
Winners of this year's Association of International Broadcasting (AIB) Media Excellence Awards were announced at a gala dinner in London on 12 November. Broadcasters, independent production houses, technology companies, journalists and media observers from more than 15 countries joined the sell-out event at the LSO St Luke's venue in central London. 2008 was a bumper year for the AIB Awards, attracting an increased number of entries in just the fourth year of the Awards. AIB chief executive **Simon Spanswick** says "Over the last four years we've considered more than 1,000 entries, with this year providing over 300 submissions of TV, Radio and on-line productions from more than 25 countries. We saw a marked increase in quality this year, and this meant our international panel of judges had some difficult decisions to make." This year's winners include: South African Broadcasting Corporation; Strix TV; Tinderbox Production; BBC World Service; Rockhopper TV; BBC Northern Ireland; Sveriges Radio; 3FM; NFL Network; France 24; Sveriges Television; Link Research. In addition, the AIB awarded presenter of the year awards to the 3FM team for radio and to Sky1's Ross Kemp for television.


NASWA Flashsheet


FRENDX: Twenty-Five Years Ago (December 1983)

In John Herkimer's *Shortwave Center*, Jerry Berg wrote about "Verifying Chinese Regional Stations" while Marlin Field wrote "Christian Radio Voices." In his *Technical Topics* column, Jim Herkimer wrote about loop antennas. In his *Pappas on Programming* column, editor Nick Pappas discussed "Gatekeepers and Grenada: Alternatives and Restrictions in News Flow." Roger Legge compiled another edition of *English Language Broadcasts to North America*. Gilfer Shortwave was advertising a new 200-page softbound computer printout of shortwave broadcasting schedules available in January 1984 entitled *Radio Database International* at a special pre-publication price of \$9.95. In his *QSL Report* column, Sam Barto noted that 99 countries were reported which was a little below average but contained many good QSLs. In *Log Reporters*, editor Nick Pappas thanked this month's 67 reporters.

Mike Barraclough's compilation "Radio During and Following the Soviet Invasion of Czechoslovakia" (October Journal) was spectacular! After reading it, I started thinking that perhaps I ought to subscribe to Contact. Could you explain how it works? Do I send you the \$24, or does it have to go to the UK address? Do the magazines come from the UK, or do you handle stateside distribution?

[Rich has asked a bunch of questions that come my way periodically, so let me take a moment to answer them. In North America – or for anyone with US funds – I take sample requests (\$2.00 each) and subscriptions/memberships for US\$24.00 (airmail) or US\$20.00 (surface mail) for the World DX Club. The monthly club bulletin, Contact, comes direct from the UK headquarters. My address is on the masthead of NASWA Notes. – RAD]

I had wondered, since no SWLer or DXer stops with just one radio, how they use these sets. I read of the exploits of a DXpedition but it seems that everyone shows up with a single radio. Is this their favorite radio, or does one chose a certain set for the DXpedition, or is each radio used in turn? Or are a couple or so brought along to compare during an event?

As for myself, I have limited myself to a small portable I can slip into a pocket. I also lack room for a good shack and once turned down a friend's free offer of a Japan NRD-525 for this reason. As any of you, I could carry so much gear that it would look like a 19th century African safari but the idea is to enjoy radio not spend the time making sure of the whereabouts of so much equipment.

I also read of Radio Netherlands ending their North American Service in the October Journal. Too bad as I still enjoyed their programs but I still get a fair signal from their African service. I felt that Radio Netherlands started downhill when they first modernized then ended the "Happy Station" program.

I saw Rich Cuff's idea for RMW to use an American SW station as a relay. I think they already have. Recently, I came across RNW at 2200 UTC on 9955 kHz. This is the frequency of WRML, a station I very rarely hear. The signal ranges from very poor to somewhat fair and have enjoyed "Radio Books" program to some point. No real ID bit I did hear "... to East, West and ... Africa." The third place was either North or South Africa. Another

time, I tuned it several minutes before 2200 and heard a faint signal which came up enough to be RNW.

I have a very hard time hearing any American SW station here. Someone in a better place or with better equipment might be able to confirm this transmission. I guessed it would be from 2100 to 2300 UTC.

Megan Pinette, President of the Belfast Historical Society, just told me that Jerry Berg will be visiting here to research the RCA radio station of 1923-1029 for his newest radio history book, covering 1923-1945. I hope to meet him but I very much doubt if I can tell him anything he doesn't already know.

Also, a clerk at the Belfast Post Office told me that the international postal rates will jump 84% sometime in 2009. With stations dropping like flies and now this, looks like we all will have to look for something else to do.

