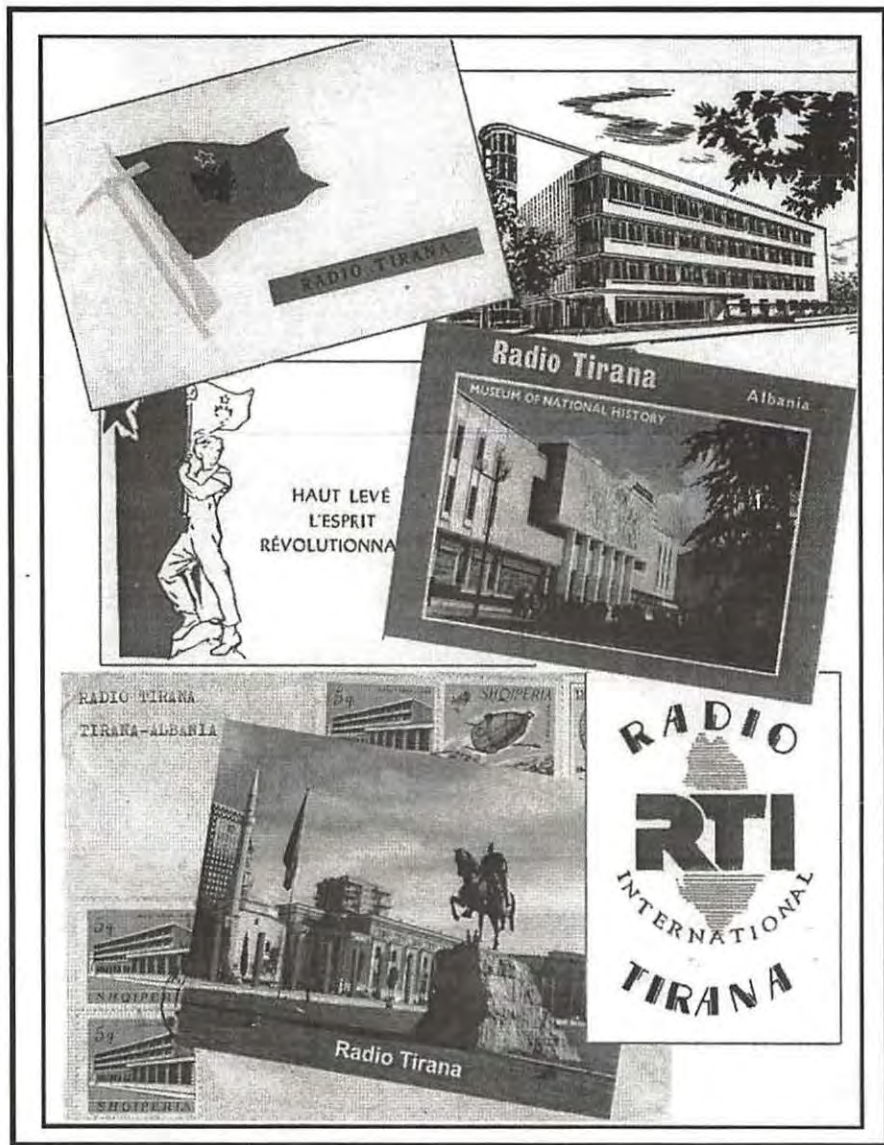

Check out this month's edition of *Listeners Notebook* for the latest regarding Puntland Radio One operating from Somalia. The station first made news about two years ago when it burst upon the scene before just as quickly disappearing. At that time the Country List Committee (CLC) addressed the situation finding that since Puntland was not seeking independence from Somalia, in fact considered itself an integral part of Somalia, there was no justification for granting it separate radio country status. Therefore, Puntland will continue to be counted as the current Somalia, Democratic Republic - Italian. Thanks CLC Chairman **John Herkimer** and the committee members for the refresher/update on the evolving Puntland situation.

We are now done with the NASWA Grab Bags. Vintage QSLs were eagerly sought out by members with grab-bag lots featuring nice cards, envelopes, etc. grabbed by many. Thanks to **Ralph Perry** for the technical details and to **Bill Oliver** who collected much of the cash. All of this was made possible through the generous donation of a QSL collection from a long time member who wished to stay anonymous. The donation enabled the club to raise necessary operating funds which can be used to offset rising printing and postage costs. If there are other potential donations out there, we may be able to do this again in the future.

Anker Petersen writing in the DX Window publication of the Danish Shortwave Club International: "I am just back from the successful Annual General Meeting of the DSWCI in Tarp, Germany, where 24 members and wives participated. With written votes from non-participating members, we with an overwhelming majority (97%) decided to close down the DSWCI by the end of 2016, due to the general termination of shortwave broadcasting stations and the growing age

of the DSWCI Board members, who cannot find any replacements. In addition we had an excellent visit to the members **Hella and Karl Helt**, who live in Tarp, and had very interesting lectures by our members **Toshi Ohtake** about "DX in Japan 2015" and by **Kari Kivekäs**, Secretary General of the European DX Council, about "EDXC Status".


Harry Scott at Radio Free Asia (RFA) sends information about their latest QSL, "Celebrating Musical Instruments of Asia", which is the fourth in the design series and 58th overall QSL design. The card shows a khene, which is a traditional Lao mouth organ played primarily in Laos and Thailand. The khene's pipes are made of bamboo, while its reed, which vibrates to produce the sound, is made of brass or silver. The khene is usually played using a pentatonic scale, using five notes per octave as opposed to the seven notes per octave used in most Western music. This QSL is used to confirm all valid reception reports from May 1 to July 31, 2015. tion listing in the old MTXpress electronic magazine, this valuable tool will now be your new guide to listening to the world.

