressed with the improvements and decided to give a control program a try. I downloaded a number of control systems from the Internet but finally settled on one, Smart NRD Control 32 written by Mark Fine. The shareware version had such a well thought out help format, I decided to purchase the registered version. I am not a computer guru and the instructions were very helpful to understand the operation of the program. Complete instructions on the interface cable are also supplied. If you are handy with a solder iron you may choose to make your own or

purchase a standard cable and add a null modem to interface with the serial port of the laptop.

My description of the program will be only a basic view as the Smart NRD Control 32 program has so many features that it will not be possible to list them all. After installing the program and starting from the desktop Icon, a graphic receiver loads to the screen. Complete with frequency display and all non-knob related receiver controls. Both computer control and operator control of receiver are possible at the same time. S meter, clock which can be set to local or UTC time, key pad, plus a tool bar are also displayed.

The graphic receiver appears to be close to the front panel of the NRD535. Operation of receiver can be accomplished by clicking on the various portions of the display panel. Direct frequency input to the receiver can be achieved by entry from computer key board or by clicking on the keypad provided on the graphic receiver panel. Loading of receiver memory or viewing and changing memory can also be accomplished via the keyboard. There are a number of databases included with the program and have found myself rarely using the receiver memory system. If you click on the frequency display, a list of what other stations use this frequency will be displayed.

The NRD535 contains 200 memories while the Drake R8B contains 1000 alpha numeric memories. The Smart NRD Control program makes memory manipulation easy for both receivers. In fact a maximum of 10 banks of memories can be stored in the program, complete with id's for each of the memories. A real plus to the JRC user and also a much easier way for the Drake user to add the IDs without using the receiver key pad. The memories of both receivers can be scanned

by the program. Each bank must loaded before scanning but only take a couple of key strokes and a second to load. I personally rarely use the memories as the databases supplied with the program saves the steps of loading and dumping memories. If you are a utility DXer, however, the memories would be of great use and worth the price of the program.

The control program consists of a number of program features. Propagation predictor, where you enter your location, current Solar Flux and A index information and the station you want to listen to. Produces a multi-colored chart with LUF, MUF, and OWF. Another program of great use if you receive data from Cumbre is a Cumbre Lite parser. This imports the data from Cumbre Lite to a log format where you can view and double click on a frequency listed which will automatically tune the receiver to that frequency. A spectrum display which permits scanning at different frequency ranges and produces a display that can be saved for later inspection. Basically a poor man's spectrum analyzer. By moving the mouse in the panned display and clicking to the peaks, the receiver will automatically tune to that frequency. I find it very handy when dxing as it aids in digging out the weak ones. There are a number of databases with listings for just about any interest in shortwave. Utility stations, mediumwave, shortwave broadcast stations, English and non-English, and even RTTY and CB frequencies. The real plus is the program permits modification of the databases for your own special needs. The program also provides a second VFO setting which the NRD535 receiver does not originally provide. Very handy. From the tool bar it is possible to print out a complete listing of English broadcasts or for a single radio station. The print out can be done to paper or to the screen.

The control program has the ability to import the weekly English language and DX show listing provided by Mark Fine on an annual subscription basis. The program is supplied with the latest version at time of shipment.

A recent upgrade has been added with several new additions but one neat feature I like. The program now tracks all frequencies entered. A scratch pad of sorts which when checking parallel frequencies makes it a snap. Just by clicking on an up-down arrow, it the receiver tunes back to previous frequencies. No more entering digits to change frequency.


The program also can produce logging reports to your favorite group. There are four format templates supplied but is possible to create your own format for that special group. Each category, such as country, time, frequency, etc. can be manipulated to any order to fit the needs of that special group. A list of DX shows or shortwave programs with times and frequency listing can be produced by clicking on the tool bar. Say for example you want to listen to a BBC program, from the SWBC list, a complete list of frequencies is produced for that time block and by clicking on one will tune the receiver to that frequency. If that frequency produces poor reception, select another one and so on. As you go through the list you can highlight the frequencies with the best reception for future reference. Say you are not interested in that program but another, paging through the list will show all times and program titles. The program even has the ability to turn on a tape deck if installed properly to the receiver by a timer for that special program you want to record while away from the radio. The time and frequency are set in the timer and the program will tune to the set frequency and turn the tape deck on. There are a total of 30 timers that can be set for any day of the week or in a daily format.