Email from Larry Thom (Chief Engineer WRNO) at 1700 UTC, Oct 21: "We are currently off the air but should be back on soon. Elcor (transmitter manufacturer) is making modifications to the oscillator sections to give it more stability. Additionally, we are awaiting delivery of a Vacuum Variable Capacitor for final RF power output section of the transmitter. The transmitter was furnished with Jennings Glass type vacuum variables. We changed out all but two for the ceramic type before going on the air as they are more durable to high voltage arcing, etc. which are encountered by all high power shortwave stations from time to time. Just the nature of the beast! As luck would have it the one that wasn't replaced caused us a problem on 7505. At this point we are just working out the bugs that come along with the installation of a new transmitter, but having said that, we hope this will take care of most of the issues at hand and cause us less down time in the future. Thanks, Larry"

7295, Traxx FM, received a package from Ms Suhaila MD Zaini (Program Manager of Traxx FM), containing letter thanking me for my feedback and gives contact email for feedback as < mail [at] traxxfm.net >, several folders with program schedule and frequencies (none listed for SW) and 3 nice "TraXX fm Travel N Music Klang Valley 90.3 fm/100.1 fm" bumper stickers. About five weeks ago I sent one of their DJs (Shaz) an email with an attached audio clip of his program. He must have forwarded it on to Ms Zaini. This is my first mailed response from them. Recently they changed their station slogan to "Travel N Music" and they are now actively promoting domestic and international tourism, so now would be a good time to dust off those old reception reports (or generate new ones) and send them off. Recently I have been corresponding with Shiokaze (via COMJAN), providing information about their transmission on 6020 (including an emailed audio clip of their reception) and the North Korean jamming that recently appeared there. Went on to suggest perhaps it was time to change to a new frequency again. Once I noticed they had in fact changed frequency, I inquired about it, as I couldn't immediately find them. Received this response:

"Thank you very much for your information. We have changed the frequency 26th October because there was strong jamming from North Korea. Now we don't disclose the frequency number because of avoiding jamming from North Korea. So we would like ask you to search our frequency near 6020 khz. Maybe you can easily touch with new frequency.

Sincerely yours, Sadaki MANABE (COMJAN Vice representative)"

RE: WRNO - Glenn suggested I contact them to find out about their current schedule: received an email from Larry Thom (WRNO Chief Engineer) at 1445 UTC, 11/4/08: "As it stands, we are still testing the transmitter. We are using automation right now, our programming is not live. We still have some minor bugs to work out and are waiting for a couple of parts. Most of these modifications/parts are used in the 15590 frequency and do not affect the 7505 frequency. Normally we would not be on the air 24 hours at this time, but are doing this to make sure the new oscillators we installed in the transmitter are stable, and frequency drift will stay at a minimum. However, WRNO is planning to increase air time to day and night hours, and at some point, 24 hours of broadcast. We will be utilizing two frequencies 15590 (day time) and 7505 (evening). If all goes well, we may complete most of the modifications today and I expect normal programming to resume very soon. Thanks, Larry"

Radio Pio Doce: This is one of my favorite CP stations, not heard in a long while because of a difficult freq. Years ago it was quite regular and I got to know the Roman Catholic brothers who supported the station, financially and technically. One of them later visited me en route back to his home near Montreal. The station's purpose then, at least, was to support, educationally and politically, the tin miners' union in the mining town of Siglo Viente (a rather improbable name -- 20th Century -- for such a backwards-backwaters community). The political aspect resulted in the station being dynamited several times by government goons. That, at least, is not likely to be repeated during the Morales regime.

Radio Sicuani: This is one of my favorite OA stns in a typical small Altiplano town. I vividly recall—though this was decades ago—Sicuani as a brief stop on the rail line from Cusco to Puno on Lake Titicaca. We stopped there just long enough for me to buy an alpaca scarf from an Quechua-speaking woman, one of many lined up along the tracks selling their wares.

RRI Makassar: Of the 60 mb. Indonesians, this one has proved to be the hardest this season. I don't know why, since, traditionally it has been the best of the bunch. Sunday morning, however, it was the best, audible for the Jakarta warta berita at 1200, retuned various times until about 1245. Very quickly peaking fair to good around 1225, here in Wis., but with a relatively short window of 10 to 12 minutes. The season's usual best Indo bet, 4790, RRI Fak Fak was nearly as good as Makassar this am. Others hrd also, but at poor level, 4870 RRI Wamena and 4920 RRI Biak. Local noise made 90 mb useless, with the exception of Wewak, this a.m. Overall, though, 10/26 only a mediocre morning for Indos.