Either Sandra or I have been a member of NASWA since January 1991. We also publish the THE SHORTWAVE INTERCEPT CENTER'S ENGLISH BROADCAST GUIDE and THE SHORTWAVE INTERCEPT CENTER'S NON-ENGLISH, CLANDESTINE, PIRATE, AND UTILITY STATION GUIDE on a monthly basis. The 47th Edition was published on May 9, 2015 and the 48th. Edition will be available on June 13, 2015. Our guides are "free" to SWLs who receive them via the Internet. Some years ago I (John) came to an agreement with Mr. D'Angelo for him to use our loggings as "filler," because our publication dates differ. The editors of The NASWA Journal are certainly under no obligation to use any of our loggings, be they broadcaster, clandestine, weather, etc. The editors at NASWA decide what to and what not to publish. In my view, our filler is used to make up for the lack of participation by the other members of NASWA.

For those who are interested, the April edition of The NASWA Journal published 40 of my loggings of which only 3 were non-broadcasters.

I get Radio Japan quite good on 9625 at 1000 but it is quite fluttery. A bit later, South Korea on 15575 at 1300 is powerful and often readable. In contrast, North Korea on 11710 at 1300 is quite loud but is so broken up very little can be made out. South Korea on 11810 at 2200 is weaker and somewhat fluttery.

Japan was quite good on 11800 at 1800 but they have just moved to 9755 and I haven't heard them yet. Not too long ago, I heard on Global 24 with a good signal and seeing it was 1800, I tuned to 11810. A bet better but each station had a different program. I had thought Global 24 was relaying signals but I guess they are recordings.

Read the article on Global 24's problems in the April Journal. I guess they went too fast too soon. They did have a very good signal for some weeks but recently, they are barely audible and a lot of times not there. I don't know what future they have but I just hope things work out for them. I heard quite a number of old stations and personalities I hadn't heard for twenty or so years. Took me back to those days when I first got into shortwave. Things have certainly changed. I wonder how many listeners on the Internet bother to write to stations. I have written to Global 24 for their summer program guide, always including a SASE. I have no computer, quite old fashioned. But I wonder if I'll ever get an answer after reading John Cooper's problems with the station in the April Journal.

I believe Jeff White "flew too close to the sun" with this new station. The idea was wonderful and in the first few months, I was surprised and delighted with the many former programs and personalities of yesterday's short wave. Then reality caught up with it all and now I barely hear the station and the programming is mostly religious. I noticed that 11580 kHz is still on quite loud but it seems to be 24 hours of religion by a man with a rusty voice, interrupted only by a half hour of Radio Ukraine.

I'm not too surprised to see Global 24 fail to a point. It is of the old days when new nations were proud of their seat in the UN and a loud shortwave station. Now everything is on a computer. In the old days, one could make a radio, either from a kit or spare parts. Not in two generations has this been possible although the recent Popular Science had an article on a person making such a radio from parts from a dead TV set. Modern electronics are too cheap to make and are not repairable, at least recyclable, and generally go obsolete within a few months. One must keep up with all the new changes and improvements in a personal computer or be left in the dust as we old timers used to say.

My equipment is quite modest yet it seems to bring in quite a number of distant stations not beamed this way. Apparently Belfast is a "sweet spot" in the U.S. for radio signals. Back in the 1920s, RCA had a long range relay from England. I copied the brochure on it of the Belfast Historical Society. They sell CDs of a broadcast of a relayed musical program which might interest you.

And radios are hard to find. Not even Walmart has them. My last is a Sangean ATS-909X from Grove in 2011 but they are gone. Never set it up as it requires an outside antenna and there is a plethora of wires here. So I've fallen back on three portables - SONY ICF-SW-100 bought in 1995 from Grove, a Grundig YB-300 PE given to me in 2005, and a Grundig Mini-300 bought at L.L Bean in 2008. (They now sell only AM/FM/Weather radios, however, Campmor, a discount camping gear place in Manwah, NJ still offers the Grundig Mini-400). So, outside of Universal Radio, you have no place that has radios that would interest us.

With the owners of radio stations forever putting down the media, one wonders what next job they have or be qualified to do.

Global 24: Gone for good? Tough to say...

While **Global 24** returned to the air, somewhat, late in March, that return was apparently only temporary; there has been no schedule data shown any later than late March, and I haven't seen any online postings about station activity.

Jeff White of **WRMI** reports that **Global 24** had contracted for several hours per week until late April, but that, too, had ended. Jeff believes **Global 24** hopes to reactivate some service, but they are currently not consuming any time at **WRMI**, nor elsewhere, from what Jeff believes.

Much has already been written regarding **Global 24's** abrupt shutdown, and **NASWA** members have documented sending funds in for premiums, advertising, and donations and receiving little of what was promised. I will keep an eye out for any information on reincarnation – I have an e-mail inquiry into them – but I don't hold out much hope, unfortunately; they seemed ill-prepared for the rigors of 24/7 shortwave broadcasting and the audience dialogue that accompanies that status.