Conclusion

I have been using the program for over a year now and can tell you I rarely consider not using the program when DXing. I have used the program on a number of dxpeditions and it has saved me much time in looking up information. I have found the help screens to be very easy to understand and written in plain English. I had a couple of questions

about the database and received a fast reply via email with good answers. No sitting on the phone line for hours waiting for a response or sending an email and 4 weeks later getting an answer that does not really help, as with other software I have purchased in the past. My hat is off to Mark Fine who has done a great job producing this program. He also has control program for the Lowe receiver. I have not seen it work on the Lowe but would guess the same features would be provided. The program is affordable at \$60.00. My shack has a shelf with junk I have bought over the years that really

does not work. This program is not one of them. I personally am very happy with the receiver and control program. If you are thinking of a trying a computer control program for your receiver, I suggest checking Mark's website at <http://www.erols.com/fineware/>. Also the complete English broadcast listing updated weekly is available from the same website. Check it out.

Beware, Solar Max Is Coming

"Who is Solar Max anyway?" you ask. Is he a retired, sun-tanned wrestler running for political office? Is he the alien head of a race of beings riding a comet tail around the sun? Is he the new honcho of ANARC? No! Solar Max stands for a peak in the solar sunspot cycle, an event predicted to happen in just a few months.

In case you are new to this hobby or have been in a coma for the past decade, you need to know that short-wave radio propagation is a function of an eleven-year sunspot activity cycle. More sunspots mean higher levels of ionization of the atoms in the ionosphere. With higher sunspot activity, the higher SW frequencies become more useful for both day and night signal propagation. Frequencies above 15 MHz, once dead after sunset, now support clear reception in North America from Australia and New Zealand well into the night.

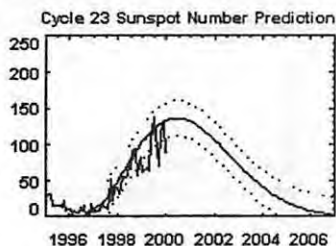


Figure 1 Solar Cycle 23 is not measuring up to previous predictions.

But cycle 23 is running well behind the predictions. As Gilda Radner would have said, "Never mind." See Figure 1.

Solar physicist David Hathaway of NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center and other researchers predicted back in 1996 that the

coming peak would be among the strongest in recent times. Predictions warned of calamities ranging from power grid melt down, and satellites prematurely falling back to earth, to the zapping of astronauts trying to build the International Space Station.

A number of techniques are used to predict the amplitude of a cycle during the previous sunspot minimum. Relationships have been found between the size of the next cycle maximum and the length of the previous cycle, the level of activity at sunspot minimum, and the size of the previous cycle.

Among the most reliable techniques are those that use the measurements of changes in the Earth's magnetic field at, and before, sunspot minimum. These changes in the Earth's magnetic field are caused by solar storms but the precise connections between them and future solar activity levels are still uncertain.

Forecasting Using "Hindcasting"

Hindcasting is the applying of old data to current models and the examination of the resulting predictions compared to the actual historical experience. The researcher then decides which models work best in given situations.

Since 1996, Hathaway has been honing his forecasts by testing methods proposed by others using hindcasting.

Hathaway narrowed the list to three models. The combined ability of the resulting "supermodel" paints a more accurate picture of space weather to come.

Of course models are only good predictors of future events if the models take into account all of the pertinent factors. The mod-

els that predicted stock market corrections in 1929 and 1987 using hindcasting have also predicted 5 of the last 2 recessions. Why? Likely there is some factor the models have not accounted for. Is it the aging of the baby boom generation? Is it the influence of the computer and the Internet on productivity?

For our purposes, it is enough to recognize that models are all flawed to some degree. I once worked with a physicist who firmly believed there was no such thing as reality. There was only our model of reality limited by our understanding of the world around us and how it really works. And so it is with solar cycle predictions.

The model developed by Hathaway, is more accurate during the months leading up to the maximum. Two models produced by other researchers were found best at predicting several years in advance.

So Hathaway decided to combine the methods. The result is a supermodel that can be fine-tuned on the fly as the solar cycle progresses. He is transitioning to give more weight to his model, which more heavily weights current activity, and less weight to two models that made their best predictions back in 1996. Hathaway predicts the peak will occur in June. High activity will continue thereafter for two or three years. The peak smoothed sunspot number will be about 136 roughly equal to the 1989 maximum.