I was told by Guillermo Siles, "administrador" of the station in the 90's, that Pío XII was attacked by goons sent out by the communist-supported Radio La Voz del Minero, active on and around 5660 in the late 50's and early 60's.

While I don't believe Pío XII will be a bombing target right now, unfortunately several other Bolivian stations are in danger, Radio San Miguel, in Riberalta, and ACLO, in Sucre, both of them run by the Catholic church, and apparently in disagreement with Morales' F. Pl.

And in neighboring Peru, goons have recently destroyed the studio equipment of also Catholic-run Radio Sicuani, which is now off the air. Newspaper reports say "campesinos" do not want a hydroelectric power plant to be built nearby (usual commie tactic to delay

civilization in backward areas). Other reports say that goons were supported by two local radio station managers, also politicians, who might bear the Radio Sicuani people a grudge also from non-political viewpoints. I happened to check Radio Sicuani online a month ago and was surprised at the incredible amount of local ads. Their internet signal was excellent. Now it's all gone.

A spoken account of what happened can be heard on the CNR website.

Thanks for the update that Sicuani is off the air. Obviously, then, my report of that one as presumed was in error. At this time I am uncertain as to which station I had. The last time I heard LV de la Selva it was about 1.5 kHz lower. And I don't believe they are on the air currently, either. What I heard was Spanish, not Brazilian Portuguese. For now it will have to stand merely as an unidentified.

As to Pio Doce, from the Catholic brother I corresponded with and spoke to in person during his visit, I knew the station had been subject to several dynamite attacks and several less successful attempts. At one point, I know they had women, wives or girlfriends of some of the union miners, sleeping in the studios, on the assumption that the goons would have enough decency not to blow it up knowing the women were sleeping there. As of our conversation, no one had been killed in the attacks, he said. The Canadian brothers and the miners supporting the station were, of course, strongly Roman Catholic, and very "progressive" or "liberal." He did mention the opposition of the local Communists, but, he, at least, was convinced that the dynamiting was done by the Army, some in uniform, some not. The politics of Bolivia, then as now, was very tangled. Back then, most of the turmoil was in the altiplano, with the area around Santa Cruz and the eastern lowlands being relatively quiet . . . people there were mostly busy making money, which they weren't interested in sharing with the poor highland Indios.

FIRST STN TO XMT IN MAYAN?

Thanks to Julian Santiago Diez de Bonilla, reporting in Condiglist, I sent an email report to one of the station's technicians, with info and an MP3 recording of my logging on 11/16, Sunday morning 0545-0615 with Mexican mx, tk pgm, phone calls from listeners. Signal greatly improved from previous spotty, distorted receptions. Report sent to Ing. L. Orlando Gonzalez Balam at tecnico@rasayucatan.com This brought an email reply in several hours from Orlando who reports the following. This stn, formerly relaying XEMQ 810 kHz when it was called Tus Panteras, had the SW call XEQM. And in fact, it Still has those call letters for the MW and SW outlets, respectively. But 810 kHz now bcsts in the Mayan language as Radio Yoo'l I'ik, which translates as the Essence of the Wind. Its slogan is "in t'aan tu yool iik," which translates, in Spanish, to "mi voz a traves del viento" or "my voice through the wind." XEQM, the SW xmtr soon will retransmit Radio Yool Iik but currently cannot for technical reasons — not entirely clear, but apparently because of some physical separation between the MW and SW xmtrs. Right now, the pgm feed on 6104.9 (nominal 6105) is from FMer, XHMH, "La Candela." The original XEQM, still in use, was homebuilt, and there have been problems getting repair parts. The power is 250 watts to a quarter-wave dipole antenna. All the stations are part of a major Mexican network of stations called Gran Cadena RASA. My thanks to Orlando for all the information.

The first topic is the just reminder of the Radio St. Helena Day 2008. Radio St. Helena will broadcast on 11092.5kHz in USB mode on Saturday, 15th of November 2008. I hope you will successfully catch this annual broadcast. I recommended our members to use ordinary stamps in sending their reception reports in order to avoid any missing mails in transit.

The second topic is the noise problem of PLC (Power Line Communication) equipment in Japan. We have filed an objection against the approval of the latest PLC equipment made by the Ministry of Interior and Communications. Some of the data taken by the academic circle show very high noise levels which prevents satisfactory listening to the Radio Nikkei. This means NO DX'ing is expected in neighboring houses. Almost 100 listeners joined this filing. We expect a formal hearing will be conducted soon for a technical re-evaluation of the approval.