BBC World Service programming updates

While the **BBC** remains a **DX** catch via shortwave here in North America, their programming continues to be available in the **USA** via public radio programming, the **BBC** website, and various smartphone apps. My April column mentioned some of the under-the-hood technology changes the **World Service** was making.

Here's a look at some of the weekly offerings on the **World Service** that have been introduced in recent years:

The Inquiry

This is a roundtable program that takes a recent news story and puts it under review for 30 minutes, long enough to explore several angles involved in the issue. For example, with word today of new charges against soccer's **FIFA**, the current episode is entitled *Who Can Fix FIFA?* The prior week's program was entitled *Why Do US Cops Keep Killing Unarmed Black Men?* Before that was *Why Is South Africa Still So Unequal?*

As you can see, question marks are a consistent theme in program titles.

Schedule: With the **BBC**, it all depends on how you tune in; Live on the **World Service** webcast Tuesdays 0205, 1205 and 2105, Saturdays 2305, and Sundays 0405 and 1305; Live on **US** public radio stations at times including Tuesdays 0406, 1606, and 2106; Saturdays, 2306; Sundays, 0206 and 1306. These times are when *The Inquiry* is on the **American Public Media** **BBC** feed, and many of these air times are only available on the **News HD** subchannels of these stations. Also available on-demand and via podcast. As for shortwave air times, these will vary by region; for **West Africa**, the only times when shortwave is in use are Tuesdays 1606 and 2106. For **East Asia**, Tuesdays 1206 and Sundays 1306.

The Essential

This program features 10-minute excerpts of longer programs such as *BBC Trending*, *The Inquiry*, *From Our Own Correspondent*, and *More Or Less*.

Schedule: Live on the **World Service** webcast Mondays-Thursdays 1620 UTC; Live to **US** public radio stations Mondays-Thursdays 1525 UTC. Also available on-demand (but not via podcast). Not on shortwave to **West Africa** or to **East Asia**.

BBC Trending

This program takes a look at stories that have been the most viral in social media, as assessed by the BBC office that keeps track of such things. When you think about it, this office has somewhat become the 21st Century version of BBC Monitoring, the group that keeps track of shortwave radio broadcasts around the world...

Schedule: Live on the World Service webcast Saturdays 1432; Sundays 0432, 0932, and 2332. Live to US public radio stations Saturdays 1332, plus Sundays 0432, 0932 and 2332. Also available on-demand and via podcast. On shortwave to East Asia Sundays 2332, to West Africa Saturdays 1732

The Thought Show

In recent years, the World Service has increasingly taken weekly programs and repackaged them – either taking daily 10-minute programs (such as *Witness*) and stringing them together into a single weekly digest, or combining similarly-themed shows into a single program. *The Thought Show* combines *More Or Less*, *BBC Trending*, and *The Why Factor*, three of the more cerebral programs on the World Service.

Schedule: Live on the World Service webcast Thursdays 1205; live to US public radio stations Thursdays 0806. Available on-demand, but not via podcast. Not on shortwave to West Africa or East Asia.

CBC Radio One summer changes not yet available

With Radio Canada International long gone, I use the domestic **CBC Radio One** service to get my regular fix of Canadian sensibilities and perspectives. One of their traditions is to offer a series of summer-only programs that are a bit “off the beaten path” and more varied than the traditional CBC fare. Not necessarily better, nor worse, just different. By the end of June, the summer season schedule should be in place. Last year saw special repeats of *As It Happens* from the CBC archives, and interesting programs such as *How To Do It*, about life lessons you never learned in school.

Unfortunately the 2015 program roster isn't yet in place, so you'll want to check in roughly mid-June to see what's on offer. I'll check in myself and post any developments in the online groups where I'm normally active (including the NASWA Yahoo group).

Radio New Zealand International – Still there!

We regularly bemoan the departure of many stations from the shortwave bands, but **Radio New Zealand International** deserves credit for maintaining its niche of Pacific-focused programming, as an alternative perspective to **Radio Australia's** coverage of the region. While *Mailbox* – the program most probably think of when they think of RNZI – is no longer on the air, there is still a range of programming available on shortwave and also 24/7 live via the Internet and on-demand. Times shown below will likely shift when RNZI goes to summer time at the end of September. Here is some of what you can hear:

Dateline Pacific

This is RNZI's flagship weekday program – a 20-minute review of news and current affairs focusing on the Pacific region. You'll hear about Pacific island nations such as the Solomon Islands and Bougainville, along with Papua New Guinea and Australian developments that impact the region. It's a great way to expand your world view.

Schedules: On shortwave and the live web stream Sundays-Thursdays at 2215 UTC, plus Mondays-Fridays 0308, 0708, 1108, 1308, 1608, 1815, and 2015 UTC. Whether or not RNZI's 24/7 shortwave service propagates to your area at that time is a different matter. The World Radio Network features *Dateline Pacific* and its sister program, *Korero Pacifica*, as well. Also available via podcast and on-demand.

Pacific Correspondent

This is a weekly program in which RNZI regional correspondents discuss political and social issues in their Pacific countries. Each week features a different correspondent, with a local perspective on issues in

their country. Example countries include Vanuatu, the Marshall Islands, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas... places that rarely make it to major news status.

Schedules: Thursdays 1130, 1330, 1630, 1930, and 2015, plus Fridays 0330. Also available via podcast and on-demand.

News About New Zealand

Here's a look at news around New Zealand itself...something I wish all international broadcasters would do...are you listening, BBC? It appears the program on radio runs 5 minutes in length, with a slightly longer version available via podcast and on-demand.