The expectation, based on the 1996 estimates, had been a sunspot peak of 160. January had several days with more than 200 sunspots and the average for the month is about 130. December averaged just 86, but in November there was an average of 132 per day.

The View From Down Under

One of the models Hathaway used comes from Richard Thompson of IPS Radio and Space Services, a part of the Australian

Government's Department of Industry, Science and Resources. He found a relationship between the number of days during a sunspot cycle in which the geomagnetic field was "disturbed" and the amplitude of the next sunspot maximum. His method has the advantage of giving a prediction for the size of the next maximum well before the previous minimum. Thompson sees the peak coming in late 2000 or early 2001. He expects the sunspot average to exceed 140.

Because the cause and effect relationships are not well understood, only a statistical inference can be made based upon hindsight. But there are plenty of examples where such apparent relationships are simply coincidence. The "super bowl" rule, which predicts stock market performance based upon the outcome of the NFL super bowl football game, comes to mind. It just seems to work in hindsight.

The SIM mission in Abidjan sends the mail to **ELWA** in a bulk package once a week by air.

You will note that I copied this e-mail to Isonius. He is our son, Lee Sonius, who is Regional Di-

rector for HCJB for Sub Sahara Africa and had a big hand in getting the **ELWA** transmitter set up. He is the former director of Radio **ELWA**.

Thank you for sending your e-mail to us. The operators of **ELWA** will be thrilled to get your QSL Card.

Contrary to some speculative observations appearing recently, there are no current operations from the **Kundu (Provincial) Network** of PNG on 6 or 11 MHz frequencies. Those services were originally intended for local daytime services and were phased out many years ago and antennas dismantled. Transmissions generally carried Schools' Programming weekdays (2230-0700 UTC) and on weekends the Sporting Service (from Port Moresby). Listings in the WRTH-2000 are quite misleading, and other "authoritative" references also persist in publishing inactive 6 and 11 MHz data. In recent years, daytime services have been augmented by additional VHF outlets in key centres for the Kundu and Karai networks. The high powered (100 kW) transmitter at Port Moresby provides adequate coverage of the Karai (National) network on 9675 during local daylight hours, and on 4890 during morning and evening. NBC plans to introduce national daytime coverage of the Kundu Network on 9 MHz at some stage when funding permits, using a converted transmitter at Port Moresby, as there are still many areas not adequately served during local daytime by the existing VHF and MW services.

Radio Australia's Tok-Pisin service uses 6020 from Shepparton 0900-1100 and is frequently misidentified as the long-silent Kieta PNG station.

Similarly, the long-dead 5985 outlet for Rabaul is often incorrectly reported during local evening hours in Asia, when in fact it is Yangon, on 5986,

which gives a strong and steady signal right across the Asian region during from s/on at 1000.

All **NBC HF** services are subject to irregular operations, due not only to under-capacity of maintenance and support resources, but also to funding constraints and lack of spare parts. (Padula 2/21-HCDX)

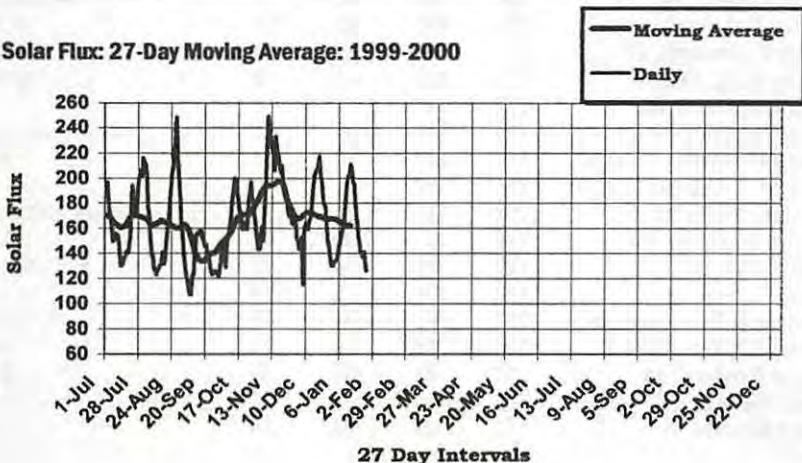