This is all for this month.

A number of these are show in the picture below:

Of interest in the picture is the bottom right hand set of three (3) clocks placed in a hand build box. The left and right hand clocks are twenty four (24) hour movements while the center clock is a twelve (12) hour movement. They are arranged to show 'GMT', 'EST' and 'EMT' (?). These clocks were often used by 'Ham Operators' to assist them in announcing their 'Call Sign' within the required intervals during their individual transmissions, for 'General Time Logging,' etc. Each clock was driven by a simple AC one (1) minute rotational electric motor connected to the second, minute, and hour digital plastic wheels (Set by hand turning of the individual wheels). Most also included a simple single small light bulb illumination (The 'Glow' being quite charming and reminiscent of times now gone

by). One clock even had a separately installed 'On / Off Push Button Switch' which was probably used by its former owner in setting the clock more exactly while listening to one of the shortwave time broadcasts. In short, each of these was fascinating to examine and behold! All were in very good to excellent condition complete with individual cords and AC plugs. To say the least, the clocks produced some lively discussion and we thank Ron Hunsicker for bringing them in to share!

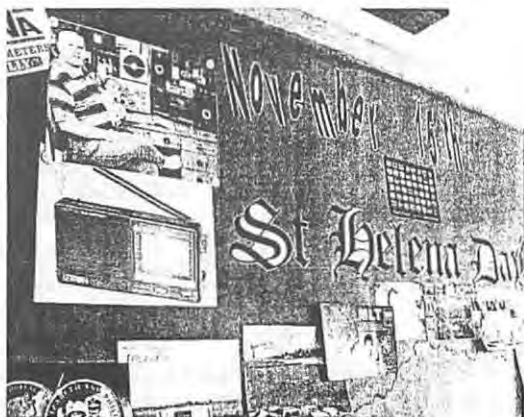

Seasonal and holiday specials

One interesting consequence to the development of on-demand audio options is that you don't have to set your alarm clock to catch special holiday programming from international broadcasters. The specific examples I've listed below are generally available on-demand from the broadcasters' websites; the available archives of the BBC programming shown below now date back several years.

Radio Australia and Radio New Zealand International: "The Silly Season"

As I've mentioned in years past, with Australia and New Zealand in the southern hemisphere, the traditional Christmas holidays are overlaid on summer vacations, which means that the countries' domestic and international public broadcast services—along with the rest of the countries—go on mass vacation from mid-December to mid-January. Since both **Radio Australia** and **Radio New Zealand International** relay a substantial amount of domestic content, these broadcasters have to shuffle their schedules and bring in one-time programming and increase some repeats.

While plans aren't finalized yet for the schedules of each broadcaster, historically Radio Australia takes much of its holiday season programming from the Local Radio network, not Radio National. There is also an increased level of sports programming at times and on frequencies that are not typically allocated to sports programming.

The ABC's **Radio National** and **Radio Australia** will quite often air more documentaries than you would normally hear during the year, and you can expect to hear some programs that originally aired on such broadcasters as **Radio Netherlands**, the **BBC World Service**, Canada's **CBC Radio**

One and the USA's **National Public Radio**. If you're used to listening to Radio Australia and RNZI programming on-demand, you may be out of luck during this period; these special editions often are not made available for on-demand listening.

Expect these altered schedules to be in place from December 20th to January 20th, give or take a few days.

As mid-December approaches, I'll try to publicize schedule changes via the *swprograms* e-mail list, the *NASWA Flashsheet*, and my very occasional blog, <http://intl-radio.blogspot.com/>.

Other broadcasters' holiday plans

Most international broadcasters try to arrange for time off for their program presenters and editors around the Christmas and New Year's seasons, resulting in specials and end-of-year reviews and perspectives that can be prepared in advance. Prior years have seen the following specials and events:

Radio Canada International / CBC

The ODXA's Fred Waterer along with John Figliozzi, have assembled the following notes on what to expect from the CBC:

As It Happens, especially on Christmas Eve, produces a special annual program. Each year, the program contacts members of the Canadian Armed Forces serving with the UN, NATO, NORAD and those serving in the far north. Each unit has 3 or 4 people speak for those serving with the unit. In past years, the units have served in such diverse locations as Canadian Forces Base Alert (Arctic), Colorado Springs (Norad), Germany, Cyprus, Golan Heights, Bermuda (!), the Persian Gulf, Somalia, Bosnia and Croatia, and Kosovo. It also has its moments of humor, such as the time the Canadian naval personnel stationed in Bermuda tried

to claim they missed the Canadian winter real bad! (via Fred Waterer/ODXA).