Schedule: Fridays 1835, Sundays 1935, Mondays 1835, 1935, 2135; Tuesdays 0835, 1835, 1935, 2135; Wednesdays 0935, 1835, 1935, 2135; Thursdays 1835, 1935, 2035, 2135.

Checkpoint

This program originates from the domestic **New Zealand Radio National** service; it's the weeknight two-hour news magazine program that airs around the country and is relayed by RNZI. It has long been one of my favorites; back in the day, I'd set up a cassette recorder to catch the audio late at night, so I could then listen the next morning.

Schedule: Mondays-Fridays 0500.

Insight

Also from the domestic service, this is a weekly documentary that explores a topical issue. Domestically, this is a "Sunday Morning" type of program suitable for consumption over a long breakfast; internationally the times vary, with the program alternating weekly with **Spectrum**.

Schedule: Alternating Mondays 0330, 0830, 1930; Tuesdays 0330; Fridays 0835.

On-demand and podcast editions are available from the **Radio New Zealand National** website.

Spectrum

Spectrum is a long-running documentary series – it began in 1972 – which captures the essence of New Zealand through stories, landscape and people. While **Insight** focuses on recent current events, the **Spectrum** lens is not restricted this way. Recent topics have included a new elephant coming to the Auckland Zoo, and missing World War II mementos from the Waihi Museum.

Schedule – as above. Podcast and on-demand editions are available.

Radio Australia – a couple selections

Radiotonic

From ABC's **Radio National**, this is a mix of fiction, non-fiction, essays and drama from writers, artists and radio makers. This is one of two programs – **Soundproof** is the other – that actively commissions programming from individuals outside of the ABC. Schedule: Fridays 0100; available on-demand and via podcast at the **Radio National** website

Minefield

Also from **Radio National**, **The Minefield** helps negotiate the ethical dilemmas, contradictory claims and unacknowledged complicities of modern life in a world marked by wicked social problems. Schedule: Thursdays 0130

The VOA Audience Elimination Act of 2015

Well, as expected, members of the House of Representatives have reintroduced H.R. 2323, the "United States International Communications Reform Act of 2015."

I've been dreading this moment. I'd rather clean the cat box than read this bill and try to explain it to NASWA members. It's largely inexplicable.

H.R. 2323 begins by complaining about the inefficiencies of the Broadcasting Board of Governors, a nine-person bipartisan body that oversees all of U.S. Government funded international broadcasting. Its solution is to create two nine-person bipartisan bodies. One would oversee the International Communication Agency, consisting of the Voice of America and the Office of Cuba Broadcasting (the Martis). The other would supervise the Freedom News Network, an amalgamation of Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty Inc, Radio Free Asia Inc, and Middle East Broadcasting Networks Inc.

VOA's fate

So what would become of VOA? VOA would be *limited* to "serving as a consistently reliable and authoritative source of news on the United States, its policies, its people, and the international developments that affect the United States." That means no news about the target country or the world in general.

Furthermore, while VOA shall provide "accurate, objective, and comprehensive news," there are several strings attached. These include "producing content and related programming that provides a comprehensive understanding of the impact of United States foreign assistance programs and United States international philanthropy,

complementing other media outlets" and "presenting the law and policies of the United States clearly and effectively." There are enough stipulations that if the act is taken seriously, an agenda will become apparent in VOA's output. The audience will perceive this as bias.

There are two main reasons audiences consume VOA news today: 1) news about the audience's own country, and 2) news that is more credible than the news they get from their state-controlled domestic media. Under the provisions of the legislation, VOA forfeits the former, and the latter is greatly compromised. The incentive to use VOA news is mostly evaporated. Its audience will tune elsewhere. Congress will see the new audience numbers. I really don't see how VOA will survive five years beyond the implementation of this act.

Not-so-free Freedom News Network

Then there is the Freedom News Network. "Freedom" is a wonderful concept. We all support and cherish freedom, don't we? Well, of course we do. But "freedom" is not such a great name for a news organization, if news is truly the purpose of such an organization. A news organization should have a flat, neutral name, like BBC.

The problem is if we object to the name "Freedom News Network," we will be accused of being against freedom. And so it goes.

According to the act, the Freedom News Network shall "provide uncensored local and regional news and analysis to people in societies where a robust, indigenous, independent, and free media does not exist."

Yet in the very next paragraph, the network shall "strengthen civil societies by promoting democratic values and promoting equality and the rights of the individual,

including for marginalized groups, such as women and minorities.”

Promote? Strengthen? Even for such commendable causes, isn't a specification to promote and strengthen a form of censorship? So much for the “uncensored” news of the previous paragraph.

Furthermore, if Freedom News Network does “local and regional news,” and VOA does “news on the United States,” who does *world* news? I envision a new entity with a new nine-person bipartisan board. Or will we just leave world news to the BBC world services?

Granting the enemy first refusal

The various entities of U.S. international broadcasting are engaged not merely in a rivalry, but in a full-tilt *war*. Each entity is wholly and enthusiastically committed to the absolute destruction of the other entity that transmits in the same language. With the other entity defeated, the other entity's moneys will transfer to the victor entity, so that the winning entity can hire more cronies as senior managers.

In H.R. 2323, section 133, we see that the operatives of the radio free “grantees” preemptively infiltrated the legislation: “[I]t shall be the policy of the United States International Communications Agency to, in the event it intends to dispose of any radio or television broadcast transmission facilities or equipment, provide the Freedom News Network with the right of first refusal with respect to the acquisition of such facilities and equipment. ... [I]n the event the Freedom News Network is willing to accept the facilities and equipment referred to in such subsection, the United States International Communications Agency shall transfer to the Freedom News Network such facilities and equipment at no cost to the Freedom News Network.” So if ICA might want to liquidate resources rather than turn them over to archival Freedom News Network, this bill prevents that.

Real reform

Completely missing from H.R. 2323 is any discussion of what audiences abroad may want from U.S. international broadcasting. This bill is an exercise of central planning rather than a market-based approach to international broadcasting. It is essentially how Radio Moscow was organized in the Cold War years, and how RT (nee Russia Today) and sputniknews.com (the evolution of Radio Moscow) are organized now.

Real reform — market-based reform — would put the audience front and center. The audience wants news that is more credible than the news they get from their state-controlled domestic media. News achieves credibility by the absence of strings attached. H.R. 2323 is replete with such strings.

Furthermore, the audience wants a comprehensive news service. In most cases, they are mostly interested in about their own country, but not to the exclusion of news about the rest of the world and about the United States. A successful international broadcasting effort would provide all the news from the convenience of one source. This is basically how the BBC World Service, the world's most successful international broadcasting organization, does it.

If I, heaven forbid, were a member of Congress, I would introduce a bill to consolidate all the many, many entities into one corporation with one bipartisan board to protect it from U.S. government kibitzing. The corporation would provide *all* the news, not new tied to an agenda, in proportions (target-country news, world news, U.S. news) appropriate to the needs of each target audience. If there is an urge to advocate for U.S. policies, there are public diplomacy offices within the State Department tasked with such a mission.

Now I must go clean the cat box.

Trends in tropical bands broadcasting 2015

by Anker Petersen, editor of the Domestic Broadcasting Survey

Since the Danish Shortwave Club International (DSWCI) published its first Tropical Bands Survey in 1973, I have registered

which stations are active based upon loggings from our members and other DXers around the world. Here is an updated status. Clandestine and Pirate stations are not included.

During the past year, tropical shortwave stations continued to slowly disappear. This is a worldwide trend. Clearly, the reason is that other media are receiving a higher priority than keeping elderly shortwave transmitters on line. However, there was only a minor fall from 157 last year to 147 frequencies this year. The People's Republic of China increased its numbers of transmit-

ters; while Peru, Brazil and India decreased their numbers of active transmitters. But if this constantly falling trend continues, by 2020 there will only be a few stations left on the tropical bands!

Here are some stations on the Tropical Bands, which have closed down during 2013-2014:

Domestic Broadcasting Survey

There are numerous providers of free radio broadcasting information on the Internet today. Although the "free" price is reasonable, these publications tend to be lacking in terms of the quality, consistency and reliability of information particularly in the areas of tropical band and domestic band shortwave station listening. One question I frequently field from newer shortwave listeners who are first discovering domestic shortwave broadcasting and/or the tropical bands is what a good, reliable source of information is since much of the "free" Internet material is lacking in terms of

quality. The latest Domestic Broadcasting Survey, 17th Edition (DBS or DBS-17), which was once again edited by Denmark's world-renowned DXer Anker Petersen, is one resource that provides an accurate DX reference for the tropical band and domestic band shortwave listening enthusiast each year. Published in April by the Danish Shortwave Club International (DSWCI), the DBS continues to be the top annual publication devoted to tropical and domestic band shortwave broadcasting stations. Along with its monthly updated graphical companion, the Tropical Band Monitor (TBM), the combination of these two DX references continues to be unbeatable in quality, timeliness and value to the serious shortwave listener. The DSWCI offers the DBS in electronic form (PDF format), which provides for a substantial price reduction over the paper version increasing its value and speed of delivery. For traditionalists,

the paper version of the DBS is available. Either way you will be receiving and using an important DX resource produced by an international array of top notch DXers that will prove its worth to you time after time. The DBS and TBM references are usually the first items I pack on each of the French Creek State Park DXpeditions.

As in past years, a copy of the Press Release can be found on the DSWCI website at www.dswci.org. By clicking on the Domestic Band Survey, you will see the color front page of Amazigh musicians and shooting soldiers on horseback south of Agadir, Morocco. The Amazigh's are the original population of Morocco, which later was invaded by Arabs and Romans. The photo, which was taken by Editor Petersen during his world travels, and a sample listings from this year's DBS along with reviews from last year's edition all can be found at that location. Anker's annual colorful cover photographs for the DBS continues to provide the local flavor associated with a domestic shortwave listening market.

The DSWCI is now fifty-eight years old. It has a worldwide membership of experienced shortwave listeners scattered in 34 different countries all over the globe. Anker draws upon the knowledge and skills of the DSWCI's international array of top-flight DXers to produce this unique and extremely valuable hobby resource. However, about 40 domestic shortwave stations frequencies have left the bands, so DBS-17 is thinner than past editions. In order to make the DBS reliable, the club's own monitors around the world checked the 530 station shortwave frequencies - down from 570 station frequencies the previous year - on the air throughout the period April 2014 to March 2015. In addition to the club's extensive monitoring activity, the new survey is also based upon many official sources and DX bulletins with A15 schedules included when available. Over the years, the DSWCI has published some of the best non-commercial hobby references available to the shortwave listener. The electronic and print editions of DBS-17 continue in this grand tradition. It is an essential reference for serious shortwave listeners and DXers.