Christmas Day will likely see specials across CBC Radio One; there's no word as to whether or not these will show up on **Radio Canada International**, but this is less likely this year than in years past, since there is rarely any overlap between **Radio One** and RCI programming.

The weekend either before or after Christmas, *Quirks and Quarks*, the popular long-running science show, will likely air the *Annual Quirks Question Show*. *Quirks* is regularly ranked as the "Most Enjoyed" program on CBC Radio.

Vinyl Café will likely air a special Christmas concert.

BBC World Service

The BBC World Service hasn't publicized their holiday plans yet, but there are several annual traditions that are expected to continue:

The Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols is a long-standing tradition. Expect the program to originate once again from King's College in Cambridge; the *Festival* is a celebration of the birth of Christ in readings from the Bible and beautiful choral music. It features traditional favorites such as *Once In Royal David's City* as well as new music specially composed for the occasion. Last year's airings included Christmas Eve at 1501 and Christmas Day at 1301; the program also airs on **BBC Radio 4** and many US public radio stations that take programming from **Public Radio International**.

The Queen's Christmas Message to the Commonwealth is another annual tradition, lasting just 10 minutes but a highlight from year to year. Last year's airtimes included December 25th at 1505. You can also expect to hear the program on **Radio 4**, and recent editions have been available via podcast from the royals' own website, <http://www.royal.gov.uk>.

Radio Netherlands

Often Radio Netherlands will air a special seasonal documentary in lieu of *Newsline* on Christmas Day.

US Public Radio

Glenn Hauser, in years past, has put together a list of holiday specials on public radio on this World Of Radio website, specifically in the calendar section, <http://www.worldof-radio.com/calendar>. As of this date, you can browse the 2007-8 list, but Glenn has not yet freshened the list for 2008-9. It appears most US public radio stations haven't yet posted their holiday specials lists.

Radio Austria International—still producing English programming

Rich D'Angelo sent along the following:

The Listeners Relations Department of Radio Austria 1 International sent the latest program schedule and frequency information including how to tune them in "via short wave, medium wave, satellite, cable and the Internet." Clearly, they have their eye on the multi-media world platforms impacting worldwide communications today.

*The shortwave schedule shows a broadcast to Eastern North America on 7,325 kHz at 0030 to 0100 UTC with **The Week in Review** slated for Monday at 0035 UTC. Tuesday through Saturday the transmission begins with the News in Spanish followed by **Report from Austria**. The Sunday transmission is **The Week in Review**. A broadcast to Western North America is scheduled for 1600 to 1700 UTC on 13,675 kHz. Monday features **Report from Austria** at 1605 UTC and 1645 UTC. Tuesday through Saturday they feature **Report from Austria** at 1615 UTC and 1645 UTC. The Saturday and Sunday broadcasts feature **The Week in Review** at 1605 UTC, repeated at 1633 UTC.*

*The schedule describes **Report from Austria** as "a 15 minute news and current affairs programme on the air Monday to Friday, keeps*

you up to date on what's happening in Austria with news bulletins as well as interviews and features from the world of domestic and international politics, business, culture and sports."

New programs from the *Voice of Turkey*

Rich also forwarded information he received from the **Voice Of Turkey** regarding four new programs that have recently begun on the schedule:

Turkey and Energy: This new program introduces the energy policies and the work carried out in this field by Turkey, which is located right in the heart of the regional and global energy routes. It looks at the issue of energy throughout history and Turkey's relations with the neighboring countries, all of which are rich in energy resources.

Trailing in the Footsteps of our Heritage: The Turkish populace in the Caucasus is a neglected community. The program accentuates this reality and sheds light on the common history of the Caucasian Turkish nationalist's life story, which is aimed at better understanding the developments and problems of the present day.

The Black Sea: The relations of the littorals of the Black Sea, among them Turkey, the importance of the Black Sea in international relations, Black Sea organizations and Turkey's ideas and views in this regard are what this program deals with.

Yet More Letters from Meryem: Meryem is a name common in Christian and Islamic cultures. Meryem speaks about herself and the environment she is living in. The program has an approach of friendliness, providing an in-depth understanding of various aspects of Turkey in the format of letters penned by an imaginary person who goes by the name Meryem.

The **Voice of Turkey** targets North America via shortwave (yay!); I have heard them

recently from 0400 to 0500 on 6240 kHz and also from 1330 to 1425 on 12035 kHz. I've also recently heard them from 2300 to 2355 on 5960 kHz, but not nearly as well as the other two just mentioned.

China Radio International—*Voices from Other Lands*

One of the programming genres I enjoy the most is what I'll call the "external observer" genre. This is where an international broadcaster interviews someone who is originally not from the broadcaster's country but who is now living in the country on a regular basis. One example is **Deutsche Welle's** long-running *Living In Germany*, a staple in Deutsche Welle's Sunday (Monday UTC) programming; alas, this program is no longer being aired.

However, **CRI** has an entry called *Voices from Other Lands* that you may enjoy. The program features interviews from foreigners living in China and their impressions on Chinese culture and how their own culture interacts with, and contributes to, life in China. The CRI website describes *Voices from Other Lands* as "...a half-hour magazine show devoted to interviews and discussions on topics concerning China and its ties to the rest of the world...it is our intention to provide the setting for insights to be shared, knowledge to be gained, and ideas to be cherished, be they of national or international importance."

A recent edition featured an interview with the artistic director of the Peking University's Institute of World Theatre and Film. He produces the works of Shakespeare in both Chinese and English languages, and uses the nuances of Shakespearean English to teach his students about the diversity of the English language as well as Western theatre.

Voices from Other Lands also made the "Ten of the Best" list of top shortwave programs in the recently published 2009 edition of *Passport to World Band Radio*.

Voices from Other Lands airs Thursdays Beijing time, which corresponds to CRI broadcasts from 2300 UTC Wednesdays through to 2200 UTC Thursdays. You can easily find CRI on shortwave in North America at 2300, 0000, 0100, 0300, 0400, 0500, 0600, 1100, 1200, and 1300 UTC. Services targeting other regions (e.g. Europe and Africa) might also be audible as well.

The program is also available via live and on-demand webcast from CRI's website, <http://english.cri.cn>.

Shortwave Radio Africa

I recently took the time to listen to this station, a UK-based group broadcasting news about the strife-torn African country of Zimbabwe using transmitters in South Africa and the United Kingdom targeting Africa. The UK transmission—currently 1700–1900 on 11745 kHz—came in very well during a recent French Creek State Park DXpedition. The station obviously has a very narrow focus, but serves as a great testimonial for shortwave—able to reach audiences when domestic media is unreliable, censored, or simply not available. The service is operated by Zimbabweans in exile in the United Kingdom.

On the day I caught the broadcast, the emphasis was primarily on the attempt by former US President Jimmy Carter and former United Nations Secretary-General Kofi Annan to enter the country and their rebuff at the country's border. There was an extensive interview—probably longer than was available on any other shortwave resource in English that day.

While news about Zimbabwe is also available from such mainstream broadcasters as the BBC World Service, Channel Africa, Radio France International and the Voice of America, their responsibilities lie across the entire continent of Africa in their services; Shortwave Radio Africa is able to dedicate its entire focus to events in Zimbabwe.

Even though shortwave is an obvious preferred method to reach Zimbabwe, Shortwave Radio Africa is available via live and on-demand webcast, with a two-week programming archive available. Their URL is <http://www.swradioafrica.com>.

Use online resources to freshen up programming information

I've mentioned this before...the advent of websites and e-mails has enabled broadcasters to shorten their planning horizons—quite often, I'll ask them for information regarding their programming topics four to eight weeks in advance, and the information simply won't yet be available.

I'll occasionally post significant programming developments via the NASWA Yahoo Group (check out <http://groups.yahoo.com/group/NASWA/> if you're a NASWA member), the swprograms e-list (<http://montreal.kotalampi.com/mailman/listinfo/swprograms>), and my blog, <http://intradio.blogspot.com/>, which I'll admit hasn't been edited in many months...

BBC and DW Join Forces

Radio World Newsbytes October 10, 2008

Early 2009 is the target for a new joint radio service that will serve European audiences via DRM shortwave.

It was announced in September by the BBC World Service and Deutsche Welle; the English-language service will target Western and Central Europe, with content including global news and current affairs, analysis, documentaries and cultural programs.

In the announcement, Mike Cronk of the BBC World Service called this an important time for DRM and "a huge opportunity" for broadcasters in Europe to look at the potential for new services. "Two of the most important players in international broadcasting are reaffirming their faith in the DRM standard."

Digital Radio Mondiale is a digital broadcasting system for bands below 30 MHz (long-, medium- and shortwave). Ruxandra Obreja is chair of the DRM Consortium and the controller for business development at the BBC World Service; she stated in the announcement: "Deutsche Welle and the BBC see DRM

as the winning solution for the digitization of the AM bands on a global scale and they believe that this new stream for Europe will give a welcome boost to international digital radio."