This is the seventeenth year that the DSWCI has incorporated its invaluable tropical band survey into a broader national survey that includes all domestic shortwave broadcasting. The old Tropical Band Survey (TBS) portion of this publication, which has been tops in the field of shortwave broadcast lists for many years, is in its 43rd year. Because most of the club's members devote the majority of their DXing time to domestic broadcasting stations on the tropical and international shortwave bands, many years ago the DSWCI decided to expand the traditional tropical band survey to include stations broadcasting to a domestic audience on the international shortwave bands. Consequently, the DSWCI now publishes a superb, comprehensive reference of domestic shortwave broadcasting throughout the shortwave spectrum. The DBS-17 covers all active stations broadcasting to a domestic audience between the frequencies of 2,300 kHz to 30,000 kHz. Part 1 is the 43rd edition of Tropical Band Survey covering all active broadcasting stations in the 2300 to 5700 kHz range including clandestine stations. Part 2 covers the domestic stations on the international bands above 5700 kHz broadcasting to a domestic radio audience. Part 3 contains deleted frequencies between 2 and 30 MHz, which have not been reported heard during the last five years, but may reappear at some future point in time. Unfortunately, this latter section continues to grow at a faster rate each year.

As in past years, a valuable, unique feature of the DBS-17 is the right hand column called Last Log. This column features the last month, and year prior to the March 31, 2015 deadline, when a particular station was reported by a DXer somewhere in the world. This gives the listener a reasonable indication of the audibility of the shortwave broadcasting station. As part of the updating process, most frequencies that have not been heard in the last year have been deleted from the list and moved to a section at the end of the survey, Part 3 as discussed above. This updating procedure keeps the DBS current and very user friendly. No other frequency list has this unique feature! My own personal monitoring and checking confirms that the 2015 edition of the

Domestic Broadcasting Survey continues the tradition of providing very accurate and extremely useful information for the serious shortwave DXer. Consequently, the DBS is an extremely valuable addition to any shortwave listener's DX shack where published radio resources are necessary in pursuit of elusive DX station catches. My copy of the Domestic Band Survey sits on my desk in the shack along with its companion, the Tropical Band Monitor, next to my communications receivers at all times.

To assure reliability, each of the 530 station frequencies has been checked by the club's extensive collection of worldwide shortwave monitoring experts since the last publication through the March closing date. Stations confirmed as being active is marked with an "A" (regular), or "B" (irregular), "C" (sporadic) or "D" (likely inactive) in the list. This simple coding system provides valuable information when tuning the bands while trying to get a handle on rare, exotic shortwave DX catches. As a result of extensive monitoring, most of the frequencies already have been confirmed as being active in 2015.

The previously mentioned Tropical Bands Monitor feature was added in 2005 as a monthly updater to the DBS. Its introduction provided a readily available electronic update of broadcasting stations below 5700 kHz using a color-coded graphical presentation format. It has been a big success making the DBS/TBM combination an extremely valuable tool for shortwave monitoring activity. This website based feature, which is updated each month, helps to keep the DBS-17 current. All buyers of DBS-17 get a username and password to the monthly updates on the tropical bands published as "Tropical Bands Monitor" on the club's website. At www.dswci.org/tbm you can follow the activity of each station during 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014 with their collection of annual Tropical Band Monitors. I download the latest version each month, it is usually available 3 or 4 days after the close of the previous month, and use it as a ready guide to what is being heard around the world on the domestic shortwave frequencies. This service alone is worth more than the price

of the DBS itself. I can't over emphasize the value the TBM adds to the DBS. Together they are an indispensable package of DX reference sources that are updated each month. DSWCI members also receive periodic updates issued in the *Shortwave News* bulletin published by the club and through its electronic *DX Window* bi-weekly newsletter (a service similar to our own weekly electronic Flashsheet). These extra services keep the domestic band survey accurate, up-to-date and essential tools in chasing elusive shortwave DX catches. Details about becoming a DSWCI member are available at the club website. The electronic, pdf-format, club membership option substantially reduces the cost of being a member by reducing the printing and postage costs. Because of the club's strong DX culture and its array of international DX'ers, membership in the DSWCI is well worth the annual dues.

The Domestic Broadcasting Survey and Tropical Band Monitor are high quality shortwave broadcast DX resources made available at a very reasonable price. The combination of high quality and low price make the DBS and TBM unbeatable in today's global resource reference marketplace. If you listen to domestic broadcasters, the DBS-17, along with the monthly updates through the TBM, is a "must have" addition to the radio shack's hobby literature resource bundle needed while tuning the shortwave bands. As I mentioned before, these are the first resources I pack when attending French Creek DXpeditions. I can't imagine DX'ing the shortwave bands without a copy of the Domestic Band Survey and the latest graphical update of the Tropical Band Monitor at my side. The combination of highly accurate data in an easy to use format makes them extremely valuable hobby resources.