She continued: "Listeners in Western and Central Europe can now buy one of the growing selection of DRM-capable receivers and hear in excellent quality top-class programs that in recent years they could only access online."

Shortwave with that laptop?

I missed the last Radio Netherlands English shortwave transmission to North America on UTC 26 October. I couldn't stay awake for the final final transmission at 0400 UTC. Shortwave is an old medium, and some of us shortwave radio listeners are getting old, and when it's time to sleep, it's time to sleep.

Reception would probably have been problematic, in any case, suffering from the digital-hashy noise that permeates the entire shortwave spectrum at my house. It's a wonder I can hear any shortwave stations at all.

And so I was surprised to read that shortwave still has appeal among at least some users of personal computers, given that PCs (and peripherals) are among the most notorious of noisemakers on HF. Writers at InfoWorld have been putting together what they think would be the ideal laptop computer, dubbed Worldbook. They asked readers for enhancements to their design: "Wish lists included TV, GPS, a music synthesizer, shortwave radio, a tablet form factor, a keyboard that doubles as a touchscreen, even a fold-out screen or add-on panels to extend the display."

How about that? Shortwave radio! Thinking about it a bit, it makes some sense. Imagine you and your Worldbook somewhere in the world where there is no local internet access: no broadband, no dial-up, no nothing. Shortwave capability would come in handy.

The ability to receive shortwave radio broadcasts would be nice, but let's face it, there are fewer and fewer shortwave radio broadcasts to be heard on the shortwave radio broadcast bands. Or at least fewer of

the types of broadcasts that most people would want to listen to.

Shortwave for news via text?

But shortwave is also a serviceable medium for the transmission of text, and data. As such, shortwave could be used to tap into the greater internet. Not for graphics-rich websites, or streamed video, but certainly for e-mail and maybe some text-only website material. There still is an HF e-mail industry, though it is a bit murky.

It might make more sense for a shortwave text and data transceiver or receiver to exist as a dongle rather than something built in to a laptop. This is because most laptop owners would have no use for the shortwave capability. And because the shortwave receive circuitry would be out in the less noisy open rather than inside the RF hell of a personal computer.

My design for such a dongle would include an antenna that you can adhere to the window of your hotel room. Typically, this would be a hotel room in a country that blocks the bejesus out the internet. In such a country, you may not be able to get the news from the BBC or New York Time websites.

The dongle would be a smart receiver, trying all the frequencies of your desired shortwave news source, then glomming on the one that provides satisfactory reception. The shortwave text source would send, in addition to news, continuous updates of its frequency schedule, which the dongle would automatically note and use in future searches.

The shortwave text receiver could be left unattended in your hotel room, receiving the news when it's transmitter and when it's receivable. Such news would be stored in memory. When you return to your hotel room after a day of business, you can read the news at your leisure.

A fly in the ointment of my dongle design is that you might need your laptop for your day of business. Thus, the dongle should be able to work standing alone. The laptop would come in handy later as a way to read, comfortably, the stored news, and as a device in whose memory that news text can be placed, if desired.

In this design, I am inspired by amateur radio's PSK-31 mode. In contrast to DRM shortwave digital audio, which requires a great huge swath of spectrum, and which drops out at the slightest provocation of interference or attenuation, PSK-31 is robust. Using a sliver of spectrum, a PSK-31 signal that is down in the soup and barely audible on a receiver often produces 100% copy on a computer screen.

A moderate number of disparate transmitter sites, using modest power output, should be able to produce signals that can be received by these devices anywhere in the world, any time of the day, except when solar conditions are really bad.

There are enough people in remote or denied areas of the world to justify this new technology. The only competing technology would be Iridium and Globalstar, the LEO satellite telephone services, probably more expensive, and more conspicuous when being brought into countries that do not welcome the free international flow of information.

Internet radios are a not-so-reliable alternative

The availability of radio via the internet is one of the reasons why Radio Netherlands and other stations are dropping shortwave to North America and other parts of the world. The new batch of internet radios allows internet radio to be heard on a device that looks, feels, and behaves much like a radio.

I'm in the habit of listening to my Tangent Quattro internet radio in the middle of the night, when I can't sleep. (For some of us aging shortwave listeners, when it's time

to sleep, it's time to sleep, and when it's time to wake up, it's time to wake up.) I'll be listening to something from, say, BBC Radio 4, and just as it is getting interesting, the signal drops out, and the infamous "buffering" takes up aggravating seconds, sometimes minutes, before the audio is restored. So internet radio is not necessarily more reliable than shortwave radio.

I can't figure out if the loss of signal is happening at the broadcaster's server, or somewhere in the Great Vast Internet, or in my home network. It could be that my wireless access point needs more power. Or that my WPA encryption, prone to disconnections, is disconnecting. I'd love to have one of the Sangean internet radios that would allow me to connect via the RJ-45 jack in my bedroom, so that I can determine if wirelessness is the culprit.

Speaking of internet standalone radios, Michael Horowitz in CNET recently wrote an overview of a class of laptop computers called "Netbooks." (Not sure why Netbook has to be capitalized.) "A Netbook is a new type of laptop computer, defined by size, price, horsepower, and operating system. They are small, cheap, under-powered, and run either an old or unfamiliar operating system."

He goes on to write: "Why carry a small box that does one thing, when you can carry a small box that does many things? Why buy a dedicated Internet radio, when a Netbook can do that? Why buy a small DVD player if you can get a movie on a flash memory card? Why buy a high-end smart phone, when a Netbook can do all that on a larger screen? It's an exciting future for Netbooks."

So maybe these little laptops will be the shortwave-like, radio-like audio receiving machines of the future. On the other hand, the Tangent, Sangean, and other internet radios have knobs. And there is much to be said for knobs.

AZERBAIJAN Authorities in Azerbaijan say they plan to halt local broadcasts by foreign stations by the end of the year. The

chairman of Azerbaijan's National Television and Radio Council, Nushiravan Maharramli, says his country is not interested in granting local frequencies to foreign broadcasters. He says the change will affect the BBC, the VOA and R Liberty. The official says his country has been gradually implementing changes, having previously eliminated broadcasts by Russian, French and Turkish stations.

The U.S. Broadcasting Board of Governors, the federal agency responsible for all U.S. government-supported, non-military international broadcasting, says it strongly objects to the proposal. A BBG Board Member, Steven J. Simmons, says the decision follows a "disturbing pattern" that began with harsh restrictions on private broadcasters within Azerbaijan two years ago and now directly impacts international media. A spokesman for the U.S. embassy in Baku, Terry Davidson, says it will be seeking clarification of the issue from the Azerbaijani government. He said in Azerbaijan, foreign broadcasters such as the VOA, the BBC and Radio Liberty have contributed greatly to enriching the space for public debate and understanding. However, WRNO is planning to increase air time to day and night hours, and at some point, 24 hours of broadcast. We will be utilizing two frequencies 15590 (day time) and 7505 (evening). 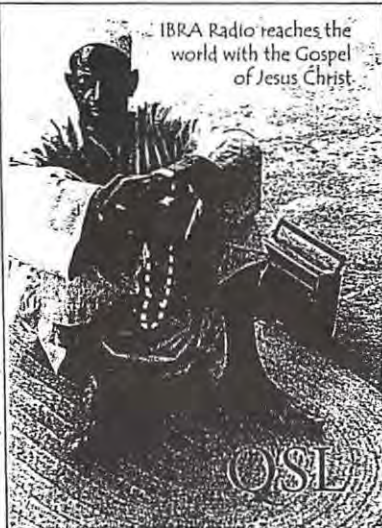



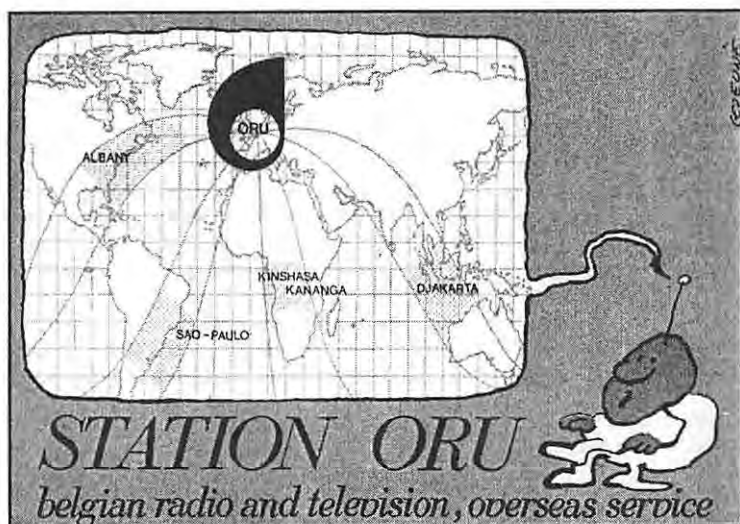