How easy is the Domestic Broadcasting Survey to use? Simple, the DBS-17 is very straightforward and easy to use. The first column provides the reception code, A, B, or C as previously described. The second column lists the frequency. The third column provides the station transmitter output. The fourth column designates the broadcasting country utilizing the International Telecommunications Union (ITU)

country code abbreviations. For those not familiar with these abbreviations, a complete list of ITU country codes is given on page 3 of the DBS. The fifth column provides the station name and/or call letters and location. The next column provides transmission times and other useful information about the station such as operating schedules during Ramadan for Middle East and Indonesian stations. Other useful features for easy station identification are the parallel frequencies and station ID information. The final column is the Last Log feature previously described. Also, the survey includes a listing of Indonesian provinces and special districts, which is extremely useful for DX'ers with an interest in that part of shortwave broadcasting world. See the sample extracts from the DBS at the end of this review.

The 20-page A-4 size Domestic Broadcasting Survey is available in electronic form in pdf-format of about 350 kB. The electronic DBS-17 is available via e-mail for just US\$6.00, EUR 4, or 2 International Reply Coupons ("IRCs"). The print edition is available for only US\$12.00, EUR 8, or 4 IRCs. The 2015 edition of the Domestic Broadcasting Survey continues the long-standing, excellent tradition of being a very useful and reliable DX'ing resource that should be in the radio shack of every serious shortwave radio monitor. I use the DBS on a regular basis while tuning the shortwave bands from home. Though some enjoy operating a computer while tuning the bands, I print out a hardcopy to keep nearby thus eliminating another evil electronic device from the radio shack while listening. During French Creek DXpeditions, my copy of the domestic Broadcasting Survey is in constant use! The pdf-format DBS is incredibly inexpensive, extremely useful and an indispensable DX reference tool. The monthly update to the Tropical Band Monitor keeps the information current. At only US\$6.00, the electronic Domestic Broadcasting Survey continues to be the "best buy" of any hobby resource on the market today. Add the Tropical Band Monitor as a bonus and you have the superior package of shortwave DX reference tools. You must have the new DBS, which is an outstanding piece of DX hobby research. This is a "must have" for every DX radio shack and I can highly recommend its purchase so order a copy to enhance your shortwave DXing listening sessions.

Survey On Radio Listening

Italy

The idea for this survey was brought up in January 2015 in order to find out to how radio listeners feel about the Italian DX Magazine. This survey, promoted by

Giovanni Sergi and Dario Gabrielli, was conducted in the hope that more listeners could be encouraged to collaborate with this quarterly publication. The survey was targeted to the Italian DX Group, both via the Internet and through other radio listeners' magazines and on some radio stations' listener comment sections. The closing date for entries was 15 May 2015 and the total number received was 117 from 29 countries.

Data includes the following preferences:

- 115 people like to listen to radio broadcast station.
- 43 people like utilities radio, 38 people enjoy Ham Radio.
- 116 people like to listen to programs with normal radio.
- 32 people like to listen to programs via streaming.
- 5 people listen via satellite.
- 15 people like to listen via remote SDRs.
- 95 people like to listen to programs.
- 57 people like to collect QSL cards.

In reading radio-related magazines, the hard copy paper format was preferred by 38 people while 27 people preferred the

PDF format. Both formats were acceptable to 56 people.

The page dedicated to technical topics was liked by 70 while the culture page was liked by 32 people. 78 people liked to read both pages.

Radio listening logs were liked by 66 people and the postal page was liked by 60 people. Radio competitions were liked by 42 people and the page dedicated to QSLs received was liked by 57 people.

Equal numbers of radio listeners were found to use "traditional" radios and SDRs, either through direct ownership of the latter or via remote SDRs accessed through the Internet.

One listens to radio to follows programs, to collect QSL cards or "other". Checking the later option presumably refers to medium wave listening, DX or CW listening, interest in propagation studies or alternative methods of transmission, for information, news of the world, channels on the tropical bands and other activities.

Report of former BBC Seychelles Relay Site "Hand Over".

(Seychelles News Agency - Tuesday November 18, 2014 via Worldwide DX Club)

Tuesday November 18 marked the closure of an iconic chapter of Seychelles' history, signalling the end of an era when information was much more difficult to come by. With much of Africa joining the internet and mobile phone revolution, the times of

trying to glean information about happenings in the rest of the world on a crackly AM radio station have now passed by.

Over 25 years after its establishment, the site of the BBC's former Indian Ocean Relay Station (IORS), located at Grand Anse, on the western side of the largest inhabited island in the archipelago, was handed

back to the government of Seychelles by the country's British High Commissioner, Lindsay Skoll.

The station transmitted BBC World Service programmes since 1988 via shortwave to listeners across East Africa in a range of languages, including the BBC's English-language output for Africa as well as programmes in Swahili, Kinyarwanda, Kirundi, Somali and French.

In November 2013, the BBC announced its intention to cease all its shortwave transmission services from Seychelles due to a gradual and irreversible fall in demand for shortwave radio services, and on March 29 this year, the BBC IORS retransmission services from Seychelles were officially switched off. BBC World Service broadcasts in East Africa are still available via the internet and also via various other localized frequencies.

The handing over of the site to the Ministry of Land Use and Housing (MLUH) also included the station's buildings and equipment, all of which are still in working order. The site is spread over a 32,000 square metre property, occupied under a lease dating back to March 27, 1985.

A Unifying Force

Speaking at the handing over ceremony yesterday, High Commissioner Skoll said the relay station had brought the services of the BBC to parts of the world that really needed it.

"I think BBC stands for inspiration, values, citizenship and unity," she said. "It brings us together, it makes connections and thereby helps listeners make sense of what is a very fast changing and increasingly global and challenging world."

The Chief Operating Officer of BBC World Service Group, Richard Thomas, thanked the people of Seychelles for the 25 years of smooth operations, adding that the station's assets have remained in good condition due to the diligence of the local staff and the

station's operating team.

"The BBC has been very proud to be broadcasting from Seychelles for 25 years and we have covered some huge stories and broadcast them into Africa in particular - obviously the Gulf war, the death of Nelson Mandela - those are some of the events we have been proud to broadcast across Africa and to other parts of the world," he said.

"And although we are not broadcasting on shortwave from here, we are delighted that we will still be broadcasting on medium wave to the people of the Seychelles, so the BBC will still be here and we are delighted that is the case."

Seychelles' Foreign Affairs Minister, Jean Paul Adam, said that just as the station had served an important international cause during its years of operation, it would now serve as an equally important national cause: that of agricultural development, where in a small island state such as Seychelles, the minister pointed out that every square metre counted.

The Nation's Bread Basket

Now that the site has been officially handed back to the government, MLUH has divided the assets among four local institutions. The Ministry of Natural Resources will take up occupation of the main station building for use as the new Veterinary and Livestock Services centre, which used to be situated at Union Vale, close to the capital city of Victoria.

The relay station site was situated on land formerly used by farmers of long tradition right up until the site was allocated to the BBC in the mid-1980s, and the flat area is likely to see a return to that tradition.

Currently, the immediate surrounds of the site consists of a national pig genetic centre, a newly-constructed soil diagnostic laboratory, the national agricultural inputs bulk store, office buildings belonging to the Ministry of Natural Resources and some livestock farms. A small government-built

housing estate of 18 flats and a natural wetland of significant ecological importance also surround the area.

The Minister of Natural Resources, Peter Sinon, described the decision to allocate these assets to agricultural development as testimony of the government's resolve to revive agriculture in Seychelles.


"Grand Anse, Mahe has always been at the heart of Seychelles agricultural development," he said. "Along with the new laboratory for plants and research, located in the same district, having the livestock and veterinary facilities here makes it the ideal place for our bread basket."

Dr. Christelle Dailoo, the Director of Livestock Services at the Seychelles Agricultural Agency (SAA), told SNA that there are plans to develop laboratory services that will allow SAA to perform livestock laboratory testing that could not be offered to farmers before and that were being sent overseas or to the public health lab.


A Communications Boost for Seychelles

The station is equipped with 33KV high-voltage equipment and transformers which will now go into the possession of the Public Utilities Corporation, while the Seychelles Civil Aviation Authority (SCAA) will take over three of the BBC's four steel communications towers and the annex building.


The SCAA will use the towers to strengthen its air communication and surveillance capabilities and the annex building will be used to house a new high-frequency aviation communications radio system to help control air traffic coming in from the west of the island.

The fourth steel tower will be allocated to the local telecommunications company Cable and Wireless for mobile based telecommunications.

Tsipras informed the two men that ERT is officially reopening next Monday and suggested that their first priority should be the orderly return of former employees, who had been laid off, to work. The Greek premier said that ERT should set new standards in public broadcasting, be pluralistic and independent. He also asked them to restore Greek people's faith to the national broadcaster and provide good programming for all. Tsipras also asked for fair and objective reporting of news, suggesting that ERT should be objective, not a government mouthpiece, and should not be afraid to criticize government policies when necessary. Finally, he asked them to be present at the ERT headquarters' courtyard celebration on June 11, the anniversary of the national broadcaster shutdown in 2013. 

TRANS WORLD RADIO TARGETS Russia, Belarus and Ukraine via Austria / Germany): Trans World Radio appears to now have several separate studio entities in Russia to create local language programs for retransmission on MW, FM and SW. The short-wave transmissions are presently relayed on 7300 (Nauen) and 9470 (Moosbrunn) at 1400-1430 daily. Based on the languages, one can surmise that 1. programming on local Mondays should most likely be from TWR Belarus, 2. on Sundays from TWR Ukraine, 3. and other days from TWR Russia or Ukraine (since both these create Russian language content). Information is a little bit sketchy, but here's a start: TWR Ukraine (Trans Svitove Radio), Kiev, Ukraine. According to a letter received from Mr. Oleksandr Chmut, the director of Trans World Radio Ukraine, they have two studios in Kiev and produce 15 programs per week in Ukrainian and Russian for MW, SW and some local FM stations in Ukraine. They also publish a magazine called "Ahteha" (Antenna) four times per year. Website is

www.TWR-UA.org and Facebook page is www.facebook.com/twrukr. Ukrainian language programming is broadcast on SWBC on Sundays according to their schedule, so that appears to be the day to log programming that definitely originates from TWR Ukraine. Email address is info@twr-ua.org. Their address is Trans World Radio Ukraine, Trans Svitove Radio, a/c 100 м. Kyiv 02090, Ukraine (or TCP-Україна а/с 100, 02090, Київ.). TWR Belarus, Brest, Belarus. This should be available via same SW relays on local Mondays, at least according to the schedule. Their mailing address is TWR Belarus, a/c 45, 224020 Brest, Belarus (or ТМР-Беларусь а/я 45, 224020 Брест). Email is btwr@brest.by and website is listed as www.twr.fm although neither of those web addresses were found to be working right now. TWR Russia, in St. Petersburg, Russia. This should be available on SWBC on days when Russian language broadcasts are taking place -- that is, unless they are originating from TWR Ukraine. This remains to be sorted out. 
